8 **PART I. INTRODUCTION AND TITLE OF ACT**

10 **TITLE**

11 **SECTION 1.1.** This act shall be known as the "Current Operations and Capital
12 Improvements Appropriations Act of 2011."

13
14 **INTRODUCTION**

15 **SECTION 1.2.** The appropriations made in this act are for maximum amounts
16 necessary to provide the services and accomplish the purposes described in the budget.
17 Savings shall be effected where the total amounts appropriated are not required to perform
18 these services and accomplish these purposes and, except as allowed by the State Budget Act,
19 or this act, the savings shall revert to the appropriate fund at the end of each fiscal year.

SECTION 2.2.(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-187.9(b)(1) and G.S. 105-187.9(b)(2), the sum to be transferred under those subdivisions for the 2011-2012 fiscal year is forty-one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$41,500,000) and for the 2012-2013 fiscal year is twenty-seven million six hundred thousand dollars (\$27,600,000).

SECTION 2.2.(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 115C-546.1, the Secretary of Revenue shall transfer the funds specified in G.S. 115C-546.1(b) to the State Controller for deposit in Nontax Budget Code 19978 (Intrastate Transfers) during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium to offset continued operations of the State's public schools.

SECTION 2.2.(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, effective July 1, 2011, the following amounts shall be transferred to the State Controller to be deposited in Nontax Budget Code 19878 (Intrastate Transfers) or the appropriate budget code as determined by the State Controller. These funds shall be used to support the General Fund appropriations as specified in this act for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

1 **SECTION 2.2.(e)** Pursuant to Section 2(b) of S.L. 1999-2, the fifty percent (50%)
2 of the 2011-2012 and the 2012-2013 annual installment payments to the North Carolina State
3 Specific Account that would have been transferred to The Golden L.E.A.F. (Long-Term
4 Economic Advancement Foundation), Inc. are transferred to the General Fund.

5 **SECTION 2.2.(f)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-187.19(b), effective
6 for taxes levied during the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Secretary of Revenue shall credit to the
7 General Fund the net tax proceeds that G.S. 105-187.19(b) directs the Secretary to credit to the
8 Scrap Tire Disposal Account.

9 **SECTION 2.2.(g)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-187.24, effective for
10 taxes levied during the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Secretary of Revenue shall credit to the
11 General Fund the net tax proceeds that G.S. 105-187.24 directs the Secretary to credit to the
12 White Goods Management Account.

13 **SECTION 2.2.(h)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-228.30(b) and
14 G.S. 113-44.15, effective for taxes levied during the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Secretary of
15 Revenue shall credit the sum of eight million four hundred thirty-five thousand dollars
16 (\$8,435,000) to the General Fund of the net tax proceeds that G.S. 105-228.30(b) directs the
17 Secretary to credit to the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund.

18 **SECTION 2.2.(i)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 105-228.30(b) and
19 G.S. 113-77.9, effective for taxes levied during the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Secretary of
20 Revenue shall credit the sum of eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) to the General Fund of the
21 net tax proceeds that G.S. 105-228.30(b) directs the Secretary to credit to the Natural Heritage
22 Trust Fund.

23 **SECTION 2.2.(j)** Of the funds available in the year-end 2010-2011 fiscal year
24 fund balance, the Director of the Budget may use up to one hundred twenty-five million dollars
25 (\$125,000,000) to repay the federal Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services for excess
26 Medicaid funds drawn down during the 2009-2010 fiscal year. The Director of the Budget
27 shall report the amount of funds used under this section no later than 30 days after payment to
28 the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Chairs of the Senate and
29 House of Representatives Appropriations Committees, and the Fiscal Research Division.

STATE HIGHWAY PATROL FUNDS TRANSFER

21 **SECTION 3.3.(a)** In fiscal year 2011-2012, the State Treasurer shall transfer one
22 hundred ninety-three million five hundred twenty-seven thousand three hundred dollars
23 (\$193,527,300) of the funds allocated to the Highway Fund under G.S. 105-449.125 to the
24 General Fund. The transfer of funds authorized by this section may be made by transferring
25 one-fourth of the amount at the end of each quarter in the fiscal year or by transferring the full
26 amount annually on July 1 of each fiscal year, subject to the availability of revenue.

27 **SECTION 3.3.(b)** In fiscal year 2012-2013, the State Treasurer shall transfer one
28 hundred ninety million three hundred ninety-four thousand dollars (\$190,394,000) of the funds
29 allocated to the Highway Fund under G.S. 105-449.125 to the General Fund. The transfer of
30 funds authorized by this section may be made by transferring one-fourth of the amount at the
31 end of each quarter in the fiscal year or by transferring the full amount annually on July 1 of
32 each fiscal year, subject to the availability of revenue.

33 **SECTION 3.3.(c)** The Office of State Budget and Management and the Office of
34 State Controller shall discontinue use of the Crime Control and Public Safety – Highway Fund
35 budget code (Budget Code 24960) and shall certify funds appropriated by this act for the State
36 Highway Patrol under a separate fund code within the Crime Control and Public Safety –
37 General Fund budget code (Budget Code 14900). The Department of Transportation, Office of
38 State Budget and Management, and Office of State Controller shall certify and account for
39 State matching funds for Motor Carrier Safety Assistance Program grants, federal funds, and
40 other receipts budgeted for State Highway Patrol programs, as necessary.

41 **SECTION 3.3.(d)** G.S. 20-194 reads as rewritten:

42 "**§ 20-194. ~~Expense of administration; defense~~ Defense of members and other State**
43 **law-enforcement officers in civil actions; payment of judgments.**

44 (a) ~~All expenses incurred in carrying out the provisions of this Article shall be paid out~~

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PART V. OTHER APPROPRIATIONS

APPROPRIATION OF OTHER FUNDS

SECTION 5.1.(a) State funds, as defined in G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(25), are appropriated and authorized as provided in G.S. 143C-1-2 for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, with the adjustments made to the continuation budget as reflected in the Governor's Recommended Budget and Budget Support document, as follows:

- (1) For all budget codes listed in "The State of North Carolina Governor's Recommended Budget, 2011-2013" and in the Budget Support Document, cash balances and receipts are appropriated up to the amounts specified, as adjusted by the General Assembly, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the 2012-2013 fiscal year. Funds may be expended only for the programs, purposes, objects, and line items or as otherwise authorized by the General Assembly. Expansion budget funds listed in those documents are appropriated only as otherwise provided in this act.
- (2) Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivision (1) of this subsection:
 - a. Any receipts that are required to be used to pay debt service requirements for various outstanding bond issues and certificates of participation are appropriated up to the actual amounts received for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the 2012-2013 fiscal year and shall be used only to pay debt service requirements.
 - b. Other funds, cash balances, and receipts of funds that meet the definition issued by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board of a trust or agency fund are appropriated for and in the amounts required to meet the legal requirements of the trust agreement for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

SECTION 5.1.(b) Receipts collected in a fiscal year in excess of the amounts authorized by this section shall remain unexpended and unencumbered until appropriated by the General Assembly in a subsequent fiscal year, unless the expenditure of overrealized receipts in the fiscal year in which the receipts were collected is authorized by the State Budget Act. Overrealized receipts are appropriated up to the amounts necessary to implement this subsection.

SECTION 5.1.(c) In addition to the consultation and reporting requirements set out in G.S. 143C-6-4, the Office of State Budget and Management shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and to the Fiscal Research Division within 30 days after the end of each quarter on any overrealized receipts approved for expenditure under this subsection by the Director of the Budget. The report shall include the source of the receipt, the amount overrealized, the amount authorized for expenditure, and the rationale for expenditure.

SECTION 5.1.(d) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b) of this section, there is appropriated from the Reserve for Reimbursements to Local Governments and Shared Tax Revenues for each fiscal year an amount equal to the amount of the distributions required by law to be made from that reserve for that fiscal year.

OTHER RECEIPTS FROM PENDING GRANT AWARDS

SECTION 5.2.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4, State agencies may, with approval of the Director of the Budget and after consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, spend funds received from grants awarded subsequent to the enactment of this act.

SECTION 5.2.(b) The Office of State Budget and Management shall work with the recipient State agencies to budget grant awards according to the annual program needs and within the parameters of the respective granting entities. Depending on the nature of the award, additional State personnel may be employed on a time-limited basis. The Office of State Budget and Management shall consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to expending any funds received from grant awards. Funds received from such grants are hereby appropriated and shall be incorporated into the authorized budget of the recipient State agency.

SECTION 5.2.(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, no State agency may accept a grant not anticipated in this act if acceptance of the grant would obligate the State to make future expenditures relating to the program receiving the grant or would otherwise result in a financial obligation as a consequence of accepting the grant funds.

CIVIL FORFEITURE FUNDS

SECTION 5.3. Appropriations. – Appropriations are made from the Civil Penalty and Forfeiture Fund for the fiscal biennium ending June 30, 2013, as follows:

EDUCATION LOTTERY

SECTION 5.4.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164, the revenue used to support appropriations made in this act is transferred from the State Lottery Fund in the amount of four hundred twenty-four million nine hundred seventy-three thousand six hundred thirty dollars (\$424,973,630) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

SECTION 5.4.(b) Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164, the appropriations made from the Education Lottery Fund for the 2011-2012 fiscal year are as follows:

SECTION 5.4.(c) Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164, the North Carolina State Lottery Commission shall not transfer funds to the Education Lottery Reserve Fund for the 2011-2012 fiscal year or the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

SECTION 5.4.(d) Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164(c), G.S. 115C-546.2(d), or any other provision of law, funds appropriated in this section to the Public School Building Capital Fund for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be allocated to counties on the basis of average daily membership (ADM).

Counties may authorize local school administrative units to use funds received from the Public School Building Capital Fund pursuant to subsection (f) of this section for one or more of the following purposes only: (i) for school construction projects in accordance with G.S. 115C-546.2(d), (ii) to retire indebtedness incurred on or after January 1, 2003, in accordance with G.S. 115C-546.2(d), for school construction projects, and (iii) for classroom teachers. A county may authorize the use of these funds for classroom teachers only upon the request of the local board of education. Funds used for classroom teachers shall supplement and not supplant existing local current expense funding for the public schools.

SECTION 5.4.(e) Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164(c), Article 35A of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes, or any other provision of law, the funds appropriated in this section for

1 UNC Need-Based Financial Aid shall be administered in accordance with the policy adopted
2 by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina.

3 **SECTION 5.4.(f)** Notwithstanding G.S. 18C-164(f), if the actual net lottery
4 revenues for the 2011-2012 fiscal year exceed the amounts appropriated in subsection (b) of
5 this section, the excess net lottery revenues shall be allocated for school capital on the basis of
6 average daily membership.

8 **PART VI. GENERAL PROVISIONS**

9

10 **CLARIFY CERTIFIED BUDGET**

11 **SECTION 6.1.(a)** The purpose of this section is to clarify the distinction between
12 changes to the budget enacted by the General Assembly in this act and changes made by the
13 Director of the Budget pursuant to other authority.

14 **SECTION 6.1.(b)** For the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, and notwithstanding the
15 provisions of Chapter 143C of the General Statutes or any other provision of law, the certified
16 budget for each State agency shall reflect only the total of all appropriations enacted for each
17 State agency by the General Assembly in this act as modified by this act; therefore, the Director
18 of the Budget shall modify the certified budget only to reflect the following actions and only to
19 the extent that they are authorized by this act:

- 20 (1) The allocation of funds set out in reserves.
- 21 (2) Government reorganizations.

22 The Director of the Budget shall set out all other budget modifications in the authorized budget.
23

24 **CONTINGENCY AND EMERGENCY FUND LIMITATION**

25 **SECTION 6.2.** For the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, and notwithstanding the
26 provisions of G.S. 143C-4-4(b), funds appropriated to the Contingency and Emergency Fund
27 may be used only for expenditures required (i) by a court or Industrial Commission order or (ii)
28 to respond to events as authorized under G.S. 166A-5(1)a.9. of the North Carolina Emergency
29 Management Act of 1977.
30

31 **ESTABLISHING OR INCREASING FEES UNDER THIS ACT**

32 **SECTION 6.3.(a)** Notwithstanding G.S. 12-3.1, an agency is not required to
33 consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to
34 establishing or increasing a fee as authorized or anticipated in this act.

35 **SECTION 6.3.(b)** Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.1A(a), an agency may adopt an
36 emergency rule in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1A to establish or increase a fee as authorized
37 by this act if the adoption of a rule would otherwise be required under Article 2A of Chapter
38 150B of the General Statutes.
39

40 **CONSULTATION REQUIRED BEFORE CREATION OF NEW FUNDS**

41 **SECTION 6.4.** Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-1-3 or any other provision of law to
42 the contrary, the Office of State Budget and Management and the Office of the State Controller
43 shall consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to the
44 establishment of a new fund as defined in G.S. 143C-1-3.
45

46 **INTERIM APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEES/MEETINGS/CONSULTATION BY** 47 **GOVERNOR**

48 **SECTION 6.5.(a)** The General Assembly finds that:

- 49 (1) The power of appropriation is vested only with the General Assembly; and
- 50 (2) Article V, Section 7 of the North Carolina Constitution requires that no
51 money shall be drawn from the State treasury but in consequence of
52 appropriations made by law; and
- 53 (3) Article III, Section 5 of the North Carolina Constitution requires the
54 Governor to administer the budget as enacted by the General Assembly; and
- 55 (4) Proper oversight of public funds and oversight of the execution and
56 administration of the State's budget are tantamount to good stewardship and
57 proper governance; and

- 1 (5) It is the proper duty of a legislative body to examine and review the
2 expenditure of public funds on an ongoing basis and that the appropriations
3 committees of the General Assembly shall meet as needed to fulfill this duty.

4 **SECTION 6.5.(b)** Purpose. – The House of Representatives and Senate
5 Appropriations Committees (the Committees) may meet monthly during the period between
6 legislative sessions to perform ongoing examination and oversight of State agencies' execution
7 and administration of the budget, including review of agency expenditures and collections of
8 receipts, agency compliance with State laws governing the expenditure of public moneys,
9 compliance with legislative policies and intent, and the ongoing fiscal stability and integrity of
10 State government.

11 **SECTION 6.5.(c)** The Committees may perform the following:

- 12 (1) Review the expenditure of State funds as to:
13 a. Conformity with State law.
14 b. Conformity with legislative intent.
15 c. Necessity with meeting program or purpose objectives.
16 (2) Conduct zero-based budgeting or another systematic approach to examine
17 the use of State funds on an ongoing basis.
18 (3) Receive quarterly analyses of the State's revenues and expenditures as
19 prepared by the Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative Services
20 Commission.
21 (4) Propose legislation that would result in enhanced program accountability.
22 (5) Provide oversight of fiscal studies.
23 (6) Provide oversight of justification reviews conducted by the Fiscal Research
24 Division of the Legislative Services Commission, whereby programs are
25 evaluated periodically for continuing appropriations. The results of these
26 justification reviews shall be made to the Appropriations Committees at the
27 beginning of each legislative session.
28 (7) Evaluate State agencies' plans or proposals regarding the funding of new or
29 expanded programs and services not previously approved by the General
30 Assembly as part of its Appropriations Act.
31 (8) Produce written reports of findings and recommendations as follows:
32 a. To the General Assembly. If findings arrived at during a study have a
33 potential impact on appropriations deliberations, the findings shall be
34 presented immediately to the committees. These reports shall contain
35 recommendations for appropriate executive action and when
36 legislation is considered necessary to effect change, draft legislation
37 for that purpose may be included.
38 b. To the Governor. If findings arrived at during a review have a
39 potential impact on the current budget, the findings shall be
40 presented immediately to the Governor and shall contain
41 recommendations for appropriate executive action.

42 **SECTION 6.5.(d)** The Committees shall be consulted by the Governor prior to any
43 of the following:

- 44 (1) Establishment of permanent State positions in the executive branch unless
45 authorized in this act.
46 (2) Expenditures in excess of the total requirements of a purpose or program as
47 enacted by the General Assembly and as provided by G.S. 143C-6-4.
48 (3) Extraordinary measures taken under Article III, Section 5(3) of the North
49 Carolina Constitution to effect necessary economies in State expenditures
50 required for balancing the budget due to a revenue shortfall, including, but
51 not limited to, the following: loans among funds, personnel freezes or
52 layoffs, capital project reversions, program eliminations, and use of reserves.
53 However, if the Committees fail to meet within 10 calendar days of a request
54 by the Governor for its consultation, the Governor may proceed to take the
55 appropriate and necessary actions and shall then report those actions at the
56 next meeting of the Committees.
57 (4) Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-8-7, G.S. 143C-8-12, or any law to the contrary,
58 the Committees shall be consulted by the Governor prior to approval of new
59 capital improvement projects funded from gifts, grants, receipts, special

1 funds, self-liquidating indebtedness, and other funds or any combination of
2 funds for projects not specifically authorized by the General Assembly. The
3 consultation shall include a description for each proposed capital project as
4 delineated in G.S. 143C-8-6(e).
5

6 **JUSTIFICATION/OPERATIONAL REVIEWS**

7 **SECTION 6.6.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to subject the operations
8 of State government and the operations of nongovernmental entities receiving State funds to
9 periodic Justification Reviews. The Reviews shall be conducted by the Fiscal Research
10 Division and shall specifically address the following questions:

- 11 (1) Is the program or service fulfilling the letter and/or intent of its legislative
12 mandate?
- 13 (2) Is that mandate still justified, either in its original form or some modified
14 form?
- 15 (3) Does the program follow identified best practices to address its mandate?
- 16 (4) Is the program duplicative of other services provided by the public or private
17 sectors?
- 18 (5) Is the program effective?
- 19 (6) Is the program efficient?
- 20 (7) Are there any other obstacles that might limit the program's ability to
21 accomplish its mission?

22 **SECTION 6.6.(b)** For the fiscal year 2011-2012, the following programs or
23 services shall be the subject of review:

- 24 (1) Lumberton Farmer's Market – Department of Agriculture and Consumer
25 Services.
- 26 (2) DENR Regional Offices – Department of Environment and Natural
27 Resources.
- 28 (3) DHHS postsecondary education programs.
- 29 (4) Environmental Rating Scales Contract.

30 **SECTION 6.6.(c)** By May 1, 2012, the Fiscal Research Division shall report its
31 findings and recommendations to the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations
32 Committees. The report shall:

- 33 (1) Provide a description of each program.
- 34 (2) Identify major policy issues that the General Assembly should address.
- 35 (3) Explore means to achieve program objectives more efficiently.
- 36 (4) Characterize the likely results of alternative funding levels and/or
37 opportunities to save taxpayer dollars.
- 38 (5) Identify performance measures that have been established by the agency and
39 the usefulness of those performance measures, as well as the agency's
40 progress toward meeting their established measures.
41

42 **CONTINUATION REVIEW OF CERTAIN FUNDS/PROGRAMS/DIVISIONS**

43 **SECTION 6.7.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to periodically and
44 systematically review the funds, agencies, divisions, and programs financed by State
45 government. This process is known as the Continuation Review Program. The Continuation
46 Review Program is intended to assist the General Assembly in determining whether to
47 continue, reduce, or eliminate funding for the State's funds, agencies, divisions, and programs
48 subject to continuation review.

49 **SECTION 6.7.(b)** The Appropriations Committees of the House of
50 Representatives and the Senate may review the funds, programs, and divisions listed in this
51 section and shall determine whether to continue, reduce, or eliminate funding for the funds,
52 programs, and divisions, subject to the Continuation Review Program. The Fiscal Research
53 Division may issue instructions to the State departments and agencies subject to continuation
54 review regarding the expected content and format of the reports required by this section. No
55 later than December 1, 2011, the following agencies shall report to the Fiscal Research
56 Division:

- 57 (1) Justice and Public Safety. –
 - 58 a. Drug Treatment Court.
 - 59 b. Family Court.

- 1 (2) Education. – Center for Public Television as provided by Section 9.1 of this
2 act.
- 3 (3) Natural and Economic Resources. –
4 a. Agriculture/Research Stations.
5 b. DENR/Prairie Ridge Ecostation.
6 c. Commerce/Office of Science and Technology.
7 d. Wildlife Resources Commission/Conservation Education.
- 8 (4) Health and Human Services. – Division of Information Resource
9 Management.
- 10 (5) General Government. – General Assembly Facility Services.
- 11 (6) Transportation. – Division of Motor Vehicles Drivers' License Program.

12 **SECTION 6.7.(c)** The continuation review reports required in this section shall
13 include the following information:

- 14 (1) A description of the fund, agency, division, or program mission, goals, and
15 objectives.
- 16 (2) The statutory objectives for the fund, agency, division, or program and the
17 problem or need addressed.
- 18 (3) The extent to which the fund, agency, division, or program objectives have
19 been achieved.
- 20 (4) The fund's, agency's, division's, or program's functions or programs
21 performed without specific statutory authority.
- 22 (5) The performance measures for each fund, agency, division, or program and
23 the process by which the performance measures determine efficiency and
24 effectiveness.
- 25 (6) Recommendations for statutory, budgetary, or administrative changes
26 needed to improve efficiency and effectiveness of services delivered to the
27 public.
- 28 (7) The consequences of discontinuing funding.
- 29 (8) Recommendations for improving services or reducing costs or duplication.
- 30 (9) The identification of policy issues that should be brought to the attention of
31 the General Assembly.
- 32 (10) Other information necessary to fully support the General Assembly's
33 Continuation Review Program along with any information included in
34 instructions from the Fiscal Research Division.

35 **SECTION 6.7.(d)** State departments and agencies identified in subsection (b) of
36 this section shall submit a final report to the General Assembly by March 1, 2012.

37 38 **STATE GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION**

39 **SECTION 6.8.** The Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations
40 (Commission) shall study the feasibility of creating a single department to support State
41 departments, agencies, and offices with services, including, but not limited to, human resource
42 management, information technology, purchasing, and budget and financial management. The
43 Commission shall report to the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations
44 Committees on its findings and recommendations upon the convening of the 2012 Regular
45 Session of the 2011 General Assembly.

46 In the conduct of this study, the Commission may consider the Governor's proposed
47 Department of Management and Administration as included in Executive Order 85, dated
48 March 25, 2011, entitled "Consolidation and Reorganization of Executive Branch Agencies to
49 Improve the Efficiency of State Government."

50 51 **UTILIZATION REVIEW/PUBLIC SCHOOL AND PUBLIC HEALTH NURSES**

52 **SECTION 6.9.(a)** Beginning July 1, 2011, the Fiscal Research Division, in
53 consultation with the Department of Public Instruction and the Department of Health and
54 Human Services, shall review all publicly (federal and State) funded public school nurse
55 positions assigned within or connected to those respective organizations in order to determine
56 the most effective and cost-efficient ways to provide needed nursing service to public school
57 students. The review shall identify specific areas where overlaps of service provision may exist.
58 The review shall focus on ways to maximize existing nursing resources and to change
59 prospectively the manner in which local school nurses are allocated to better address the needs

1 of students in the public schools at reasonable cost. Specifically, the review shall examine at
2 least all of the following:

- 3 (1) Feasibility of having the money all flow to local public health departments
4 for management and administration purposes to align health-related
5 activities with the local entity best equipped to manage.
- 6 (2) Feasibility of using a mix of licensed nurses, both registered nurses (RN)
7 and licensed practical nurses (LPN), to provide health care services in the
8 public schools.
- 9 (3) Feasibility of allowing a school nurse to be licensed as an LPN as long as the
10 nurse works under the direct supervision of an RN.
- 11 (4) Development of a new allocation formula that considers:
 - 12 a. Average daily membership.
 - 13 b. Local match requirement.
 - 14 c. A base amount for each local school administrative unit.

15 **SECTION 6.9.(b)** By May 1, 2012, the Fiscal Research Division shall report to the
16 House and Senate Appropriations Committees.

17 **GLOBAL TRANSPARK DEBT/REPORT**

18 **SECTION 6.10.(a)** G.S. 147-69.2(b)(11), as amended by Section 7 of S.L.
19 2005-144, Section 2 of S.L. 2005-201, Section 28.17 of S.L. 2005-276, Section 27.7 of S.L.
20 2007-323, and Section 25.2 of S.L. 2009-451, reads as rewritten:

21 "(b) It shall be the duty of the State Treasurer to invest the cash of the funds enumerated
22 in subsection (a) of this section in excess of the amount required to meet the current needs and
23 demands on such funds, selecting from among the following:

- 24 ...
- 25 (11) With respect to assets of the Escheat Fund, obligations of the North Carolina
26 Global TransPark Authority authorized by G.S. 63A-4(a)(22), not to exceed
27 twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000), that have a final maturity not later
28 than October 1, ~~2011~~, 2012. The obligations shall bear interest at the rate set
29 by the State Treasurer. No commitment to purchase obligations may be
30 made pursuant to this subdivision after September 1, 1993, and no
31 obligations may be purchased after September 1, 1994. In the event of a loss
32 to the Escheat Fund by reason of an investment made pursuant to this
33 subdivision, it is the intention of the General Assembly to hold the Escheat
34 Fund harmless from the loss by appropriating to the Escheat Fund funds
35 equivalent to the loss.

36 If any part of the property owned by the North Carolina Global
37 TransPark Authority now or in the future is divested, proceeds of the
38 divestment shall be used to fulfill any unmet obligations on an investment
39 made pursuant to this subdivision."

41 **SECTION 6.10.(b)** The Global TransPark Authority shall report to the Program
42 Evaluation Division on its strategic, business, and financial plans. The report shall be made by
43 no later than May 1, 2012, and shall include the Authority's proposed schedule to achieve
44 financial self-sufficiency and proposed schedule to repay to the Escheat Fund the investment
45 authorized under G.S. 147-69.2(b)(11) plus any accumulated interest, both of which totaled
46 forty million sixty-seven thousand nine hundred eighteen dollars and twenty cents
47 (\$40,067,918.20) as of March 31, 2011.

48 **HEALTH AND WELLNESS TRUST FUND AND TOBACCO TRUST FUND/FUTURE** 49 **MSA PAYMENTS**

50 **SECTION 6.11.(a)** Effective December 31, 2011, the Health and Wellness Trust
51 Fund (HWTF) is abolished. Article 6C of Chapter 147 of the General Statutes is repealed.

52 **SECTION 6.11.(b)** The title of Article 75 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes
53 reads as rewritten:

54 "Article 75.

55 Tobacco ~~Trust Fund Funds.~~"

56 **SECTION 6.11.(c)** G.S. 143-716 reads as rewritten:

57 **"§ 143-716. Definitions.**

58 The following definitions apply in this Article:
59

- 1 (1) ~~Commission.~~ The Tobacco Trust Fund Commission. ~~Board.~~ – The Board of
 2 Agriculture established in G.S. 106-2.
- 3 (2) ~~Compensatory programs.~~ – Programs developed by the ~~Commission~~ Board
 4 to identify, locate, compensate, and indemnify tobacco producers, allotment
 5 holders, and persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses who have
 6 suffered actual economic losses in this State due to lost quota, the decline in
 7 value of tobacco-related personal property assets, and declining market
 8 conditions resulting from the Master Settlement Agreement or declines in
 9 the tobacco-related segment of the State's economy.
- 10 ~~(3) Fund.~~ ~~The Tobacco Trust Fund.~~
- 11 (4) Master Settlement Agreement. – The settlement agreement between certain
 12 tobacco manufacturers and the states, as incorporated in the consent decree
 13 entered in the action of State of North Carolina v. Philip Morris,
 14 Incorporated, et al., 98 CVS 14377, in the General Court of Justice, Superior
 15 Court Division, Wake County, North Carolina.
- 16 (5) National Tobacco Grower Settlement Trust. – The trust established by
 17 tobacco companies to provide payments to tobacco growers and allotment
 18 holders in 14 states for the purposes of ameliorating potential adverse
 19 economic consequences of likely reduction in demand, sales, and prices for
 20 tobacco as an agricultural product as a result of the Master Settlement
 21 Agreement.
- 22 (6) Qualified agricultural programs. – Programs developed by the ~~Commission~~
 23 Board to support and foster the vitality and solvency of the tobacco-related
 24 segment of the State's agricultural economy, particularly the segment
 25 adversely affected by the Master Settlement Agreement, with the objective
 26 of alleviating and avoiding unemployment, preserving, and increasing local
 27 tax bases, and encouraging the economic stability of participants in the
 28 State's agricultural economy. Examples of qualified agricultural programs
 29 include programs to finance the modernization of farming equipment,
 30 programs to finance the conversion of existing equipment to conform to
 31 environmental and other regulatory requirements, and programs to finance
 32 the conversion or replacement of equipment in order to cultivate crops that
 33 are more profitable than are currently being cultivated.
- 34 (7) Tobacco product component business. – An individual, partnership, limited
 35 liability company, corporation, or other commercial entity that engages in
 36 the manufacture of component products for use in the manufacture of
 37 tobacco products.
- 38 (8) Tobacco-related business. – An individual, partnership, limited liability
 39 company, corporation, or other commercial entity that provides products or
 40 services used directly in (i) the production of tobacco, or (ii) support of the
 41 business of the production or sale of tobacco. The term does not include the
 42 manufacturing of tobacco products or the sale of tobacco products at
 43 wholesale or retail.
- 44 (9) Tobacco-related employment. – Employment in a tobacco-related business,
 45 or in the manufacturing of tobacco products or the component products used
 46 in the manufacture of tobacco products. The term does not include persons
 47 employed in the sale of tobacco products at wholesale or retail."

48 **SECTION 6.11.(d)** G.S. 143-717 is repealed.

49 **SECTION 6.11.(e)** G.S. 143-718 reads as rewritten:

50 **"§ 143-718. Powers and duties.**

10 **SECTION 6.11.(f)** G.S. 143-719 is repealed.

11 **SECTION 6.11.(g)** G.S. 143-720 reads as rewritten:

12 **"§ 143-720. Benefits and administration of ~~Fund-funds~~ for compensatory programs.**

13 (a) Funds ~~held in the Fund~~ appropriated for purposes of this Article may be expended on
14 compensatory programs as provided in this section.

15 (b) The ~~Fund-Board~~ may provide direct and indirect financial assistance, in accordance
16 with criteria established by the ~~Commission-Board~~ and to the extent allowed by law, to

22 tobacco-related businesses for economic loss resulting from lost quota and
23 compensate tobacco producers for the decline in value of tobacco-related
24 personal property assets and declining market conditions resulting from the
25 Master Settlement Agreement in this State.

26 (3) Compensate individuals displaced from tobacco-related employment in this
27 State as a result of the adverse economic effects of the Master Settlement
28 Agreement.

29 (4) Compensate tobacco product component businesses that are (i) adversely
30 impacted by the Master Settlement Agreement and that (ii) need financial
31 assistance to retool machinery or equipment or to retrain workers, in order to
32 convert to the production of new products or nontobacco use of existing
33 products, or to effect other similar changes.

34 (c) Only tobacco producers, persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses, individuals
35 displaced from tobacco-related employment, and tobacco product component businesses in this
36 State, and holders of North Carolina tobacco allotments are eligible to apply for and receive
37 assistance pursuant to subsection (b) of this section. Direct payments made to tobacco
38 producers, tobacco allotment holders, and persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses shall
39 be based on losses resulting in 1998 and thereafter. Lost quota shall be a primary determinative
40 factor in calculating the amount of compensable economic loss for tobacco producers,
41 allotment holders, and persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses.

42 (d) The ~~Commission-Board~~ shall determine the priority of awards among the categories
43 in subsection (b) of this section and within each of those categories.

44 (e) Financial assistance awards shall be for no more than one year at a time. An award
45 may be renewed annually, without limitation.

46 (f) The ~~Commission-Board~~ may require applicants to provide copies of documents
47 necessary to determine compensable economic loss.

48 (g) In no event shall the amount paid to a tobacco producer or allotment holder pursuant
49 to this Article, when combined with the amount received through the National Tobacco Grower
50 Settlement Trust, exceed the compensable economic loss of the producer or allotment holder.

51 (h) The ~~Commission-Board~~ may consider the criteria used for National Tobacco
52 Grower Settlement Trust payments and may correspond with the National Tobacco Grower
53 Settlement Trust certification entity to ensure that tobacco farmers and allotment holders are
54 treated fairly."

55 **SECTION 6.11.(h)** G.S. 143-721 reads as rewritten:

56 **"§ 143-721. Benefits and administration of ~~Fund-funds~~ for qualified agricultural
57 programs.**

58 (a) Funds appropriated for purposes of this Article ~~held in the Fund~~ may be expended
59 on qualified agricultural programs as provided in this section.

1 (b) In implementing qualified agricultural programs, the ~~Commission Board~~ shall
 2 endeavor to identify those areas of the tobacco-related segment of the State's economy in need
 3 of assistance to be provided by the ~~Fund funds~~ in order to assure the continued vitality and
 4 solvency of those areas. The ~~Commission Board~~ shall endeavor to select for funding qualified
 5 agricultural programs that will have the greatest favorable impact on the long-term health of the
 6 tobacco-related economy of the State.

7 (c) The benefits of qualified agricultural programs are not limited to persons suffering
 8 economic loss resulting from the Master Settlement Agreement, but these programs shall be
 9 designed to foster, support, and assist the tobacco-related segment of the agricultural economy.

10 (d) The ~~Commission Board~~ may solicit and accept proposals from agencies and
 11 departments of the State, including institutions of The University of North Carolina, local units
 12 of government, the federal government, and members of the private sector for qualified
 13 agricultural programs to be funded with ~~money held in the Fund funds~~ appropriated for
 14 purposes of this Article."

15 **SECTION 6.11.(i)** G.S. 143-722 reads as rewritten:

16 "**§ 143-722. Reporting.**

17 (a) The chair of the ~~Commission Board~~ shall report each year by November 1 to the
 18 Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the chairs of the House and
 19 Senate Appropriations Committees regarding the implementation of this Article, including a
 20 report on funds disbursed during the fiscal year by amount, purpose, and category of recipient,
 21 and other information as requested by the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
 22 Operations. A written copy of the report shall also be sent to the Legislative Library by
 23 November 1 each year.

24 (b) Any non-State entity as that term is defined in G.S. 143C-1-1 that receives, uses, or
 25 expends any funds from the ~~Commission Board~~ under this Article is subject to the applicable
 26 reporting requirements of G.S. 143C-6-14."

27 **SECTION 6.11.(j)** G.S. 143-723 is repealed.

28 **SECTION 6.11.(k)** G.S. 143C-9-3 is repealed.

29 **SECTION 6.11.(l)** G.S. 116-29.1(b)(1) reads as rewritten:

30 "(b) The General Assembly finds that it is imperative that the State provide a minimum
 31 of fifty million dollars (\$50,000,000) each calendar year to the University Cancer Research
 32 Fund; therefore, effective July 1 of each calendar year:

33 (1) ~~Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-9-3, of~~ Of the funds credited to the Tobacco
 34 Trust Account, Budget Code 69430 in the Department of State Treasurer, the
 35 sum of eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) is transferred from the Tobacco
 36 Trust Account, Budget Code 69430 to the University Cancer Research Fund
 37 and appropriated for this purpose."

38 **SECTION 6.11.(m)** Section 6 of S.L. 1999-2 reads as rewritten:

39 "Section 6. It is the intent of the General Assembly that the funds under the Master
 40 Settlement Agreement, which is incorporated into the Consent Decree, be allocated as follows:

41 (1) Fifty percent (50%) to the nonprofit corporation as provided by the Consent
 42 Decree.

43 (2) ~~Twenty five percent (25%) to a trust fund to be established by the General~~
 44 ~~Assembly~~ Fifty percent (50%) shall be allocated as follows:

45 a. Debt service as authorized by the State Capital Facilities Act of 2004,
 46 Part 1 of S.L. 2004-179 and S.L. 2004-124. As soon as practicable
 47 after the beginning of each fiscal year, the State Treasurer shall
 48 estimate and transfer to Budget Code 69430 the amount of debt
 49 service anticipated to be paid during the fiscal year for special
 50 indebtedness authorized by the State Capital Facilities Act of 2004.

51 b. The sum of eight million dollars (\$8,000,000) as credited to Budget
 52 Code 69430 shall be transferred from that Code to the University
 53 Cancer Research Fund in accordance with G.S. 116-29.1.

54 c. The balance remaining to be credited to the State General Fund to be
 55 used for the following purposes:

56 1. ~~for the~~ The benefit of tobacco producers, tobacco allotment
 57 holders, and persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses,
 58 with this trust fund to be governed by a board of trustees
 59 representing these interests. ~~businesses.~~ To carry out this

purpose, ~~this trust fund~~ funds may provide direct and indirect financial assistance, ~~in accordance with criteria established by the trustees of the trust fund and~~ assistance to the extent allowed by law, to (i) indemnify tobacco producers, allotment holders, and persons engaged in tobacco-related businesses from the adverse economic effects of the Master Settlement Agreement, (ii) compensate tobacco producers and allotment holders for the economic loss resulting from lost quota, and (iii) revitalize tobacco dependent communities.

2. The benefit of health to fund programs and initiatives that include research, education, prevention, and treatment of health problems in North Carolina and to increase the capacity of communities to respond to the public's health needs through programs such as Health Choice and the State's Medicaid program.

(3) ~~Twenty five percent (25%) to a trust fund to be established by the General Assembly for the benefit of health, with this trust fund to be governed by a board of trustees comprised of a broad representation of health interests."~~

SECTION 6.11.(n) From funds available to the General Fund pursuant to this section, the funds shall be used as follows:

- (1) Funds to the Office of the Attorney General for the administration and oversight of the Master Settlement Agreement in the amount of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000).
- (2) One million dollars (\$1,000,000) to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services for tobacco grants pursuant to subsections (g) and (h) of this section.
- (3) Two million twenty-seven thousand seven hundred twenty-five dollars (\$2,027,725) for the Checkmeds program.
- (4) Two million two hundred ninety-four thousand seven hundred sixty-five dollars (\$2,294,765) for the Medication Assistance Program.
- (5) Ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) to a reserve account for the Division of Public Health. The Division shall develop a plan for the use of these funds that addresses the following:
 - a. Tobacco use prevention, with an emphasis on adolescents and young adults.
 - b. Prevention of chronic illnesses and conditions – obesity, heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes, and asthma.
 - c. Health disparities amongst populations disproportionately affected by the diseases listed sub-subdivision b. of this subdivision.

SECTION 6.11.(o) The Health and Wellness Trust Fund Commission and the Tobacco Trust Fund Commission shall develop a plan to phase out existing grant programs and staff by December 31, 2011.

SECTION 6.11.(p) Any funds remaining in the Health and Wellness Trust Fund and the Tobacco Trust Fund on December 31, 2011, shall revert to the General Fund.

COMPENSATION LIMITATIONS FOR GRANTEE ORGANIZATIONS RECEIVING STATE FUNDS

SECTION 6.12.(a) In addition to the requirements of Part 3 of Article 6 of Chapter 143C of the General Statutes, or any other provision of law, any private organization that is a grantee as defined by G.S. 143C-6-23(a)(2) shall impose an annual salary cap limiting the amount of salary its full and part-time employees may be paid from State funds in accordance with the schedule set forth in subsection (b) of this section.

SECTION 6.12.(b) The annual salary cap limitation on the amount of State funds that can be used to pay a grantee's employee salaries are established by this subsection for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium as follows:

- (1) For grantees receiving:
 - a. Over ten million dollars (\$10,000,000) annually in total State funds, the annual salary cap limitation is one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000).

- 1 b. Over or equal to five million dollars (\$5,000,000) but less than ten
2 million dollars (\$10,000,000) annually in total State funds, the annual
3 salary cap limitation is ninety thousand dollars (\$90,000).
4 c. Over or equal to three million dollars (\$3,000,000) but less than five
5 million dollars (\$5,000,000) annually in total State funds, the annual
6 salary cap limitation is eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000).
7 d. Over or equal to one million dollars (\$1,000,000) but less than three
8 million dollars (\$3,000,000) annually in total State funds, the annual
9 salary cap limitation is seventy thousand dollars (\$70,000).
10 e. Less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000) annually in total State
11 funds, the annual salary cap limitation is sixty thousand dollars
12 (\$60,000).

13 (2) Part-time employees shall be compensated on a pro rata basis in accordance
14 with this schedule.

15 (3) No State funds may be used to support the costs of any position with an
16 annual salary in excess of two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000).

17 **SECTION 6.12.(c)** The limitations imposed by this section do not apply to salaries
18 capped pursuant to the provisions of Parts X and XIV of this act.

19 **SECTION 6.12.(d)** The provisions of G.S. 143C-6-23(f) apply to violations of this
20 section.

21
22 **CONSOLIDATION OF AIR SERVICES AND CENTRALIZATION OF AIR**
23 **MANAGEMENT/STATE-OWNED PASSENGER AND NON-PASSENGER**
24 **VEHICLES**

25 **SECTION 6.13.(a)** The State Motor Fleet project in the Work Plan of the Program
26 Evaluation Division approved April 5, 2011, by the Joint Legislative Program Evaluation
27 Oversight Committee is amended as described in this section.

28 **SECTION 6.13.(b)** The Program Evaluation Division shall evaluate the
29 consolidation of air services provided by the Department of Transportation, the State Bureau of
30 Investigation, and the University of North Carolina Passenger Mission and shall recommend
31 the most appropriate agency to house the consolidated services. Other air services may be
32 examined for consolidation by the Program Evaluation Division. The study shall evaluate
33 savings through consolidation, including potential savings from the following:

- 34 (1) Reduction in aircraft.
35 (2) Reduction in personnel.
36 (3) Reduction in state facilities.
37 (4) An improved level of service.

38 **SECTION 6.13.(c)** The Program Evaluation Division shall study the formation of
39 an Aviation Management Authority, as recommended by the Program Evaluation Division's
40 April 2010 Report "Selling 25 Underutilized Aircraft May Yield Up to \$8.1 Million and Save
41 \$1.5 Million Annually."

42 **SECTION 6.13.(d)** The Program Evaluation Division shall study all passenger and
43 non-passenger vehicles owned and operated by all State government departments, institutions,
44 and entities. The study shall include motor fleet fees and associated cash balances, mechanic
45 operations, the use and purpose of assigned vehicles, and State fueling stations and associated
46 fees.

47 **SECTION 6.13.(e)** The Program Evaluation Division shall report its findings and
48 recommendations from the State Motor Fleet project described under this section to the Joint
49 Legislative Program Evaluation Oversight Committee no later than May 1, 2012.

50
51 **TORNADO ASSISTANCE**

52 **SECTION 6.14.** The General Assembly finds that on April 16, 2011, heavy
53 thunderstorms and powerful tornadoes swept through this State, with 18 counties sustaining the
54 most extensive damage. Those counties are Bertie, Bladen, Craven, Cumberland, Currituck,
55 Greene, Halifax, Harnett, Hertford, Hoke, Johnston, Lee, Onslow, Pitt, Robeson, Sampson,
56 Wake, and Wilson Counties. It is the intent of the General Assembly to provide State matching
57 funds to help mitigate losses, rebuild infrastructure, and aid affected citizens and businesses.

58
59 **STATE-OWNED DISPOSABLE ASSETS**

SECTION 6.15. Definition. – For purposes of this section, the term "State-owned disposable assets" or "assets" means State-owned land, buildings, and other assets that are unused, underused, or do not involve a core function of government. The Department of Administration, in consultation with all other affected State departments, agencies, and institutions, shall do all of the following:

- (1) Develop criteria to be considered prior to the sale of assets. The criteria shall include all of the following factors:
 - a. The condition of the property.
 - b. The extent to which it meets the purpose for which it was intended.
 - c. The future needs of the State to perform the service intended at the location.
 - d. The best and most cost-effective manner in which these future needs can be serviced.
 - e. The practicability of moving the function of the services performed at a location to another area that might reduce acquisition, construction, and labor costs without diminishing the quality of service.
 - f. The manner in which an asset should be (i) sold or retained, (ii) renovated, (iii) expanded for future use, or (iv) sold with a leaseback.
 - g. Other recommendations regarding use of the asset.
- (2) Determine whether the highest and best use is being made of the asset.
- (3) Review assets to determine whether an agency has any property that meets the criteria as set forth in this section.
- (4) Examine current State law to determine amendments to allow for the most efficient and effective disposition of assets.

The Department may retain consultants to assist with the accomplishment of the objectives set forth in this section. The Department of Administration shall make an interim report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Fiscal Research Division, and the Program Evaluation Division by no later than December 31, 2011, regarding its findings and recommendations and the progress in implementing this section.

8 **SECTION 6A.1.(b)** By September 1 of each year, data integration funding in the
9 Information Technology Fund for that State fiscal year shall be transferred to State agencies in
10 proportion to their use of data integration licenses at that point in time. The State Chief
11 Information Officer shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information
12 Technology and the Fiscal Research Division by September 2 of each year on the status of the
13 transfer.

14 Any licensing requirements after the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium shall be the
15 responsibility of the participating agency. The State Chief Information Officer shall notify
16 affected agencies of this requirement by September 1, 2011. The State Chief Information
17 Officer shall ensure that agencies choosing to participate after that date are notified prior to
18 agreeing to participate in the data integration license agreement. The State Chief Information
19 Officer shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology
20 Operations and the Fiscal Research Division by September 2, 2011, on agency notification of
21 their responsibility to fund any data integration license requirements after the 2011-2013 fiscal
22 biennium.

23 **SECTION 6A.1.(c)** This section is effective when it becomes law.
24

25 INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY OPERATIONS

26 **SECTION 6A.2.(a)** Information Technology Internal Service Fund Budget. –
27 Notwithstanding G.S. 147-33.88, the Office of Information Technology Services shall develop
28 an annual budget for review and approval by the Office of State Budget and Management in
29 accordance with a schedule prescribed by the Director of the Office of State Budget and
30 Management. The approved Information Technology Internal Service Fund budget shall be
31 included in the Governor's budget recommendations to the General Assembly.

32 The Office of State Budget and Management shall ensure that State agencies have
33 an opportunity to adjust their budgets based on any rate changes proposed by the Office of
34 Information Technology Services and approved by the Office of State Budget and
35 Management.

36 Any uses of the Internal Service Fund not specifically related to the operation of the
37 Office of Information Technology Services shall immediately be reported to the Office of State
38 Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division with an explanation as to why it was
39 necessary to use the Fund.

40 **SECTION 6A.2.(b)** Enterprise Projects. – The State Chief Information Officer
41 shall consult the respective State agency chief information officer and obtain approval from the
42 Office of State Budget and Management prior to the initiation of any enterprise project or
43 contract. State agency requirements shall be incorporated into any enterprise agreement signed
44 by the State Chief Information Officer or his or her representative. Enterprise projects shall not
45 exceed the participating State agencies' ability to financially support the contracts.

46 **SECTION 6A.2.(c)** The State Chief Information Officer shall not enter into any
47 information technology contracts without obtaining written agreements from participating State
48 agencies regarding the apportionment of the contract cost. State agencies agreeing to
49 participate in a contract shall:

- 50 (1) Ensure that sufficient funds are budgeted to support their agreed shares of
- 51 enterprise agreements throughout the life of the contract or project.
- 52 (2) Transfer the agreed-upon funds to the Information Technology Internal
- 53 Service Fund in sufficient time for the Office of Information Technology
- 54 Services to meet vendor contract requirements.

55 The State Chief Information Officer shall ensure that enterprise project and contract
56 costs are allocated to participating agencies in an equitable manner.

57 **SECTION 6A.2.(d)** Agency Projects. – Prior to initiation, any information
58 technology project, or any segment of a multipart project, costing more than one hundred
59 thousand dollars (\$100,000) shall be approved by the General Assembly.

1 **SECTION 6A.2.(e)** Three-Year Contracts. – Notwithstanding the cash
2 management provisions of G.S. 147-86.11, the Office of Information Technology Services may
3 procure information technology goods and services for periods of up to a total of three years
4 where the terms of the procurement contract require payment of all, or a portion, of the contract
5 price at the beginning of the contract agreement. All of the following conditions shall be met
6 before payment for these agreements may be disbursed:

- 7 (1) Any advance payment can be accomplished within the Information
8 Technology Internal Service Fund budget.
- 9 (2) The State Controller receives conclusive evidence that the proposed
10 agreement would be more cost-effective than a multiyear agreement that
11 complies with G.S. 147-86.11.
- 12 (3) The procurement complies in all other aspects with applicable statutes and
13 rules.
- 14 (4) The proposed agreement contains contract terms that protect the financial
15 interest of the State against contractor nonperformance or insolvency
16 through the creation of escrow accounts for funds, source codes, or both, or
17 by any other reasonable means that have legally binding effect.

18 The Office of State Budget and Management shall ensure the savings from any
19 authorized agreement shall be included in the Information Technology Internal Service Fund
20 rate calculations before the Office of State Budget and Management annually approves
21 proposed rates. Any savings resulting from the agreements shall be returned to agencies
22 included in the contract in the form of reduced rates. The Office of Information Technology
23 Services shall submit a quarterly written report to the Office of State Budget and Management
24 on any State agency budget impacts resulting from multiyear contracts. Under no
25 circumstances shall multiyear contracts result in rate increases for participating agencies. The
26 Office of Information Technology Services shall submit a quarterly written report of any
27 authorizations granted under this section to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on
28 Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division of the North Carolina General
29 Assembly.

30 **SECTION 6A.2.(f)** Information Technology Hosting. – State agencies developing
31 and implementing information technology projects shall use the State infrastructure to host
32 their projects. An exception to this requirement may be granted only if approved by both the
33 State Chief Information Officer on the basis of technology requirements and by the Office of
34 State Budget and Management based on cost-savings, subject to consultation with the Joint
35 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and a report to the Joint Legislative
36 Oversight Committee on Information Technology.

37 Projects currently hosted outside the State infrastructure shall be returned to State
38 infrastructure not later than the end of any current contract.

39 By October 1, 2011, the State Chief Information Officer shall report to the Joint
40 Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology regarding projects currently
41 hosted outside State infrastructure and a schedule to return those projects to State infrastructure.

42 **SECTION 6A.2.(g)** Service Level Agreements. – Service level agreements
43 developed with supported State agencies shall include metrics for the Office of Information
44 Technology Services, as well as the supported agencies. When the Office of Information
45 Technology Services or an agency fails to meet metrics established by the service level
46 agreement, a report shall be provided to the Office of State Budget and Management and the
47 Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly within 10 days, detailing the shortfall and
48 providing a corrective action plan with a time line.

49 **SECTION 6A.2.(h)** The Office of Information Technology Services shall assist
50 State agencies in identifying the least expensive source and best value for the purchase of IT
51 goods and services and shall ensure that agencies receive every available discount when
52 purchasing IT goods and services. When the best value and the least expensive sources are
53 different, the Office of Information Technology Services shall report to the Office of State
54 Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division on why the least expensive vendor
55 was not the best value.

56 **SECTION 6A.2.(i)** Agency Billing and Payments. – The State CIO shall ensure
57 that bills from the Office of Information Technology Services are easily understood and fully
58 transparent. If a State agency fails to pay its IT Internal Service Fund bills within 30 days of

1 receipt, the Office of State Budget and Management may transfer funds from the agency to
2 cover the cost of the bill from that agency to the IT Internal Service Fund.
3

4 **COORDINATION OF INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS AND** 5 **GEOGRAPHIC INFORMATION SYSTEM REQUIREMENTS**

6 **SECTION 6A.3.** The State Chief Information Officer, through the Enterprise
7 Project Management Office, shall develop a plan and adopt measures to avoid the duplication
8 of information technology capabilities and resources across State agencies. When multiple
9 agencies require the same or substantially similar information technology capability, the State
10 Chief Information Officer shall designate one State agency as the lead to coordinate support
11 and to manage that capability for all State agencies requiring the capability, with the State
12 Chief Information Officer maintaining oversight of the effort. Further, the Enterprise Project
13 Management Office shall:

- 14 (1) Review all ongoing and future technology projects to determine whether the
15 capabilities required for each project, or the specific requirements
16 comprising a component within a project, already exist in a planned,
17 ongoing, or completed information technology project developed by another
18 State agency. Information Technology Procurement shall work to develop
19 contracts for information technology projects to allow the addition of other
20 agencies' requirements within the terms of the existing contract.
- 21 (2) Identify existing projects that can best support a particular requirement for
22 multiple agencies and work to transition agencies to those projects.
- 23 (3) When State agencies request approval for new projects, determine if the
24 information technology project has transferable applicability to current or
25 future capabilities required by another State agency.
- 26 (4) Upon identifying an existing information technology capability needed by a
27 State agency, assist that agency in determining how best to access existing
28 projects.
- 29 (5) Implement the State Chief Information Officer's plan to reduce duplication.
- 30 (6) Deny approval for new projects that duplicate existing capabilities within
31 State agencies.
- 32 (7) Provide quarterly reports to the Fiscal Research Division of the General
33 Assembly on progress toward eliminating duplication. The report shall
34 include a list of duplicate projects across State agencies, both ongoing and
35 legacy, and shall document explicit efforts to reduce the duplication. It shall
36 specifically address progress during the quarter for which the report is being
37 submitted. It shall also include a list of projects denied approval because of
38 duplication, with a description of the measures taken to access an existing
39 project with the same capabilities.

40 All State agencies shall coordinate any Geographic Information System (GIS)
41 initiatives through the Center for Geographic Information and Analysis (CGIA) to ensure that
42 they are not duplicating an existing function. The CGIA shall monitor and approve all new
43 GIS-related information technology projects and expansion budget requests. By January 1 of
44 each year, the CGIA shall make a written report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee
45 on Information Technology and to the Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly on
46 the results of these efforts.
47

48 **CRIMINAL JUSTICE LAW ENFORCEMENT AUTOMATED DATA SERVICES** 49 **(CJLEADS)**

50 **SECTION 6A.4.(a)** The Office of the State Controller, in cooperation with the
51 State Chief Information Officer, shall:

- 52 (1) Continue the implementation of the Criminal Justice Data Integration Pilot
53 Program, which is now known as the Criminal Justice Law Enforcement
54 Automated Data Services (CJLEADS), expanding it throughout the State of
55 North Carolina;
- 56 (2) Review plans to transition CJLEADS to the Department of Justice,
57 determining if that is still the best course of action, and identifying an
58 alternative, if required;

1 (3) By October 1, 2011, provide a recommendation to the Joint Legislative
2 Oversight Committee on Information Technology on the best alternative for
3 managing and hosting CJLEADS, along with a time line for the transition;
4 and

5 (4) Provide quarterly reports on the status of the Program to the Joint Legislative
6 Oversight Committee on Information Technology beginning October 1,
7 2011.

8 **SECTION 6A.4.(b)** The Office of the State Controller shall administer CJLEADS
9 with the assistance of a Leadership Council consisting of:

10 (1) The Attorney General;

11 (2) The Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts;

12 (3) The Secretary of the Department of Correction;

13 (4) The Secretary of Crime Control and Public Safety;

14 (5) The Secretary of the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency
15 Prevention;

16 (6) The Commissioner of Motor Vehicles, Department of Transportation;

17 (7) The President of the North Carolina Association of Chiefs of Police;

18 (8) The President of the North Carolina Sheriffs' Association, Inc.;

19 (9) A representative of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, who shall be a
20 nonvoting member;

21 (10) The State Controller; and

22 (11) The State Chief Information Officer.

23 **SECTION 6A.4.(c)** Data that is not classified as a public record under G.S. 132-1
24 shall not be considered a public record when incorporated into the CJLEADS database.

25 **SECTION 6A.4.(d)** To maintain the confidentiality requirements attached to the
26 information provided to CJLEADS by the various State and local agencies, each source agency
27 providing data for CJLEADS shall be the sole custodian of the data for the purpose of any
28 request for inspection or copies thereof under Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. CJLEADS
29 shall only allow access to data from the source agencies in accordance with rules adopted by
30 the respective source agencies.

31 **SECTION 6A.4.(e)** Section 6.10 of S.L. 2010-31 is repealed.
32

33 **CONTINUING PILOT PROGRAM TO ALLOW PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIPS** 34 **TO MEET DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE TECHNOLOGY NEEDS**

35 **SECTION 6A.5.(a)** To speed the implementation of the Tax Information
36 Management System (TIMS) and the additional components of the Planning and Design
37 Project (PDP) through June 30, 2015, the Secretary of the Department of Revenue may enter
38 into public-private arrangements where (i) the funding of the project under the arrangement
39 comes from revenue generated by the project and (ii) the project is related to the
40 implementation of TIMS and additional components of the PDP. As used in this section, the
41 "additional components of the PDP" are Enterprise Data Warehouse, Management Reporting
42 and Decision Analytics, Customer Relationship Management, Enterprise Case Management,
43 and E-Services. All such arrangements shall terminate June 30, 2015.

44 Work under a public-private arrangement may be contracted by requests for
45 proposals, modifications to existing contracts, and purchases using existing contract vehicles.

46 The Secretary of Revenue shall establish a measurement process to determine the
47 increased revenue attributable to the public-private arrangements. To accomplish this, the
48 Secretary shall consult subject matter experts outside the Department of Revenue, both within
49 State government and from private industry. The measurement process shall include:

50 (1) Calculation of a revenue baseline against which the increased revenue
51 attributable to the project is measured;

52 (2) Periodic evaluation to determine if the baseline needs to be modified based
53 on significant measurable changes in the economic environment; and

54 (3) Monthly calculation of increased revenue attributable to contracts executed
55 under this program.

56 Of funds generated from collections above the baseline established by subdivision
57 (1) of this subsection, in both the General Fund, Highway Funds, and the State portion of the
58 Unauthorized Substance Tax collections of the Special Revenue Fund, up to forty-five million
59 five hundred thousand dollars (\$45,500,000) may be authorized by the Office of State Budget

1 and Management for the purchases related to the implementation of TIMS and the additional
2 components of the PDP, including payment for services from non-State entities. The
3 Department of Revenue may retain an additional six million six hundred forty-six thousand five
4 hundred fifty-seven dollars (\$6,646,557) from benefits generated for the General Fund since the
5 beginning of the public-private partnership. These funds shall be used as payment of internal
6 costs for the fiscal biennium, and such funds are hereby appropriated for this purpose.

7 If the Department of Revenue finds that it cannot generate additional benefits
8 totaling forty-five million five hundred thousand dollars (\$45,500,000) through June 30, 2015,
9 or that total costs exceed the total available appropriations and earned benefits, then the
10 Department shall do all of the following: (i) immediately notify the Chairs of the House of
11 Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees and the Fiscal Research Division, (ii)
12 identify any obligations to vendors, (iii) identify options for meeting obligations to vendors,
13 and (iv) provide costs associated with each option. The Department shall ensure that this
14 notification is made in sufficient time to allow the General Assembly to properly evaluate the
15 options presented.

16 **SECTION 6A.5.(b)** Notwithstanding G.S. 114-2.3, the Department of Revenue
17 shall engage the services of private counsel with the pertinent information technology and
18 computer law expertise to review requests for proposals, and to negotiate and review contracts
19 associated with TIMS and the additional components of the Planning and Design Project (PDP)
20 (Enterprise Data Warehouse, Management Reporting and Decision Analytics, Customer
21 Relationship Management, Enterprise Case Management, and E-Services).

22 **SECTION 6A.5.(c)** There is established within the Department of Revenue the
23 Oversight Committee for reviewing and approving the benefits measurement methodology and
24 calculation process. The Oversight Committee shall review and approve in writing all contracts,
25 including change orders, amendments to contracts, and addendums to contracts, before they are
26 executed under this section. This shall include (i) details of each public-private contract, (ii) the
27 benefits from each contract, and (iii) a comprehensive forecast of the benefits of using
28 public-private agreements to implement TIMS and the additional PDP components, including
29 the measurement process established for the Secretary of Revenue. The Oversight Committee
30 shall approve all of the fund transfers for this project. Within five days of entering into a
31 contract, the Department shall provide copies of each contract and all associated information to
32 the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, the Chairs of the House
33 of Representatives and Senate Committees on Appropriations, and the Fiscal Research
34 Division.

35 The members of the Committee shall include the following:

- 36 (1) The State Budget Director;
- 37 (2) The Secretary of the Department of Revenue;
- 38 (3) The State Chief Information Officer;
- 39 (4) Two persons appointed by the Governor;
- 40 (5) One member of the general public having expertise in information
41 technology appointed by the General Assembly upon the recommendation of
42 the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
- 43 (6) One member of the general public having expertise in economic and revenue
44 forecasting appointed by the General Assembly upon recommendation of the
45 President Pro Tempore of the Senate.

46 The State Budget Director shall serve as chair of the Committee. The Committee
47 shall set its meeting schedule and adopt its rules of operation by majority vote. A majority of
48 the members constitutes a quorum. Vacancies shall be filled by the appointing authority.
49 Administrative support staff shall be provided by the Department of Revenue. Members of the
50 Committee shall receive reimbursements for subsistence and travel expenses as provided by
51 Chapter 138 of the General Statutes. The Committee shall terminate on June 30, 2015.

52 The Department shall provide copies of the minutes of each meeting and all
53 associated information to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information
54 Technology, the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Committees on
55 Appropriations, and the Fiscal Research Division.

56 **SECTION 6A.5.(d)** Beginning August 1, 2011, and quarterly thereafter, the
57 Department of Revenue shall submit detailed written reports to the Chairs of the House of
58 Representatives and Senate Committees on Appropriations, to the Joint Legislative Oversight
59 Committee on Information Technology, and to the Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative

1 Services Office. The report shall include (i) details of each public-private contract, (ii) the
2 benefits from each contract, (iii) a comprehensive forecast of the benefits of using
3 public-private agreements to implement TIMS and the additional PDP components, including
4 cost savings and the acceleration of the project time line, (iv) and any issues associated with the
5 operation of the public-private partnership.

6 **SECTION 6A.5.(e)** In addition to the oversight provided by the Oversight
7 Committee established in subsection (c) of this section, the TIMS project shall be subject to
8 existing Information Technology project oversight legislation and the TIMS project
9 management shall comply with all statutory requirements and other requirements established
10 by the State Chief Information Officer and the Office of State Budget and Management for
11 information technology projects. The State Chief Information Officer and the Office of State
12 Budget and Management shall immediately report any failure to do so to the Joint Legislative
13 Oversight Committee on Information Technology, the Chairs of the House of Representatives
14 and Senate Committees on Appropriations, and the Fiscal Research Division.

15 **SECTION 6A.5.(f)** Section 6.20 of S.L. 2009-451, as rewritten by Section 2.3 of
16 S.L. 2010-123, is repealed.

17 18 **INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PERSONAL SERVICES CONTRACT** 19 **REQUIREMENTS**

20 **SECTION 6A.6.(a)** Effective for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, and
21 notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary:

- 22 (1) No contract for information technology personal services, or providing
23 personnel to perform information technology functions, may be established
24 or renewed without the express written approval of the Statewide
25 Information Technology Procurement Office.
- 26 (2) Before any State agency, department, or institution may renew a contract
27 position for information technology personnel, the State agency must report
28 to the Statewide Information Technology Procurement Office, the Office of
29 State Budget and Management, the Office of State Personnel, the Office of
30 Information Technology Services, and to the Fiscal Research. The report
31 shall explain:
 - 32 a. The proposed duration of the contract position. If the contract is for
33 more than 12 months, why recruitment of a State employee is not
34 feasible.
 - 35 b. Whether the contract position requires unique skills for which the
36 State has a short-term need.
 - 37 c. Whether the position is required for a specific information
38 technology project and if the position will be terminated upon
39 completion of the project.
 - 40 d. The specific work products and completion time lines for the contract
41 position.
- 42 (3) All contract positions requiring information technology skills are subject to
43 the provisions of this section. The Office of State Budget and Management
44 may immediately terminate the funding for any information technology
45 contractor position that is filled without following defined procedures.
- 46 (4) All information technology personnel contracts shall be competitive and
47 shall be subject to competition each time they expire. Exceptions must be
48 approved by the Office of Information Technology Services, the Office of
49 State Personnel, and the Office of State Budget and Management. Approved
50 exceptions must immediately be reported to the Fiscal Research.
- 51 (5) Agencies shall make every effort to convert SAP and Curam contractors
52 supporting permanent requirements to State employees. Beginning October
53 1, 2011, agencies shall submit written quarterly reports to the Joint
54 Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal
55 Research Division documenting their progress in converting these
56 contractors to State employment.

57 Contract positions subject to this section shall be reviewed and approved by the
58 Statewide Information Technology Procurement Office and shall be entered into the project
59 portfolio management tool.

1 The Statewide Information Technology Procurement Office shall determine the
2 market rate for the type of contract required, as well as to determine the comparable cost for a
3 State employee. Agencies may not exceed the market rate determined by the Statewide
4 Information Technology Procurement Office. After the Statewide Information Technology
5 Procurement Office provides cost data, the Office of State Budget and Management must
6 approve funding for the position.

7 **SECTION 6A.6.(b)** Whenever a State agency, department, or institution
8 determines that only a contractor can fill a position and the position is required to perform an
9 ongoing function within the agency, the head of the State agency must develop and implement
10 a plan to hire or train a qualified State employee to fill the position within 12 months. Within
11 60 days of hiring the contractor, this plan shall be forwarded to the Office of State Budget and
12 Management, the Office of State Personnel, the Office of Information Technology Services,
13 and the Fiscal Research Division.

14 **SECTION 6A.6.(c)** Beginning August 1, 2011, and monthly thereafter, each State
15 agency, department, and institution employing information technology personal services
16 contractors, or contract personnel performing information technology functions, shall provide a
17 detailed report on those contracts to the Office of State Budget and Management, the Office of
18 State Personnel, the Office of Information Technology Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight
19 Committee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division of the General
20 Assembly. Each State agency's report shall include at least the following:

- 21 (1) For each contracted information technology position:
 - 22 a. The title of the position, a brief synopsis of the essential functions of
23 the position, and how long the position has existed.
 - 24 b. The name of the individual filling the position and the vendor
25 company, if any, that regularly employs that individual.
 - 26 c. The type of contract, start date, and termination date.
 - 27 d. The length of time that the individual filling the contracted position
28 has been employed by the State as a contractor in any position.
 - 29 e. The contracted position salary or hourly rate, the number of hours per
30 year, and the total annualized cost of the contracted position.
 - 31 f. The salary and benefits cost for a State employee performing the
32 same function.
 - 33 g. The purchase order number for the position.
 - 34 h. Whether the position can be converted to a State employee position.
35 This determination will be certified by the State Information
36 Technology Purchasing Office.
 - 37 i. When the agency anticipates converting the position to a State
38 employee.
- 39 (2) The total annual cost for information technology contractors and the total
40 annual salary and benefits cost for filling the contract positions with State
41 employees.
- 42 (3) A determination of whether the information technology functions performed
43 by the contractor can be performed by State employees.
- 44 (4) All information required by this subsection related to information
45 technology contractors regardless of the contracting source.

46 **SECTION 6A.6.(d)** Each State agency shall provide a detailed explanation of any
47 differences between the agency report required by subsection (b) of this section and the
48 Information Technology Expenditures Report published annually by the Office of the State
49 Controller. This report of differences shall be due 30 days after the publication of the Office of
50 the State Controller's report and shall be submitted to the Office of State Budget and
51 Management, the Fiscal Research Division, and the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on
52 Information Technology.

53 **SECTION 6A.6.(e)** This section does not apply to The University of North
54 Carolina and its constituent institutions.

55 STATE INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY CONSOLIDATION

56 **SECTION 6A.7.(a)** By November 1, 2011, the State Chief Information Officer
57 (State CIO), in conjunction with the Office of State Budget and Management (OSBM), shall
58 develop a detailed plan for consolidating the information technology infrastructure and
59

1 applications of all State agencies, departments, and institutions in the executive branch.
2 Information technology infrastructure includes personal computers, hosting and network
3 environments, the help desk, call centers, and information technology security. Applications
4 include enterprise software, on-demand software, and customized software. At a minimum, the
5 consolidation plan shall include the following:

- 6 (1) Defined targets and priorities with a detailed time line for the
7 implementation of consolidation.
- 8 (2) The costs of consolidation by fiscal year and by agency.
- 9 (3) The anticipated savings to result from consolidation and a time line for
10 actual achievement of those savings.
- 11 (4) Technical, policy, or other issues associated with achieving a timely and
12 effective consolidation.
- 13 (5) A process to transfer all information technology hardware and software
14 funding to the Office of the State CIO.
- 15 (6) Creation of a project management organization to manage all information
16 technology projects.
- 17 (7) Review of agency, Office of Information Technology Services, and Office of
18 the State CIO to identify redundant personnel positions.

19 When setting consolidation targets, the State CIO shall give high priority to
20 infrastructure issues that pose significant risk to agency operations or data, that provide
21 opportunities for immediate cost savings, and where a statewide approach would minimize
22 disruption of services. In carrying out the consolidation, the Office of Information Technology
23 Services shall utilize the authority set out in G.S. 147-33.83.

24 **SECTION 6A.7.(b)** Beginning July 1, 2011, the State CIO shall plan and
25 implement an enterprise level grants management system. Similar systems currently under
26 development may be suspended by the State CIO with funding reprogrammed to support
27 development of the enterprise level grants management system.

28 In coordination with the State CIO, the Department of Health and Human Services
29 shall develop a plan to implement a single case management system throughout that
30 Department, beginning in the 2012-2013 fiscal year, and shall report to the Joint Legislative
31 Oversight Committee on Information Technology by February 1, 2012, on its initiatives to
32 implement the system. The report shall include a detailed time line for completion and an
33 explanation of the costs associated with case management consolidation.

34 **SECTION 6A.7.(c)** Beginning September 1, 2011, and quarterly thereafter, the
35 Office of State Budget and Management, in conjunction with the State CIO, shall provide
36 written reports to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Joint
37 Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division
38 relating to State information technology consolidation.
39

40 **ITS/INTERNAL SERVICE FUND RATE ESTABLISHMENT/CASH MANAGEMENT**

41 **SECTION 6A.8.(a)** For the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, receipts for the Information
42 Technology Internal Service Fund shall not exceed one hundred ninety million dollars
43 (\$190,000,000), excluding a 60-day balance for contingencies. Rates established by the Office
44 of State Budget and Management (OSBM) to support the IT Internal Service Fund shall be
45 based on this required fund limit. Established rates shall be adjusted within 30 days in the event
46 the fund exceeds the prescribed limit. In the event that an increase in receipts for the IT Internal
47 Service Fund is required, the Office of Information Technology Services may implement the
48 increase after consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations.

49 **SECTION 6A.8.(b)** Rates shall be set to support a specific service for which an
50 agency is being charged. Overhead charges to agencies must be consistently applied and must
51 not exceed industry standards. Rate increases shall require approval of the OSBM. Rate
52 reductions shall be immediately implemented following notification of the OSBM.

53 **SECTION 6A.8.(c)** Beginning October 1, 2011, the State Chief Information
54 Officer shall submit a quarterly report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
55 Operations and Fiscal Research Division on collections for, expenditures from, and the balance
56 of the IT Internal Service Fund. The report shall include all expenditures made from the fund
57 to support the Office of Information Technology Services and the activities of the State Chief
58 Information Officer.
59

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY PRIVATIZATION

SECTION 6A.9.(a) Any privatization of any grouping of information technology services, or "towers," identified in the Infrastructure Study and Assessment (INSA) shall require prior approval from the General Assembly. Funding to support any outsourcing of any of these towers shall be specifically appropriated by the General Assembly for that purpose, to include any use of Information Technology Internal Service Fund receipts.

SECTION 6A.9.(b) Before privatizing any major information technology function during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, the State Chief Information Officer shall do all of the following:

- (1) Develop a detailed plan for implementing any privatization initiative to include the following:
 - a. A governance and accountability structure for the privatization effort.
 - b. Detailed time line with milestones.
 - c. Any costs necessary to accomplish outsourcing with funding sources identified.
 - d. Estimated monthly cost for each participating agency for the first five years of privatization.
 - e. Risks associated with privatization, measures being taken to mitigate those risks, and any costs associated with the mitigation measures.
 - f. Any security issues associated with outsourcing each application impacted by the outsourcing, with a detailed plan to mitigate those issues.
 - g. A list of State employees to be terminated with information on their job description and how long they have been employed by the State, a schedule of when the terminations are to occur, the cost of terminating each employee, and plans to assist each terminated employee.

The State Chief Information Officer shall consult the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology on the completed plan prior to any implementation of privatization.

- (2) Have a detailed plan in place, to include associated costs and sources of funding, to return the function to State control in the event privatization fails to provide anticipated cost-savings or required service levels.
- (3) Privatize only those individual functions where verifiable market data shows that privatization will result in cost-savings to the State and there is no data identifying alternatives that generate greater savings, ensuring that agencies receive at a minimum the same level of service and functionality as the level prior to privatization.
- (4) Document and certify any anticipated savings resulting from privatization by individual function.
- (5) Ensure full disclosure of any privatization decisions that combine multiple services or towers into a single contract, including the costs associated with each specific service or tower included in the contract.
- (6) Ensure that any changes are made across the entire executive branch.
- (7) Consult the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, and report to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology regarding the plan for funding any requirements formerly covered by the receipts from the privatized function.

SECTION 6A.9.(c) After privatizing any major information technology function, the State Chief Information Officer shall do all of the following:

- (1) Report quarterly on the results of the privatization, including a detailed comparison of projected savings to actual cost, data on whether or not the vendor is meeting service level agreements, and an explanation of the reasons for any deficiency or difference.
- (2) Immediately notify the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations of any outsourcing effort that does not meet projected savings or required service levels for two quarters in a row or during any two quarters of a fiscal year, and develop a corrective action plan.

- 1 (3) Terminate any contract where privatization fails to achieve projected savings
2 or meet service levels over a period of 12 months.
3

4 STATE PORTAL

5 **SECTION 6A.10.(a)** The Department of Administration may implement and
6 operate a statewide electronic enterprise portal to increase the convenience of members of the
7 public in conducting online transactions with, and obtaining information from, State
8 government and to facilitate their interactions and communications with government agencies.
9 The portal shall be hosted on State information technology infrastructure.

10 **SECTION 6A.10.(b)** Prior to implementation of a State portal, the Department of
11 Administration shall provide all of the following to the General Assembly:

- 12 (1) A detailed plan for development and implementation of the portal, to
13 include a list of applications to be implemented during the 2011-2013 and
14 2013-2015 fiscal biennia, including:
15 a. A description of how the portal is to be implemented, to include the
16 use of outside vendors, with detailed information on their
17 participation and potential cost.
18 b. Detailed information on the anticipated total cost of ownership of the
19 portal and any applications proposed for implementation during that
20 period, to include the amount of any payments to be made to vendors
21 supporting the project for each application and the portal as a whole.
22 c. A detailed State governance structure to provide oversight of portal
23 operations. This oversight shall include the review of any new
24 functions and of rates associated with the operation of the portal.
25 (2) A funding model for the implementation that does not increase the cost of
26 services for any citizen of the State or reduce the receipts or other funding
27 currently available to State agencies or included in appropriations for the
28 2011-2013 fiscal biennium. Any fees and other charges that may be required
29 to support the portal shall not be collected from agencies without General
30 Assembly approval.
31 (3) If outsourced, a detailed, fully executable plan to return portal operations to
32 the State, with associated costs.

33 **SECTION 6A.10.(c)** Participation by State agencies in the portal shall be
34 voluntary.

35 **SECTION 6A.10.(d)** Any fees or other charges collected under this section for the
36 use of the State portal or any supporting functions shall be:

- 37 (1) Collected by the Department of Administration only and not by a private
38 vendor.
39 (2) Deposited in the General Fund.

40 **SECTION 6A.10.(e)** The State portal project shall meet all requirements for
41 project management established by the State Chief Information Officer. Nothing in this section
42 exempts the State portal project from the laws governing State information technology and
43 purchasing.
44

45 TRANSFER CRIMINAL JUSTICE INFORMATION NETWORK TO THE OFFICE OF 46 THE STATE CHIEF INFORMATION OFFICER

47 **SECTION 6A.11.(a)** The Criminal Justice Information Network (CJIN), as
48 provided in Article 69 of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, is hereby transferred to the
49 Office of the State Chief Information Officer. The transfer shall have all the elements of a
50 Type II transfer, as defined in G.S. 143A-6.

51 **SECTION 6A.11.(b)** G.S. 143-661(a) reads as rewritten:

52 "(a) The Criminal Justice Information Network Governing Board is established within
53 the ~~Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, Office of the State Chief Information~~
54 Officer, to operate the State's Criminal Justice Information Network, the purpose of which shall
55 be to provide the governmental and technical information systems infrastructure necessary for
56 accomplishing State and local governmental public safety and justice functions in the most
57 effective manner by appropriately and efficiently sharing criminal justice and juvenile justice
58 information among law enforcement, judicial, and corrections agencies. The Board is
59 established within the ~~Department of Crime Control and Public Safety~~ Office of the State Chief

1 Information Officer, for organizational and budgetary purposes only and the Board shall
2 exercise all of its statutory powers in this Article independent of control by the ~~Department of~~
3 ~~Crime Control and Public Safety~~. Office of the State Chief Information Officer."

4 **SECTION 6A.11.(c)** G.S. 143-664(b) reads as rewritten:

5 "(b) ~~Pending permanent staffing, the Department~~ The staff of the Criminal Justice
6 Information Network shall provide the Board with professional and clerical ~~staff support~~ and
7 any additional support the Board needs to fulfill its mandate. The ~~Board may meet in an area~~
8 ~~provided by the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety and the Board's staff shall use~~
9 ~~space provided by the Department~~. Office of the State Chief Information Officer."

10 INTEGRATED BUDGET INFORMATION SYSTEM

11 **SECTION 6A.12.(a)** The Office of State Budget and Management (OSBM) shall
12 create a detailed, comprehensive plan for the development and implementation of the
13 Integrated Budget Information System (IBIS). By August 1, 2011, the IBIS plan shall be
14 submitted to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology and the
15 Fiscal Research Division. The plan must include at least the following:

- 17 (1) A detailed description of the system with a list of the functions.
- 18 (2) A projected time line for completion with detailed milestones.
- 19 (3) Total cost of the project, including five years of operations and maintenance
20 costs.
- 21 (4) Projected costs for the project each month, including how the funding is to
22 be spent.
- 23 (5) Funds identified to support the project from its inception, with the amounts
24 and sources of funding.
- 25 (6) Personnel involved in the project, their position and responsibilities, their
26 qualifications, the amount of time each devotes to the project, and their cost,
27 including both State employees and contract personnel.
- 28 (7) Number and cost of personnel required to operate the system after its
29 completion.
- 30 (8) Total number of hours required to complete the project.
- 31 (9) Outside vendors supporting the project, their functions, and their total cost.
- 32 (10) Implementation plan, to include a time line for fielding it to participating
33 agencies.
- 34 (11) A training plan with a time line.
- 35 (12) Any risks to the project, with a strategy to mitigate those risks.

36 **SECTION 6A.12.(b)** Beginning August 1, 2011, on the first day of each month,
37 the Office of State Budget and Management shall report to the Joint Legislative Oversight
38 Committee on Information Technology and the Fiscal Research Division on the status of IBIS.
39 The monthly reports shall be signed by the project sponsor, who shall verify in writing that the
40 information contained in the report is current, complete, and accurate. The monthly report shall
41 include the following:

- 42 (1) Project status, to include any issues identified by the Enterprise Project
43 Management Office.
- 44 (2) Comparison of project status to the time line, with an explanation of any
45 differences.
- 46 (3) Detailed descriptions of milestones to be completed that month and the
47 following month.
- 48 (4) Any changes in project cost.
- 49 (5) Actual expenditures to date and during that month.
- 50 (6) Any variances from projected expenditures and the reasons for the variance.
- 51 (7) Any potential funding shortfalls and their impact.
- 52 (8) Total hours worked each month and cumulative total hours.
- 53 (9) Any variance between projected and actual hours and the reason.
- 54 (10) Any issues identified during the month, with a corrective action plan and a
55 time line for resolving them.
- 56 (11) Impact of any issues identified on the project schedule.
- 57 (12) Impact of any issues identified on project cost.
- 58 (13) Any changes to the project.
- 59 (14) Any change requests submitted to project vendors and their cost.

1 **SECTION 6A.12.(c)** The State Chief Information Officer shall immediately
2 suspend the project if OSBM fails to provide a monthly report required by subsection (b) of this
3 section in a timely manner until such time as the report is submitted.

4 **SECTION 6A.12.(d)** If OSBM fails to submit reports to the Enterprise Project
5 Management Office for inclusion in the project portfolio management tool on time, the State
6 CIO shall immediately suspend the project until the information is completed in the tool.

7 8 **COMPREHENSIVE, ENTERPRISE-LEVEL DATA INTEGRATION CAPABILITY**

9 **SECTION 6A.13.(a)** The Office of the State Controller (OSC) shall continue the
10 development of a comprehensive, enterprise-level data integration capability, providing broad
11 access to and analysis of information across State government. As part of this development
12 effort, OSC shall update the BEACON Strategic Plan for Data Integration by March 1, 2012,
13 and shall provide the updated plan to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
14 Operations, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information Technology, and the
15 Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly. The plan shall comply with all necessary
16 security measures and restrictions to ensure that access to any specific information held
17 confidential under federal or State law is limited to appropriate and authorized persons. OSC
18 shall also develop, document, and enforce security requirements for data integration initiatives,
19 to include establishing and monitoring security standards for vendors supporting development
20 and implementation efforts.

21 **SECTION 6A.13.(b)** As part of the State's continuing effort to develop a
22 comprehensive, enterprise-level data integration capability, the Office of the State Controller
23 shall develop an enterprise process to detect fraud, waste, and improper payments across State
24 agencies. In support of the automated fraud detection effort, the OSC shall:

- 25 (1) Develop a detailed long range plan to implement an automated fraud
26 detection system within State agencies.
- 27 (2) Develop and issue a request for information to determine the range of
28 options available to provide automated fraud detection to State agencies.
- 29 (3) Coordinate with State agencies to determine interest in participating in the
30 project and to identify potential applications that can be included in an initial
31 request for proposal.
- 32 (4) Establish priorities for developing and implementing potential applications.
- 33 (5) Develop and issue a request for proposal to solicit bids to provide automated
34 fraud detection. The committee may choose to make payments to vendors
35 contingent on producing savings.
- 36 (6) Review proposals and consider selecting multiple vendors, evaluating the
37 requirements and information technology applications of specific State
38 agencies participating in the process.
- 39 (7) Evaluate savings resulting from each effort.
- 40 (8) Beginning October 1, 2011, provide quarterly reports to the General
41 Assembly.
- 42 (9) Provide recommendations to the General Assembly on future initiatives.

43 **SECTION 6A.13.(c)** Of the funds appropriated to the Information Technology
44 Fund, one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) shall be appropriated to support this initiative.

45 **SECTION 6A.13.(d)** There is created a Data Integration Steering Committee that
46 shall have responsibility for providing oversight for all data integration efforts in the State. The
47 Committee shall be housed in and supported by the Office of the State Controller.

48 **SECTION 6A.13.(e)** This Committee shall assume all of the BEACON Project
49 Steering Committee roles and responsibilities for oversight of data integration projects. This
50 Committee shall be chaired by the State Controller and shall include the following six voting
51 members:

- 52 (1) One member appointed by the Governor with an information technology
53 background and experience.
- 54 (2) One member appointed by the Governor with a background in law
55 enforcement.
- 56 (3) One member appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate with a
57 background in government accounting.
- 58 (4) One member appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the Senate with
59 government operations experience.

1 (5) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives with
2 a background in information technology.

3 (6) One member appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives with
4 a background in business management.

5 Members shall not have any connections to potential vendors. Current members of the General
6 Assembly shall not serve as members of this Committee.

7 **SECTION 6A.13.(f)** The Director of the Office of State Budget and Management,
8 the State Chief Information Officer, the Secretary of Health and Human Services, and the State
9 Treasurer shall serve as advisory members.

10 11 **PART VII. PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

12 13 **EDUCATION REFORM IN NORTH CAROLINA**

14 **SECTION 7.1.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly that the children of
15 North Carolina are ready to succeed when they start school, learn the appropriate foundational
16 education in the early grades, are prepared for a career or higher education upon graduation,
17 and have job and learning skills appropriate to the global economy.

18 **SECTION 7.1.(b)** To implement this, the Joint Education Oversight Committee
19 shall study the following and report to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly
20 with a comprehensive plan, including implementation dates and schedules, to accomplish this
21 vision:

- 22 (1) Elementary and secondary education. – It is a priority of the General
23 Assembly that by the end of third grade, North Carolina children receive a
24 foundational education in reading and mathematics upon which to build
25 future educational achievement. Further, it is a priority that children in all
26 grades receive quality education from high-quality teachers that are ready
27 and able to teach and that children are promoted in an educationally
28 appropriate manner. To that end, the Committee shall study the following:
- 29 a. Teacher tenure and its relationship with student performance.
 - 30 b. Teacher pay and its relationship with student performance, including
31 the following:
 - 32 1. Salary supplements for employees with master's degrees and
33 national board certification, and their relationship with
34 student performance.
 - 35 2. Methods of implementing a performance pay plan for school
36 employees.
 - 37 c. Strategies for reducing teacher paperwork to assist teachers in
38 spending more time with students.
 - 39 d. Kindergarten as a transition year between pre-K and elementary
40 education, including the following:
 - 41 1. Kindergarten specific class size ratios.
 - 42 2. Effectiveness of teacher assistants.
 - 43 e. Reducing teacher-student ratio to 1:15 in first through third grades
44 and its relationship with student performance.
 - 45 f. Specific reasons why students drop out and reasons why at-risk
46 students decide to stay in school. In studying this, the Committee
47 shall review dropout prevention programs implemented across the
48 State to determine the effectiveness of different approaches.
 - 49 g. The effectiveness of various diagnostic tools in improving student
50 performance.
 - 51 h. District size and its relationship with student performance and school
52 finance.
 - 53 i. State funding formulas. In its examination and review, the
54 Committee shall determine which funding formulas maximize
55 district flexibility and parental choice.
 - 56 j. Course offerings, including the existence of duplicative courses of
57 study in public and private secondary and postsecondary institutions
58 in each local school administrative unit or county.

- 1 k. Alternative course delivery methods, including virtual schools and
2 off-site courses.
- 3 l. Strategies to reduce the number of students that receive special
4 education accommodations under the federal Individuals with
5 Disabilities Education Act and its implementing regulations.
- 6 m. The advisability, costs, and barriers to increasing public access to
7 value-added assessments such as the Education Value Added
8 Assessment System and local school administrative unit financial
9 information.
- 10 n. School and district accreditation and its relationship with student
11 performance.
- 12 o. The advisability, costs, and barriers to adding additional information
13 to State Public School Report Cards, including productivity
14 measures, compensation of personnel, and value-added scores.
- 15 p. The amount of school district resources used for advocacy, including
16 funds paid to organizations that employ lobbyists and government
17 relations personnel.
- 18 q. The advisability, costs, potential savings, and barriers to privatization
19 of local school administrative unit services, including food service,
20 transportation, cleaning, landscaping, and resource officers.
- 21 r. Strategies for measuring and strengthening academic achievement in
22 middle schools.
- 23 (2) Transition from high school. – It is a priority of the General Assembly that
24 high school graduates enter the workforce or higher education fully
25 prepared. To that end, the Committee shall study the following:
- 26 a. Ways to reduce the need for remedial or developmental education in
27 the State's higher education institutions, so that students and the State
28 do not pay repeatedly for the same education, including the
29 following:
- 30 1. Ensuring clear, rigorous secondary school standards, such as
31 using college assessment tests in high school, including
32 reviewing models in Florida and California, and using college
33 assessment tests as entrance requirements for universities.
- 34 2. Ways to hold high schools accountable for the higher
35 education performance of their students, including requiring
36 funding for developmental education to come from high
37 schools.
- 38 3. The most cost-effective way to provide remedial education in
39 higher education, including funding summer term
40 developmental courses at community colleges based on
41 successful course completions, focusing remediation at the
42 community colleges, and redirecting university appropriations
43 for remedial education to the community colleges.
- 44 b. The most efficient and effective way to provide opportunities for
45 high school students to access higher education, including the
46 following:
- 47 1. Models of specific instructional pathways to higher
48 education, including the following:
- 49 I. A Career Technical Education Pathway (CTE),
50 leading to a certificate or diploma aligned with one or
51 more high school Tech Prep Career Clusters.
- 52 II. A College Transfer Pathway leading to a college
53 transfer certificate requiring successful completion of
54 eight college transfer courses, including English and
55 Mathematics.
- 56 III. A school-specific pathway, including Learn and Earn
57 schools, the iSchool of the University of North
58 Carolina at Greensboro, and other Cooperative and

Innovative High Schools approved under Part 9 of Article 16 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes.

IV. Other pathways, including the Governor's Proposed Career and College Promise Program.

2. Revising statutes for high school students in higher education.
- (3) Higher education. – It is a priority of the General Assembly that the State's higher education system produce college graduates in the most efficient and effective manner possible, to improve productivity and public accountability for performance in postsecondary education, and ultimately to increase the educational level and earning potential of the State. To that end, the Committee shall study the following:
- a. A revised set of accountability measures and performance standards by which to evaluate and measure student progress and student success in the North Carolina Community College System, as described in Section 8.14 of this act, including how to incorporate these measures into formula funding.
 - b. Ways to increase transparency in the university system spending and revenues.
 - c. Other states' performance funding systems, including efforts in Ohio, Florida, and Washington.
 - d. Ways to increase college graduation rates, by funding based on performance.
 - e. The impact of directing more students to the community colleges for their freshman and sophomore years of a four-year degree, including requiring a certificate of transfer from the North Carolina Community College System before transferring to The University of North Carolina System.
 - f. Faculty class loads at the constituent institutions of the North Carolina Community College System and The University of North Carolina.

SECTION 7.1.(c) In all cases, any program implemented needs to be structured so that ongoing, evaluable performance and outcome data is available.

SECTION 7.1.(d) Funds appropriated to implement this section may be used by the Committee to hire one or more external consultants to complete these studies.

FUNDS FOR CHILDREN WITH DISABILITIES

SECTION 7.2. The State Board of Education shall allocate additional funds for children with disabilities on the basis of three thousand five hundred ninety-eight dollars and fifty-five cents (\$3,598.55) per child. Each local school administrative unit shall receive funds for the lesser of (i) all children who are identified as children with disabilities or (ii) twelve and five-tenths percent (12.5%) of its 2011-2012 allocated average daily membership in the local school administrative unit. The dollar amounts allocated under this section for children with disabilities shall also adjust in accordance with legislative salary increments, retirement rate adjustments, and health benefit adjustments for personnel who serve children with disabilities.

FUNDS FOR ACADEMICALLY GIFTED CHILDREN

SECTION 7.3. The State Board of Education shall allocate additional funds for academically or intellectually gifted children on the basis of one thousand eighty-three dollars and fifty-two cents (\$1,083.52) per child for fiscal year 2011-2012 and one thousand eighty-three dollars and twenty cents (\$1,083.20) per child for fiscal year 2012-2013. A local school administrative unit shall receive funds for a maximum of four percent (4%) of its 2011-2012 allocated average daily membership, regardless of the number of children identified as academically or intellectually gifted in the unit. The dollar amounts allocated under this section for academically or intellectually gifted children shall also adjust in accordance with legislative salary increments, retirement rate adjustments, and health benefit adjustments for personnel who serve academically or intellectually gifted children.

USE OF SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING IN LOW-WEALTH COUNTIES

1 **SECTION 7.4.(a)** Use of Funds for Supplemental Funding. – All funds received
2 pursuant to this section shall be used only (i) to provide instructional positions, instructional
3 support positions, teacher assistant positions, clerical positions, school computer technicians,
4 instructional supplies and equipment, staff development, and textbooks and (ii) for salary
5 supplements for instructional personnel and instructional support personnel. Local boards of
6 education are encouraged to use at least twenty-five percent (25%) of the funds received
7 pursuant to this section to improve the academic performance of children who are performing
8 at Level I or II on either reading or mathematics end-of-grade tests in grades 3-8 and children
9 who are performing at Level I or II in grades 4 and 7.

10 **SECTION 7.4.(b)** Definitions. – As used in this section, the following definitions
11 apply:

- 12 (1) "Anticipated county property tax revenue availability" means the
13 county-adjusted property tax base multiplied by the effective State average
14 tax rate.
- 15 (2) "Anticipated total county revenue availability" means the sum of the
16 following:
 - 17 a. Anticipated county property tax revenue availability.
 - 18 b. Local sales and use taxes received by the county that are levied under
19 Chapter 1096 of the 1967 Session Laws or under Subchapter VIII of
20 Chapter 105 of the General Statutes.
 - 21 c. Sales tax hold harmless reimbursement received by the county under
22 G.S. 105-521.
 - 23 d. Fines and forfeitures deposited in the county school fund for the most
24 recent year for which data are available.
- 25 (3) "Anticipated total county revenue availability per student" means the
26 anticipated total county revenue availability for the county divided by the
27 average daily membership of the county.
- 28 (4) "Anticipated State average revenue availability per student" means the sum
29 of all anticipated total county revenue availability divided by the average
30 daily membership for the State.
- 31 (5) "Average daily membership" means average daily membership as defined in
32 the North Carolina Public Schools Allotment Policy Manual, adopted by the
33 State Board of Education. If a county contains only part of a local school
34 administrative unit, the average daily membership of that county includes all
35 students who reside within the county and attend that local school
36 administrative unit.
- 37 (6) "County-adjusted property tax base" shall be computed as follows:
 - 38 a. Subtract the present-use value of agricultural land, horticultural land,
39 and forestland in the county, as defined in G.S. 105-277.2, from the
40 total assessed real property valuation of the county.
 - 41 b. Adjust the resulting amount by multiplying by a weighted average of
42 the three most recent annual sales assessment ratio studies.
 - 43 c. Add to the resulting amount the following:
 - 44 1. Present-use value of agricultural land, horticultural land, and
45 forestland, as defined in G.S. 105-277.2.
 - 46 2. Value of property of public service companies, determined in
47 accordance with Article 23 of Chapter 105 of the General
48 Statutes.
 - 49 3. Personal property value for the county.
- 50 (7) "County-adjusted property tax base per square mile" means the
51 county-adjusted property tax base divided by the number of square miles of
52 land area in the county.
- 53 (8) "County wealth as a percentage of State average wealth" shall be computed
54 as follows:
 - 55 a. Compute the percentage that the county per capita income is of the
56 State per capita income and weight the resulting percentage by a
57 factor of five-tenths.
 - 58 b. Compute the percentage that the anticipated total county revenue
59 availability per student is of the anticipated State average revenue

- 1 availability per student and weight the resulting percentage by a
2 factor of four-tenths.
- 3 c. Compute the percentage that the county-adjusted property tax base
4 per square mile is of the State-adjusted property tax base per square
5 mile and weight the resulting percentage by a factor of one-tenth.
- 6 d. Add the three weighted percentages to derive the county wealth as a
7 percentage of the State average wealth.
- 8 (9) "Effective county tax rate" means the actual county tax rate multiplied by a
9 weighted average of the three most recent annual sales assessment ratio
10 studies.
- 11 (10) "Effective State average tax rate" means the average of effective county tax
12 rates for all counties.
- 13 (11) "Local current expense funds" means the most recent county current expense
14 appropriations to public schools, as reported by local boards of education in
15 the audit report filed with the Secretary of the Local Government
16 Commission pursuant to G.S. 115C-447.
- 17 (12) "Per capita income" means the average for the most recent three years for
18 which data are available of the per capita income according to the most
19 recent report of the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of
20 Economic Analysis, including any reported modifications for prior years as
21 outlined in the most recent report.
- 22 (13) "Sales assessment ratio studies" means sales assessment ratio studies
23 performed by the Department of Revenue under G.S. 105-289(h).
- 24 (14) "State average current expense appropriations per student" means the most
25 recent State total of county current expense appropriations to public schools,
26 as reported by local boards of education in the audit report filed with the
27 Secretary of the Local Government Commission pursuant to G.S. 115C-447.
- 28 (15) "State average adjusted property tax base per square mile" means the sum of
29 the county-adjusted property tax bases for all counties divided by the
30 number of square miles of land area in the State.
- 31 (16) "Supplant" means to decrease local per student current expense
32 appropriations from one fiscal year to the next fiscal year.
- 33 (17) "Weighted average of the three most recent annual sales assessment ratio
34 studies" means the weighted average of the three most recent annual sales
35 assessment ratio studies in the most recent years for which county current
36 expense appropriations and adjusted property tax valuations are available. If
37 real property in a county has been revalued one year prior to the most recent
38 sales assessment ratio study, a weighted average of the two most recent sales
39 assessment ratios shall be used. If property has been revalued the year of the
40 most recent sales assessment ratio study, the sales assessment ratio for the
41 year of revaluation shall be used.

42 **SECTION 7.4.(c)** Eligibility for Funds. – Except as provided in subsection (g) of
43 this section, the State Board of Education shall allocate these funds to local school
44 administrative units located in whole or in part in counties in which the county wealth as a
45 percentage of the State average wealth is less than one hundred percent (100%).

46 **SECTION 7.4.(d)** Allocation of Funds. – Except as provided in subsection (f) of
47 this section, the amount received per average daily membership for a county shall be the
48 difference between the State average current expense appropriations per student and the current
49 expense appropriations per student that the county could provide given the county's wealth and
50 an average effort to fund public schools. (To derive the current expense appropriations per
51 student that the county could be able to provide given the county's wealth and an average effort
52 to fund public schools, multiply the county's wealth as a percentage of State average wealth by
53 the State average current expense appropriations per student.) The funds for the local school
54 administrative units located in whole or in part in the county shall be allocated to each local
55 school administrative unit located in whole or in part in the county based on the average daily
56 membership of the county's students in the school units. If the funds appropriated for
57 supplemental funding are not adequate to fund the formula fully, each local school
58 administrative unit shall receive a pro rata share of the funds appropriated for supplemental
59 funding.

1 **SECTION 7.4.(e)** Formula for Distribution of Supplemental Funding Pursuant to
2 This Section Only. – The formula in this section is solely a basis for distribution of
3 supplemental funding for low-wealth counties and is not intended to reflect any measure of the
4 adequacy of the educational program or funding for public schools. The formula is also not
5 intended to reflect any commitment by the General Assembly to appropriate any additional
6 supplemental funds for low-wealth counties.

7 **SECTION 7.4.(f)** Minimum Effort Required. – Counties that had effective tax
8 rates in the 1996-1997 fiscal year that were above the State average effective tax rate but that
9 had effective rates below the State average in the 1997-1998 fiscal year or thereafter shall
10 receive reduced funding under this section. This reduction in funding shall be determined by
11 subtracting the amount that the county would have received pursuant to Section 17.1(g) of
12 Chapter 507 of the 1995 Session Laws from the amount that the county would have received if
13 qualified for full funding and multiplying the difference by ten percent (10%). This method of
14 calculating reduced funding shall apply one time only. This method of calculating reduced
15 funding shall not apply in cases in which the effective tax rate fell below the statewide average
16 effective tax rate as a result of a reduction in the actual property tax rate. In these cases, the
17 minimum effort required shall be calculated in accordance with Section 17.1(g) of Chapter 507
18 of the 1995 Session Laws. If the county documents that it has increased the per student
19 appropriation to the school current expense fund in the current fiscal year, the State Board of
20 Education shall include this additional per pupil appropriation when calculating minimum
21 effort pursuant to Section 17.1(g) of Chapter 507 of the 1995 Session Laws.

22 **SECTION 7.4.(g)** Nonsupplant Requirement. – A county in which a local school

40 **SECTION 7.4.(i)** Department of Revenue Reports. – The Department of Revenue
41 shall provide to the Department of Public Instruction a preliminary report for the current fiscal
42 year of the assessed value of the property tax base for each county prior to March 1 of each
43 year and a final report prior to May 1 of each year. The reports shall include for each county the
44 annual sales assessment ratio and the taxable values of (i) total real property, (ii) the portion of

51 **SECTION 7.5.** The State Board of Education may expend up to five hundred

53 unexpended funds for certified employees' salaries to pay expenses related to litigation.

55 UNIFORM EDUCATION REPORTING SYSTEM (UERS) FUNDS

56 **SECTION 7.6.(a)** Funds appropriated for the Uniform Education Reporting
57 System shall not revert at the end of the 2010-2011 fiscal year.

58 **SECTION 7.6.(b)** This section becomes effective June 30, 2011.

FOCUSED EDUCATION REFORM PROGRAM FUNDS DO NOT REVERT

SECTION 7.7.(a) Funds appropriated for the Focused Education Reform Pilot Program that are unexpended and unencumbered at the end of the 2010-2011 fiscal year shall not revert but shall remain available for expenditure for that purpose through the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

SECTION 7.7.(b) This section becomes effective June 30, 2011.

DISADVANTAGED STUDENT SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING (DSSF)

SECTION 7.8.(a) Funds appropriated for disadvantaged student supplemental funding shall be used, consistent with the policies and procedures adopted by the State Board of Education, only to the following:

- (1) Provide instructional positions or instructional support positions and/or professional development;
- (2) Provide intensive in-school and/or after-school remediation;
- (3) Purchase diagnostic software and progress-monitoring tools; and
- (4) Provide funds for teacher bonuses and supplements. The State Board of Education shall set a maximum percentage of the funds that may be used for this purpose.

The State Board of Education may require districts receiving funding under the Disadvantaged Student Supplemental Fund to purchase the Education Value Added Assessment System in order to provide in-depth analysis of student performance and help identify strategies for improving student achievement. This data shall be used exclusively for instructional and curriculum decisions made in the best interest of children and for professional development for their teachers and administrators.

SECTION 7.8.(b) Funds appropriated to a local school administrative unit for disadvantaged student supplemental funding shall be allotted based on (i) the local school administrative unit's eligible DSSF population and (ii) the difference between a teacher-to-student ratio of 1:21 and the following teacher-to-student ratios:

- (1) For counties with wealth greater than ninety percent (90%) of the statewide average, a ratio of 1:19.9.
- (2) For counties with wealth not less than eighty percent (80%) and not greater than ninety percent (90%) of the statewide average, a ratio of 1:19.4.
- (3) For counties with wealth less than eighty percent (80%) of the statewide average, a ratio of 1:19.1.
- (4) For LEAs receiving DSSF funds in 2005-2006, a ratio of 1:16. These LEAs shall receive no less than the DSSF amount allotted in 2006-2007.

For the purpose of this subsection, wealth shall be calculated under the low-wealth supplemental formula.

SECTION 7.8.(c) If a local school administrative unit's wealth increases to a level that adversely affects the unit's DSSF allotment ratio, the DSSF allotment for that unit shall be maintained at the prior year level for one additional fiscal year.

TUITION CHARGE FOR GOVERNOR'S SCHOOL

SECTION 7.9. G.S. 115C-12(36) reads as rewritten:

"(36) Duty to Charge Tuition for the Governor's School of North Carolina. – The State Board of Education ~~shall~~may implement a ~~five-hundred-dollar (\$500.00)~~ tuition charge for students attending the Governor's School of ~~North Carolina~~Carolina to cover the costs of the School."

SCHOOL CONNECTIVITY INITIATIVE FUNDS

11 SMALL SCHOOL SYSTEM SUPPLEMENTAL FUNDING

12 SECTION 7.12.(a) Funds for Small School Systems. – Except as provided in
13 subsection (b) of this section, the State Board of Education shall allocate funds appropriated for
14 small school system supplemental funding (i) to each county school administrative unit with an
15 average daily membership of fewer than 3,175 students and (ii) to each county school
16 administrative unit with an average daily membership from 3,175 to 4,000 students if the
17 county in which the local school administrative unit is located has a county-adjusted property
18 tax base per student that is below the State-adjusted property tax base per student and if the
19 total average daily membership of all local school administrative units located within the
20 county is from 3,175 to 4,000 students. The allocation formula shall do all of the following:

- 30 (5) Provide a base for the consolidated funds allotment of at least seven hundred
31 seventeen thousand three hundred sixty dollars (\$717,360), excluding
32 textbooks, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and a base of seven hundred
33 seventeen thousand three hundred sixty dollars (\$717,360) for the 2012-2013
34 fiscal year.
- 35 (6) Allot vocational education funds for grade 6 as well as for grades 7-12. If
36 funds appropriated for each fiscal year for small school system supplemental
37 funding are not adequate to fully fund the program, the State Board of
38 Education shall reduce the amount allocated to each county school
39 administrative unit on a pro rata basis. This formula is solely a basis for
40 distribution of supplemental funding for certain county school administrative

25 average daily membership who reside within the State.
- 26 (6) "Supplant" means to decrease local per student current expense
27 appropriations from one fiscal year to the next fiscal year.
- 28 (7) "Weighted average of the three most recent annual sales assessment ratio
29 studies" means the weighted average of the three most recent annual sales
30 assessment ratio studies in the most recent years for which county current
31 expense appropriations and adjusted property tax valuations are available. If
32 real property in a county has been revalued one year prior to the most recent
33 sales assessment ratio study, a weighted average of the two most recent sales
34 assessment ratios shall be used. If property has been revalued during the year
35 of the most recent sales assessment ratio study, the sales assessment ratio for
36 the year of revaluation shall be used.

37 **SECTION 7.12.(e)** Reports. – The State Board of Education shall report to the
38 Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee prior to May 1, 2012, if it determines that
39 counties have supplanted funds.

40 **SECTION 7.12.(f)** Use of Funds. – Local boards of education are encouraged to
41 use at least twenty percent (20%) of the funds they receive pursuant to this section to improve
42 the academic performance of children who are performing at Level I or II on either reading or
43 mathematics end-of-grade tests in grades 3-8.

44 **ELIMINATION OF REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

45 **SECTION 7.13.(a)** G.S. 115C-47(32a) reads as rewritten:

46 "(32a) To Establish Alternative Learning Programs and Develop Policies and

5 **SECTION 7.14.(a)** A school with less than 100 students in final average daily
6 membership is not entitled to 12 months of employment for a principal.

7 **SECTION 7.14.(b)** This section applies only to schools created after July 1, 2011.

8 9 **TRANSFER OF FEDERAL AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION FUNDS**

10 **SECTION 7.15.** The Agricultural Education Program in the Department of
11 Agricultural and Extension Education at North Carolina State University shall develop the
12 secondary agricultural education curricula. The Program shall recommend the curricula and
13 corresponding assessment instruments to the State Board of Education, which shall adopt the
14 curricula for inclusion in the Standard Course of Study. This curricula shall include as part of
15 its core content the Future Farmers of America (FFA) student youth organization and the
16 Supervised Agricultural Experience learning program.

17 Effective with the 2011 federal grant, the State Board of Education shall transfer a
18 prorated share of funds from all federal Career and Technical Education funds available for

26 27 **PHASEOUT OF ALLOTMENT OF TEACHERS FOR GEOGRAPHICALLY** 28 **ISOLATED SCHOOLS**

29 **SECTION 7.16.(a)** Section 7.26 of S.L. 2009-451 is repealed.

30 **SECTION 7.16.(b)** For the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the State Board of Education
31 shall modify its policy on the allotment of additional classroom teachers to a school containing
32 grades K-12 and located in a local school administrative unit in which the average daily
33 membership is less than 1.5 per square mile in order to allot four additional teachers to the
34 geographically isolated school.

35 36 **SCHOOL CALENDAR PILOT PROGRAM**

37 **SECTION 7.17.** The State Board of Education shall establish a school calendar
38 pilot program in the Wilkes County Schools and the Stanly County Schools. The purpose of the
39 pilot program is to determine whether and to what extent a local school administrative unit can
40 save money during this extreme fiscal crisis by consolidating the school calendar.

41 Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-84.2(a)(1), the school calendar for the 2011-2012
42 calendar year for the pilot school systems shall include a minimum of 180 days or 1,000 hours
43 of instruction covering at least nine calendar months. Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-84.2(d), the

47 have a minimum of 180 days of instruction, and teachers employed for a 10-month term are
48 deemed to have been employed for the days being made up and shall be compensated as if they
49 had worked the days being made up.

50 The State Board of Education shall report to the Joint Legislative Education
51 Oversight Committee by March 15, 2012, on the administration of the pilot program,
52 cost-savings realized by it, and its impact on student achievement.

53 54 **PERFORMANCE PAY MODEL PROGRAM**

55 **SECTION 7.18.** The State Board of Education shall establish a performance pay
56 model program. A local school administrative unit that is approved by the State Board of
57 Education as a performance pay model unit may use State funds, except for funds allotted for
58 salaries, to implement a performance pay model.

BUDGET REDUCTIONS/DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC INSTRUCTION

SECTION 7.19.(a) Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4 or Section 7.14 of S.L. 2009-451, the Department of Public Instruction may, after consultation with the Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division, reorganize if necessary to implement the budget reductions set out in this act. This consultation shall occur prior to requesting budgetary and personnel changes through the budget revision process. The Department shall provide a current organization chart in the consultation process. The Department shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on any reorganization.

SECTION 7.19.(b) The Department of Public Instruction shall not increase the number of State-funded positions in any Department of Public Instruction divisions identified for reductions in this act.

SECTION 7.19.(c) In implementing budget reductions under this act, the Department of Public Instruction shall make no reduction in funding or positions for the Positive Behavioral Support program.

LEA BUDGET ADJUSTMENT

SECTION 7.20.(a) Within 14 days of the date this act becomes law, the State Board of Education shall notify each local school administrative unit and charter school of the amount the unit or charter school must reduce from the State General Fund appropriations. The State Board shall determine the amount of the reduction for each unit and charter school on the basis of average daily membership.

SECTION 7.20.(b) Each unit or charter school shall report to the Department of Public Instruction on the flexibility budget reductions it has identified for the unit within 30 days of the date this act becomes law.

LEA BUDGETARY FLEXIBILITY

SECTION 7.21.(a) For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, the State Board of Education is authorized to extend its emergency rules, in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1A, granting maximum flexibility to local school administrative units regarding the expenditure of State funds. These rules shall not be subject to the limitations on transfers of funds between funding allotment categories set out in G.S. 115C-105.25. These rules shall not permit the transfer of funds into central office administration.

SECTION 7.21.(b) For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, local school administrative units shall make every effort to reduce spending whenever and wherever such budget reductions are appropriate with the goal of protecting direct classroom services. Notwithstanding G.S. 115C-301 or any other law, local school administrative units shall have the maximum flexibility to use allotted teacher positions to maximize student achievement in grades 4-12. Allocation of teachers and class size requirements in grades K-3 shall remain unchanged.

NORTH CAROLINA VIRTUAL PUBLIC SCHOOLS

SECTION 7.22.(a) The North Carolina Virtual Public School (NCVPS) program shall report to the State Board of Education and shall maintain an administrative office at the Department of Public Instruction.

SECTION 7.22.(b) The Director of NCVPS shall ensure that students residing in rural and low-wealth county local school administrative units have access to e-learning course offerings in order to expand available instructional opportunities. E-learning instructional opportunities shall include courses required as part of the standard course of study for high school graduation and AP offerings not otherwise available.

SECTION 7.22.(c) Section 7.4 of S.L. 2010-31 is repealed.

SECTION 7.22.(d) The State Board of Education shall take the following steps to implement an allotment formula for NCVPS beginning with the 2011-2012 school year:

- (1) Project NCVPS student enrollment by semester and year-long course types for each local school administrative unit and charter school.
- (2) Establish a per course teacher payment structure for the instructional costs of NCVPS. In establishing this payment structure, the Board shall consider the following:

- 1 a. The payment structure is based on a total compensation analysis to
2 ensure NCVPS teacher pay has parity with similar programs. The
3 total compensation analysis shall take into account salaries, benefits,
4 and work effort to ensure valid comparisons between occupations.
5 b. The effects any change in NCVPS teacher payments may have on the
6 attraction and retention of NCVPS teachers.
- 7 (3) Develop a per student fee structure for in-State students that is based on the
8 per course teacher pay structure. The fee structure for in-State students shall
9 ensure that the projected cost for local school administrative units and
10 charter schools equals the projected instructional cost for NCVPS courses.
- 11 (4) Multiply the per course fees for in-State students by the projected enrollment
12 by course type to determine the total instructional cost for each local school
13 administrative unit and charter school.
- 14 (5) Transfer a dollar amount equal to seventy-five percent (75%) of the local
15 school administrative unit's or charter school's projected instructional cost
16 from the classroom teacher allotment to NCVPS.
- 17 (6) No later than February 21 of each year, calculate the actual instructional cost
18 for each local school administrative unit and charter school based upon
19 actual NCVPS enrollment as of that date.
- 20 (7) Subtract the amount transferred pursuant to subdivision (5) of this subsection
21 from the actual instructional cost for each unit or charter school and transfer
22 the remaining dollar amount owed, up to a maximum of one hundred percent
23 (100%) of the projected cost.
- 24 (8) Develop and implement a policy regarding returning funds to local school
25 administrative units and charter schools in cases where the amount
26 transferred pursuant to subdivision (5) of this subsection exceeds the actual
27 instructional costs.

28 NCVPS shall use funds transferred to it to provide the NCVPS program at no cost to all
29 students in North Carolina who are enrolled in North Carolina's public schools, Department of
30 Defense schools, and schools operated by the Bureau of Indian Affairs.

31 **SECTION 7.22.(e)** In establishing the fee structure and payment structure for
32 NCVPS, the State Board shall consider recommendations from the eLearning Commission and
33 the NCVPS Advisory Board.

34 **SECTION 7.22.(f)** The State Board shall establish a separate per student tuition for
35 out-of-state students, home-schooled students, and private school students, which shall be
36 adjusted upward from the in-State student fee structure by an amount determined appropriate
37 by the State Board.

38 **SECTION 7.22.(g)** NCVPS shall develop a revenue-generating plan for the sale of
39 courses to out-of-state educational entities. NCVPS shall submit its plan to the State Board by
40 September 1, 2011.

41 **SECTION 7.22.(h)** Beginning in 2011, the Director of NCVPS shall submit an
42 annual report on NCVPS to the State Board of Education no later than December 1 of each
43 year. The report shall use data from the previous fiscal year and shall include statistics on
44 actual vs. projected costs to local administrative units and charter schools, student enrollment,
45 virtual teacher salaries, and measures of academic achievement.

46 The Director of NCVPS shall continue to ensure the following:

- 47 (1) Course quality standards are established and met.
48 (2) All e-learning opportunities other than virtual charter schools offered by
49 State-funded entities to public school students are consolidated under the
50 NCVPS program, eliminating course duplication.
51 (3) All courses offered through NCVPS are aligned to the North Carolina
52 Standard Course of Study.

53 **SECTION 7.22.(i)** The State Board of Education shall reduce ADM dollar
54 allotments on the basis of ADM in grades 6-12 to provide the sum of two million eight hundred
55 sixty-six thousand nine hundred twenty-three dollars (\$2,866,923) for the State-level operations
56 and administration of NCVPS for the 2011-2012 fiscal year. The reduction to ADM dollar
57 allotments for State-level operations and administration shall continue in future fiscal years and
58 be adjusted annually based upon the percentage growth in NCVPS enrollment, ensuring the
59 expansion of services due to increased virtual student enrollment.

1 **SECTION 7.22.(j)** For fiscal year 2011-2012, the State Board of Education shall
2 reduce ADM dollar allotments on the basis of ADM in grades 6-12 to provide the sum of two
3 million dollars (\$2,000,000) in order to create an NCVPS enrollment reserve. The NCVPS
4 enrollment reserve shall be used to cover the NCVPS instructional costs of local school
5 administrative units or charter schools with enrollments exceeding projected NCVPS
6 enrollment.

7 Beginning in fiscal year 2012-2013, and annually thereafter, the State Board of Education
8 shall reduce ADM dollar allotments on the basis of ADM in grades 6-12 an amount that is the
9 difference between two million dollars (\$2,000,000) and the balance of the NCVPS enrollment
10 reserve.

11 Amounts available in the NCVPS enrollment reserve shall not revert.

12 **SECTION 7.22.(k)** The State Board shall use only funds provided through the
13 North Carolina Virtual Public Schools Allotment Formula and the NCVPS enrollment reserve
14 as set forth in this section to fund instructional costs of NCVPS.

15 **PERFORMANCE-BASED REDUCTIONS IN FORCE**

16 **SECTION 7.23.(a)** The State Board of Education shall adopt a Reduction in Force
17 policy that is consistent across all local school administrative units. Under the policy, the
18 following criteria shall apply to local school administrative units conducting any necessary
19 reductions in force:
20

- 21 (1) In determining which positions shall be subject to a reduction in force, a
22 local school administrative unit shall consider the following:
 - 23 a. Structural considerations, such as identifying positions, departments,
24 courses, programs, operations, and other areas where there are (i) less
25 essential, duplicative, or excess personnel; (ii) job responsibility
26 and/or position inefficiencies; (iii) opportunities for combined work
27 functions; and/or (iv) decreased student or other demands for
28 curriculum, programs, operations, or other services.
 - 29 b. Organizational considerations, such as anticipated organizational
30 needs of the school system and program/school enrollment.
- 31 (2) In determining which employees in similar positions shall be subject to a
32 reduction in force, a local school administrative unit shall consider work
33 performance.

34 The State Board of Education shall have this policy in place on or before July 15, 2011.

35 **SECTION 7.23.(b)** G.S. 115C-325(e)(2) reads as rewritten:

36 "(2) Reduction in Force. – Before recommending to a board the dismissal or
37 demotion of the career employee pursuant to G.S. 115C-325(e)(1)l., the
38 superintendent shall give written notice to the career employee by certified
39 mail or personal delivery of his intention to make such recommendation and
40 shall set forth as part of his recommendation the grounds upon which he
41 believes such dismissal or demotion is justified. The notice shall include a
42 statement to the effect that if the career employee within 15 days after
43 receipt of the notice requests a review, he shall be entitled to have the
44 proposed recommendations of the superintendent reviewed by the board.
45 Within the 15-day period after receipt of the notice, the career employee
46 may file with the superintendent a written request for a hearing before the
47 board within 10 days. If the career employee requests a hearing before the
48 board, the hearing procedures provided in G.S. 115C-325(j3) shall be
49 followed. If no request is made within the 15-day period, the superintendent
50 may file his recommendation with the board. If, after considering the
51 recommendation of the superintendent and the evidence adduced at the
52 hearing if there is one, the board concludes that the grounds for the
53 recommendation are true and substantiated by a preponderance of the
54 evidence, the board, if it sees fit, may by resolution order such dismissal.
55 Provisions of this section which permit a hearing by a case manager shall not
56 apply to a dismissal or demotion recommended pursuant to
57 G.S. 115C-325(e)(1)l.

58 When a career employee is dismissed pursuant to G.S. 115C-325(e)(1)l.
59 above, his name shall be placed on a list of available career employees to be

1 maintained by the board. ~~Career employees whose names are placed on such~~
2 ~~a list shall have a priority on all positions in which they acquired career~~
3 ~~status and for which they are qualified which become available in that~~
4 ~~system for the three consecutive years succeeding their dismissal. However,~~
5 ~~if the local school administrative unit offers the dismissed career employee a~~
6 ~~position for which he is certified and he refuses it, his name shall be~~
7 ~~removed from the priority list."~~

9 TEACHING FELLOWS ADMINISTRATIVE REDUCTION

10 SECTION 7.24. G.S. 115C-363.23A(f) reads as rewritten:

11 "§ 115C-363.23A. Teaching Fellows Program established; administration.

12 ...
13 (f) All funds appropriated to or otherwise received by the Teaching Fellows Program
14 for scholarships, all funds received as repayment of scholarship loans, and all interest earned on
15 these funds, shall be placed in a revolving fund. This revolving fund shall be used for
16 scholarship loans granted under the Teaching Fellows Program. With the prior approval of the
17 General Assembly in the Current Operations Appropriations Act, the revolving fund may also
18 be used for campus and summer program support, and costs related to disbursement of awards
19 and collection of loan repayments.

20 The Public School Forum, as administrator for the Teaching Fellows Program, may use up
21 to ~~eight hundred ten thousand dollars (\$810,000)~~six hundred thousand dollars (\$600,000)
22 annually from the fund balance for costs associated with administration of the Teaching
23 Fellows Program."
24

25 RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS

26 SECTION 7.25.(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, the
27 Department of Public Instruction shall not close the Governor Morehead School for the Blind,
28 the Eastern North Carolina School for the Deaf, or the North Carolina School for the Deaf (the
29 "residential schools") nor consolidate all operations of any of the residential schools on the
30 campus of another residential school until an enactment of the General Assembly instructs the
31 Department to do so.

32 SECTION 7.25.(b) The Department of Public Instruction shall ensure that the
33 residential and instructional schedules for the residential schools that were in effect before
34 February 8, 2010, shall remain in effect unless the General Assembly approves a material
35 change to the instructional week. Residential students shall have the opportunity to arrive at
36 their respective schools on the evening of the day before commencement of academic
37 instruction for the week. The Department shall also maintain summer school programming at
38 the residential schools in substantially the same manner as in prior years and shall make no
39 material changes to summer school programming without the approval of the General
40 Assembly.

41 SECTION 7.25.(c) The Department of Public Instruction may create a principal
42 position at each residential school not currently assigned a principal position from funds
43 appropriated in this act for the residential schools.

44 SECTION 7.25.(d) The position of superintendent for the residential schools
45 within the Department of Public Instruction is eliminated. The Department shall designate one
46 of the directors of the residential schools to serve as the superintendent for the residential
47 schools. Of funds previously appropriated to the Department for the position of superintendent
48 for the residential schools, the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) shall be used to
49 supplement the salary of the director who also serves as superintendent of residential schools.
50 The remaining funds shall be used to offset other reductions to the residential schools made in
51 this act.
52

53 SIXTY-FIVE PERCENT OF SCHOOL FUNDING MUST BE USED FOR 54 CLASSROOM INSTRUCTION

55 SECTION 7.26.(a) Article 30 of Chapter 115C of the General Statutes is amended
56 by adding a new section to read:

57 "§ 115C-408.1. Duty to ensure that sixty-five percent of State funds for the operations of
58 the public schools are used for classroom instruction."

1 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the State Board of Education shall modify its
2 allotment formulas, modify its rules regarding the expenditure of State funds, and transfer
3 funds, as necessary, to ensure that each local administrative unit spends on classroom
4 instruction at least sixty-five percent (65%) of the State funding it receives for the operations of
5 the public schools. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules utilizing the existing purpose
6 codes that are associated with instructional expenditures to implement this section."

7 **SECTION 7.26.(b)** This section applies to expenditures for school years beginning
8 with the 2012-2013 school year.
9

10 **PART VIII. COMMUNITY COLLEGES**

11 **REORGANIZATION OF THE COMMUNITY COLLEGES SYSTEM OFFICE**

12 **SECTION 8.1.(a)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, and consistent with
13 the authority granted in G.S. 115D-3, the President of the North Carolina Community College
14 System may reorganize the System Office in accordance with recommendations and plans
15 submitted to and approved by the State Board of Community Colleges.
16

17 **SECTION 8.1.(b)** This section expires June 30, 2012.
18

19 **REPEAL OBSOLETE REPORTING REQUIREMENTS**

20 **SECTION 8.2.(a)** G.S. 115D-4.1(e) reads as rewritten:

21 "(e) The State Board of Community Colleges shall develop appropriate criteria and
22 standards to regulate the operation of college transfer programs. ~~The criteria and standards shall~~
23 ~~require all college transfer programs to continue to meet the accreditation standards of the~~
24 ~~Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.~~

25 ~~The State Board of Community Colleges shall report annually to the General Assembly on~~
26 ~~compliance of the community colleges with these criteria and standards."~~

27 **SECTION 8.2.(b)** G.S. 115D-5(j) reads as rewritten:

28 "(j) The State Board of Community Colleges shall use its Board Reserve Fund for
29 feasibility studies, pilot projects, start-up of new programs, and innovative ideas. ~~The State~~
30 ~~Board shall report to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee on expenditures~~
31 ~~from the State Board Reserve Fund on January 15 and June 15 each year."~~
32

33 **IMPLEMENT ALTERNATIVE FORMULA MODEL**

34 **SECTION 8.3.(a)** The State Board of Community Colleges shall consolidate the
35 Health Sciences Allotment, the Technical Education Allotment, and the Special High Cost
36 Allotment for Heavy Equipment with formula funds to support curriculum instruction.

37 **SECTION 8.3.(b)** The State Board of Community Colleges shall allocate formula
38 funds appropriated to support curriculum instruction and the occupational education component
39 of continuing education through a formula that provides an instructional base allocation to all
40 colleges and allocates remaining funds on a weighted full-time equivalent (FTE) basis. In
41 determining the appropriate weighting, the State Board of Community Colleges shall weigh
42 curriculum courses in high-cost areas such as health care, technical education, and lab-based
43 science courses more heavily than other curriculum courses. The State Board of Community
44 Colleges shall also weigh continuing education courses that lead to a third-party credential or
45 certification and courses providing an industry-designed curriculum more heavily than other
46 occupational extension courses.
47

48 **USE OF OVERREALIZED RECEIPTS TO SUPPORT ENROLLMENT GROWTH** 49 **RESERVE RATHER THAN EQUIPMENT RESERVE**

50 **SECTION 8.4.** G.S. 115D-31(e) reads as rewritten:

51 "(e) If receipts for community college tuition and fees exceed the amount certified in
52 General Fund Codes at the end of a fiscal year, the State Board of Community Colleges shall
53 transfer the amount of receipts and fees above those budgeted to the ~~Equipment Reserve~~
54 ~~Fund~~ Enrollment Growth Reserve. Funds in the Enrollment Growth Reserve shall not revert to
55 the General Fund and shall remain available to the State Board until expended. The State Board
56 may allocate funds in this reserve to colleges experiencing an enrollment increase greater than
57 five percent (5%) of budgeted enrollment levels."
58

59 **BASIC SKILLS PLUS**

1 **SECTION 8.5.(a)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the State Board
2 may authorize a local community college to use up to twenty percent (20%) of the State
3 Literacy Funds allocated to it to provide employability skills, job-specific occupational and
4 technical skills, and developmental education instruction to students concurrently enrolled in a
5 community college course leading to a high school diploma or equivalent certificate.

6 **SECTION 8.5.(b)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, if a community
7 college is authorized by the State Board to provide employability skills, job-specific
8 occupational or technical skills, or developmental education instruction to students
9 concurrently enrolled in a community college course leading to a high school diploma or
10 equivalent certificate, the college may waive the tuition and registration fees associated with
11 this instruction.
12

13 **CARRYFORWARD OF COLLEGE INFORMATION SYSTEM FUNDS**

14 **SECTION 8.6.** Of the funds appropriated to the Community Colleges System
15 Office for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium for the College Information System, up to one million
16 two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$1,250,000) shall not revert at the end of each fiscal year
17 but shall remain available until expended. These funds may be used only to purchase periodic
18 system upgrades.
19

20 **EQUIPMENT FUNDING**

21 **SECTION 8.8.(a)** For the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, community colleges may
22 expend regular equipment allocations on equipment, repairs and renovations of existing
23 facilities, and new construction. Colleges must match funds expended on new construction on
24 an equal matching-fund basis in accordance with G.S. 115D-31. Notwithstanding any other
25 provision of law, community colleges are not required to match funds expended on repairs and
26 renovations of existing facilities.

27 Colleges must have capital improvement projects approved by the State Board of
28 Community Colleges and any required matching funds identified by June 30, 2013.

29 **SECTION 8.8.(b)** Of the funds appropriated to the Community Colleges System
30 Office for the 2011-2012 fiscal year for equipment, the State Board of Community Colleges
31 shall allocate the sum of two hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$250,000) to Forsyth Technical
32 Community College. These funds shall be used only for the purpose of building and equipping
33 the Stokes County multicampus site. These funds shall not be considered for a management
34 flexibility reduction.
35

36 **CLARIFICATION REGARDING EQUIPMENT TITLED TO STATE BOARD**

37 **SECTION 8.9.** G.S. 115D-15(a) reads as rewritten:

38 "(a) The board of trustees of any institution organized under this Chapter may, with the
39 prior approval of the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office, convey a
40 right-of-way or easement for highway construction or for utility installations or modifications.
41 When in the opinion of the board of trustees the use of any other real property owned or held
42 by the board of trustees is unnecessary or undesirable for the purposes of the institution, the
43 board of trustees, subject to prior approval of the State Board of Community Colleges, may
44 sell, exchange, or lease the property. The board of trustees may dispose of any personal
45 property owned or held by the board of trustees without approval of the State Board of
46 Community Colleges. Personal property titled to the State Board of Community Colleges
47 consistent with G.S. 115D-14 and G.S. 115D-58.5 may be transferred to another community
48 college at no cost and without the approval of the Department of Administration, Division of
49 Surplus Property.

50 Article 12 of Chapter 160A of the General Statutes shall apply to the disposal or sale of any
51 real or personal property under this subsection. Personal property also may be disposed of
52 under procedures adopted by the North Carolina Department of Administration. The proceeds
53 of any sale or lease shall be used for capital outlay purposes, except as provided in subsection
54 (b) of this section."
55

56 **NO STATE FUNDS FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS**

57 **SECTION 8.10.** Article 3 of Chapter 115D of the General Statutes is amended by
58 adding a new section to read:

59 "**§ 115D-42.1. Funds for an intercollegiate athletics program.**"

No State funds, student tuition receipts, or student aid funds shall be used to create, support, maintain, or operate an intercollegiate athletics program at a community college."

MANAGEMENT FLEXIBILITY REDUCTION/COMMUNITY COLLEGES

SECTION 8.11. The management flexibility reduction for the North Carolina Community College System shall be allocated by the State Board of Community Colleges in a manner that accounts for the unique needs of each college and provides for the equitable distribution of funds to the institutions consistent with G.S. 115D-5(a). Before taking reductions to instructional budgets, the community colleges shall consider reducing budgets for senior and middle management personnel and for programs that have both low enrollment and low postgraduate success. Colleges may, however, reduce funds from basic skills, curriculum, and continuing education programs. Colleges shall minimize the impact on student support services and on the retraining of dislocated workers. The community colleges shall also review their institutional funds to determine whether there are monies available in those funds that can be used to assist with operating costs before taking reductions in instructional budgets.

There shall be no reduction in funds allocated to Rowan-Cabarrus Community College for the Biotechnology Training Center at the North Carolina Research Campus.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE TUITION WAIVERS

SECTION 8.12.(a) G.S. 115D-5(b) reads as rewritten:

"(b) In order to make instruction as accessible as possible to all citizens, the teaching of curricular courses and of noncurricular extension courses at convenient locations away from institution campuses as well as on campuses is authorized and shall be encouraged. A pro rata portion of the established regular tuition rate charged a full-time student shall be charged a part-time student taking any curriculum course. In lieu of any tuition charge, the State Board of Community Colleges shall establish a uniform registration fee, or a schedule of uniform registration fees, to be charged students enrolling in extension courses for which instruction is financed primarily from State funds. The State Board of Community Colleges may provide by general and uniform regulations for waiver of tuition and registration fees ~~for~~ for the following:

- (1) Persons not enrolled in elementary or secondary schools taking courses leading to a high school diploma or equivalent ~~certificate~~; certificate.
- (2) ~~Training courses for~~ Courses requested for the training of personnel by the following:
 - a. ~~(i) volunteer firemen,~~ Volunteer fire departments.
 - b. ~~(ii) local fire department personnel,~~ Municipal, county, or State fire departments.
 - c. ~~(iii) volunteer rescue and lifesaving department personnel,~~ Volunteer EMS or rescue and lifesaving departments.
 - d. ~~(iv) local rescue and lifesaving department personnel,~~ Municipal, county, or State EMS or rescue and lifesaving departments.
 - e. ~~(v) Radio Emergency Associated Citizens Team (REACT) members when the REACT team is under contract to a county as an emergency response agency,~~ (vi) municipal, county, or State law enforcement officers, Municipal, county, or State law enforcement agencies.
 - f. ~~(vii) all full-time custodial employees of the Department of Correction, and~~ The Department of Correction for the training of full time custodial employees and employees of the Department's Division of Community Corrections required to be certified under Chapter 17C of the General Statutes and the rules of the Criminal Justice and Training Standards Commission.
 - g. ~~(viii) employees of the Department's Division of Community Corrections and employees of the~~ The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for the training of employees required to be certified under Chapter 17C of the General Statutes and the rules of the Criminal Justice and Training Standards Commission; Commission.
- (3) ~~Patients in State alcoholic rehabilitation centers;~~
- (4) Trainees enrolled in courses conducted under the Customized Training Program; Program.

- 1 (5) ~~Clients of sheltered workshops;~~
 2 (6) ~~Clients of adult developmental activity programs;~~
 3 (7) ~~Students in Health and Human Services Development Programs;~~
 4 (8) ~~Juveniles of any age committed to the Department of Juvenile Justice and~~
 5 ~~Delinquency Prevention by a court of competent jurisdiction;~~
 6 (9) ~~Members of the North Carolina State Defense Militia as defined in~~
 7 ~~G.S. 127A-5 and as administered under Article 5 of Chapter 127A of the~~
 8 ~~General Statutes;~~
 9 (10) Elementary and secondary school employees enrolled in courses in first aid
 10 or cardiopulmonary resuscitation ~~(CPR);(CPR).~~
 11 (11) Up to six hours of credit instruction and one course of noncredit instruction

 13 as legal residents of North ~~Carolina;Carolina.~~
 14 (12) All curriculum courses taken by high school students at community colleges,
 15 including students in early college and middle college high school programs,
 16 in accordance with G.S. 115D-20(4) and this ~~section;section.~~
 17 (13) Human resources development courses for any individual who (i) is
 18 unemployed; (ii) has received notification of a pending layoff; (iii) is
 19 working and is eligible for the Federal Earned Income Tax Credit (FEITC);
 20 or (iv) is working and earning wages at or below two hundred percent
 21 (200%) of the federal poverty ~~guidelines; andguidelines.~~
 22 (14) ~~Prison inmates.~~

23 The State Board of Community Colleges shall not waive tuition and registration fees for
 24 other individuals."

25 **SECTION 8.12.(b)** G.S. 115D-5 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

26 "**(b1)** The State Board of Community Colleges shall not waive tuition and registration fees
 27 for community college faculty or staff members. Community colleges may, however, use State
 28 or local funds to pay tuition and registration fees for one course per semester for full-time
 29 community college faculty or staff members employed for a nine-, ten-, eleven-, or
 30 twelve-month term."

31 **SECTION 8.12.(c)** The Community Colleges System Office shall transfer funds
 32 appropriated for curriculum and continuing education instruction to the Department of
 33 Correction. The Department of Correction shall use these funds to pay tuition and fees for
 34 prisoners.

35 The amount transferred shall be calculated by multiplying the number of curriculum
 36 and continuing education FTE served in prisons in the 2010-2011 fiscal year by the per capita
 37 budgeted receipts for curriculum and continuing education.

38 This section is projected to result in a reduction of up to forty-three percent (43%)
 39 reduction in the number of curriculum and continuing education courses provided to prisoners.
 40

41 **FUNDING FOR MULTICAMPUS CENTERS**

42 **SECTION 8.13.** G.S. 115D-5(o) reads as rewritten:

43 "(o) The General Assembly finds that additional data are needed to determine the
 44 adequacy of multicampus and off-campus center funds; therefore, multicampus colleges and
 45 colleges with off-campus centers shall report annually, beginning September 1, 2005, to the
 46 Community Colleges System Office on all expenditures by line item of funds used to support
 47 their multicampuses and off-campus centers. The Community Colleges System Office shall
 48 report on these expenditures to the Education Appropriation Subcommittees of the House of
 49 Representatives and the Senate, the Office of State Budget and Management, and the Fiscal
 50 Research Division by December 1 of each year.

51 All multicampus centers approved by the State Board of Community Colleges shall receive
 52 funding under the same formula. The State Board of Community Colleges shall not approve
 53 any additional multicampus centers without identified recurring sources of funding."
 54

55 **STUDY COMMUNITY COLLEGE PERFORMANCE MEASURES**

56 **SECTION 8.14.** The State Board of Community Colleges shall report to the Joint
 57 Legislative Education Oversight Committee by March 1, 2012, on a revised set of
 58 accountability measures and performance standards by which to evaluate and measure student
 59 progress and student success, including measures of graduation rates and course completions.

1 The report shall include a plan to incorporate these revised accountability measures and
2 performance standards into regular formula funding. These revised accountability measures
3 and performance standards shall also be the basis for the allocation of performance funding, in
4 accordance with G.S. 115D-31.3(g) and (h).

6 COMMUNITY COLLEGE AUDITS

7 **SECTION 8.15.** Article 4A of Chapter 115D of the General Statutes is amended by
8 adding a new section to read:

9 **"§ 115D-58.16. Audits.**

10 (a) Each community college shall be audited a minimum of once every two years.
11 Community colleges may use State funds to contract with the State Auditor or with a certified
12 public accountant to perform the audits. The colleges shall submit the results of the audits to
13 the State Board of Community Colleges.

14 The State Board of Community Colleges shall ensure that all colleges are audited in
15 accordance with this section.

16 (b) Notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 143D of the General Statutes, a
17 community college shall not be subject to the EAGLE program administered by the Office of
18 the State Controller unless (i) there is a finding of internal control problems in the most recent
19 financial audit of the college or (ii) the State Board of Community Colleges determines that a
20 college should be subject to the program."

22 ENROLLMENT GROWTH

23 **SECTION 8.16.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to ensure that there is
24 an increase in funding for community college technology and equipment when enrollment
25 increases; therefore, the continuation budget requirements proposed by the Director of the
26 Budget in accordance with G.S. 143C-3-5 to fund the community college enrollment growth
27 shall include adjustments necessary to fund additional equipment FTE at the prior year's rate.

28 **SECTION 8.16.(b)** Beginning with any adjustments to the 2011-2012 fiscal year
29 budget, and annually thereafter, the State Board of Community Colleges' requests for funding
30 enrollment growth shall provide a detailed description of the costs of educating community
31 college students. This request shall be based on the current year's enrollment, listed by college
32 and aggregated for the system as a whole.

33 **SECTION 8.16.(c)** Enrollment requests shall include the following information for
34 each community college:

- 35 (1) The budgeted enrollment for the current year, divided between the categories
36 of instruction: curriculum, continuing education, and Basic Skills.
- 37 (2) The budgeted enrollment for the current year, divided between tiers of
38 instruction, as set forth in Section 8.3 of this act.
- 39 (3) The actual enrollment for the two years prior to the current year.
- 40 (4) A five-year enrollment projection at each community college by category
41 and tier of instruction.
- 42 (5) The projected requirements and anticipated tuition receipts for the growth in
43 regular-term enrollment.
- 44 (6) The costs per FTE in each category and tier of instruction, to include the
45 following component parts:
 - 46 a. Instructional costs, including faculty salaries and other costs.
 - 47 b. Student support services and other college administrative costs.

49 LIMITATION ON COMMUNITY COLLEGE TUITION

50 **SECTION 8.17.** Notwithstanding G.S. 115D-5 or G.S. 115D-39, the tuition for
51 community college curriculum courses and the fees for community college continuing
52 education courses for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium shall not exceed the amounts provided for
53 in this act.

55 PART IX. UNIVERSITIES

57 CENTER FOR PUBLIC TELEVISION CONTINUATION REVIEW

58 **SECTION 9.1.(a)** A continuation review of the Center for Public Television shall
59 be prepared jointly by The University of North Carolina General Administration and The

1 University of North Carolina Center for Public Television. The review shall be submitted to the
2 House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Education no later than
3 March 31, 2012. The written report shall include the information listed in subsection (b) of this
4 section.

5 **SECTION 9.1.(b)** The continuation review required by this section shall include
6 all of the following information:

- 7 (1) A description of the services provided by the Center for Public Television
8 and its mission, goals, and objectives.
- 9 (2) The program's statutory objectives and the problem or need addressed.
- 10 (3) The extent to which the program's objectives have been achieved.
- 11 (4) The program's functions or programs performed without specific statutory
12 authority.
- 13 (5) The program's performance measures and the process by which the
14 performance measures determine efficiency and effectiveness.
- 15 (6) Recommendations for statutory, budgetary, or administrative changes
16 needed to improve efficiency and effectiveness of services delivered to the
17 public.
- 18 (7) The consequences of discontinuing funding.
- 19 (8) Recommendations for improving services or reducing costs or duplication.
- 20 (9) The identification of policy issues that should be brought to the attention of
21 the General Assembly.
- 22 (10) Any other information necessary to fully support the General Assembly's
23 Continuation Review Program, along with any information included in
24 instructions from the Fiscal Research Division.

25 **UNIVERSITY CANCER RESEARCH FUND REPORTING REQUIREMENT**

26 **SECTION 9.4.** G.S. 116-29.1 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

27 "(g) Report. – By November 1 of each year, the Cancer Research Fund Committee shall
28 provide to the Joint Legislative Education Oversight Committee and to the Office of State
29 Budget and Management an annual financial report which shall include the following
30 components:

- 31 (1) Accounting of expenditures of State funds related to strategic initiatives,
32 development of infrastructure, and ongoing administrative functions.
- 33 (2) Accounting of expenditures of extramural funds related to strategic
34 initiatives, development of infrastructure, and ongoing administrative
35 functions.
- 36 (3) Measures of impact to the State's economy in the creation of jobs,
37 intellectual property, and start-up companies.
- 38 (4) Other performance measures directly related to the investment of State
39 funds.
- 40 (5) Accounting of any fund balances retained by the Fund, along with
41 information about any restrictions on the use of these funds."

42 **UNC BOARD OF GOVERNORS REVIEW OF FACULTY RECRUITMENT AND** 43 **RETENTION**

44 **SECTION 9.5.** The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall
45 review its current policies regarding financial incentives to retain faculty. The review shall
46 focus on the prioritization of recruitment and retention funds and the identification of key
47 metrics to measure overall program effectiveness. The Board of Governors shall report its
48 findings and recommendations for changes to the policies, if any, to the Joint Legislative
49 Education Oversight Committee, the Office of State Budget and Management, and the Fiscal
50 Research Division by April 1, 2012.

51 **UNC MANAGEMENT FLEXIBILITY REDUCTION**

52 **SECTION 9.6.(a)** The management flexibility reduction for The University of
53 North Carolina shall not be allocated by the Board of Governors to the constituent institutions
54 and affiliated entities using an across-the-board method but in a manner that recognizes the
55 importance of the academic mission and differences among The University of North Carolina
56 entities.
57
58
59

1 Before taking reductions in instructional budgets, the Board of Governors and the
2 campuses of the constituent institutions shall consider all of the following:

- 3 (1) Reducing State funding for centers and institutes, speaker series, and other
4 nonacademic activities.
- 5 (2) Faculty workload adjustments.
- 6 (3) Restructuring of research activities.
- 7 (4) Implementing cost-saving span of control measures.
- 8 (5) Reducing the number of senior and middle management positions.
- 9 (6) Eliminating low-performing, redundant, or low-enrollment programs.

10 The Board of Governors and the campuses of the constituent institutions also shall
11 review the institutional trust funds and the special funds held by or on behalf of The University
12 of North Carolina and its constituent institutions to determine whether there are monies
13 available in those funds that can be used to assist with operating costs.

14 In addition, the campuses of the constituent institutions also shall require their
15 faculty to have a teaching workload equal to the national average in their Carnegie
16 classification.

17 When implementing personnel reductions, the Board of Governors and the
18 campuses shall make every effort to abolish vacant positions first.

19 **SECTION 9.6.(b)** In allocating the management flexibility reduction, no reduction
20 shall be made to funding for any of the following:

- 21 (1) Hickory Metro Higher Education Center.
- 22 (2) Need-Based Financial Aid.
- 23 (3) Aid to Private Colleges.
- 24 (4) Joint Graduate School of Nanoscience and Nanoengineering at North
25 Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University and the University of
26 North Carolina at Greensboro.
- 27 (5) The North Carolina Research Campus.

28 **SECTION 9.6.(c)** In allocating the management flexibility reduction, State funds
29 for agricultural research stations operated by The University of North Carolina shall not be
30 reduced in either fiscal year of the biennium by more than ten percent (10%) from the
31 Governor's Recommended Continuation Budget for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

32 33 **USE OF ESCHEAT FUND FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID PROGRAMS**

34 **SECTION 9.8.(a)** There is appropriated from the Escheat Fund income to the
35 Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina the sum of thirty-two million one
36 hundred twenty-two thousand two hundred forty-two dollars (\$32,122,242) for the 2011-2012
37 fiscal year and the sum of thirty-two million one hundred twenty-two thousand two hundred
38 forty-two dollars (\$32,122,242) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year to be used for The University of
39 North Carolina Need-Based Financial Aid Program.

40 **SECTION 9.8.(b)** In addition to the appropriation in subsection (a) of this section,
41 there is appropriated from the Escheat Fund income to the Board of Governors of The
42 University of North Carolina the sum of ninety-five million two hundred thirty-one thousand
43 nine hundred twelve dollars (\$95,231,912) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to be used for The
44 University of North Carolina Need-Based Financial Aid Program.

45 **SECTION 9.8.(c)** There is appropriated from the Escheat Fund income to the State
46 Board of Community Colleges the sum of sixteen million five hundred thousand dollars
47 (\$16,500,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of sixteen million five hundred
48 thousand dollars (\$16,500,000) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year to be used for community college
49 grants.

50 **SECTION 9.8.(d)** There is appropriated from the Escheat Fund income to the
51 Department of Administration, Division of Veterans Affairs, the sum of six million five
52 hundred twenty thousand nine hundred sixty-four dollars (\$6,520,964) for the 2011-2012 fiscal
53 year and the sum of six million five hundred twenty thousand nine hundred sixty-four dollars
54 (\$6,520,964) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year to be used for need-based student financial aid.

55 **SECTION 9.8.(e)** The funds appropriated by this section shall be allocated by the
56 State Educational Assistance Authority (SEAA) for need-based student financial aid in
57 accordance with G.S. 116B-7. If the interest income generated from the Escheat Fund is less
58 than the amounts referenced in this section, the difference may be taken from the Escheat Fund
59 principal to reach the appropriations referenced in this section; however, under no

1 circumstances shall the Escheat Fund principal be reduced below the sum required in
2 G.S. 116B-6(f). If any funds appropriated under this section remain uncommitted for
3 need-based financial aid as of the end of a fiscal year, the funds shall be returned to the Escheat
4 Fund, but only to the extent the funds exceed the amount of the Escheat Fund income for that
5 fiscal year.

6 **SECTION 9.8.(f)** The State Education Assistance Authority shall perform all of
7 the administrative functions necessary to implement this program of financial aid. The SEAA
8 shall conduct periodic evaluations of expenditures of the scholarship programs to determine if
9 allocations are utilized to ensure access to institutions of higher learning and to meet the goals
10 of the respective programs. SEAA may make recommendations for redistribution of funds to
11 The University of North Carolina, Department of Administration, and the President of the
12 Community College System regarding their respective scholarship programs, who then may
13 authorize redistribution of unutilized funds for a particular fiscal year.

14 **SECTION 9.8.(g)** The Office of State Budget and Management shall transfer the
15 cash balance of the community college grant program remaining in Budget Code 66801, Fund
16 6102, to the Escheat Fund.

18 **UNC NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID PROGRAM FUNDING SCHEDULE**

19 **SECTION 9.9.(a)** Of the funds appropriated by this act for the 2011-2012 fiscal
20 year for The University of North Carolina Need-Based Financial Aid Program, the sum of
21 eighty-nine million dollars (\$89,000,000) shall not be used for expenditures in the 2011-2012
22 fiscal year but shall be carried forward and held in reserve by the State Education Assistance
23 Authority. The funds carried forward and held in reserve pursuant to this subsection may be
24 disbursed by the State Education Assistance Authority after July 1, 2012, for need-based
25 student financial aid in the 2012-2013 academic year in accordance with G.S. 116B-7.

26 **SECTION 9.9.(b)** Of the funds appropriated by this act for the 2012-2013 fiscal
27 year for The University of North Carolina Need-Based Financial Aid Program, the sum of
28 eighty-nine million dollars (\$89,000,000) shall not be used for expenditures in the 2012-2013
29 fiscal year but shall be carried forward and held in reserve by the State Education Assistance
30 Authority. The funds carried forward and held in reserve pursuant to this subsection may be
31 disbursed by the State Education Assistance Authority after July 1, 2013, for need-based
32 student financial aid in the 2013-2014 academic year in accordance with G.S. 116B-7.
33

34 **CONSOLIDATE ASSETS OF MILLENNIUM TEACHING SCHOLARSHIP LOAN 35 PROGRAM AND PROSPECTIVE TEACHERS SCHOLARSHIP LOAN FUND**

36 **SECTION 9.10.(a)** Effective January 1, 2012, the Millennium Teaching
37 Scholarship Loan Program is abolished.

38 **SECTION 9.10.(b)** All financial obligations to any student awarded a scholarship
39 loan from the Millennium Teaching Scholarship Loan Program before January 1, 2012, shall be
40 fulfilled with funds from the Scholarship Loan Fund for Prospective Teachers established under
41 G.S. 116-209.33, provided the student remains eligible under the provisions of the Millennium
42 Teaching Scholarship Loan Program. All contractual agreements between a student awarded a
43 scholarship loan from the Millennium Teaching Scholarship Loan Program before January 1,
44 2012, and the State Education Assistance Authority regarding the loan remain enforceable.

45 **SECTION 9.10.(c)** The assets and liabilities for the Millennium Teaching
46 Scholarship Loan Program shall be transferred as follows:

- 47 (1) Five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) shall be transferred to the Escheat
48 Fund on July 1, 2011.
- 49 (2) The remaining balance of the assets and liabilities shall be transferred to the
50 Scholarship Loan Fund for Prospective Teachers established under

56 not receive a grant from The University of North Carolina Need-Based Financial Aid Program
57 for more than nine full-time academic semesters, or its equivalent if enrolled part-time, unless
58 the student is enrolled in a program officially designated by the Board of Governors as a
59 five-year degree program. If a student is enrolled in such a five-year degree program, then the

1 student shall not receive a need-based grant from The University of North Carolina
2 Need-Based Financial Aid Program for more than 11 full-time academic semesters or its
3 equivalent if enrolled part-time.

4 Upon application by a student, the student may receive a grant for one additional
5 part-time or full-time academic semester as appropriate, if the student demonstrates that any of
6 the following have substantially disrupted or interrupted the student's pursuit of a degree: (i) a

49 Carolina and North Carolina Community College need-based grants, legislative tuition grants,

12 be allowed to enroll through the Academic Common Market program into The University of
13 North Carolina graduate programs for the 2012-2013 academic year.

14 **SECTION 9.12.(b)** This section does not affect a student enrolled in The
15 University of North Carolina System under the Academic Common Market program prior to
16 the 2012-2013 academic year; that student may continue to pay in-State tuition as long as the
17 student is enrolled in that graduate program.

37 **SECTION 9.15.(c)** G.S. 116-244 reads as rewritten:

38 "**§ 116-244. Duties of board of directors.**

~~The board of directors Board of Directors shall meet at least twice a year, and more frequently on the call of the chairman Chair or at the request of at least 10 members of the board Board. Meetings shall be held at the Arboretum, the University of North Carolina at Asheville, or Western Carolina University any campus of a constituent institution of The University of North Carolina, or at other public locations in support of the Arboretum mission and purposes. "~~

SECTION 9.15.(d) Effective July 1, 2011, the President of The University of North Carolina shall appoint one member pursuant to G.S. 116-243(4a) as enacted by subsection (b) of this section to serve an initial term of two years to end July 1, 2013, and one member to serve an initial term of four years to end July 1, 2015; successors shall be appointed to four-year terms as provided by G.S. 116-243. Effective July 1, 2011, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall appoint one of the new members to be added to Board of Directors pursuant to G.S. 116-243(7) as amended by subsection (b) of this section to serve an initial term of two years to end July 1, 2013, and the other new member to be added to serve an initial term of four-years to end July 1, 2015; successors shall be appointed to four year terms as provided by G.S. 116-243.

SPECIAL RESPONSIBILITY CONSTITUENT INSTITUTION AUDITS

SECTION 9.16. Article 1 of Chapter 116 of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new section to read:

"§ 116-30.8. Special responsibility constituent institutions: annual audit by State Auditor or certified public accountant.

Each special responsibility constituent institution shall be audited annually. The Chancellor of the special responsibility constituent institution may use State funds to contract with the State Auditor or with a certified public accountant to perform the audit. The audit shall be provided to the Chancellor and Board of Trustees of the special responsibility institution, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, and the State Auditor. The audit shall also be included in the State's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report (CAFR).

The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall ensure that all special responsibility constituent institutions are audited in accordance with this section."

PART X. DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

CHILD CARE SUBSIDY RATES

SECTION 10.1.(a) The maximum gross annual income for initial eligibility, adjusted biennially, for subsidized child care services shall be seventy-five percent (75%) of the State median income, adjusted for family size.

SECTION 10.1.(b) Fees for families who are required to share in the cost of care shall be established based on a percent of gross family income and adjusted for family size. Fees shall be determined as follows:

FAMILY SIZE	PERCENT OF GROSS FAMILY INCOME
1-3	10%
4-5	9%
6 or more	8%.

SECTION 10.1.(c) Payments for the purchase of child care services for low-income children shall be in accordance with the following requirements:

- (1) Religious-sponsored child care facilities operating pursuant to G.S. 110-106 and licensed child care centers and homes that meet the minimum licensing standards that are participating in the subsidized child care program shall be paid the one-star county market rate or the rate they charge privately paying parents, whichever is lower.

- 1 (2) Licensed child care centers and homes with two or more stars shall receive
2 the market rate for that rated license level for that age group or the rate they
3 charge privately paying parents, whichever is lower.
- 4 (3) Nonlicensed homes shall receive fifty percent (50%) of the county market
5 rate or the rate they charge privately paying parents, whichever is lower.
- 6 (4) No payments shall be made for transportation services or registration fees
7 charged by child care facilities.
- 8 (5) Payments for subsidized child care services for postsecondary education
9 shall be limited to a maximum of 20 months of enrollment.
- 10 (6) The Department of Health and Human Services shall implement necessary
11 rule changes to restructure services, including, but not limited to, targeting
12 benefits to employment.

13 **SECTION 10.1.(d)** Provisions of payment rates for child care providers in counties
14 that do not have at least 50 children in each age group for center-based and home-based care
15 are as follows:

- 16 (1) Except as applicable in subdivision (2) of this subsection, payment rates
17 shall be set at the statewide or regional market rate for licensed child care
18 centers and homes.
- 19 (2) If it can be demonstrated that the application of the statewide or regional
20 market rate to a county with fewer than 50 children in each age group is
21 lower than the county market rate and would inhibit the ability of the county
22 to purchase child care for low-income children, then the county market rate
23 may be applied.

24 **SECTION 10.1.(e)** A market rate shall be calculated for child care centers and
25 homes at each rated license level for each county and for each age group or age category of
26 enrollees and shall be representative of fees charged to parents for each age group of enrollees
27 within the county. The Division of Child Development shall also calculate a statewide rate and
28 regional market rates for each rated license level for each age category.

29 **SECTION 10.1.(f)** Facilities licensed pursuant to Article 7 of Chapter 110 of the
30 General Statutes and facilities operated pursuant to G.S. 110-106 may participate in the
31 program that provides for the purchase of care in child care facilities for minor children of
32 needy families. No separate licensing requirements shall be used to select facilities to
33 participate. In addition, child care facilities shall be required to meet any additional applicable
34 requirements of federal law or regulations. Child care arrangements exempt from State
35 regulation pursuant to Article 7 of Chapter 110 of the General Statutes shall meet the
36 requirements established by other State law and by the Social Services Commission.

37 County departments of social services or other local contracting agencies shall not
38 use a provider's failure to comply with requirements in addition to those specified in this
39 subsection as a condition for reducing the provider's subsidized child care rate.

40 **SECTION 10.1.(g)** Payment for subsidized child care services provided with Work
41 First Block Grant funds shall comply with all regulations and policies issued by the Division of
42 Child Development for the subsidized child care program.

43 **SECTION 10.1.(h)** Noncitizen families who reside in this State legally shall be
44 eligible for child care subsidies if all other conditions of eligibility are met. If all other
45 conditions of eligibility are met, noncitizen families who reside in this State illegally shall be
46 eligible for child care subsidies only if at least one of the following conditions is met:

- 47 (1) The child for whom a child care subsidy is sought is receiving child
48 protective services or foster care services.
- 49 (2) The child for whom a child care subsidy is sought is developmentally
50 delayed or at risk of being developmentally delayed.
- 51 (3) The child for whom a child care subsidy is sought is a citizen of the United
52 States.

53 **CHILD CARE ALLOCATION FORMULA**

54 **SECTION 10.2.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall allocate
55 child care subsidy voucher funds to pay the costs of necessary child care for minor children of
56 needy families. The mandatory thirty percent (30%) Smart Start subsidy allocation under
57 G.S. 143B-168.15(g) shall constitute the base amount for each county's child care subsidy
58 allocation. The Department of Health and Human Services shall use the following method
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1 when allocating federal and State child care funds, not including the aggregate mandatory thirty
2 percent (30%) Smart Start subsidy allocation:

- 3 (1) Funds shall be allocated to a county based upon the projected cost of serving
4 children under age 11 in families with all parents working who earn less than
5 seventy-five percent (75%) of the State median income.
- 6 (2) No county's allocation shall be less than ninety percent (90%) of its State
7 fiscal year 2001-2002 initial child care subsidy allocation.

8 **SECTION 10.2.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services may reallocate
9 unused child care subsidy voucher funds in order to meet the child care needs of low-income
10 families. Any reallocation of funds shall be based upon the expenditures of all child care
11 subsidy voucher funding, including Smart Start funds, within a county.

12 **SECTION 10.2.(c)** Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, the Department
13 of Health and Human Services shall allocate up to twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) in
14 federal block grant funds and State funds appropriated for fiscal years 2011-2012 and
15 2012-2013 for child care services. These funds shall be allocated to prevent termination of
16 child care services. Funds appropriated for specific purposes, including targeted market rate
17 adjustments given in the past, may also be allocated by the Department separately from the
18 allocation formula described in subsection (a) of this section.

19 **CHILD CARE FUNDS MATCHING REQUIREMENT**

20 **SECTION 10.3.** No local matching funds may be required by the Department of
21 Health and Human Services as a condition of any locality's receiving its initial allocation of
22 child care funds appropriated by this act unless federal law requires a match. If the Department
23 reallocates additional funds above twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) to local purchasing
24 agencies beyond their initial allocation, local purchasing agencies must provide a twenty
25 percent (20%) local match to receive the reallocated funds. Matching requirements shall not
26 apply when funds are allocated because of a disaster as defined in G.S. 166A-4(1).

27 **CHILD CARE REVOLVING LOAN**

28 **SECTION 10.4.** Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, funds budgeted for the
29 Child Care Revolving Loan Fund may be transferred to and invested by the financial institution
30 contracted to operate the Fund. The principal and any income to the Fund may be used to make
31 loans, reduce loan interest to borrowers, serve as collateral for borrowers, pay the contractor's
32 cost of operating the Fund, or pay the Department's cost of administering the program.

33 **EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT INITIATIVES**

34 **ENHANCEMENTS**

35 **SECTION 10.5.(a)** Administrative costs shall be equivalent to, on an average
36 statewide basis for all local partnerships, not more than eight percent (8%) of the total statewide
37 allocation to all local partnerships. For purposes of this subsection, administrative costs shall
38 include costs associated with partnership oversight, business and financial management,
39 general accounting, human resources, budgeting, purchasing, contracting, and information
40 systems management. The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., shall develop a single
41 statewide contract management system that incorporates features of the required standard fiscal
42 accountability plan described in G.S. 143B-168.12(a)(4). All local partnerships shall be
43 required to participate in the contract management system and shall be directed by the North
44 Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., to collaborate, to the fullest extent possible, with other
45 local partnerships to increase efficiency and effectiveness.

46 **SECTION 10.5.(b)** G.S. 143B-168.12(a)(5) is repealed.

47 **SECTION 10.5.(c)** The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., shall not use
48 more than eighty thousand dollars (\$80,000) in funds from the General Fund for the salary of
49 any individual employee. A local partnership shall not use more than sixty thousand dollars
50 (\$60,000) in funds from the General Fund for the salary of any individual employee. Nothing in
51 this subsection shall be construed to prohibit the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.,
52 or a local partnership from using non-State funds to supplement the salary of an employee
53 employed by the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., or the local partnership.

54 **SECTION 10.5.(d)** The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., and all local
55 partnerships shall use competitive bidding practices in contracting for goods and services on
56 contract amounts as follows:
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58
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- 1 (1) For amounts of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) or less, the procedures
2 specified by a written policy to be developed by the Board of Directors of
3 the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.
- 4 (2) For amounts greater than five thousand dollars (\$5,000), but less than fifteen
5 thousand dollars (\$15,000), three written quotes.
- 6 (3) For amounts of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) or more, but less than
7 forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), a request for proposal process.
- 8 (4) For amounts of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) or more, a request for
9 proposal process and advertising in a major newspaper.

10 **SECTION 10.5.(e)** The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., and all local
11 partnerships shall, in the aggregate, be required to match one hundred percent (100%) of the
12 total amount budgeted for the program in each fiscal year of the biennium. Of the funds the
13 North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., and the local partnerships are required to match,
14 contributions of cash shall equal to at least ten percent (10%) and in-kind donated resources
15 equal to no more than three percent (3%) for a total match requirement of thirteen percent
16 (13%) for each fiscal year. The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., may carry
17 forward any amount in excess of the required match for a fiscal year in order to meet the match
18 requirement of the succeeding fiscal year. Only in-kind contributions that are quantifiable shall
19 be applied to the in-kind match requirement. Volunteer services may be treated as an in-kind
20 contribution for the purpose of the match requirement of this subsection. Volunteer services
21 that qualify as professional services shall be valued at the fair market value of those services.
22 All other volunteer service hours shall be valued at the statewide average wage rate as
23 calculated from data compiled by the Employment Security Commission in the Employment
24 and Wages in North Carolina Annual Report for the most recent period for which data are
25 available. Expenses, including both those paid by cash and in-kind contributions, incurred by
26 other participating non-State entities contracting with the North Carolina Partnership for
27 Children, Inc., or the local partnerships, also may be considered resources available to meet the
28 required private match. In order to qualify to meet the required private match, the expenses
29 shall:

- 30 (1) Be verifiable from the contractor's records.
- 31 (2) If in-kind, other than volunteer services, be quantifiable in accordance with
32 generally accepted accounting principles for nonprofit organizations.
- 33 (3) Not include expenses funded by State funds.
- 34 (4) Be supplemental to and not supplant preexisting resources for related
35 program activities.
- 36 (5) Be incurred as a direct result of the Early Childhood Initiatives Program and
37 be necessary and reasonable for the proper and efficient accomplishment of
38 the Program's objectives.
- 39 (6) Be otherwise allowable under federal or State law.
- 40 (7) Be required and described in the contractual agreements approved by the
41 North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., or the local partnership.
- 42 (8) Be reported to the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., or the local
43 partnership by the contractor in the same manner as reimbursable expenses.

44 Failure to obtain a thirteen percent (13%) match by June 30 of each fiscal year shall
45 result in a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the appropriation for the Program for a subsequent
46 fiscal year. The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., shall be responsible for
47 compiling information on the private cash and in-kind contributions into a report that is
48 submitted to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations in a format that
49 allows verification by the Department of Revenue. The same match requirements shall apply to
50 any expansion funds appropriated by the General Assembly.

51 **SECTION 10.5.(f)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall continue
52 to implement the performance-based evaluation system.

53 **SECTION 10.5.(g)** The Department of Health and Human Services and the North
54 Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., shall ensure that the allocation of funds for Early
55 Childhood Education and Development Initiatives for State fiscal years 2011-2012 and
56 2012-2013 shall be administered and distributed in the following manner:

- 57 (1) Capital expenditures are prohibited for fiscal years 2011-2012 and
58 2012-2013. For the purposes of this section, "capital expenditures" means
59 expenditures for capital improvements as defined in G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(5).

- 1 (2) Expenditures of State funds for advertising and promotional activities are
2 prohibited for fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013.

3 **SECTION 10.5.(h)** A county may use the county's allocation of State and federal
4 child care funds to subsidize child care according to the county's Early Childhood Education
5 and Development Initiatives Plan as approved by the North Carolina Partnership for Children,
6 Inc. The use of federal funds shall be consistent with the appropriate federal regulations. Child
7 care providers shall, at a minimum, comply with the applicable requirements for State licensure
8 pursuant to Article 7 of Chapter 110 of the General Statutes.

9 **SECTION 10.5.(i)** For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, the local
10 partnerships shall spend an amount for child care subsidies that provides at least fifty-two
11 million dollars (\$52,000,000) for the TANF maintenance of effort requirement and the Child
12 Care Development Fund and Block Grant match requirement.

13 **SECTION 10.5.(j)** For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, local partnerships
14 shall not spend any State funds on marketing campaigns, advertising, or any associated
15 materials. Local partnerships may spend any private funds the local partnerships receive on
16 those activities.

17 **SECTION 10.5.(k)** The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., and its
18 Board shall establish policies that focus the North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.'s
19 mission on improving child care quality in North Carolina for children from birth to five years
20 of age. North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc.-funded activities shall include assisting
21 child care facilities with (i) improving quality, including helping one- and two-star rated
22 facilities increase their star ratings, and (ii) implementing prekindergarten programs. State
23 funding for local partnerships shall also be used for evidence-based or evidence-informed
24 programs for children from birth to five years of age that do the following:

- 25 (1) Increase children's literacy.
26 (2) Increase the parents' ability to raise healthy, successful children.
27 (3) Improve children's health.
28 (4) Assist four- and five-star rated facilities in improving and maintaining
29 quality.

30 **SECTION 10.5.(l)** It is the intent of the General Assembly that the North Carolina
31 Partnership for Children, Inc., implement an evidence-based pilot literacy program that
32 improves literacy of children from birth through five years of age and increases children's
33 chances of success in school. An annual evaluation of the pilot literacy program shall assess the
34 goals and intended outcomes of the evidence-based pilot literacy program.

35 **SECTION 10.5.(m)** The Legislative Research Commission is authorized to study
36 the cost, quality, consumer education, and outcomes of the North Carolina Partnership for
37 Children, Inc.'s activities funded to (i) increase early literacy, (ii) measurably improve families'
38 abilities to raise healthy, productive, and successful children, and (iii) increase assess to
39 preventative health care for children from birth to five years of age. The Legislative Services
40 Commission shall evaluate and report on the following:

- 41 (1) The types of activities, goals, and intended outcomes of evidence-based
42 early literacy activities that promote phonemic awareness, letter recognition,
43 segmenting words into sounds, and decoding print text.
44 (2) The types of family support and health activities supported with the North
45 Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc., funds.
46 (3) The goal and intended outcome of the family support and health activities.
47 (4) The numbers served and results of the family support and health activities.
48 (5) Study the match requirements and what constitutes the match requirements.
49 (6) Any other matter the Commission deems relevant to its charge.

50 **SECTION 10.5.(n)** On or before October 1, 2012, the Legislative Research
51 Commission shall make a report of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed
52 legislation, to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly, the House of
53 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate
54 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.
55

56 ADMINISTRATIVE ALLOWANCE FOR COUNTY DEPARTMENTS OF SOCIAL 57 SERVICES

58 **SECTION 10.6.** The Division of Child Development of the Department of Health
59 and Human Services shall fund the allowance that county departments of social services may

1 use for administrative costs at four percent (4%) of the county's total child care subsidy funds
2 allocated in the Child Care Development Fund Block Grant plan.
3

4 **CONSOLIDATE MORE AT FOUR PROGRAM INTO DIVISION OF CHILD** 5 **DEVELOPMENT**

6 **SECTION 10.7.(a)** The Department of Public Instruction, Office of Early
7 Learning, and Department of Health and Human Services are directed to consolidate the "More
8 At Four" program into the Division of Child Development. The Division of Child
9 Development is renamed the Division of Child Development and Early Education (DCDEE).
10 The DCDEE is directed to maintain "More At Four" program's high programmatic standards.
11 The Department of Health and Human Services shall assume the functions of the regulation and
12 monitoring system and payment and reimbursement system for the "More At Four" program.

13 All regulation and monitoring functions shall begin July 1, 2011. The "More At
14 Four" program shall be designated as "prekindergarten" on the five-star rating scale.

15 The Office of State Budget and Management shall transfer positions to the
16 Department of Health and Human Services to assume the regulation, monitoring, and
17 accounting functions within the Division of Child Development's Regulatory Services Section.
18 This transfer shall have all the elements of a Type I transfer as defined in G.S. 143A-6. All
19 funds transferred pursuant to this section shall be used for the funding of prekindergarten slots
20 for four-year-olds and for the management of the program. The Department of Health and
21 Human Services shall incorporate eight consultant positions into the regulation and accounting
22 sections of Division of Child Development and Early Education, eliminate the remaining
23 positions, and use position elimination savings for the purpose of funding prekindergarten
24 students.

25 **SECTION 10.7.(b)** The Childcare Commission shall adopt rules for programmatic
26 standards for regulation of prekindergarten classrooms. The Commission shall review and
27 approve comprehensive, evidenced-based early childhood curricula with a reading component.
28 These curricula shall be added to the currently approved "More At Four" curricula.

29 **SECTION 10.7.(c)** G.S. 143B-168.4(a) reads as rewritten:

30 "(a) The Child Care Commission of the Department of Health and Human Services shall
31 consist of ~~15-17~~ members. Seven of the members shall be appointed by the Governor and ~~eight~~
32 10 by the General Assembly, ~~four-five~~ upon the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore
33 of the Senate, and ~~four-five~~ upon the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of
34 Representatives. Four of the members appointed by the Governor, two by the General
35 Assembly on the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and two by the
36 General Assembly on the recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives,
37 shall be members of the public who are not employed in, or providing, child care and who have
38 no financial interest in a child care facility. Two of the foregoing public members appointed by
39 the Governor, one of the foregoing public members recommended by the President Pro
40 Tempore of the Senate, and one of the foregoing public members recommended by the Speaker
41 of the House of Representatives shall be parents of children receiving child care services. Of
42 the remaining two public members appointed by the Governor, one shall be a pediatrician
43 currently licensed to practice in North Carolina. Three of the members appointed by the
44 Governor shall be child care providers, one of whom shall be affiliated with a for profit child
45 care center, one of whom shall be affiliated with a for profit family child care home, and one of
46 whom shall be affiliated with a nonprofit facility. Two of the members appointed by the
47 General Assembly on the recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and two
48 by the General Assembly on recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives,
49 shall be child care providers, one affiliated with a for profit child care facility, and one
50 affiliated with a nonprofit child care facility. The General Assembly, upon the recommendation
51 of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, and the General Assembly, upon the
52 recommendation of the Speaker of the House of Representatives, shall appoint two early
53 childhood education specialists. None may be employees of the State."

54 **SECTION 10.7.(d)** The additional curricula approved and taught in
55 prekindergarten classrooms shall also be taught in four- and five-star rated facilities in the
56 non-prekindergarten four-year-old classrooms. The Child Care Commission shall increase
57 standards in the four- and five-star-rated facilities for the purpose of placing an emphasis on
58 early reading. The Commission shall require the four- and five-star-rated facilities to teach
59 from the Commission's approved curricula. The Division of Child Development may use funds

1 from the Child Care Development Fund Block Grant to assist with the purchase of curricula or
 2 adjust rates of reimbursements to cover increased costs.

3 **SECTION 10.7.(e)** The Division of Child Development and Early Education shall
 4 adopt a policy to encourage all prekindergarten classrooms to blend private pay families with
 5 prekindergarten subsidized children in the same manner that regular subsidy children are
 6 blended with private pay children. The Division may implement a waiver or transition period
 7 for the public classrooms.

8 **SECTION 10.7.(f)** The prekindergarten program may continue to serve at-risk
 9 children identified through existing "child find" methods at-risk children are served within the
 10 Division of Child Development and serve at-risk children regardless of income, up to twenty
 11 percent (20%) of the four-year-olds served.

12 **SECTION 10.7.(g)** The Division of Child Development and Early Education
 13 (DCDEE) shall adopt policies that improve the quality of childcare for subsidized children.
 14 The DCDEE shall phase in a new policy in which child care subsidies will be paid, to the
 15 extent possible, for child care in the higher quality centers and homes only. The DCDEE shall
 16 define higher quality, and subsidy funds shall not be paid for one- or two-star-rated facilities.
 17 For those counties with an inadequate number of three-, four-, and five-star-rated facilities, the
 18 DCDEE shall establish a transition period that allows the facilities to continue to receive
 19 subsidy funds while the facilities work on the increased star ratings. The DCDEE shall allow
 20 for exemptions in nonstar-rated programs, such as religious programs or other currently
 21 allowed arrangements, and continue to pay for child care in these situations.

22 **SECTION 10.7.(h)** The Division of Child Development and Early Education shall
 23 implement a parent co-payment requirement for prekindergarten classrooms the same as what
 24 is required of parents subject to regular child care subsidy payments.

25 Fees for families who are required to share in the cost of care shall be established
 26 based on a percent of gross family income and adjusted for family size. Fees shall be
 27 determined as follows:

FAMILY SIZE	PERCENT OF GROSS FAMILY INCOME
1-3	10%
4-5	9%
6 or more	8%.

28 **SECTION 10.7.(i)** All prekindergarten classrooms shall be required to participate
 29 in the Subsidized Early Education for Kids (SEEK) accounting system to streamline the
 30 payment function for these classrooms with a goal of eliminating duplicative systems and
 31 streamlining the accounting and payment processes among the subsidy reimbursement systems.
 32 Prekindergarten funds transferred may be used to add these programs to SEEK.

33 **SECTION 10.7.(j)** Based on market analysis and within funds available, the
 34 Division of Child Development and Early Education shall establish reimbursement rates based
 35 on newly increased requirements of four- and five-star-rated facilities and the higher teacher
 36 standards within the prekindergarten class rooms, specifically "More At Four" teacher
 37 standards, when establishing the rates of reimbursements. Additionally, the prekindergarten
 38 curriculum day shall cover six and one-half to 10 hours daily and no less than 10 months per
 39 year. The public classrooms will have a one-year transition period to become licensed through
 40 the Division of Child Development and may continue to operate prekindergarten, formerly
 41 "More At Four," classrooms during the 2011-2012 fiscal year.

42 **MENTAL HEALTH CHANGES**

43 **SECTION 10.8.(a)** For the purpose of mitigating cash flow problems that many
 44 non-single-stream local management entities (LMEs) experience at the beginning of each fiscal
 45 year, the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health,
 46 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, shall adjust the timing and method
 47 by which allocations of service dollars are distributed to each non-single-stream LME. To this
 48 end, the allocations shall be adjusted such that at the beginning of the fiscal year the
 49 Department shall distribute not less than one-twelfth of the LME's continuation allocation and
 50 subtract the amount of the adjusted distribution from the LME's total reimbursements for the
 51 fiscal year.

52 **SECTION 10.8.(b)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
 53 Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
 54 Substance Abuse Services, the sum of twenty-nine million one hundred twenty-one thousand
 55

1 six hundred forty-four dollars (\$29,121,644) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of
2 twenty-nine million one hundred twenty-one thousand six hundred forty-four dollars
3 (\$29,121,644) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year shall be allocated for the purchase of local
4 inpatient psychiatric beds or bed days. In addition, at the discretion of the Secretary of Health
5 and Human Services, existing funds allocated to LMEs for community-based mental health,
6 developmental disabilities, and substance abuse services may be used to purchase additional
7 local inpatient psychiatric beds or bed days. These beds or bed days shall be distributed across
8 the State in LME catchment areas and according to need as determined by the Department. The
9 Department shall enter into contracts with the LMEs and community hospitals for the
10 management of these beds or bed days. The Department shall work to ensure that these
11 contracts are awarded equitably around all regions of the State. Local inpatient psychiatric beds
12 or bed days shall be managed and controlled by the LME, including the determination of which
13 local or State hospital the individual should be admitted to pursuant to an involuntary
14 commitment order. Funds shall not be allocated to LMEs but shall be held in a statewide
15 reserve at the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse
16 Services to pay for services authorized by the LMEs and billed by the hospitals through the
17 LMEs. LMEs shall remit claims for payment to the Division within 15 working days of receipt
18 of a clean claim from the hospital and shall pay the hospital within 30 working days of receipt
19 of payment from the Division. If the Department determines (i) that an LME is not effectively
20 managing the beds or bed days for which it has responsibility, as evidenced by beds or bed days
21 in the local hospital not being utilized while demand for services at the State psychiatric
22 hospitals has not reduced, or (ii) the LME has failed to comply with the prompt payment
23 provisions of this subsection, the Department may contract with another LME to manage the
24 beds or bed days, or, notwithstanding any other provision of law to the contrary, may pay the
25 hospital directly. The Department shall develop reporting requirements for LMEs regarding the
26 utilization of the beds or bed days. Funds appropriated in this section for the purchase of local
27 inpatient psychiatric beds or bed days shall be used to purchase additional beds or bed days not
28 currently funded by or through LMEs and shall not be used to supplant other funds available or
29 otherwise appropriated for the purchase of psychiatric inpatient services under contract with
30 community hospitals, including beds or bed days being purchased through Hospital Utilization
31 Pilot funds appropriated in S.L. 2007-323. Not later than March 1, 2012, the Department shall
32 report to the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human
33 Services, the Senate, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Mental Health,
34 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services, and the Fiscal Research Division
35 on a uniform system for beds or bed days purchased (i) with local funds, (ii) from existing State
36 appropriations, (iii) under the Hospital Utilization Pilot, and (iv) purchased using funds
37 appropriated under this subsection.

38 **SECTION 10.8.(c)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
39 Health and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
40 Substance Abuse Services, for mobile crisis teams, the sum of five million seven hundred
41 thousand dollars (\$5,700,000) shall be distributed to LMEs to support 30 mobile crisis teams.
42 The new mobile crisis units shall be distributed over the State according to need as determined
43 by the Department.

44 **SECTION 10.8.(d)** The Department of Health and Human Services may create a
45 midyear process by which it can reallocate State service dollars away from LMEs that do not
46 appear to be on track to spend the LMEs' full appropriation and toward LMEs that appear able
47 to spend the additional funds.

48 **JOHNSTON COUNTY LME ADMINISTRATIVE FUNDING**

49 **SECTION 10.8A.** Notwithstanding G.S. 122C-115(a1), the Department of Health
50 and Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance
51 Abuse Services, shall not further reduce the allocation of administrative funding to the Johnston
52 County Area Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Authority for
53 the 2011-2012 fiscal year as a consequence of the total population of the catchment area served.
54

55 **MH/DD/SAS HEALTH CARE INFORMATION SYSTEM PROJECT**

56 **SECTION 10.9.** Of the funds appropriated to the Department of Health and
57 Human Services for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, the Department may use a portion of these
58 funds to continue to develop and implement a health care information system for State
59

1 institutions operated by the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
2 Substance Abuse Services. G.S. 143C-6-5 does not apply to this section.

3 4 **LME FUNDS FOR SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES**

5 **SECTION 10.10.(a)** Consistent with G.S. 122C-2, the General Assembly strongly
6 encourages Local Management Entities (LMEs) to use a portion of the funds appropriated for
7 substance abuse treatment services to support prevention and education activities.

8 **SECTION 10.10.(b)** An LME may use up to one percent (1%) of funds allocated
9 to it for substance abuse treatment services to provide nominal incentives for consumers who
10 achieve specified treatment benchmarks, in accordance with the federal substance abuse and
11 mental health services administration best practice model entitled Contingency Management.

12 **SECTION 10.10.(c)** In providing treatment and services for adult offenders and
13 increasing the number of Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities (TASC) case
14 managers, local management entities shall consult with TASC to improve offender access to
15 substance abuse treatment and match evidence-based interventions to individual needs at each
16 stage of substance abuse treatment. Special emphasis should be placed on intermediate
17 punishment offenders, community punishment offenders at risk for revocation, and Department
18 of Correction (DOC) releasees who have completed substance abuse treatment while in
19 custody.

20 In addition to the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health and
21 Human Services, Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse
22 Services, to provide substance abuse services for adult offenders and to increase the number of
23 TASC case managers, the Department shall allocate up to three hundred thousand dollars
24 (\$300,000) to TASC. These funds shall be allocated to TASC before funds are allocated to
25 LMEs for mental health services, substance abuse services, and crisis services.

26 **SECTION 10.10.(d)** In providing drug treatment court services, LMEs shall
27 consult with the local drug treatment court team and shall select a treatment provider that meets
28 all provider qualification requirements and the drug treatment court's needs. A single treatment
29 provider may be chosen for non-Medicaid-eligible participants only. A single provider may be
30 chosen who can work with all of the non-Medicaid-eligible drug treatment court participants in
31 a single group. During the 52-week drug treatment court program, participants shall receive an
32 array of treatment and aftercare services that meets the participant's level of need, including
33 step-down services that support continued recovery.

34 35 **MH/DD/SAS COMMUNITY SERVICE FUNDS**

36 **SECTION 10.11.(a)** The Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities,
37 and Substance Abuse Services (as used in this section "The Division") is directed to reduce the
38 Community Service Fund by twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000).

39 **SECTION 10.11.(b)** The Division is directed, through consultation with LME
40 representatives and stakeholders, to develop a set of standardized covered benefits for
41 recipients of LME Service Funds that shall become the only services paid for by community
42 service funds through LMEs. These services shall be best practices for developmental
43 disabilities, mental illness, and substance abuse.

44 **SECTION 10.11.(c)** Effective January 1 2012, the Division shall implement a
45 co-payment for all mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse services
46 based upon the Medicaid co-payment rates.

47 **SECTION 10.11.(d)** The Division is directed to reduce the Community Service
48 Fund by twenty-five million dollars (\$25,000,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year based on
49 available fund balance reported by the LMEs' 2010 fiscal audit. The Division is directed to
50 allocate the reduction among LMEs based on unreserved, undesignated fund balance totals, as
51 of June 30, 2010. The LMEs are required to backfill the reduction with fund balance
52 availability and not further reduce services beyond the amount identified in subsection (a) of
53 this section.

54 **SECTION 10.11.(e)** LMEs are directed to spend their unreserved, undesignated
55 fund balance on services, commensurate with the reduction directed by the Division. Quarterly
56 reports shall be submitted to the Division by LMEs to ensure expenditures from fund balance
57 occurs at the level required by this law. Additionally, the Division shall review the designation
58 of reserved or designated fund balance accounts to determine whether accounts may be moved
59 to unreserved, undesignated, in essence increasing the unreserved, undesignated fund balance

1 available for purchase of services. If categories of funds are moved into the
2 unreserved/undesignated categories, the affected LMEs are encouraged to spend these funds to
3 minimize their share of the twenty million dollars (\$20,000,000) in reductions to services as
4 required in subsection (a) of this section.

5 **SECTION 10.11.(f)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall report to
6 the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees by December 12, 2011, on the status of
7 implementing this section.

9 **CONSOLIDATION OF FORENSIC HEALTH CARE AT DOROTHEA DIX** 10 **COMPLEX**

11 **SECTION 10.12.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of State
12 Operated Facilities, shall issue a Request for Proposal for the consolidation of forensic hospital
13 care. The operation shall initially be located at the Dorothea Dix complex. The Secretary of
14 Health and Human Services is authorized to proceed with contracting with a private entity if
15 the Secretary can justify savings through the contract. The Secretary shall compare the
16 Department's total cost to provide forensic care to proposals received and determine whether it
17 is cost-effective to contract for this service. The Secretary may only proceed if the Secretary
18 determines the Department will save money and ensure appropriate safety and quality of care
19 for patients.

20 The Secretary shall report to the Joint Appropriations Subcommittee for Health and
21 Human Services (or other interim oversight committees) by October 30, 2011, with cost detail
22 and savings identified from the proposals.

24 **TRANSITION OF UTILIZATION MANAGEMENT OF COMMUNITY-BASED** 25 **SERVICES TO LOCAL MANAGEMENT ENTITIES**

26 **SECTION 10.13.** The Department of Health and Human Services shall collaborate
27 with LMEs to enhance their administrative capabilities to assume utilization management
28 responsibilities for the provision of community-based mental health, developmental disabilities,
29 and substance abuse services. The Department may, with approval of the Office of State
30 Budget and Management, use funds available to implement this section.

32 **THIRD-PARTY BILLING FOR STATE FACILITIES**

33 **SECTION 10.14.** G.S. 122C-55 reads as rewritten:

34 **"§ 122C-55. Exceptions; care and treatment.**

35 ...
36 (g) Whenever there is reason to believe that the client is eligible for financial benefits
37 through a governmental agency, a facility may disclose confidential information to State, local,
38 or federal government agencies. Except as provided in ~~G.S. 122C-55(a3)~~, G.S. 122C-55(a3) and
39 G.S. 122C-55(g1), disclosure is limited to that confidential information necessary to establish
40 financial benefits for a client. ~~After—Except as provided in G.S. 122C-55(g1), after~~
41 establishment of these benefits, the consent of the client or his legally responsible person is
42 required for further release of confidential information under this subsection.

43 (g1) A facility may disclose confidential information for the purpose of collecting
44 payment due the facility for the cost of care, treatment, or habilitation.

45"

47 **COLLABORATION AMONG DEPARTMENTS OF ADMINISTRATION, HEALTH** 48 **AND HUMAN SERVICES, JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY** 49 **PREVENTION, AND PUBLIC INSTRUCTION ON SCHOOL-BASED CHILD AND** 50 **FAMILY TEAM INITIATIVE**

51 **SECTION 10.15.(a)** School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative Established.

- 52 —
53 (1) Purpose and duties. — There is established the School-Based Child and
54 Family Team Initiative. The purpose of the Initiative is to identify and
55 coordinate appropriate community services and supports for children at risk
56 of school failure or out-of-home placement in order to address the physical,
57 social, legal, emotional, and developmental factors that affect academic
58 performance. The Department of Health and Human Services, the
59 Department of Public Instruction, the State Board of Education, the

1 Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the
2 Administrative Office of the Courts, and other State agencies that provide
3 services for children shall share responsibility and accountability to improve
4 outcomes for these children and their families. The Initiative shall be based
5 on the following principles:

- 6 a. The development of a strong infrastructure of interagency
7 collaboration.
- 8 b. One child, one team, one plan.
- 9 c. Individualized, strengths-based care.
- 10 d. Accountability.
- 11 e. Cultural competence.
- 12 f. Children at risk of school failure or out-of-home placement may
13 enter the system through any participating agency.
- 14 g. Services shall be specified, delivered, and monitored through a
15 unified Child and Family Plan that is outcome-oriented and
16 evaluation-based.
- 17 h. Services shall be the most efficient in terms of cost and effectiveness
18 and shall be delivered in the most natural settings possible.
- 19 i. Out-of-home placements for children shall be a last resort and shall
20 include concrete plans to bring the children back to a stable
21 permanent home, their schools, and their community.
- 22 j. Families and consumers shall be involved in decision making
23 throughout service planning, delivery, and monitoring.

24 (2) Program goals and services. – In order to ensure that children receiving
25 services are appropriately served, the affected State and local agencies shall
26 do the following:

- 27 a. Increase capacity in the school setting to address the academic,
28 health, mental health, social, and legal needs of children.
- 29 b. Ensure that children receiving services are screened initially to
30 identify needs and assessed periodically to determine progress and
31 sustained improvement in educational, health, safety, behavioral, and
32 social outcomes.
- 33 c. Develop uniform screening mechanisms and a set of outcomes that
34 are shared across affected agencies to measure children's progress in
35 home, school, and community settings.
- 36 d. Promote practices that are known to be effective based upon research
37 or national best practice standards.
- 38 e. Review services provided across affected State agencies to ensure
39 that children's needs are met.
- 40 f. Eliminate cost-shifting and facilitate cost-sharing among
41 governmental agencies with respect to service development, service
42 delivery, and monitoring for participating children and their families.
- 43 g. Participate in a local memorandum of agreement signed annually by
44 the participating superintendent of the local LEA, directors of the
45 county departments of social services and health, director of the local
46 management entity, the chief district court judge, and the chief
47 district court counselor.

48 (3) Local level responsibilities. – In coordination with the North Carolina Child
49 and Family Leadership Council (Council), established in subsection (b) of
50 this section, the local board of education shall establish the School-Based
51 Child and Family Team Initiative at designated schools and shall appoint the
52 Child and Family Team Leaders, who shall be a school nurse and a school
53 social worker. Each local management entity that has any selected schools in
54 its catchment area shall appoint a Care Coordinator, and any department of
55 social services that has a selected school in its catchment area shall appoint a
56 Child and Family Teams Facilitator. The Care Coordinators and Child and
57 Family Team Facilitators shall have as their sole responsibility working with
58 the selected schools in their catchment areas and shall provide training to
59 school-based personnel, as required. The Child and Family Team Leaders

1 shall identify and screen children who are potentially at risk of academic
2 failure or out-of-home placement due to physical, social, legal, emotional, or
3 developmental factors. Based on the screening results, responsibility for
4 developing, convening, and implementing the Child and Family Team
5 Initiative is as follows:

- 6 a. School personnel shall take the lead role for those children and their
7 families whose primary unmet needs are related to academic
8 achievement.
- 9 b. The local management entity shall take the lead role for those
10 children and their families whose primary unmet needs are related to
11 mental health, substance abuse, or developmental disabilities and
12 who meet the criteria for the target population established by the
13 Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
14 Substance Abuse Services.
- 15 c. The local department of public health shall take the lead role for
16 those children and their families whose primary unmet needs are
17 health-related.
- 18 d. Local departments of social services shall take the lead for those
19 children and their families whose primary unmet needs are related to
20 child welfare, abuse, or neglect.
- 21 e. The chief district court counselor shall take the lead for those
22 children and their families whose primary unmet needs are related to
23 juvenile justice issues. A representative from each named or
24 otherwise identified publicly supported children's agency shall
25 participate as a member of the Team as needed. Team members shall
26 coordinate, monitor, and assure the successful implementation of a
27 unified Child and Family Plan.

28 (4) Reporting requirements. – School-Based Child and Family Team Leaders
29 shall provide data to the Council for inclusion in their report to the North
30 Carolina General Assembly. The report shall include the following:

- 31 a. The number of and other demographic information on children
32 screened and assigned to a team and a description of the services
33 needed by and provided to these children.
- 34 b. The number of and information about children assigned to a team
35 who are placed in programs or facilities outside the child's home or
36 outside the child's county and the average length of stay in residential
37 treatment.
- 38 c. The amount and source of funds expended to implement the
39 Initiative.
- 40 d. Information on how families and consumers are involved in decision
41 making throughout service planning, delivery, and monitoring.
- 42 e. Other information as required by the Council to evaluate success in
43 local programs and ensure appropriate outcomes.
- 44 f. Recommendations on needed improvements.

45 (5) Local advisory committee. – In each county with a participating school, the
46 superintendent of the local LEA shall either identify an existing
47 cross-agency collaborative or council or shall form a new group to serve as a
48 local advisory committee to work with the Initiative. Newly formed
49 committees shall be chaired by the superintendent and one other member of
50 the committee to be elected by the committee. The local advisory committee
51 shall include the directors of the county departments of social services and
52 health; the directors of the local management entity; the chief district court
53 judge; the chief district court counselor; the director of a school-based or
54 school-linked health center, if a center is located within the catchment area
55 of the School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative; and representatives
56 of other agencies providing services to children, as designated by the
57 Committee. The members of the Committee shall meet as needed to monitor
58 and support the successful implementation of the School-Based Child and
59 Family Team Initiative. The Local Child and Family Team Advisory

1 Committee may designate existing cross-agency collaboratives or councils
2 as working groups or to provide assistance in accomplishing established
3 goals.

4 **SECTION 10.15.(b)** North Carolina Child and Family Leadership Council. –

5 (1) Leadership Council established; location. – There is established the North
6 Carolina Child and Family Leadership Council (Council). The Council shall
7 be located within the Department of Administration for organizational and
8 budgetary purposes.

9 (2) Purpose. – The purpose of the Council is to review and advise the Governor
10 in the development of the School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative
11 and to ensure the active participation and collaboration in the Initiative by all
12 State agencies and their local counterparts providing services to children in
13 participating counties in order to increase the academic success of and
14 reduce out-of-home and out-of-county placements of children at risk of
15 academic failure.

16 (3) Membership. – The Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Secretary
17 of Health and Human Services shall serve as cochairs of the Council.
18 Council membership shall include the Secretary of the Department of
19 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, the Chair of the State Board of
20 Education, the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts, and other
21 members as appointed by the Governor.

22 (4) The Council shall do the following:

23 a. Sign an annual memorandum of agreement (MOA) among the named
24 State agencies to define the purposes of the program and to ensure
25 that program goals are accomplished.

26 b. Resolve State policy issues, as identified at the local level, which
27 interfere with effective implementation of the School-Based Child
28 and Family Team Initiative.

29 c. Direct the integration of resources, as needed, to meet goals and
30 ensure that the Initiative promotes the most effective and efficient
31 use of resources and eliminates duplication of effort.

32 d. Establish criteria for defining success in local programs and ensure
33 appropriate outcomes.

34 e. Develop an evaluation process, based on expected outcomes, to
35 ensure the goals and objectives of this Initiative are achieved.

36 f. Review progress made on integrating policies and resources across
37 State agencies, reaching expected outcomes, and accomplishing other
38 goals.

39 g. Report semiannually, on January 1 and July 1, on progress made and
40 goals achieved to the Office of the Governor, the Joint
41 Appropriations Committees and Subcommittees on Education,
42 Justice and Public Safety, and Health and Human Services, and the
43 Fiscal Research Division of the Legislative Services Office. The
44 Council may designate existing cross-agency collaboratives or
45 councils as working groups or to provide assistance in accomplishing
46 established goals.

47 **SECTION 10.15.(c)** Department of Health and Human Services. – The Secretary
48 of the Department of Health and Human Services shall ensure that all agencies within the
49 Department collaborate in the development and implementation of the School-Based Child and
50 Family Team Initiative and provide all required support to ensure that the Initiative is
51 successful.

52 **SECTION 10.15.(d)** Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.
53 – The Secretary of the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention shall ensure
54 that all agencies within the Department collaborate in the development and implementation of
55 the School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative and provide all required support to ensure
56 that the Initiative is successful.

57 **SECTION 10.15.(e)** Administrative Office of the Courts. – The Director of the
58 Administrative Office of the Courts shall ensure that the Office collaborates in the development

1 and implementation of the School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative and shall provide all
2 required support to ensure that the Initiative is successful.

3 **SECTION 10.15.(f)** Department of Public Instruction. – The Superintendent of
4 Public Instruction shall ensure that the Department collaborates in the development and
5 implementation of the School-Based Child and Family Team Initiative and shall provide all
6 required support to ensure that the Initiative is successful.

7 8 **DHHS POSITION ELIMINATIONS**

9 **SECTION 10.16.** The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services
10 is directed to eliminate 250 full-time equivalent positions that have been continuously vacant
11 since July 1, 2010, in order to accomplish a total savings of six million five hundred thousand
12 dollars (\$6,500,000) in State funds. To the extent possible, the Secretary shall not eliminate
13 positions assigned to the Division of State Operated Healthcare Facilities or the Division of
14 Medical Assistance. In the event that eliminating 250 full-time equivalent positions that have
15 been continuously vacant since July 1, 2010, does not achieve the savings specified in this
16 section, the Secretary may eliminate other positions within the Department or achieve the
17 designated savings through other administrative and operational reductions or efficiencies. By
18 September 30, 2011, the Secretary shall submit a report to the House Appropriations
19 Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health
20 and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division on the positions eliminated and any
21 other reductions or efficiencies implemented in order to achieve the savings required by this
22 section. The report shall include the total number of positions eliminated, savings generated by
23 each eliminated position, the impact on any federal funds previously received for the eliminated
24 positions, and any other reductions or efficiencies implemented to achieve the savings required
25 by this section.

26 27 **DHHS REGULATORY FUNCTIONS STUDY AND PLAN**

28 **SECTION 10.17.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall examine
29 all regulatory functions performed by each of the divisions within the Department. By January
30 30, 2012, the Department shall make a report of its findings to the House of Representatives
31 Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations
32 Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division. The report shall
33 include all of the following:

- 34 (1) A summary of each division's regulatory functions.
- 35 (2) The purpose of each of the identified regulatory functions.
- 36 (3) The amount of any fee charged for the identified regulatory functions, along
37 with the date and amount of the most recent fee increase.
- 38 (4) The number of full-time equivalent positions dedicated to the identified
39 regulatory functions, broken down by division.
- 40 (5) Whether there is a federal requirement for, or a federal component to, any of
41 the identified regulatory functions.
- 42 (6) Identification of overlap among the divisions within the Department and
43 with other State agencies, with respect to the regulation of providers. For
44 each area of overlap, the report shall specify all of the following:
 - 45 a. The name of each division and State agency that performs the
46 regulatory function.
 - 47 b. How often each division or State agency performs the regulatory
48 function.
 - 49 c. The total amount of funds expended by each division or State agency
50 to perform the regulatory function.

51 **SECTION 10.17.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop
52 a plan to consolidate regulatory functions performed by the various divisions within the
53 Department. The plan shall identify proposed position eliminations and anticipated savings as
54 a result of the consolidation. The Department shall not implement the plan or consolidate any
55 of its regulatory functions except as directed by an act of the General Assembly.

56 57 **REDUCE FUNDING FOR NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS**

58 **SECTION 10.18.** For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, the Department of
59 Health and Human Services shall reduce the amount of funds allocated to nonprofit

1 organizations by five million dollars (\$5,000,000) on a recurring basis. In achieving the
2 reductions required by this section, the Department (i) shall minimize reductions to funds
3 allocated to nonprofit organizations for the provision of direct services and (ii) shall not reduce
4 funds allocated to nonprofit organizations to pay for direct services to individuals with
5 developmental disabilities.

6
7 **PROHIBIT USE OF ALL FUNDS FOR PLANNED PARENTHOOD**
8 **ORGANIZATIONS**

9 **SECTION 10.19.** For fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013, the Department of
10 Health and Human Services may not provide State funds or other funds administered by the
11 Department for contracts or grants to Planned Parenthood, Inc., and affiliated organizations.
12

13 **LIABILITY INSURANCE**

14 **SECTION 10.20.(a)** The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human
15 Services, the Secretary of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, and the
16 Secretary of the Department of Correction may provide medical liability coverage not to
17 exceed one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per incident on behalf of employees of the
18 Departments licensed to practice medicine or dentistry, on behalf of all licensed physicians who
19 are faculty members of The University of North Carolina who work on contract for the
20 Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services for
21 incidents that occur in Division programs, and on behalf of physicians in all residency training
22 programs from The University of North Carolina who are in training at institutions operated by
23 the Department of Health and Human Services. This coverage may include commercial
24 insurance or self-insurance and shall cover these individuals for their acts or omissions only
25 while they are engaged in providing medical and dental services pursuant to their State
26 employment or training.

27 **SECTION 10.20.(b)** The coverage provided under this section shall not cover any
28 individual for any act or omission that the individual knows or reasonably should know
29 constitutes a violation of the applicable criminal laws of any state or the United States or that
30 arises out of any sexual, fraudulent, criminal, or malicious act or out of any act amounting to
31 willful or wanton negligence.

32 **SECTION 10.20.(c)** The coverage provided pursuant to this section shall not
33 require any additional appropriations and shall not apply to any individual providing
34 contractual service to the Department of Health and Human Services, the Department of
35 Environment and Natural Resources, or the Department of Correction, with the exception that
36 coverage may include physicians in all residency training programs from The University of
37 North Carolina who are in training at institutions operated by the Department of Health and
38 Human Services and licensed physicians who are faculty members of The University of North
39 Carolina who work for the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
40 Substance Abuse Services.
41

42 **CHANGES TO COMMUNITY-FOCUSED ELIMINATING HEALTH DISPARITIES**
43 **INITIATIVE**

44 **SECTION 10.21.(a)** Funds appropriated in this act from the General Fund to the
45 Department of Health and Human Services for the Community-Focused Eliminating Health
46 Disparities Initiative (CFEHDI) shall be used to provide grants-in-aid to local public health
47 departments to close the gap in the health status of African-Americans, Hispanics/Latinos, and
48 American Indians as compared to the health status of white persons. These grants shall focus on
49 the use of preventive measures to eliminate or reduce health disparities in infant mortality,
50 heart disease, cardiovascular disease, asthma, cancer, diabetes, and other conditions that
51 disproportionately affect minority populations in this State. The Office of Minority Health shall
52 coordinate and implement the grants-in-aid program authorized under this section.

53 **SECTION 10.21.(b)** In applying for the grants-in-aid available under subsection
54 (a) of this section, local public health departments shall demonstrate substantial funding
55 partnerships with American Indian tribes, faith-based organizations, and community-based
56 organizations in minority communities in fulfilling the goals and activities of the grant.

57 **SECTION 10.21.(c)** In implementing the grants-in-aid program authorized by
58 subsection (a) of this section, the Department of Health and Human Services may consider the
59 feasibility of a three-year grant period. If approved, the grantee (i) shall not use more than five

1 percent (5%) of the grant funds for indirect costs and (ii) shall be required at the end of the
2 three-year grant period to demonstrate significant gains in addressing one or more of the health
3 disparity focus areas identified in subsection (a) of this section.

4 **SECTION 10.21.(d)** Funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health
5 and Human Services, Division of Public Health, for the CFEHDI shall be awarded as
6 grants-in-aid to honor the memory of the following recently deceased members of the General
7 Assembly: Bernard Allen, John Hall, Robert Holloman, Howard Hunter, Jeanne Lucas, Vernon
8 Malone, William Martin, and Pete Cunningham. These funds shall be used for concerted efforts
9 to address large gaps in health status among North Carolinians who are African-American, as
10 well as disparities among other minority populations in North Carolina.

11 **SECTION 10.21.(e)** By October 1, 2012, and annually thereafter, the Department
12 of Health and Human Services shall submit a report to the House of Representatives
13 Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations
14 Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division on funds
15 appropriated to the CFEHDI. The report shall include specific activities undertaken pursuant to
16 subsection (a) of this section to address large gaps in health status among North Carolinians
17 who are African-American and other minority populations in this State, and shall also address
18 all of the following:

- 19 (1) Which local health departments received CFEHDI grants.
- 20 (2) The amount of funding awarded to each local health department grantee.
- 21 (3) Which of the minority populations were served by local health department
22 grantees.
- 23 (4) Which American Indian tribes, faith-based organizations, or
24 community-based organizations were involved in fulfilling the goals and
25 activities of each grant awarded to a local health department.
- 26 (5) How the activities implemented by the local health departments fulfilled the
27 goal of reducing health disparities among minority populations, and the
28 specific success in reducing particular incidences.

30 FUNDS FOR SCHOOL NURSES

31 **SECTION 10.22.(a)** All funds appropriated in this act for the School Nurse
32 Funding Initiative shall be used to supplement and not supplant other State, local, or federal
33 funds appropriated or allocated for this purpose. Communities shall maintain their current level
34 of effort and funding for school nurses. These funds shall not be used to fund nurses for State
35 agencies. These funds shall be distributed to local health departments according to a formula
36 that includes all of the following:

- 37 (1) School nurse-to-student ratio.
- 38 (2) Percentage of students eligible for free or reduced meals.
- 39 (3) Percentage of children in poverty.
- 40 (4) Per capita income.
- 41 (5) Eligibility as a low-wealth county.
- 42 (6) Mortality rates for children between 1 and 19 years of age.
- 43 (7) Percentage of students with chronic illnesses.
- 44 (8) Percentage of county population consisting of minority persons.

45 **SECTION 10.22.(b)** The Division of Public Health shall ensure that school nurses
46 funded with State funds (i) do not assist in any instructional or administrative duties associated
47 with a school's curriculum and (ii) perform all of the following with respect to school health
48 programs:

- 49 (1) Serve as the coordinator of the health services program and provide nursing
50 care.
- 51 (2) Provide health education to students, staff, and parents.
- 52 (3) Identify health and safety concerns in the school environment and promote a
53 nurturing school environment.
- 54 (4) Support healthy food services programs.
- 55 (5) Promote healthy physical education, sports policies, and practices.
- 56 (6) Provide health counseling, assess mental health needs, provide interventions,
57 and refer students to appropriate school staff or community agencies.
- 58 (7) Promote community involvement in assuring a healthy school and serve as
59 school liaison to a health advisory committee.

- 1 (8) Provide health education and counseling and promote healthy activities and
2 a healthy environment for school staff.
- 3 (9) Be available to assist the county health department during a public health
4 emergency.
5

6 **REPLACEMENT OF RECEIPTS FOR CHILD DEVELOPMENT SERVICE** 7 **AGENCIES.**

8 **SECTION 10.23.** Receipts earned by the Child Development Service Agencies
9 (CDSAs) from any public or private third-party payer shall be budgeted on a recurring basis to
10 replace reductions in State appropriations to CDSAs.
11

12 **HEALTH INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY**

13 **SECTION 10.24.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, in
14 cooperation with the State Chief Information Officer, shall coordinate health information
15 technology (HIT) policies and programs within the State of North Carolina. The Department's
16 goal in coordinating State HIT policy and programs shall be to avoid duplication of efforts and
17 to ensure that each State agency, public entity, and private entity that undertakes health
18 information technology activities does so within the area of its greatest expertise and technical
19 capability and in a manner that supports coordinated State and national goals, which shall
20 include at least all of the following:

- 21 (1) Ensuring that patient health information is secure and protected, in
22 accordance with applicable law.
- 23 (2) Improving health care quality, reducing medical errors, reducing health
24 disparities, and advancing the delivery of patient-centered medical care.
- 25 (3) Providing appropriate information to guide medical decisions at the time and
26 place of care.
- 27 (4) Ensuring meaningful public input into HIT infrastructure development.
- 28 (5) Improving the coordination of information among hospitals, laboratories,
29 physicians' offices, and other entities through an effective infrastructure for
30 the secure and authorized exchange of health care information.
- 31 (6) Improving public health services and facilitating early identification and
32 rapid response to public health threats and emergencies, including
33 bioterrorist events and infectious disease outbreaks.
- 34 (7) Facilitating health and clinical research.
- 35 (8) Promoting early detection, prevention, and management of chronic diseases.

36 **SECTION 10.24.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall
37 establish and direct a HIT management structure that is efficient and transparent and that is
38 compatible with the Office of the National Health Coordinator for Information Technology
39 (National Coordinator) governance mechanism. The HIT management structure shall be
40 responsible for all of the following:

- 41 (1) Developing a State plan for implementing and ensuring compliance with
42 national HIT standards and for the most efficient, effective, and widespread
43 adoption of HIT.
- 44 (2) Ensuring that (i) specific populations are effectively integrated into the State
45 plan, including aging populations, populations requiring mental health
46 services, and populations utilizing the public health system; and (ii)
47 unserved and underserved populations receive priority consideration for HIT
48 support.
- 49 (3) Identifying all HIT stakeholders and soliciting feedback and participation
50 from each stakeholder in the development of the State plan.
- 51 (4) Ensuring that existing HIT capabilities are considered and incorporated into
52 the State plan.
- 53 (5) Identifying and eliminating conflicting HIT efforts where necessary.
- 54 (6) Identifying available resources for the implementation, operation, and
55 maintenance of health information technology, including identifying
56 resources and available opportunities for North Carolina institutions of
57 higher education.
- 58 (7) Ensuring that potential State plan participants are aware of HIT policies and
59 programs and the opportunity for improved health information technology.

- 1 (8) Monitoring HIT efforts and initiatives in other states and replicating
2 successful efforts and initiatives in North Carolina.
- 3 (9) Monitoring the development of the National Coordinator's strategic plan and
4 ensuring that all stakeholders are aware of and in compliance with its
5 requirements.
- 6 (10) Monitoring the progress and recommendations of the HIT Policy and
7 Standards Committee and ensuring that all stakeholders remain informed of
8 the Committee's recommendations.
- 9 (11) Monitoring all studies and reports provided to the United States Congress
10 and reporting to the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Information
11 Technology and the Fiscal Research Division on the impact of report
12 recommendations on State efforts to implement coordinated HIT.

13 **SECTION 10.24.(c)** Beginning October 1, 2011, the Department of Health and
14 Human Services shall provide quarterly written reports on the status of HIT efforts to the
15 Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, the House of
16 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal
17 Research Division. The reports due each January 1 and July 1 shall consist of updates to
18 substantial initiatives or challenges that have occurred since the most recent comprehensive
19 report. The reports due each October 1 and April 1 shall be comprehensive and shall include
20 all of the following:

- 21 (1) Current status of federal HIT initiatives.
- 22 (2) Current status of State HIT efforts and initiatives among both public and
23 private entities.
- 24 (3) A breakdown of current public and private funding sources and dollar
25 amounts for State HIT initiatives.
- 26 (4) Department efforts to coordinate HIT initiatives within the State and any
27 obstacles or impediments to coordination.
- 28 (5) HIT research efforts being conducted within the State and sources of funding
29 for research efforts.
- 30 (6) Opportunities for stakeholders to participate in HIT funding and other efforts
31 and initiatives during the next quarter.
- 32 (7) Issues associated with the implementation of HIT in North Carolina and
33 recommended solutions to these issues.

34 **FUNDS FOR STROKE PREVENTION**

35 **SECTION 10.25.(a)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
36 Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, the sum of four hundred thousand
37 dollars (\$400,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of four
38 hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2012-2013 fiscal year is
39 allocated to the Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention Branch for continuation of community
40 education campaigns and communication strategies, in partnership with the American Heart
41 Association/American Stroke Association, on stroke signs and symptoms and the importance of
42 immediate response.

43 **SECTION 10.25.(b)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
44 Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, the sum of fifty thousand dollars
45 (\$50,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of fifty thousand
46 dollars (\$50,000) in nonrecurring funds for the 2012-2013 fiscal year is allocated for continued
47 operations of the Stroke Advisory Council.

48 **AIDS DRUG ASSISTANCE PROGRAM**

49 **SECTION 10.26.** The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) shall
50 work with the Department of Correction (DOC) to use DOC funds to purchase pharmaceuticals
51 for the treatment of DOC inmates with HIV/AIDS in a manner that allows these funds to be
52 accounted for as State matching funds in DHHS' drawdown of federal Ryan White funds.
53
54

55 **MEN'S HEALTH**

56 **SECTION 10.26A.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
57 Public Health, shall delegate to the Chronic Disease Prevention and Control Office the
58 responsibility for ensuring attention to the prevention of disease and improvement in the quality
59

1 of life for men over their entire lifespan. The Department shall develop strategies for achieving
2 these goals, which shall include (i) developing a strategic plan to improve health care services,
3 (ii) building public health awareness, (iii) developing initiatives within existing programs, and
4 (iv) pursuing federal and State funding for the screening, early detection, and treatment of
5 prostate cancer and other diseases affecting men's health.
6

7 **NC HEALTH CHOICE MEDICAL POLICY**

8 **SECTION 10.27.** Unless required for compliance with federal law, the Department
9 shall not change medical policy affecting the amount, sufficiency, duration, and scope of NC
10 Health Choice health care services and who may provide services until the Division of Medical
11 Assistance has prepared a five-year fiscal analysis documenting the increased cost of the
12 proposed change in medical policy and submitted it for departmental review. If the fiscal
13 impact indicated by the fiscal analysis for any proposed medical policy change exceeds one
14 million dollars (\$1,000,000) in total requirements for a given fiscal year, then the Department
15 shall submit the proposed medical policy change with the fiscal analysis to the Office of State
16 Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division. The Department shall not
17 implement any proposed medical policy change exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in
18 total requirements for a given fiscal year unless the source of State funding is identified and
19 approved by the Office of State Budget and Management. For medical policy changes
20 exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000) in total requirements for a given fiscal year that are
21 required for compliance with federal law, the Department shall submit the proposed medical
22 policy or policy interpretation change with a five-year fiscal analysis to the Office of State
23 Budget and Management prior to implementing the change. The Department shall provide the
24 Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division a quarterly report
25 itemizing all medical policy changes with total requirements of less than one million dollars
26 (\$1,000,000).
27

28 **COMMUNITY CARE OF NORTH CAROLINA**

29 **SECTION 10.28.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services (Department)
30 shall submit a report annually from a qualified entity with proven experience in conducting
31 actuarial and health care studies on the Medicaid cost-savings achieved by the CCNC networks,
32 which shall include children, adults, and the aged, blind, and disabled, to the House of
33 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate
34 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.

35 **SECTION 10.28.(b)** The Department and the Division of Medical Assistance
36 (DMA) shall enter into a three-party contract between North Carolina Community Care
37 Networks, Inc., (NCCCN, Inc.) and each of the 14 participating local CCNC networks and shall
38 require NCCCN, Inc., to provide standardized clinical and budgetary coordination, oversight,
39 and reporting for a statewide Enhanced Primary Care Case Management System for Medicaid
40 enrollees. The contracts shall require NCCCN, Inc., to build upon and expand the existing
41 successful CCNC primary care case management model to include comprehensive statewide
42 quantitative performance goals and deliverables which shall include all of the following areas:
43 (i) service utilization management, (ii) budget analytics, (iii) budget forecasting methodologies,
44 (iv) quality of care analytics, (v) participant access measures, and (vi) predictable cost
45 containment methodologies.

46 **SECTION 10.28.(c)** NCCCN, Inc., shall report quarterly to the Department and to
47 the Office of State Budget and Management (OSBM) on the development of the statewide
48 Enhanced Primary Care Case Management System and its defined goals and deliverables as
49 agreed upon in the contract. NCCCN, Inc., shall submit biannual reports to the Secretary of
50 Health and Human Services, OSBM, the House of Representatives Appropriations
51 Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health
52 and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division on the progress and results of
53 implementing the quantitative, analytical, utilization, quality, cost containment, and access
54 goals and deliverables set out in the contract. NCCCN, Inc., shall conduct its own analysis of
55 the CCNC system to identify any variations from the development plan for the Enhanced
56 Primary Care Case Management System and its defined goals and deliverables set out in the
57 contract between DMA and NCCCN, Inc. Upon identifying any variations, NCCCN, Inc., shall
58 develop and implement a plan to address the variations. NCCCN, Inc., shall report the plan to
59 DMA within 30 days after taking any action to implement the plan.

1 **SECTION 10.28.(d)** By January 1, 2012, the Department and OSBM shall assess
2 the performance of NCCCN, Inc., and CCNC regarding the goals and deliverables established
3 in the contract. Based on this assessment, the Department and DMA shall expand, cancel, or
4 alter the contract with NCCCN, Inc., and CCNC effective April 1, 2012. Expansion or
5 alteration of the contract may reflect refinements based on clearly identified goals and
6 deliverables in the areas of quality of care, participant access, cost containment, and service
7 delivery.

8 **SECTION 10.28.(e)** By July 1, 2012, the Department, DMA, and NCCCN, Inc.,
9 shall finalize a comprehensive plan that establishes management methodologies which include
10 all of the following: (i) quality of care measures, (ii) utilization measures, (iii) recipient access
11 measures, (iv) performance incentive models in which past experience indicates a benefit from
12 financial incentives, (v) accountable budget models, (vi) shared savings budget models, and
13 (vii) budget forecasting analytics as agreed upon by the Department, DMA, and NCCCN, Inc.
14 In the development of these methodologies, the Department, DMA, and NCCCN, Inc., shall
15 consider options for shared risk. The Department and DMA shall provide assistance to
16 NCCCN, Inc., in meeting the objectives of this section.

17
18 **MEDICAID MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM (MMIS)**
19 **FUNDS/IMPLEMENTATION OF MMIS**

20 **SECTION 10.29.(a)** The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human
21 Services may utilize prior year earned revenue received for the new Medicaid Management
22 Information System (MMIS) in the amount of three million two hundred thirty-two thousand
23 three hundred four dollars (\$3,232,304) in fiscal year 2011-2012 and twelve million dollars
24 (\$12,000,000) in fiscal year 2012-2013. The Department shall utilize prior year earned
25 revenues received for the procurement, design, development, and implementation of the new
26 MMIS. In the event that the Department does not receive prior year earned revenues in the
27 amounts authorized by this section or funds are insufficient to advance the project, the
28 Department is authorized, with approval of the Office of State Budget and Management, to
29 utilize other overrealized receipts and funds appropriated to the Department to achieve the level
30 of funding specified in this section for the MMIS.

31 **SECTION 10.29.(b)** The Department shall make full development of the
32 replacement MMIS a top priority. During the development and implementation of MMIS, the
33 Department shall develop plans to ensure the timely and effective implementation of
34 enhancements to the system to provide the following capabilities:

- 35 (1) Receiving and tracking premiums or other payments required by law.
- 36 (2) Compatibility with the administration of the Health Information System.

37 The Department shall make every effort to expedite the implementation of the
38 enhancements. The Office of Information Technology Services shall work in cooperation with
39 the Department to ensure the timely and effective implementation of the MMIS and
40 enhancements. The contract between the Department and the contract vendor shall contain an
41 explicit provision requiring that the MMIS have the capability to fully implement the
42 administration of NC Health Choice, NC Kids' Care, Ticket to Work, Families Pay Part of the
43 Cost of Services under the CAP-MR/DD, CAP Children's Program, and all relevant Medicaid
44 waivers and the Medicare 646 waiver as it applies to Medicaid eligibles. The Department must
45 have detailed cost information for each requirement before signing the contract. Any contract
46 between the Department and a vendor for the MMIS that does not contain the explicit provision
47 required under this subsection is void on its face. Notwithstanding any other provision of law to
48 the contrary, the Secretary of the Department does not have the authority to sign a contract for
49 the MMIS if the contract does not contain the explicit provision required under this section.

50 **SECTION 10.29.(c)** Notwithstanding G.S. 114-2.3, the Department shall engage
51 the services of private counsel with the pertinent information technology and computer law
52 expertise to review requests for proposals and to negotiate and review contracts associated with
53 MMIS. The counsel engaged by the Department shall review the MMIS contracts and
54 amendments between the Department and the vendor to ensure that the requirements of
55 subsection (b) of this section are met in their entirety.

56 **SECTION 10.29.(d)** The Department shall develop a revised comprehensive
57 schedule for the development and implementation of the MMIS that fully incorporates federal
58 and State project management and review requirements. The Department shall ensure that the
59 schedule is as accurate as possible. Any changes to the design, development, and

1 implementation schedule shall be reported as part of the Department's quarterly MMIS
2 reporting requirements. The Department shall submit the schedule to the Chairs of the House
3 of Representatives Committee on Appropriations and the House of Representatives
4 Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Chairs of the Senate Committee on
5 Appropriations and the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and
6 the Fiscal Research Division. This submission shall include a detailed explanation of schedule
7 changes that have occurred since the initiation of the project. Any change to key milestones in
8 either schedule shall be immediately reported to the Chairs of the House of Representatives
9 Committee on Appropriations and the House of Representatives Subcommittee on Health and
10 Human Services, the Chairs of the Senate Committee on Appropriations and the Senate
11 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, the Joint Legislative Oversight
12 Committee on Information Technology, and the Fiscal Research Division with a full
13 explanation of the reason for the change.

14 **SECTION 10.29.(e)** Beginning July 1, 2011, the Department shall make quarterly
15 reports on changes in the functionality and projected costs of the MMIS. This report shall
16 include any changes to MMIS vendor contracts and shall provide a detailed explanation for any
17 cost increases. Each report shall be made to the Chairs of the House of Representatives
18 Committee on Appropriations and the House of Representatives Subcommittee on Health and
19 Human Services, the Chairs of the Senate Committee on Appropriations and the Senate
20 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.
21 A copy of the final report on the contract award also shall be submitted to the Joint Legislative
22 Commission on Governmental Operations.

23 **SECTION 10.29.(f)** Upon initiation of the NC MMIS Program Reporting and
24 Analytics Project and the Division of Health Services Regulation Project, the Department shall
25 submit all reports regarding functionality, schedule, and cost in the next regular cycle of
26 reporting identified in subsections (d) and (e) of this section. The Department shall ensure that
27 the solution developed in the Reporting and Analytics Project supports the capability, in its
28 initial implementation, to interface with the North Carolina Teachers' and State Employees'
29 Health Plan. The costs for this capability shall be negotiated prior to the award of the
30 Reporting and Analytics Project contract. The Reporting and Analytics Project solution must be
31 completed simultaneously with the replacement MMIS.
32

33 **NORTH CAROLINA FAMILIES ACCESSING SERVICES THROUGH** 34 **TECHNOLOGY (NC FAST) FUNDS**

35 **SECTION 10.30.** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Health
36 and Human Services (Department), the nonrecurring sum of nine million five hundred
37 ninety-two thousand three hundred thirty-two dollars (\$9,592,332) for fiscal year 2011-2012
38 and the nonrecurring sum of nine million five hundred ninety-two thousand three hundred
39 thirty-two dollars (\$9,592,332) for fiscal year 2012-2013 shall be used to support the NC FAST
40 project. These funds shall be (i) deposited to the Department's information technology budget
41 code and (ii) used to match federal funds for the project. In addition, the Department shall
42 utilize prior year earned revenues received in the amount of eight million seven hundred
43 sixty-seven thousand six hundred ninety-six dollars (\$8,767,696) in fiscal year 2011-2012 for
44 the NC FAST project. Funds appropriated to the Department by this act shall be used to
45 expedite the development and implementation of the Global Case Management and Food and
46 Nutrition Services and the Eligibility Information System (EIS) components of the North
47 Carolina Families Accessing Services through Technology (NC FAST) project. In the event
48 that the Department does not receive prior year earned revenues in the amount authorized by
49 this section, the Department is authorized, with approval of the Office of State Budget and
50 Management, to utilize other overrealized receipts and funds appropriated to the Department to
51 achieve the level of funding specified in this section for the NC FAST project. The Department
52 shall not obligate any of its overrealized receipts or funds for this purpose without (i) prior
53 written approval from the United States Department of Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service,
54 the United States Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and
55 Families, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and any other federal partner
56 responsible for approving changes to the annual Advance Planning Document update (APDu)
57 for the NC FAST Program and (ii) prior review and approval from the Office of Information
58 Technology Services (ITS) and the Office of State Budget and Management (OSBM). The
59 Department shall report any changes to the NC FAST Program to the Joint Legislative

1 Oversight Committee on Information Technology, the Joint Legislative Commission on
2 Governmental Operations, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human
3 Services, the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, and the
4 Fiscal Research Division not later than 30 days after receiving all the approvals required by this
5 section.
6

7 **MEDICAID**

8 **SECTION 10.31.(a)** Use of Funds, Allocation of Costs, Other Authorizations. –

- 9 (1) Use of funds. – Funds appropriated in this act for services provided in
10 accordance with Title XIX of the Social Security Act (Medicaid) are for both
11 the categorically needy and the medically needy.
12 (2) Allocation of nonfederal cost of Medicaid. – The State shall pay one
13 hundred percent (100%) of the nonfederal costs of all applicable services
14 listed in this section. In addition, the State shall pay one hundred percent
15 (100%) of the federal Medicare Part D clawback payments under the
16 Medicare Modernization Act of 2004.
17 (3) Use of funds for development and acquisition of equipment and software. –
18 If first approved by the Office of State Budget and Management, the
19 Division of Medical Assistance, Department of Health and Human Services,
20 may use funds that are identified to support the cost of development and
21 acquisition of equipment and software and related operational costs through
22 contractual means to improve and enhance information systems that provide
23 management information and claims processing. The Department of Health
24 and Human Services shall identify adequate funds to support the
25 implementation and first year's operational costs that exceed funds allocated
26 for the new contract for the fiscal agent for the Medicaid Management
27 Information System.
28 (4) Reports. – Unless otherwise provided, whenever the Department of Health
29 and Human Services is required by this section to report to the General
30 Assembly, the report shall be submitted to the House of Representatives
31 Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate
32 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal
33 Research Division of the Legislative Services Office. Reports shall be
34 submitted on the date provided in the reporting requirement.

35 **SECTION 10.31.(b)** Policy. –

- 36 (1) Volume purchase plans and single source procurement. – The Department of
37 Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, may, subject to
38 the approval of a change in the State Medicaid Plan, contract for services,
39 medical equipment, supplies, and appliances by implementation of volume
40 purchase plans, single source procurement, or other contracting processes in
41 order to improve cost containment.
42 (2) Cost-containment programs. – The Department of Health and Human
43 Services, Division of Medical Assistance, may undertake cost-containment
44 programs, including contracting for services, preadmissions to hospitals, and
45 prior approval for certain outpatient surgeries before they may be performed
46 in an inpatient setting.
47 (3) Fraud and abuse. – The Division of Medical Assistance, Department of
48 Health and Human Services, shall provide incentives to counties that
49 successfully recover fraudulently spent Medicaid funds by sharing State
50 savings with counties responsible for the recovery of the fraudulently spent
51 funds.
52 (4) Medical policy. – Unless required for compliance with federal law, the
53 Department shall not change medical policy affecting the amount,
54 sufficiency, duration, and scope of health care services and who may provide
55 services until the Division of Medical Assistance has prepared a five-year
56 fiscal analysis documenting the increased cost of the proposed change in
57 medical policy and submitted it for departmental review. If the fiscal impact
58 indicated by the fiscal analysis for any proposed medical policy change
59 exceeds three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in total requirements for a given

fiscal year, then the Department shall submit the proposed medical policy change with the fiscal analysis to the Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division. The Department shall not implement any proposed medical policy change exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in total requirements for a given fiscal year unless the source of State funding is identified and approved by the Office of State Budget and Management. For medical policy changes exceeding three million dollars (\$3,000,000) in total requirements for a given fiscal year that are required for compliance with federal law, the Department shall submit the proposed medical policy or policy interpretation change with the five-year fiscal analysis to the Office of State Budget and Management prior to implementing the change. The Department shall provide the Office of State Budget and Management and the Fiscal Research Division a quarterly report itemizing all medical policy changes with total requirements of less than three million dollars (\$3,000,000).

(5) Posting of notices of changes on Department Web site. – For any public notice of change required pursuant to the provisions of 42 C.F.R. § 447.205, the Department shall, no later than seven business days after the date of publication, publish the same notice on its Web site on the same Web page as it publishes State Plan amendments, and the notice shall remain on the Web site continuously for 90 days.

(6) Electronic transactions. – Medicaid providers shall follow the Department's established procedures for securing electronic payments and the Department shall not provide routine provider payments by check. Medicaid providers shall file claims electronically, except that nonelectronic claims submission may be required when it is in the best interest of the Department. Medicaid providers shall submit Preadmission Screening and Annual Resident Reviews (PASARR) through the Department's Web-based tool or through a vendor with interface capability to submit data into the Web-based PASARR.

SECTION 10.31.(c) Eligibility. – Eligibility for Medicaid shall be determined in accordance with the following:

(1) Medicaid and Work First Family Assistance. –

a. Income eligibility standards. – The maximum net family annual income eligibility standards for Medicaid and Work First Family Assistance and the Standard of Need for Work First Family Assistance shall be as follows:

- 1 b. The payment level for Work First Family Assistance shall be fifty
2 percent (50%) of the standard of need. These standards may be
3 changed with the approval of the Director of the Budget.
- 4 c. The Department of Health and Human Services shall provide
5 Medicaid coverage to 19- and 20-year-olds in accordance with
6 federal rules and regulations.
- 7 d. Medicaid enrollment of categorically needy families with children
8 shall be continuous for one year without regard to changes in income
9 or assets.
- 10 (2) For the following Medicaid eligibility classifications for which the federal
11 poverty guidelines are used as income limits for eligibility determinations,
12 the income limits will be updated each April 1 immediately following
13 publication of federal poverty guidelines. The Department of Health and
14 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall provide Medicaid
15 coverage to the following:
- 16 a. All elderly, blind, and disabled people who have incomes equal to or
17 less than one hundred percent (100%) of the federal poverty
18 guidelines.
- 19 b. Pregnant women with incomes equal to or less than one hundred
20 eighty-five percent (185%) of the federal poverty guidelines and
21 without regard to resources. Services to pregnant women eligible
22 under this subsection continue throughout the pregnancy but include
23 only those related to pregnancy and to those other conditions
24 determined by the Department as conditions that may complicate
25 pregnancy.
- 26 c. Infants under the age of one with family incomes equal to or less
27 than two hundred percent (200%) of the federal poverty guidelines
28 and without regard to resources.
- 29 d. Children aged one through five with family incomes equal to or less
30 than two hundred percent (200%) of the federal poverty guidelines
31 and without regard to resources.
- 32 e. Children aged six through 18 with family incomes equal to or less
33 than one hundred percent (100%) of the federal poverty guidelines
34 and without regard to resources.
- 35 f. Family planning services to men and women of childbearing age
36 with family incomes equal to or less than one hundred eighty-five
37 percent (185%) of the federal poverty guidelines and without regard
38 to resources.
- 39 g. Workers with disabilities described in G.S. 108A-54.1 with unearned
40 income equal to or less than one hundred fifty percent (150%) of the
41 federal poverty guidelines.
- 42 (3) The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical
43 Assistance, shall provide Medicaid coverage to adoptive children with
44 special or rehabilitative needs regardless of the adoptive family's income.
- 45 (4) The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical
46 Assistance, shall provide Medicaid coverage to "independent foster care
47 adolescents," ages 18, 19, and 20, as defined in section 1905(w)(1) of the
48 Social Security Act [42 U.S.C. § 1396d(w)(1)], without regard to the
49 adolescent's assets, resources, or income levels.
- 50 (5) ICF and ICF/MR work incentive allowances. – The Department of Health
51 and Human Services may provide an incentive allowance to
52 Medicaid-eligible recipients of ICF and ICF/MR services, who are regularly
53 engaged in work activities as part of their developmental plan, and for whom
54 retention of additional income contributes to their achievement of
55 independence. The State funds required to match the federal funds that are
56 required by these allowances shall be provided from savings within the
57 Medicaid budget or from other unbudgeted funds available to the
58 Department. The incentive allowances may be as follows:

(6) The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall provide Medicaid coverage to women who need treatment for breast or cervical cancer and who are defined in 42 U.S.C. § 1396a.(a)(10)(A)(ii)(XVIII).

SECTION 10.31.(d) Services and Payment Bases. – The Department shall spend funds appropriated for Medicaid services in accordance with the following schedule of services and payment bases. All services and payments are subject to the language at the end of this subsection. Unless otherwise provided, services and payment bases will be as prescribed in the State Plan as established by the Department of Health and Human Services and may be changed with the approval of the Director of the Budget.

The Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) shall operate and manage the Medicaid program within the annual State appropriation. DHHS shall establish policies, practices, rates, and expenditure procedures that are in compliance with CMS regulations and approved State Plans, State laws, and regulations.

Additionally, the Department shall be required to use the Physician's Advisory Group for review and will collaborate with other stakeholder groups in the adoption and implementation of all clinical and payment policies, including all public notice and posting provisions in use as of the effective date of this provision.

(1) **Mandatory Services.** – In order to manage the Medicaid program within the annual State appropriation, the Secretary shall have the authority to submit State Plan amendments and establish temporary rules affecting the amount of service and payment rate for the following mandatory services:

- a. Hospital inpatient. – Payment for hospital inpatient services will be prescribed by the State Plan as established by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- b. Hospital outpatient. – Eighty percent (80%) of allowable costs or a prospective reimbursement plan as established by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- c. Nursing facilities. – Nursing facilities providing services to Medicaid recipients who also qualify for Medicare must be enrolled in the Medicare program as a condition of participation in the Medicaid program. State facilities are not subject to the requirement to enroll in the Medicare program. Residents of nursing facilities who are eligible for Medicare coverage of nursing facility services must be placed in a Medicare-certified bed. Medicaid shall cover facility services only after the appropriate services have been billed to Medicare.
- d. Physicians, certified nurse midwife services, nurse practitioners, physician assistants. – Fee schedules as developed by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- e. EPSDT Screens. – Payments in accordance with rate schedule developed by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- f. Home health and related services, durable medical equipment. – Payments according to reimbursement plans developed by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- g. Rural health clinical services. – Provider-based, reasonable cost, nonprovider-based, single-cost reimbursement rate per clinic visit.
- h. Family planning. – Negotiated rate for local health departments. For other providers see specific services, e.g., hospitals, physicians.
- i. Independent laboratory and X-ray services. – Uniform fee schedules as developed by the Department of Health and Human Services.
- j. Medicare Buy-In. – Social Security Administration premium.
- k. Ambulance services. – Uniform fee schedules as developed by the Department of Health and Human Services. Public ambulance providers will be reimbursed at cost.

1. Medicare crossover claims. – The Department shall apply Medicaid medical policy to Medicare claims for dually eligible recipients. The Department shall pay an amount up to the actual coinsurance or deductible or both, in accordance with the State Plan, as approved by the Department of Health and Human Services. The Department may disregard application of this policy in cases where application of the policy would adversely affect patient care.
- m. Pregnancy-related services. – Covered services for pregnant women shall include nutritional counseling, psychosocial counseling, and predelivery and postpartum home visits as described in clinical policy.
- n. Mental health services. – Coverage is limited to children eligible for EPSDT services provided by:
1. Licensed or certified psychologists, licensed clinical social workers, certified clinical nurse specialists in psychiatric mental health advanced practice, nurse practitioners certified as clinical nurse specialists in psychiatric mental health advanced practice, licensed psychological associates, licensed professional counselors, licensed marriage and family therapists, licensed clinical addictions specialists, and certified clinical supervisors, when Medicaid-eligible children are referred by the Community Care of North Carolina primary care physician, a Medicaid-enrolled psychiatrist, or the area mental health program or local management entity, and
 2. Institutional providers of residential services as defined by the Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services and approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for children and Psychiatric Residential Treatment Facility services that meet federal and State requirements as defined by the Department.
- (2) **Optional Services.** – In order to manage the Medicaid program within the annual State appropriation, the Secretary shall have the authority to submit State Plan amendments and establish temporary rules affecting the amount of service, payment rate, or elimination of the following optional services:
- a. Certified registered nurse anesthetists.
 - b. Community Alternative Programs.
 - c. Hearing aids. – Wholesale cost plus dispensing fee to provider.
 - d. Ambulatory surgical centers.
 - e. Private duty nursing, clinic services, prepaid health plans.
 - f. Intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded.
 - g. Chiropractors, podiatrists, optometrists, dentists.
 - h. Dental coverage. – Dental services shall be provided on a restricted basis in accordance with criteria adopted by the Department to implement this subsection.
 - i. Optical supplies. – Payment for materials is made to a contractor in accordance with 42 C.F.R. § 431.54(d). Fees paid to dispensing providers are negotiated fees established by the State agency based on industry charges.
 - j. Physical therapy, occupational therapy, and speech therapy. – Services for adults. Payments are to be made only to qualified providers at rates negotiated by the Department of Health and Human Services.
 - k. Personal care services. – Payment in accordance with the State Plan developed by the Department of Health and Human Services.
 - l. Case management services. – Reimbursement in accordance with the availability of funds to be transferred within the Department of Health and Human Services.
 - m. Hospice and palliative care.

- 1 n. Medically necessary prosthetics or orthotics. – In order to be eligible
2 for reimbursement, providers must be licensed or certified by the
3 occupational licensing board or the certification authority having
4 authority over the provider's license or certification. Medically
5 necessary prosthetics and orthotics are subject to prior approval and
6 utilization review.
- 7 o. Health insurance premiums.
- 8 p. Medical care/other remedial care. – Services not covered elsewhere
9 in this section include related services in schools; health professional
10 services provided outside the clinic setting to meet maternal and
11 infant health goals.
- 12 q. Bariatric surgeries. – Covered as described in clinical policy 1A-15,
13 Surgery for Clinically Severe Obesity. In order to raise the standard
14 of bariatric care in North Carolina, approval for these procedures
15 shall only be granted to those providers (facilities and surgeons) who
16 are designated as a Bariatric Surgery Center of Excellence (BSCOE)
17 by the American Society for Metabolic and Bariatric Surgery
18 (ASMBS). Providers must then submit to NC Medicaid
19 documentation of their designation as a BSCOE as well as verify
20 their continued annual participation.
- 21 r. Drugs. –
- 22 1. Reimbursements. – Reimbursements shall be available for
23 prescription drugs as allowed by federal regulations plus a
24 professional services fee per month, excluding refills for the
25 same drug or generic equivalent during the same month.
26 Payments for drugs are subject to the provisions of this
27 subdivision or in accordance with the State Plan adopted by
28 the Department of Health and Human Services, consistent
29 with federal reimbursement regulations. Payment of the
30 professional services fee shall be made in accordance with the
31 State Plan adopted by the Department of Health and Human
32 Services, consistent with federal reimbursement regulations.
33 The professional services fee shall be established by the
34 Department. In addition to the professional services fee, the
35 Department may pay an enhanced fee for pharmacy services.
- 36 2. Limitations on quantity. – The Department of Health and
37 Human Services may establish authorizations, limitations,
38 and reviews for specific drugs, drug classes, brands, or
39 quantities in order to manage effectively the Medicaid
40 program. The Department may impose prior authorization
41 requirements on brand-name drugs for which the phrase
42 "medically necessary" is written on the prescription.
- 43 3. Dispensing of generic drugs. – Notwithstanding
44 G.S. 90-85.27 through G.S. 90-85.31, or any other law to the
45 contrary, under the Medical Assistance Program (Title XIX
46 of the Social Security Act), and except as otherwise provided
47 in this subsection for drugs listed in the narrow therapeutic
48 index, a prescription order for a drug designated by a trade or
49 brand name shall be considered to be an order for the drug by
50 its established or generic name, except when the prescriber
51 has determined, at the time the drug is prescribed, that the
52 brand-name drug is medically necessary and has written on
53 the prescription order the phrase "medically necessary." An
54 initial prescription order for a drug listed in the narrow
55 therapeutic drug index that does not contain the phrase
56 "medically necessary" shall be considered an order for the
57 drug by its established or generic name, except that a
58 pharmacy shall not substitute a generic or established name
59 prescription drug for subsequent brand or trade name

- 1 prescription orders of the same prescription drug without
2 explicit oral or written approval of the prescriber given at the
3 time the order is filled. Generic drugs shall be dispensed at a
4 lower cost to the Medical Assistance Program rather than
5 trade or brand-name drugs. Notwithstanding this subdivision
6 to the contrary, the Secretary of Health and Human Services
7 may prevent substitution of a generic equivalent drug,
8 including a generic equivalent that is on the State maximum
9 allowable cost list, when the net cost to the State of the
10 brand-name drug, after consideration of all rebates, is less
11 than the cost of the generic equivalent. As used in this
12 subsection, "brand name" means the proprietary name the
13 manufacturer places upon a drug product or on its container,
14 label, or wrapping at the time of packaging; and "established
15 name" has the same meaning as in section 502(e)(3) of the
16 Federal Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act, as amended, 21
17 U.S.C. § 352(e)(3).
- 18 4. Specialty drug provider network. – The Department of Health
19 and Human Services shall work with specialty drug
20 providers, manufacturers of specialty drugs, Medicaid
21 recipients who are prescribed specialty drugs, and the medical
22 professionals that treat Medicaid recipients who are
23 prescribed specialty drugs to develop ways to ensure that best
24 practices and the prevention of overutilization are maintained
25 in the delivery and utilization of specialty drugs.
- 26 5. Lock controlled substances prescriptions into single
27 pharmacy/provider. – The Department of Health and Human
28 Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall lock Medicaid
29 enrollees into a single pharmacy and provider when the
30 Medicaid enrollee's utilization of selected controlled
31 substance medications meets the lock-in criteria approved by
32 the NC Physicians Advisory Group, as follows:
- 33 I. Enrollees may be prescribed selected controlled
34 substance medications by only one prescribing
35 physician and may not change the prescribing
36 physician at any time without prior approval or
37 authorization by the Division.
- 38 II. Enrollees may have prescriptions for selected
39 controlled substance medications filled at only one
40 pharmacy and may not change to another pharmacy at
41 any time without prior approval or authorization by
42 the Division.
- 43 5A. Prior authorization. – The Department of Health and Human
44 Services shall not impose prior authorization requirements or
45 other restrictions under the State Medical Assistance Program
46 on medications prescribed for Medicaid recipients for the
47 treatment of (i) mental illness, including, but not limited to,
48 medications for schizophrenia, bipolar disorder, major
49 depressive disorder or (ii) HIV/AIDS. Medications prescribed
50 for the treatment of mental illness shall be included on the
51 Preferred Drug List (PDL). The Department of Health and
52 Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, may
53 initiate prior authorization for the prescribing of drugs
54 specified for the treatment of mental illness by providers who
55 fail to prescribe those drugs in accordance with indications
56 and dosage levels approved by the federal Food and Drug
57 Administration. The Department may require retrospective
58 clinical justification for the use of multiple psychotropic
59 drugs for a Medicaid patient. For individuals 18 years of age

1 and under who are prescribed three or more psychotropic
2 medications, the Department shall implement clinical edits
3 that target inefficient, ineffective, or potentially harmful
4 prescribing patterns. When such patterns are identified, the
5 Medical Director for the Division of Medical Assistance and
6 the Chief of Clinical Policy for the Division of Mental
7 Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse
8 Services shall require a peer-to-peer consultation with the
9 target prescribers. Alternatives discussed during the
10 peer-to-peer consultations shall be based upon:

- 11 a. Evidence-based criteria available regarding efficacy
12 or safety of the covered treatments; and
- 13 b. Policy approval by a majority vote of the North
14 Carolina Physicians Advisory Group (NCPAG).

15 The target prescriber has final decision-making authority to
16 determine which prescription drug to prescribe or refill.

- 17 6. Preferred Drug List. – The Department of Health and Human
18 Services shall establish and implement a preferred drug list
19 program under the Division of Medical Assistance.
20 Medications prescribed for the treatment of mental illness
21 shall be included on the Preferred Drug List (PDL).

22 The pharmaceutical and therapeutics committee of the
23 Physician's Advisory Group (PAG) shall provide ongoing
24 review of the preferred drug list including the implementation
25 of prior authorization on identified drugs. Members of the
26 committee shall submit conflict of interest disclosure
27 statements to the Department and shall have an ongoing duty
28 to disclose conflicts of interest not included in the original
29 disclosure.

30 The Department, in consultation with the PAG, shall
31 adopt and publish policies and procedures relating to the
32 preferred drug list, including the following:

- 33 I. Guidelines for the presentation and review of drugs
34 for inclusion on the preferred drug list.
- 35 II. The manner and frequency of audits of the preferred
36 drug list for appropriateness of patient care and
37 cost-effectiveness.
- 38 III. An appeals process for the resolution of disputes.
- 39 IV. Such other policies and procedures as the Department
40 deems necessary and appropriate.

41 The Department and the pharmaceutical and therapeutics
42 committee shall consider all therapeutic classes of
43 prescription drugs for inclusion on the preferred drug list,
44 except medications for treatment of human
45 immunodeficiency virus or acquired immune deficiency
46 syndrome shall not be subject to consideration for inclusion
47 on the preferred drug list.

48 The Department shall maintain an updated preferred drug
49 list in electronic format and shall make the list available to
50 the public on the Department's Internet Web site.

51 The Department shall (i) enter into a multistate
52 purchasing pool; (ii) negotiate directly with manufacturers or
53 labelers; (iii) contract with a pharmacy benefit manager for
54 negotiated discounts or rebates for all prescription drugs
55 under the medical assistance program; or (iv) effectuate any
56 combination of these options in order to achieve the lowest
57 available price for such drugs under such program.

58 The Department may negotiate supplemental rebates from
59 manufacturers that are in addition to those required by Title

1 XIX of the Social Security Act. The committee shall consider
2 a product for inclusion on the preferred drug list if the
3 manufacturer provides a supplemental rebate. The
4 Department may procure a sole source contract with an
5 outside entity or contractor to conduct negotiations for
6 supplemental rebates.

7 The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human
8 Services shall establish a Preferred Drug List (PDL) Policy
9 Review Panel within 60 days after the effective date of this
10 section. The purpose of the PDL Policy Review Panel is to
11 review the Medicaid PDL recommendations from the
12 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
13 Medical Assistance, and the Physician Advisory Group
14 Pharmacy and Therapeutics (PAG P&T) Committee.

15 The Secretary shall appoint the following individuals to
16 the review panel:

- 17 I. The Director of Pharmacy for the Division of Medical
18 Assistance.
- 19 II. A representative from the PAG P&T Committee.
- 20 III. A representative from the Old North State Medical
21 Society.
- 22 IV. A representative from the North Carolina Association
23 of Pharmacists.
- 24 V. A representative from Community Care of North
25 Carolina.
- 26 VI. A representative from the North Carolina Psychiatric
27 Association.
- 28 VII. A representative from the North Carolina Pediatric
29 Society.
- 30 VIII. A representative from the North Carolina Academy of
31 Family Physicians.
- 32 IX. A representative from the North Carolina Chapter of
33 the American College of Physicians.
- 34 X. A representative from a research-based
35 pharmaceutical company.
- 36 XI. A representative from hospital-based pharmacy.

37 Individuals appointed to the Review Panel, except for the
38 Division's Director of Pharmacy, shall only serve a two-year
39 term.

40 After the Department, in consultation with the PAG P&T
41 Committee, publishes a proposed policy or procedure related
42 to the Medicaid PDL, the Review Panel shall hold an open
43 meeting to review the recommended policy or procedure
44 along with any written public comments received as a result
45 of the posting. The Review Panel shall provide an opportunity
46 for public comment at the meeting. After the conclusion of
47 the meeting, the Review Panel shall submit policy
48 recommendations about the proposed Medicaid PDL policy
49 or procedure to the Secretary.

50 The Department may establish a Preferred Drug List for
51 the North Carolina Health Choice for Children program and
52 pursue negotiated discounts or rebates for all prescription
53 drugs under the program in order to achieve the lowest
54 available price for such drugs under such program. The
55 Department may procure a sole source contract with an
56 outside entity or contractor to conduct negotiations for these
57 discounts or rebates. The PAG P&T Committee and Preferred
58 Drug List Policy Review Panel will provide

- 1 recommendations on policies and procedures for the NC
2 Health Choice Preferred Drug List.
- 3 s. Incentive Payments as outlined in the State Medicaid Health
4 Information Plan for Electronic Health Records.
- 5 t. Other mental health services. – Unless otherwise covered by this
6 section, coverage is limited to the following:
- 7 1. Services as established by the Division of Medical Assistance
8 in consultation with the Division of Mental Health,
9 Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services
10 and approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid
11 Services (CMS) when provided in agencies meeting the
12 requirements and reimbursement is made in accordance with
13 a State Plan developed by the Department of Health and
14 Human Services not to exceed the upper limits established in
15 federal regulations.
- 16 2. For Medicaid-eligible adults, services provided by licensed or
17 certified psychologists, licensed clinical social workers,
18 certified clinical nurse specialists in psychiatric mental health
19 advanced practice, and nurse practitioners certified as clinical
20 nurse specialists in psychiatric mental health advanced
21 practice, licensed psychological associates, licensed
22 professional counselors, licensed marriage and family
23 therapists, certified clinical addictions specialists, and
24 licensed clinical supervisors, Medicaid-eligible adults may be
25 self-referred.
- 26 3. Payments made for services rendered in accordance with this
27 subdivision shall be qualified providers in accordance with
28 approved policies and the State Plan. Nothing in
29 sub-sub-subdivisions 1. or 2. of this sub-subdivision shall be
30 interpreted to modify the scope of practice of any service
31 provider, practitioner, or licensee, nor to modify or attenuate
32 any collaboration or supervision requirement related to the
33 professional activities of any service provider, practitioner, or
34 licensee. Nothing in sub-sub-subdivisions 1. or 2. of this
35 sub-subdivision shall be interpreted to require any private
36 health insurer or health plan to make direct third-party
37 reimbursements or payments to any service provider,
38 practitioner, or licensee.
- 39 Notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.1(a), the Department of Health
40 and Human Services may adopt temporary rules in accordance with
41 Chapter 150B of the General Statutes further defining the
42 qualifications of providers and referral procedures in order to
43 implement this subdivision. Coverage policy for services established
44 by the Division of Medical Assistance in consultation with the
45 Division of Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and
46 Substance Abuse Services under sub-subdivisions a. and b.2. of this
47 subdivision shall be established by the Division of Medical
48 Assistance.
- 49 u. Experimental/investigational medical procedures. – Coverage is
50 limited to services, supplies, drugs, or devices recognized as standard
51 medical care for the condition, disease, illness, or injury being treated
52 as determined by nationally recognized scientific professional
53 organizations or scientifically based federal organizations such as the
54 Food and Drug Administration, the National Institutes of Health, the
55 Centers for Disease Control, or the Agency for Health Care Research
56 and Quality.
- 57 v. Clinical trials. – The Division of Medical Assistance shall develop
58 clinical policy for the coverage of routine costs in clinical trial
59 services for life-threatening conditions using resources such as

coverage criteria from Medicare, NC State Health Plan, and the input of the Physician Advisory Group.

w. Organ transplants.

- (3) Never Events and Hospital Acquired Conditions (HACs) shall not be reimbursed. Medicaid will adhere to Medicare requirements for definition of events and conditions.

SECTION 10.31.(e) Provider Performance Bonds and Visits. –

- (1) Subject to the provisions of this subdivision, the Department may require Medicaid-enrolled providers to purchase a performance bond in an amount not to exceed one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) naming as beneficiary the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, or provide to the Department a validly executed letter of credit or other financial instrument issued by a financial institution or agency honoring a demand for payment in an equivalent amount. The Department may require the purchase of a performance bond or the submission of an executed letter of credit or financial instrument as a condition of initial enrollment, reenrollment, or reinstatement if:

- a. The provider fails to demonstrate financial viability.
- b. The Department determines there is significant potential for fraud and abuse.
- c. The Department otherwise finds it is in the best interest of the Medicaid program to do so.

The Department shall specify the circumstances under which a performance bond or executed letter of credit will be required.

- (1a) The Department may waive or limit the requirements of this subsection for individual Medicaid-enrolled providers or for one or more classes of Medicaid-enrolled providers based on the following:

- a. The provider's or provider class's dollar amount of monthly billings to Medicaid.
- b. The length of time an individual provider has been licensed, endorsed, certified, or accredited in this State to provide services.
- c. The length of time an individual provider has been enrolled to provide Medicaid services in this State.
- d. The provider's demonstrated ability to ensure adequate record keeping, staffing, and services.
- e. The need to ensure adequate access to care.

In waiving or limiting requirements of this subsection, the Department shall take into consideration the potential fiscal impact of the waiver or limitation on the State Medicaid Program. The Department shall provide to the affected provider written notice of the findings upon which its action is based and shall include the performance bond requirements and the conditions under which a waiver or limitation apply. The Department may adopt temporary rules in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1 as necessary to implement this provision.

- (2) Reimbursement is available for up to 30 visits per recipient per fiscal year for the following professional services: physicians, nurse practitioners, nurse midwives, physician assistants, clinics, health departments, optometrists, chiropractors, and podiatrists. The Department of Health and Human Services shall adopt medical policies in accordance with G.S. 108A-54.2 to distribute the allowable number of visits for each service or each group of services consistent with federal law. In addition, the Department shall establish a threshold of some number of visits for these services. The Department shall ensure that primary care providers or the appropriate CCNC network are notified when a patient is nearing the established threshold to facilitate care coordination and intervention as needed.

Prenatal services, all EPSDT children, emergency room visits, and mental health visits subject to independent utilization review are exempt from the visit limitations contained in this subdivision. Subject to appropriate medical review, the Department may authorize exceptions when

1 additional care is medically necessary. Routine or maintenance visits above
2 the established visit limit will not be covered unless necessary to actively
3 manage a life threatening disorder or as an alternative to more costly care
4 options.

5 **SECTION 10.31.(f)** Exceptions and Limitations on Services; Authorization of
6 Co-Payments and Other Services. –

- 7 (1) Exceptions to service limitations, eligibility requirements, and payments. –
8 Service limitations, eligibility requirements, and payment bases in this
9 section may be waived by the Department of Health and Human Services,
10 with the approval of the Director of the Budget, to allow the Department to
11 carry out pilot programs for prepaid health plans, contracting for services,
12 managed care plans, or community-based services programs in accordance
13 with plans approved by the United States Department of Health and Human
14 Services or when the Department determines that such a waiver or
15 innovation projects will result in a reduction in the total Medicaid costs.
16 (2) Co-payment for Medicaid services. – The Department of Health and Human
17 Services may establish co-payments up to the maximum permitted by federal
18 law and regulation.
19 (3) Provider enrollment fee. – Effective September 1, 2009, the Department of
20 Health and Human Services, Division of Medical Assistance, shall charge an
21 enrollment fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00), or the amount federally
22 required, to each provider enrolling in the Medicaid program for the first
23 time. The fee shall be charged to all providers at recertification every three
24 years.

25 **SECTION 10.31.(g)** Rules, Reports, and Other Matters. –

26 Rules. – The Department of Health and Human Services may adopt temporary or
27 emergency rules according to the procedures established in G.S. 150B-21.1 and
28 G.S. 150B-21.1A when it finds that these rules are necessary to maximize receipt of federal
29 funds within existing State appropriations, to reduce Medicaid expenditures, and to reduce
30 fraud and abuse. The Department of Health and Human Services shall adopt rules requiring
31 providers to attend training as a condition of enrollment and may adopt temporary or
32 emergency rules to implement the training requirement.

33 Prior to the filing of the temporary or emergency rules authorized under this
34 subsection with the Rules Review Commission and the Office of Administrative Hearings, the
35 Department shall consult with the Office of State Budget and Management on the possible
36 fiscal impact of the temporary or emergency rule and its effect on State appropriations and
37 local governments.

38 **DMA CONTRACT SHORTFALL**

39 **SECTION 10.32.(a)** Budget approval is required by the Office of State Budget and
40 Management prior to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical
41 Assistance, entering into any new contract or the renewal or amendment of existing contracts
42 that exceed the current contract amounts.

43 **SECTION 10.32.(b)** The Division of Medical Assistance shall make every effort to
44 effect savings within its operational budget and use those savings to offset its contract shortfall.
45 Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-4(b)(3), the Department may use funds appropriated in this act to
46 cover the contract shortfall in the Division of Medical Assistance if insufficient funds exist
47 within the Division.
48
49

50 **MEDICAID COST CONTAINMENT ACTIVITIES**

51 **SECTION 10.33.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services may use up to
52 five million dollars (\$5,000,000) in the 2011-2012 fiscal year and up to five million dollars
53 (\$5,000,000) in the 2012-2013 fiscal year in Medicaid funds budgeted for program services to
54 support the cost of administrative activities when cost-effectiveness and savings are
55 demonstrated. The funds shall be used to support activities that will contain the cost of the
56 Medicaid Program, including contracting for services, hiring additional staff, funding pilot
57 programs, Health Information Exchange and Health Information Technology (HIE/HIT)
58 administrative activities, or providing grants through the Office of Rural Health and
59 Community Care to plan, develop, and implement cost containment programs.

1 Medicaid cost containment activities may include prospective reimbursement
2 methods, incentive-based reimbursement methods, service limits, prior authorization of
3 services, periodic medical necessity reviews, revised medical necessity criteria, service
4 provision in the least costly settings, plastic magnetic-stripped Medicaid identification cards for
5 issuance to Medicaid enrollees, fraud detection software or other fraud detection activities,
6 technology that improves clinical decision making, credit balance recovery and data mining
7 services, and other cost containment activities. Funds may be expended under this section only
8 after the Office of State Budget and Management has approved a proposal for the expenditure
9 submitted by the Department. Proposals for expenditure of funds under this section shall
10 include the cost of implementing the cost containment activity and documentation of the
11 amount of savings expected to be realized from the cost containment activity.

12 **SECTION 10.33.(b)** The Department shall report annually on the expenditures
13 under this section to the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and
14 Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the
15 Fiscal Research Division. The report shall include the methods used to achieve savings and the
16 amount saved by these methods. The report is due to the House and Senate Appropriations
17 Subcommittees on Health and Human Services and the Fiscal Research Division not later than
18 December 1 of each year for the activities of the previous State fiscal year.
19

20 **MEDICAID SPECIAL FUND TRANSFER**

21 **SECTION 10.34.** Of the funds transferred to the Department of Health and Human
22 Services for Medicaid programs pursuant to G.S. 143C-9-1, there is appropriated from the
23 Medicaid Special Fund to the Department of Health and Human Services the sum of forty-three
24 million dollars (\$43,000,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of forty-three million
25 dollars (\$43,000,000) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year. These funds shall be allocated as
26 prescribed by G.S. 143C-9-1(b) for Medicaid programs. Notwithstanding the prescription in
27 G.S. 143C-9-1(b) that these funds not reduce State general revenue funding, these funds shall
28 replace the reduction in general revenue funding effected in this act. The Department may also
29 use funds in the Medicaid Special Fund to fund the settlement of the Disproportionate Share
30 Hospital payment audit issues between the Department of Health and Human Services and the
31 federal government related to fiscal years 1997-2002, and funds are appropriated from the Fund
32 for the 2011-2012 fiscal year for this purpose.
33

34 **ACCOUNTING FOR MEDICAID RECEIVABLES AS NONTAX REVENUE**

35 **SECTION 10.35.(a)** Receivables reserved at the end of the 2011-2012 and
36 2012-2013 fiscal years shall, when received, be accounted for as nontax revenue for each of
37 those fiscal years.

38 **SECTION 10.35.(b)** For the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the Department of Health and
39 Human Services shall deposit from its revenues one hundred fifteen million dollars
40 (\$115,000,000) with the Department of State Treasurer to be accounted for as nontax revenue.
41 For the 2012-2013 fiscal year, the Department of Health and Human Services shall deposit
42 from its revenues one hundred fifteen million dollars (\$115,000,000) with the Department of
43 State Treasurer to be accounted for as nontax revenue. These deposits shall represent the return
44 of General Fund appropriations provided to hospitals that are owned and operated by the State
45 to provide indigent and nonindigent care services and shall be returned to the DHHS. The
46 treatment of any revenue derived from federal programs shall be in accordance with the
47 requirements specified in the Code of Federal Regulations, Volume 2, Part 225.
48

49 **FAMILIES PAY PART OF THE COST OF SERVICES UNDER THE CAP-MR/DD** 50 **PROGRAM AND THE CAP-CHILDREN'S PROGRAM BASED ON FAMILY** 51 **INCOME**

52 **SECTION 10.36.(a)** Subject to approval from the Centers for Medicare and
53 Medicaid Services (CMS), the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Medical
54 Assistance, shall, in consultation with the Division of Mental Health, Developmental
55 Disabilities, and Substance Abuse Services and Community Alternatives Program (CAP)
56 stakeholders, develop a schedule of cost-sharing requirements for families of children with
57 incomes above the Medicaid allowable limit to share in the costs of their child's Medicaid
58 expenses under the CAP-MR/DD (Community Alternatives Program for Mental Retardation
59 and Developmentally Disabled) and the CAP-C (Community Alternatives Program for

1 Children). The cost-sharing amounts shall be based on a sliding scale of family income and
2 shall take into account the impact on families with more than one child in the CAP programs.
3 In developing the schedule, the Department shall also take into consideration how other states
4 have implemented cost-sharing in their CAP programs. The Division of Medical Assistance
5 may establish monthly deductibles as a means of implementing this cost-sharing. The
6 Department shall provide for at least one public hearing and other opportunities for individuals
7 to comment on the imposition of cost-sharing under the CAP program schedule.

8 **SECTION 10.36.(b)** The Division of Medical Assistance shall also, in
9 collaboration with the Controller's Office of the Department of Health and Human Services, the
10 Division of Information Resource Management (DIRM), and the new vendor of the
11 replacement Medicaid Management Information System, develop business rules, program
12 policies, and procedures and define relevant technical requirements.

13 **SECTION 10.36.(c)** Implementation of this provision shall be delayed until the
14 implementation of the new Medicaid Management Information System.

15
16 **AUTHORIZE THE DIVISION OF MEDICAL ASSISTANCE TO TAKE CERTAIN**
17 **STEPS TO EFFECTUATE COMPLIANCE WITH BUDGET REDUCTIONS IN**
18 **THE MEDICAID PROGRAM**

19 **SECTION 10.37.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
20 Medical Assistance, may take the following actions, notwithstanding any other provision of this
21 act or other State law or rule to the contrary:

22 (1) In-Home Care provision. – In order to enhance in-home aide services to
23 Medicaid recipients, the Department of Health and Human Services,
24 Division of Medical Assistance, shall:

25 a. No longer provide services under PCS and PCS-Plus the later of
26 January 1, 2012, or whenever CMS approves the elimination of the
27 PCS and PCS-Plus programs and the implementation of the
28 following two new services:

29 1. In-Home Care for Children (IHCC). – Services to assist
30 families to meet the in-home care needs of children, including
31 those individuals under the age of 21 receiving
32 comprehensive and preventive child health services through
33 the Early and Periodic Screening, Diagnosis, and Treatment
34 (EPSDT) program.

35 2. In-Home Care for Adults (IHCA). – Services to meet the
36 eating, dressing, bathing, toileting, and mobility needs of
37 individuals 21 years of age or older who, because of a
38 medical condition, disability, or cognitive impairment,
39 demonstrate unmet needs for, at a minimum: (i) three of the
40 five qualifying activities of daily living (ADLs) with limited
41 hands-on assistance; (ii) two ADLs, one of which requires
42 extensive assistance; or (iii) two ADLs, one of which requires
43 assistance at the full dependence level. The five qualifying
44 ADLs are eating, dressing, bathing, toileting, and mobility.
45 IHCA shall serve individuals at the highest level of need for
46 in-home care who are able to remain safely in the home.

47 b. Establish, in accordance with G.S. 108A-54.2, a Medical Coverage
48 Policy for each of these programs to include:

49 1. For IHCC, up to 60 hours per month in accordance with an
50 assessment conducted by DMA or its designee and a plan of
51 care developed by the service provider and approved by
52 DMA or its designee. Additional hours may be authorized
53 when the services are required to correct or ameliorate defects
54 and physical and mental illnesses and conditions in this age
55 group, as defined in 42 U.S.C. § 1396d(r)(5), in accordance
56 with a plan of care approved by DMA or its designee.

57 2. For IHCA, up to 80 hours per month in accordance with an
58 assessment conducted by DMA or its designee and a plan of

- 1 care developed by the service provider and approved by
2 DMA or its designee.
- 3 c. Implement the following program limitations and restrictions to
4 apply to both IHCC and IHCA:
- 5 1. Additional services to children required under federal EPSDT
6 requirements shall be provided to qualified recipients in the
7 IHCC Program.
- 8 2. Services shall be provided in a manner that supplements,
9 rather than supplants, family roles and responsibilities.
- 10 3. Services shall be authorized in amounts based on assessed
11 need of each recipient, taking into account care and services
12 provided by the family, other public and private agencies, and
13 other informal caregivers who may be available to assist the
14 family. All available resources shall be utilized fully, and
15 services provided by such agencies and individuals shall be
16 disclosed to the DMA assessor.
- 17 4. Services shall be directly related to the hands-on assistance
18 and related tasks to complete each qualifying ADL in
19 accordance with the IHCC or IHCA assessment and plan of
20 care, as applicable.
- 21 5. Services provided under IHCC and IHCA shall not include
22 household chores not directly related to the qualifying ADLs,
23 nonmedical transportation, financial management, and
24 non-hands-on assistance such as cueing, prompting, guiding,
25 coaching, or babysitting.
- 26 6. Essential errands that are critical to maintaining the health
27 and welfare of the recipient may be approved on a
28 case-by-case basis by the DMA assessor when there is no
29 family member, other individual, program, or service
30 available to meet this need. Approval, including the amount
31 of time required to perform this task, shall be documented on
32 the recipient's assessment form and plan of care.
- 33 d. Utilize the following process for admission to the IHCC and IHCA
34 programs:
- 35 1. The recipient shall be seen by his or her primary or attending
36 physician, who shall provide written authorization for referral
37 for the service and written attestation to the medical necessity
38 for the service.
- 39 2. All assessments for admission to IHCC and IHCA,
40 continuation of these services, and change of status reviews

- 13 (11) Medicaid service modifications and eliminations. – Subject to the prior
14 approval of the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services where required,

27 **SECTION 10.38.(c)** On or before April 1, 2012, the Division shall provide a report
28 on the status of approval and implementation of the program to the Joint Legislative
29 Commission on Governmental Operations, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health
30 and Human Services, the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health
31 and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.

33 **PROGRAM INTEGRITY**

34 **SECTION 10.39.** In order to ensure all claims presented by a provider for payment
35 by the Department of Health and Human Services meet the Department's medical necessity
36 criteria and all other applicable Medicaid, Health Choice, or other federal or State
37 documentation requirements, a provider may be required to undergo prepayment claims review
38 by DHHS. Claims reviews conducted pursuant to this section shall be in accordance with the
39 provisions of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, P.L. 111-148, and any
40 implementing regulations.

42 **TRANSFER TO OFFICE OF ADMINISTRATIVE HEARINGS**

43 **SECTION 10.40.** From funds available to the Department of Health and Human
44 Services (Department) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the sum of one million dollars
45 (\$1,000,000), and for the 2012-2013 fiscal year the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000),
46 shall be transferred by the Department of Health and Human Services to the Office of

SECTION 10.41.(c) G.S. 108A-70.23 is repealed.

MEDICATION THERAPY MANAGEMENT PILOT

SECTION 10.42.(a) The Department of Health and Human Services shall develop a two-year medication therapy management pilot program to be administered through Community Care of North Carolina (CCNC) in order to determine (i) the best method of adapting the CheckMedsNC program to the Medicaid program and CCNC's Medical Homes and (ii) the most effective and efficient role for community-based pharmacists as active members of CCNC's care management teams. The pilot program created pursuant to this section shall consist of the following components:

- (1) Identification of at least 20 community-based pharmacies that are geographically distributed and sufficiently representative to generalize pilot findings among pharmacies that dedicate pharmacist time to work with patients, their care team members, and their Medical Home practices to improve patient outcomes. To the extent that available resources allow, other types of community-based pharmacists may be involved, including those working with long-term care residents or their attending physicians.

- 1 (2) Targeting of Medicaid recipients with co-occurring illnesses or conditions
2 that are especially susceptible to poor patient outcomes when medication is
3 underused, misused, or poorly coordinated.
- 4 (3) Allowing pharmacists identified pursuant to subdivision (1) of this section to
5 have access to CCNC's Web-based Pharmacy Portal, which allows CCNC to
6 establish and monitor patients' prescriptions and to communicate with other
7 care team members.

8 **SECTION 10.42.(b)** On January 1, 2012, and every six months thereafter, CCNC
9 shall report to the Department of Health and Human Services, the House and Senate
10 Appropriations Subcommittees on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research
11 Division on the development and implementation of this pilot program. This reporting
12 requirement shall terminate with the filing of the third report on January 1, 2013. In addition to

22 determination of the appropriate per member/per month pharmacists should
23 receive for participating in the Medical Home Model of CCNC.

24 **SECTION 10.42.(c)** Funding for this pilot program shall be made available
25 through the Enhanced Federal Funding for Health Homes for the Chronically Ill.

26 **NO INFLATIONARY MEDICAID PROVIDER RATE INCREASES**

27 **SECTION 10.43.** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Secretary of the
28 Department of Health and Human Services shall not authorize any inflationary increases to
29 Medicaid provider rates during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, except that inflationary
30 increases for healthcare providers paying provider fees may occur if the State share of the
31 increases can be funded with provider fees.

32 **MEDICAID RECIPIENT APPEALS**

33 **SECTION 10.44.** The Department of Health and Human Services shall review the
34 appeals process for adverse Medicaid determinations for Medicaid recipients to examine
35 whether it conforms with, or exceeds, the requirements of federal law.

36 **DEPARTMENT TO DETERMINE COST-SAVINGS FOR MEDICAID THAT WOULD 37 RESULT FROM PROVISION OF MUSCULOSKELETAL HEALTH SERVICES**

38 **SECTION 10.45.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall study
39 and determine the cost-savings that would result for Medicaid if the following measures were
40 implemented:

- 41 (1) Healthcare providers who have expertise in musculoskeletal conditions and
42 who are willing to assist emergency departments were identified.
- 43 (2) Evidence-based medical criteria were developed, implemented, and
44 supported for high-cost/high-risk elective musculoskeletal procedures.
- 45 (3) Patient management services were provided to primary care and emergency
46 department physicians who provided musculoskeletal services.

47 **SECTION 10.45.(b)** The Department shall report its findings to the House and
48 Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Health and Human Services and to the Fiscal
49 Research Division on or before October 1, 2011.

50 **MEDICAID PROVIDER RATE ADJUSTMENTS**

51 **SECTION 10.46.(a)** Subject to the limitations contained in Section 10.37(a)(6) a.
52 and b. of this act, the Secretary of Health and Human Services shall reduce Medicaid provider
53 rates for all Medicaid providers by two percent (2%) except as follows:

- 54 (1) Physician Services. – The provider rate for physicians shall not be reduced.

- 1 (2) Hospital Inpatient Services. – The provider rate for inpatient hospital
2 services shall be reduced by a percentage equal to two percent (2%) plus a
3 percentage sufficient to achieve the amount of savings that would have
4 resulted if provider rates for physicians had been reduced by two percent
5 (2%). The provider rate for inpatient hospital services shall be further
6 reduced to offset any reduction or inflationary freeze attributable to
7 outpatient hospital services or to critical access hospitals.

8 **SECTION 10.46.(b)** The rate reductions required by this section shall take effect
9 in accordance with the following schedule:

- 10 (1) October 1, 2011. – The provider rate reductions required by subsection (a) of
11 this section shall take effect no later than October 1, 2011. If effective after
12 July 1, 2011, the reductions shall be adjusted by a percentage sufficient to
13 yield savings as if the reductions had taken effect on July 1, 2011.
14 (2) July 1, 2012. – On July 1, 2012, the provider rate reductions required by
15 subsection (a) of this section shall be adjusted to the level at which they
16 would have been without the adjustment required by subdivision (1) of this
17 subsection.

18 **SECTION 10.46.(c)** No other adjustments to the provider rates for hospital
19 outpatient or critical access hospital rates shall be made, except that hospital outpatient and
20 critical access hospital rates may continue to be eligible for inflationary increases.
21

22 **DHHS SAVINGS THROUGH CCNC**

23 **SECTION 10.47.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services, in
24 conjunction with Community Care of North Carolina (CCNC) Networks and North Carolina
25 Community Care, Inc., shall obtain savings totaling ninety million dollars (\$90,000,000)
26 through cooperation and effective cost-savings on the part of various health care providers.

27 **SECTION 10.47.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall monitor
28 the performance of the CCNC Networks and the expenditures of various healthcare providers
29 to determine the extent to which the savings required by subsection (a) of this section are being
30 achieved.

31 **SECTION 10.47.(c)** On or before October 1, 2011, and quarterly thereafter, the
32 Department shall report to the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Health and
33 Human Services and to the Fiscal Research Division on the savings being achieved pursuant to
34 this section.

35 **SECTION 10.47.(d)** If, by October 1, 2011, savings are not being achieved at a
36 rate sufficient to yield savings in the amount required by subsection (a) of this section, the
37 Secretary of Health and Human Services shall, to the extent required in order to achieve
38 savings at the required rate, take whatever actions are necessary, including the following, in the
39 following order, to be effective January 1, 2012:

- 40 (1) Reduce Medicaid provider rates by up to two percent (2%). This reduction
41 shall be in addition to other provider rate reductions in this act.
42 (2) Eliminate or reduce the level or duration of optional Medicaid services.
43

44 **INCREASE GENERIC DRUG DISPENSING RATE IN MEDICAID BY REVISING 45 PHARMACY DISPENSING FEES FOR PHARMACISTS THAT DISPENSE HIGH 46 PROPORTIONS OF GENERIC DRUGS**

47 **SECTION 10.48.(a)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall revise
48 its pharmacy dispensing fees under the Medicaid Program in order to encourage a greater
49 proportion of prescriptions dispensed to be generic prescriptions and thereby achieve savings of
50 fifteen million dollars (\$15,000,000) in the 2011-2012 fiscal year and twenty-four million
51 dollars (\$24,000,000) in the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

52 **SECTION 10.48.(b)** The Department shall report its progress in achieving the
53 savings required by subsection (a) of this section on November 1, 2011, January 1, 2012, and
54 quarterly thereafter to the House and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Health and
55 Human Services and to the Fiscal Research Division. If any report required by this subsection
56 reveals that those savings are not being achieved, the Department shall reduce prescription drug
57 rates by an amount sufficient to achieve the savings.
58

1 **SECTION 10.49.** The Department of Health and Human Services, Division of
2 Health Service Regulation, may use up to thirty-eight thousand dollars (\$38,000) for fiscal year
3 2011-2012 and thirty-eight thousand dollars (\$38,000) for fiscal year 2012-2013 of existing
4 resources to continue the NC New Organizational Vision Award special licensure designation
5 program established under G.S. 131E-154.14. The Division shall use federal civil monetary
6 penalty receipts as a source of support for this initiative, when appropriate.

7
8 **INTENSIVE FAMILY PRESERVATION SERVICES FUNDING AND**
9 **PERFORMANCE ENHANCEMENTS**

10 **SECTION 10.50.(a)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143B-150.6, the
11 Intensive Family Preservation Services (IFPS) Program shall provide intensive services to
12 children and families in cases of abuse, neglect, and dependency where a child is at imminent
13 risk of removal from the home and to children and families in cases of abuse where a child is
14 not at imminent risk of removal. The Program shall be developed and implemented statewide
15 on a regional basis. The IFPS shall ensure the application of standardized assessment criteria
16 for determining imminent risk and clear criteria for determining out-of-home placement.

17 **SECTION 10.50.(b)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall require
18 that any program or entity that receives State, federal, or other funding for the purpose of IFPS
19 shall provide information and data that allows for the following:

- 20 (1) An established follow-up system with a minimum of six months of
21 follow-up services.
- 22 (2) Detailed information on the specific interventions applied, including
23 utilization indicators and performance measurement.
- 24 (3) Cost-benefit data.
- 25 (4) Data on long-term benefits associated with IFPS. This data shall be obtained
26 by tracking families through the intervention process.
- 27 (5) The number of families remaining intact and the associated interventions
28 while in IFPS and 12 months thereafter.
- 29 (6) The number and percentage, by race, of children who received IFPS
30 compared to the ratio of their distribution in the general population involved
31 with Child Protective Services.

32 **SECTION 10.50.(c)** The Department shall establish a performance-based funding
33 protocol and shall only provide funding to those programs and entities providing the required
34 information specified in subsection (b) of this section. The amount of funding shall be based on
35 the individual performance of each program.

36
37 **FOSTER CARE AND ADOPTION ASSISTANCE PAYMENT RATES**

38 **SECTION 10.51.** Part 4 of Article 2 of Chapter 108A of the General Statutes is
39 amended by adding the following new section to read:

40 **"§ 108A-49.1. Foster care and adoption assistance payment rates.**

41 (a) The maximum rates for State participation in the foster care assistance program are
42 established on a graduated scale as follows:

- 43 (1) \$475.00 per child per month for children from birth through five years of
44 age.
- 45 (2) \$581.00 per child per month for children six through 12 years of age.
- 46 (3) \$634.00 per child per month for children 13 through 18 years of age.

47 (b) The maximum rates for the State adoption assistance program are established
48 consistent with the foster care rates as follows:

- 49 (1) \$475.00 per child per month for children from birth through five years of
50 age.
- 51 (2) \$581.00 per child per month for children six through 12 years of age.
- 52 (3) \$634.00 per child per month for children 13 through 18 years of age.

53 (c) The maximum rates for the State participation in human immunodeficiency virus
54 (HIV) foster care and adoption assistance are established on a graduated scale as follows:

- 55 (1) \$800.00 per child per month with indeterminate HIV status.
- 56 (2) \$1,000 per child per month with confirmed HIV infection, asymptomatic.
- 57 (3) \$1,200 per child per month with confirmed HIV infection, symptomatic.
- 58 (4) \$1,600 per child per month when the child is terminally ill with complex
59 care needs.

1 In addition to providing board payments to foster and adoptive families of HIV-infected
2 children, any additional funds remaining that are appropriated for purposes described in this
3 subsection shall be used to provide medical training in avoiding HIV transmission in the home.

4 (d) The State and a county participating in foster care and adoption assistance shall each
5 contribute fifty percent (50%) of the nonfederal share of the cost of care for a child placed by a
6 county department of social services or child-placing agency in a family foster home or
7 residential child care facility. A county shall be held harmless from contributing fifty percent
8 (50%) of the nonfederal share of the cost for a child placed in a family foster home or
9 residential child care facility under an agreement with that provider as of October 31, 2008,
10 until the child leaves foster care or experiences a placement change."

11 CHILD CARING INSTITUTIONS

12 **SECTION 10.52.** Until the Social Services Commission adopts rules setting
13 standardized rates for child caring institutions as authorized under G.S. 143B-153(8), the
14 maximum reimbursement for child caring institutions shall not exceed the rate established for
15 the specific child caring institution by the Department of Health and Human Services, Office of
16 the Controller. In determining the maximum reimbursement, the State shall include county and
17 IV-E reimbursements.
18

19 REPEAL STATE ABORTION FUND

20 **SECTION 10.53.** Section 93 of Chapter 479 of the 1985 Session Laws, as
21 amended by Section 75 of Chapter 738 of the 1987 Session Laws, Section 72 of Chapter 500 of
22 the 1989 Session Laws, Section 79 of Chapter 1066 of the 1989 Session Laws, Section 106 of
23 Chapter 689 of the 1991 Session Laws, Section 259.1 of Chapter 321 of the 1993 Session
24 Laws, Section 23.27 of Chapter 324 of the 1995 Session Laws, and Section 23.8A of Chapter
25 507 of the 1995 Session Laws, is repealed.
26

27 CHILD WELFARE POSTSECONDARY SUPPORT PROGRAM

28 **SECTION 10.54.(a)** Of the funds appropriated from the General Fund to the
29 Department of Health and Human Services, the sum of one million five hundred eighty-four
30 thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$1,584,125) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and one
31 million five hundred eighty-four thousand one hundred twenty-five dollars (\$1,584,125) for the
32 2012-2013 fiscal year shall be used to support the child welfare postsecondary support program
33 for the educational needs of foster youth aging out of the foster care system and special needs
34 children adopted from foster care after age 12 by providing assistance with the "cost of
35 attendance" as that term is defined in 20 U.S.C. § 1087ll.
36

37 Funds appropriated by this subsection shall be allocated by the State Education
38 Assistance Authority.

39 **SECTION 10.54.(b)** Of the funds appropriated from the General Fund to the
40 Department of Health and Human Services, the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the
41 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) for the 2012-2013 fiscal
42 year shall be allocated to the North Carolina State Education Assistance Authority (SEAA).
43 The SEAA shall use these funds only to perform administrative functions necessary to manage
44 and distribute scholarship funds under the child welfare postsecondary support program.

45 **SECTION 10.54.(c)** Of the funds appropriated from the General Fund to the
46 Department of Health and Human Services, the sum of three hundred thirty-nine thousand four
47 hundred ninety-three dollars (\$339,493) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of three
48 hundred thirty-nine thousand four hundred ninety-three dollars (\$339,493) for the 2012-2013
49 fiscal year shall be used to contract with an entity to administer the child welfare postsecondary
50 support program described under subsection (a) of this section, which administration shall
51 include the performance of case management services.

52 **SECTION 10.54.(d)** Funds appropriated to the Department of Health and Human
53 Services for the child welfare postsecondary support program shall be used only for students
54 attending public institutions of higher education in this State.
55

56 TANF BENEFIT IMPLEMENTATION

57 **SECTION 10.55.(a)** The General Assembly approves the plan titled "North
58 Carolina Temporary Assistance for Needy Families State Plan FY 2010-2012," prepared by the
59 Department of Health and Human Services and presented to the General Assembly. The North

1 Carolina Temporary Assistance for Needy Families State Plan covers the period October 1,
2 2010, through September 30, 2012. The Department shall submit the State Plan, as revised in
3 accordance with subsection (b) of this section, to the United States Department of Health and
4 Human Services, as amended by this act or any other act of the 2011 General Assembly.

5 **SECTION 10.55.(b)** The counties approved as Electing Counties in the North
6 Carolina Temporary Assistance for Needy Families State Plan FY 2010-2012, as approved by
7 this section are Beaufort, Caldwell, Catawba, Lenoir, Lincoln, Macon, and Wilson.

8 **SECTION 10.55.(c)** Counties that submitted the letter of intent to remain as an
9 Electing County or to be redesignated as an Electing County and the accompanying county plan
10 for fiscal year 2011 through 2012, pursuant to G.S. 108A-27(e), shall operate under the
11 Electing County budget requirements effective July 1, 2009. For programmatic purposes, all
12 counties referred to in this subsection shall remain under their current county designation
13 through September 30, 2012.

14 **SECTION 10.55.(d)** For the 2011-2012 fiscal year, Electing Counties shall be held
15 harmless to their Work First Family Assistance allocations for the 2010-2011 fiscal year,
16 provided that remaining funds allocated for Work First Family Assistance and Work First
17 Diversion Assistance are sufficient for payments made by the Department on behalf of
18 Standard Counties pursuant to G.S. 108A-27.11(b).

19 **SECTION 10.55.(e)** In the event that Departmental projections of Work First
20 Family Assistance and Work First Diversion Assistance for the 2011-2012 fiscal year indicate
21 that remaining funds are insufficient for Work First Family Assistance and Work First
22 Diversion Assistance payments to be made on behalf of Standard Counties, the Department is
23 authorized to deallocate funds, of those allocated to Electing Counties for Work First Family
24 Assistance in excess of the sums set forth in G.S. 108A-27.11, up to the requisite amount for
25 payments in Standard Counties. Prior to deallocation, the Department shall obtain approval by
26 the Office of State Budget and Management. If the Department adjusts the allocation set forth
27 in subsection (d) of this section, then a report shall be made to the Joint Legislative
28 Commission on Governmental Operations, the House of Representatives Appropriations
29 Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health
30 and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.

31 **PAYMENTS FOR LIEAP/CIP**

32 **SECTION 10.56.(a)** Part 1 of Article 2 of Chapter 108A of the General Statutes is
33 amended by adding the following new section to read:

34 **"§ 108A-25.4. Use of payments under the Low-Income Energy Assistance Program and** 35 **Crisis Intervention Program.**

36 (a) The Low-Income Energy Assistance Program developed by the Department of
37 Health and Human Services (Department) and submitted to the U.S. Department of Health and
38 Human Services shall focus the annual energy assistance payments on the elderly population
39 age 60 and above with income up to one hundred thirty percent (130%) of the federal poverty
40 level and disabled persons receiving services through the Division of Aging and Adult
41 Services. The energy assistance payment shall be paid directly to the service provider by the
42 county department of social services. The Plan for Crisis Intervention Program (CIP) shall
43 provide assistance for vulnerable populations who meet income eligibility criteria established
44 by the Department. The CIP payment shall be paid directly to the service provider by the
45 county department of social services.

46 (b) The Department shall submit the Plan for each program to the U.S. Department of
47 Health and Human Services no later than September 1 of each year and implement the Plan no
48 later than October 1 of each year."

49 **SECTION 10.56.(b)** Beginning September 1, 2011, on or before September 1 of
50 each year and for a period of three years thereafter, the Department of Health and Human
51 Services shall submit a copy of the Plan to the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Health
52 and Human Services and Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services.
53

54 **CONSOLIDATE BLIND, DEAF, AND VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION** 55 **DIVISIONS**

56 **SECTION 10.57.** On or before January 1, 2012, the Department of Health and
57 Human Services shall consolidate the Division of Services for the Blind, the Division of
58

1 Services for the Deaf and the Hard of Hearing, and the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation
2 Services into one division within the Department for the provision of these services.
3

4 **NON-MEDICAID REIMBURSEMENT CHANGES**

5 **SECTION 10.58.(a)** Providers of medical services under the various State
6 programs, other than Medicaid, offering medical care to citizens of the State shall be
7 reimbursed at rates no higher than those under the North Carolina Medical Assistance Program.

8 The Department of Health and Human Services may reimburse hospitals at the full
9 prospective per diem rates without regard to the Medical Assistance Program's annual limits on
10 hospital days. When the Medical Assistance Program's per diem rates for inpatient services and
11 its interim rates for outpatient services are used to reimburse providers in non-Medicaid
12 medical service programs, retroactive adjustments to claims already paid shall not be required.

13 Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, the Department of Health and
14 Human Services may negotiate with providers of medical services under the various
15 Department of Health and Human Services programs, other than Medicaid, for rates as close as
16 possible to Medicaid rates for the following purposes: contracts or agreements for medical
17 services and purchases of medical equipment and other medical supplies. These negotiated
18 rates are allowable only to meet the medical needs of its non-Medicaid eligible patients,
19 residents, and clients who require such services that cannot be provided when limited to the
20 Medicaid rate.

21 Maximum net family annual income eligibility standards for services in these
22 programs shall be as follows:

23 DSB Medical Eye Care	125% FPL
24 DSB Independent Living <55	125% FPL
25 DSB Independent Living 55>	200% FPL
26 DSB Vocational Rehabilitation	125% FPL
27 DVR Independent Living	125% FPL
28 DVR Vocational Rehabilitation	125% FPL

29 The Department of Health and Human Services shall contract at, or as close as
30 possible to, Medicaid rates for medical services provided to residents of State facilities of the
31 Department.

32 **SECTION 10.58.(b)** Subject to the prior approval of the Office of State Budget
33 and Management, the Secretary shall reduce provider rates for services rendered for the
34 Medical Eye Care, Independent Living, and Vocational Rehabilitation programs within the
35 Division of Services for the Blind, and Independent Living and Vocational Rehabilitation
36 programs within the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation to accomplish the reduction in funds
37 for this purpose enacted in this act.
38

39 **STATE-COUNTY SPECIAL ASSISTANCE**

40 **SECTION 10.59.(a)** The maximum monthly rate for residents in adult care home
41 facilities shall be one thousand one hundred eighty-two dollars (\$1,182) per month per resident
42 unless adjusted by the Department in accordance with subsection (d) of this section. The
43 eligibility of Special Assistance recipients residing in adult care homes on September 30, 2009,
44 shall not be affected by an income reduction in the Special Assistance eligibility criteria
45 resulting from the adoption of this maximum monthly rate, provided these recipients are
46 otherwise eligible.

47 **SECTION 10.59.(b)** The maximum monthly rate for residents in
48 Alzheimer/Dementia special care units shall be one thousand five hundred fifteen dollars
49 (\$1,515) per month per resident unless adjusted by the Department in accordance with
50 subsection (d) of this section.

51 **SECTION 10.59.(c)** Notwithstanding any other provision of this section, the
52 Department of Health and Human Services shall review activities and costs related to the
53 provision of care in adult care homes and shall determine what costs may be considered to
54 properly maximize allowable reimbursement available through Medicaid personal care services
55 for adult care homes (ACH-PCS) under federal law. As determined, and with any necessary
56 approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS), and the approval of the
57 Office of State Budget and Management, the Department may transfer necessary funds from
58 the State-County Special Assistance program within the Division of Social Services to the
59 Division of Medical Assistance and may use those funds as State match to draw down federal

1 matching funds to pay for such activities and costs under Medicaid's personal care services for
 2 adult care homes (ACH-PCS), thus maximizing available federal funds. The established rate for
 3 State-County Special Assistance set forth in subsections (b) and (c) of this section shall be
 4 adjusted by the Department to reflect any transfer of funds from the Division of Social Services
 5 to the Division of Medical Assistance and related transfer costs and responsibilities from
 6 State-County Special Assistance to the Medicaid personal care services for adult care homes
 7 (ACH-PCS). Subject to approval by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)
 8 and prior to implementing this section, the Department may disregard a limited amount of
 9 income for individuals whose countable income exceeds the adjusted State-County Special
 10 Assistance rate. The amount of the disregard shall not exceed the difference between the
 11 Special Assistance rate prior to the adjustment and the Special Assistance rate after the
 12 adjustment and shall be used to pay a portion of the cost of the ACH-PCS and reduce the
 13 Medicaid payment for the individual's personal care services provided in an adult care home. In
 14 no event shall the reimbursement for services through the ACH-PCS exceed the average cost of
 15 the services as determined by the Department from review of cost reports as required and
 16 submitted by adult care homes. The Department shall report any transfers of funds and
 17 modifications of rates to the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health
 18 and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services,
 19 and the Fiscal Research Division.

20 **SECTION 10.59.(d)** The Department of Health and Human Services shall
 21 recommend rates for State-County Special Assistance and for Adult Care Home Personal Care
 22 Services. The Department may recommend rates based on appropriate cost methodology and
 23 cost reports submitted by adult care homes that receive State-County Special Assistance funds
 24 and shall ensure that cost reporting is done for State-County Special Assistance and Adult Care
 25 Home Personal Care Services to the same standards as apply to other residential service
 26 providers.

27
 28 **DHHS BLOCK GRANTS**

29 **SECTION 10.60.(a)** Appropriations from federal block grant funds are made for
 30 the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, according to the following schedule:

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GENERAL PROVISIONS

SECTION 10.60.(b) Information to Be Included in Block Grant Plans. – The Department of Health and Human Services shall submit a separate plan for each Block Grant received and administered by the Department, and each plan shall include the following:

- (1) A delineation of the proposed allocations by program or activity, including State and federal match requirements.
- (2) A delineation of the proposed State and local administrative expenditures.
- (3) An identification of all new positions to be established through the Block Grant, including permanent, temporary, and time-limited positions.
- (4) A comparison of the proposed allocations by program or activity with two prior years' program and activity budgets and two prior years' actual program or activity expenditures.
- (5) A projection of current year expenditures by program or activity.
- (6) A projection of federal Block Grant funds available, including unspent federal funds from the current and prior fiscal years.

SECTION 10.60.(c) Changes in Federal Fund Availability. – If the Congress of the United States increases the federal fund availability for any of the Block Grants or contingency funds and other grants related to existing Block Grants administered by the Department of Health and Human Services from the amounts appropriated in this section, the Department shall allocate the increase proportionally across the program and activity appropriations identified for that Block Grant in this section. In allocating an increase in federal fund availability, the Office of State Budget and Management shall not approve funding for new programs or activities not appropriated in this section.

If the Congress of the United States decreases the federal fund availability for any of the Block Grants or contingency funds and other grants related to existing Block Grants administered by the Department of Health and Human Services from the amounts appropriated in this section, the Department shall develop a plan to adjust the block grants based on reduced federal funding.

Prior to allocating the change in federal fund availability, the proposed allocation must be approved by the Office of State Budget and Management. If the Department adjusts the allocation of any Block Grant due to changes in federal fund availability, then a report shall be made to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.

SECTION 10.60.(d) Appropriations from federal Block Grant funds are made for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2012, according to the schedule enacted for State fiscal year 2011-2012 or until a new schedule is enacted by the General Assembly.

SECTION 10.60.(e) All changes to the budgeted allocations to the Block Grants or contingency funds and other grants related to existing Block Grants administered by the Department of Health and Human Services that are not specifically addressed in this section shall be approved by the Office of State Budget and Management, and the Office of State Budget and Management shall consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations for review prior to implementing the changes. The report shall include an itemized listing of affected programs, including associated changes in budgeted allocations. All changes to the budgeted allocations to the Block Grants shall be reported immediately to the House of

1 Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Health and Human Services, the Senate
2 Appropriations Committee on Health and Human Services, and the Fiscal Research Division.
3 This subsection does not apply to Block Grant changes caused by legislative salary increases

6 **TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF) FUNDS**

7 **SECTION 10.60.(f)** The sum of one million ninety-three thousand one hundred
8 seventy-six dollars (\$1,093,176) appropriated in this section in TANF funds to the Department
9 of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall
10 be used to support administration of TANF-funded programs.

11 **SECTION 10.60.(g)** The sum of two million two hundred thousand dollars
12 (\$2,200,000) appropriated under this section in TANF funds to the Department of Health and
13 Human Services, Division of Social Services, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be used to
14 provide domestic violence services to Work First recipients. These funds shall be used to
15 provide domestic violence counseling, support, and other direct services to clients. These funds
16 shall not be used to establish new domestic violence shelters or to facilitate lobbying efforts.
17 The Division of Social Services may use up to seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000) in
18 TANF funds to support one administrative position within the Division of Social Services to
19 implement this subsection.

20 Each county department of social services and the local domestic violence shelter
21 program serving the county shall develop jointly a plan for utilizing these funds. The plan shall
22 include the services to be provided and the manner in which the services shall be delivered. The
23 county plan shall be signed by the county social services director or the director's designee and
24 the domestic violence program director or the director's designee and submitted to the Division
25 of Social Services by December 1, 2011. The Division of Social Services, in consultation with
26 the Council for Women, shall review the county plans and shall provide consultation and
27 technical assistance to the departments of social services and local domestic violence shelter
28 programs, if needed.

29 The Division of Social Services shall allocate these funds to county departments of
30 social services according to the following formula: (i) each county shall receive a base
31 allocation of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) and (ii) each county shall receive an allocation of
32 the remaining funds based on the county's proportion of the statewide total of the Work First
33 caseload as of July 1, 2011, and the county's proportion of the statewide total of the individuals
34 receiving domestic violence services from programs funded by the Council for Women as of
35 July 1, 2011. The Division of Social Services may reallocate unspent funds to counties that
36 submit a written request for additional funds.

37 **SECTION 10.60.(h)** The sum of fourteen million four hundred fifty-two thousand
38 three hundred ninety-one dollars (\$14,452,391) appropriated in this section to the Department
39 of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, in TANF funds for the 2011-2012
40 fiscal year for child welfare improvements shall be allocated to the county departments of
41 social services for hiring or contracting staff to investigate and provide services in Child
42 Protective Services cases; to provide foster care and support services; to recruit, train, license,
43 and support prospective foster and adoptive families; and to provide interstate and
44 post-adoption services for eligible families.

45 **SECTION 10.60.(i)** The sum of three million six hundred nine thousand three
46 hundred fifty-five dollars (\$3,609,355) appropriated in this section in TANF funds to the
47 Department of Health and Human Services, Special Children Adoption Fund, for the
48 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be used in accordance with G.S. 108A-50.2, as enacted in Section
49 10.48 of S.L. 2009-451. The Division of Social Services, in consultation with the North
50 Carolina Association of County Directors of Social Services and representatives of licensed
51 private adoption agencies, shall develop guidelines for the awarding of funds to licensed public
52 and private adoption agencies upon the adoption of children described in G.S. 108A-50 and in
53 foster care. Payments received from the Special Children Adoption Fund by participating
54 agencies shall be used exclusively to enhance the adoption services program. No local match
55 shall be required as a condition for receipt of these funds.

56 **SECTION 10.60.(j)** The sum of seven hundred fifty-four thousand one hundred
57 fifteen dollars (\$754,115) appropriated in this section to the Department of Health and Human
58 Services in TANF funds for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be used to continue support for the
59 Child Welfare Collaborative.

2 **TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES (TANF) CONTINGENCY**
3 **FUNDS**

4 **SECTION 10.60.(k)** The sum of two million five hundred thousand dollars
5 (\$2,500,000) appropriated in this section to the Department in TANF funds for Boys and Girls
6 Clubs for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be used to make grants for approved programs. The
7 Department of Health and Human Services, in accordance with federal regulations for the use
8 of TANF Contingency funds, shall administer a grant program to award funds to the Boys and
9 Girls Clubs across the State in order to implement programs that improve the motivation,
10 performance, and self-esteem of youths and to implement other initiatives that would be
11 expected to reduce gang participation, school dropout, and teen pregnancy rates. The
12 Department shall facilitate collaboration between the Boys and Girls Clubs and Support Our
13 Students, Communities in Schools, and similar programs and encourage them to submit joint
14 applications for the funds if appropriate.

15 **SECTION 10.60.(l)** The sum of one million three hundred eighty-nine thousand
16 eighty-four dollars (\$1,389,084) appropriated in this section in TANF Contingency funds to the
17 Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for the 2011-2012
18 fiscal year shall be used to support administration of TANF-funded programs.
19

20 **SOCIAL SERVICES BLOCK GRANT**

21 **SECTION 10.60.(m)** The sum of one million three hundred thousand dollars
22 (\$1,300,000) appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant to the Department
23 of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall
24 be used to support various child welfare training projects as follows:

- 25 (1) Provide a regional training center in southeastern North Carolina.
- 26 (2) Provide training for residential child caring facilities.
- 27 (3) Provide for various other child welfare training initiatives.

28 **SECTION 10.60.(n)** The sum of two million one hundred forty-seven thousand
29 nine hundred sixty-seven dollars (\$2,147,967) appropriated in this section in the Social
30 Services Block Grant for child caring agencies for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be allocated
31 in support of State foster home children.

32 **SECTION 10.60.(o)** The Department of Health and Human Services is authorized,
33 subject to the approval of the Office of State Budget and Management, to transfer Social
34 Services Block Grant funding allocated for departmental administration between divisions that
35 have received administrative allocations from the Social Services Block Grant.

36 **SECTION 10.60.(p)** Social Services Block Grant funds appropriated for the
37 Special Children's Adoption Incentive Fund will require a fifty percent (50%) local match.

38 **SECTION 10.60.(q)** The sum of four hundred twenty-two thousand three dollars
39 (\$422,003) appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant to the Department of
40 Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be
41 used to continue a Mental Health Services Program for children.

42 **SECTION 10.60.(r)** The sum of five million forty thousand dollars (\$5,040,000)
43 appropriated in this section in the Social Services Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year
44 shall be allocated to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social
45 Services. The Division shall allocate these funds to local departments of social services to
46 replace the loss of Child Protective Services State funds that are currently used by county
47 government to pay for Child Protective Services staff at the local level. These funds shall be
48 used to maintain the number of Child Protective Services workers throughout the State. These
49 Social Services Block Grant funds shall be used to pay for salaries and related expenses only
50 and are exempt from 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3) requiring a local match of twenty-five percent
51 (25%).

52 **SECTION 10.60.(s)** The sum of four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000)
53 appropriated in this section in the Social Service Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to
54 the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Central Management and Support,
55 shall be allocated to the ALS Association, Jim "Catfish" Hunter Chapter, to be used to provide
56 patient care and community services to persons with ALS and their families. These funds are
57 exempt from the provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

58 **SECTION 10.60.(t)** The sum of one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000)
59 appropriated in this section in the Social Service Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to

1 the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Public Health, shall be allocated to
2 Prevent Blindness North Carolina to be used for direct service programs. These funds are
3 exempt from the provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

4 **SECTION 10.60.(u)** The sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000)
5 appropriated in this section in the Social Service Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to
6 the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Services for the Blind, shall be
7 used to provide accessible electronic information for blind and disabled persons. These funds
8 are exempt from the provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

9 **SECTION 10.60.(v)** The sum of three hundred seventy-five thousand dollars
10 (\$375,000) appropriated in this section in the Social Service Block Grant for the 2011-2012
11 fiscal year to the Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, shall
12 be used to continue support for the Child Advocacy Centers and are exempt from the
13 provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

14 **SECTION 10.60.(w)** Social Service Block Grant funds allocated to the North
15 Carolina Inter-Agency Council for 2011-2012 fiscal year for coordinating homeless programs
16 and child medical evaluations are exempt from the provisions of 10A NCAC 71R .0201(3).

17 **LOW-INCOME HOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE BLOCK GRANT**

18 **SECTION 10.60.(x)** Additional emergency contingency funds received may be
19 allocated for Energy Assistance Payments or Crisis Intervention Payments without prior
20 consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. Additional
21 funds received shall be reported to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
22 Operations and the Fiscal Research Division upon notification of the award. The Department of
23 Health and Human Services shall not allocate funds for any activities, including increasing
24 administration, other than assistance payments, without prior consultation with the Joint
25 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations.

26 **SECTION 10.60.(y)** The sum of eleven million eight hundred sixty-two thousand
27 six hundred seventeen dollars (\$11,862,617) appropriated in this section in the Low-Income
28 Home Energy Assistance Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to the Department of
29 Health and Human Services, Division of Social Services, shall be used for energy assistance
30 payments for the households of (i) elderly persons age 60 and above with income up to one
31 hundred thirty percent (130%) of the federal poverty level and (ii) disabled persons eligible for
32 services funded through the Division of Aging and Adult Services.

33 **SECTION 10.60.(y1)** The sum of four million seven hundred thirty-two thousand
34 six hundred sixty-seven dollars (\$4,732,667) appropriated in this section in the Low-Income
35 Home Energy Assistance Block Grant for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to the Department of
36 Health and Human Services, Central Management and Support Division, shall be used to
37 continue the implementation of the NCFAST program. The U.S. Department of Health and
38 Human Services has authorized the use of the LIEAP program service funds to continue the
39 implementation of the NCFAST program. This meets the required participation based on the
40 federally approved cost allocation plan. In order to advance the implementation of NCFAST,
41 which creates a single portal of entry for the Department Health and Human Services programs,
42 these federal funds are critical, otherwise State funds will have to be identified.

43 **CHILD CARE AND DEVELOPMENT FUND BLOCK GRANT**

44 **SECTION 10.60.(z)** Payment for subsidized child care services provided with
45 federal TANF funds shall comply with all regulations and policies issued by the Division of
46 Child Development for the subsidized child care program.

47 **SECTION 10.60.(aa)** If funds appropriated through the Child Care and
48 Development Fund Block Grant for any program cannot be obligated or spent in that program
49 within the obligation or liquidation periods allowed by the federal grants, the Department may
50 move funds to child care subsidies, unless otherwise prohibited by federal requirements of the
51 grant, in order to use the federal funds fully.

52 **SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION AND TREATMENT BLOCK GRANT**

17 the court, after the payment of all costs, fees, expenses, and an adequate bond, may order that
18 the article be delivered to the claimant for proper labelling under the supervision of the
19 petitioner. The bond shall be returned to the claimant after the petitioner represents to the court
20 that the article is no longer mislabelled and that the expenses of supervision have been paid."

18 the State. No county may be held liable for any part of the expenses thus incurred unless
19 specifically authorized by the board of county commissioners under prior written agreement
20 with the ~~Secretary;Commissioner;~~ appropriations for meeting the county's share of such
21 expenses so authorized by the board of county commissioners shall be provided annually in the
22 county budget. For each county in which financial participation by the county is authorized, the
23 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall keep or cause to be kept an itemized account of all expenses thus
24 incurred and shall send such accounts periodically to the board of county commissioners of said
25 county; upon approval by the board of the correctness of such accounts, the county
26 commissioners shall issue or cause to be issued a warrant on the county treasury for the
27 payment of the county's share of such expenditures, said payment to be made within one month
28 after receipt of such statement from the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~. Appropriations made by a
29 county for the purposes set out in Articles ~~4, 4A, 4C and 6A~~72, 73, 75, and 79 of this Chapter
30 in the cooperative forest protection, development and improvement work are not to replace
31 State and federal funds which may be available to the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ for the work in
32 said county, but are to serve as a supplement thereto. Funds appropriated to the Department for
33 a fiscal year for the purposes set out in Articles ~~4, 4A, 4C and 6A~~72, 73, 75, and 79 of this
34 Chapter shall not be expended in a county unless that county shall contribute at least
35 twenty-five percent (25%) of the total cost of the forestry program.

36 **"§ 106-864. Powers of forest rangers to prevent and extinguish fires; authority to issue
37 citations and warning tickets.**

38 (a) Forest rangers shall prevent and extinguish forest fires and shall have control and
39 direction of all persons and equipment while engaged in the extinguishing of forest fires.
40 During a season of drought, the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ or his designate may establish a fire
41 patrol in any district, and in case of fire in or threatening any forest or woodland, the forest
42 ranger shall attend forthwith and use all necessary means to confine and extinguish such fire.
43 The forest ranger or deputy forest ranger may summon any resident between the ages of 18 and
44 45 years, inclusive, to assist in extinguishing fires and may require the use of crawler tractors
45 and other property needed for such purposes; any person so summoned and who is physically
46 able who refuses or neglects to assist or to allow the use of equipment and such other property
47 required shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor and upon conviction shall only be subject to
48 a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50.00) nor more than one hundred dollars (\$100.00). No
49 action for trespass shall lie against any forest ranger, deputy forest ranger, or person summoned
50 by him for crossing lands, backfiring, burning out or performing his duties as a forest ranger or
51 deputy forest ranger.

52 (b) Forest rangers are authorized to issue and serve citations under the terms of
53 G.S. 15A-302 and warning tickets under the terms of ~~G.S. 113-55.2~~G.S. 106-866 for offenses
54 under the forest laws. This subsection may not be interpreted to confer the power of arrest on
55 forest rangers, and does not make them criminal justice officers within the meaning of
56 G.S. 17C-2.

57 **"§ 106-865. Powers of forest law-enforcement officers.**

58 The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ is authorized to appoint as many forest law-enforcement
59 officers as he deems necessary to carry out the forest law-enforcement responsibilities of the

1 Department. Forest law-enforcement officers shall have all the powers and the duties of a forest
2 ranger enumerated in ~~G.S. 113-54 and 113-55~~ G.S. 106-863 and G.S. 106-864. Forest
3 law-enforcement officers shall, in addition to their other duties, have the powers of peace
4 officers to enforce the forest laws. Any forest law-enforcement officer may arrest, without
5 warrant, any person or persons committing any crime in his presence or whom such officer has
6 probable cause for believing has committed a crime in his presence and bring such person or
7 persons forthwith before a district court or other officer having jurisdiction. Forest
8 law-enforcement officers shall also have authority to obtain and serve warrants including
9 warrants for violation of any duly promulgated rule of the Department.

10 **"§ 106-866. Warning tickets for violations of the forest laws.**

11 (a) To encourage the cooperation of the public in achieving the objectives of the forest
12 laws, the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ may provide for the issuance of warning tickets instead of
13 the initiation of criminal prosecution by forest rangers and forest law-enforcement officers.
14 Issuance of the warning tickets shall be in accordance with criteria administratively
15 promulgated by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ within the requirements of this section. These
16 criteria are exempt from Article 2A of Chapter 150B of the General Statutes.

17 (b) No warning ticket may be issued unless all of the following conditions are met:

- 18 (1) The forest ranger or the forest law-enforcement officer must be convinced
19 that the offense was not committed intentionally.
- 20 (2) The offense is not one, or a type of offense, for which the ~~Secretary~~
21 Commissioner has prohibited the issuance of warning tickets.
- 22 (3) At the time of the violation it was not reasonably foreseeable that the
23 conduct of the offender could result in any significant destruction of forests
24 or woodlands or constitute a hazard to the public.

25 (c) A warning ticket may not be issued if the offender has previously been charged
26 with, or issued a warning ticket for, the same or a similar offense within the preceding three
27 years. A list of persons who have been issued warning tickets under this section within the
28 preceding three years shall be maintained and periodically updated by the
29 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~.

30 (d) This section does not entitle any person who has committed an offense to the right
31 to be issued a warning ticket, and the issuance of a warning ticket does not prohibit the later
32 initiation of criminal prosecution for the same offense for which the warning ticket was issued.

33 **"§ 106-867. Compensation of forest rangers.**

34 Forest rangers shall receive compensation from the Department at a reasonable rate to be
35 fixed by said Department for the time actually engaged in the performance of their duties; and
36 reasonable expenses for equipment, transportation, or food supplies incurred in the
37 performance of their duties, according to an itemized statement to be rendered the ~~Secretary~~
38 Commissioner every month, and approved by him. Forest rangers shall render to the ~~Secretary~~
39 Commissioner a statement of the services rendered by the men employed by them or their
40 deputy rangers, as provided in this Article, within one month of the date of service, which bill
41 shall show in detail the amount and character of the service performed, the exact duration
42 thereof, the name of each person employed, and any other information required by the
43 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~. If said bill be duly approved by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, it shall
44 be paid by direction of the Department out of any funds provided for that purpose.

45 **"§ 106-868. Overtime compensation for forest fire fighting.**

46 The Department shall, within funds appropriated to the Department, provide overtime
47 compensation to the professional employees of the Division of Forest Resources involved in
48 fighting forest fires.

49 **"§ 106-869. Woodland defined.**

50 For the purposes of this Article, woodland is taken to include all forest areas, both timber
51 and cutover land, and all second-growth stands on areas that have at one time been cultivated.

52 **"§ 106-870. Misdemeanor to destroy posted forestry notice.**

53 Any person who shall maliciously or willfully destroy, deface, remove, or disfigure any
54 sign, poster, or warning notice, posted by order of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, under the
55 provisions of this Article, or any other act which may be passed for the purpose of protecting
56 and developing the forests in this State, shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor.

57 **"§ 106-871. Cooperation between counties and State in forest protection and
58 development.**

1 The board of county commissioners of any county is hereby authorized and empowered to
2 cooperate with the Department in the protection, reforestation, and promotion of forest
3 management of their own forests within their respective counties, and to appropriate and pay
4 out of the funds under their control such amount as is provided in ~~G.S. 113-54~~ G.S. 106-863.

5 **"§ 106-872. Instructions on forest preservation and development.**

6 (a) It shall be the duty of all district, county, township rangers, and all deputy rangers
7 provided for in this Chapter to distribute in all of the public schools and high schools of the
8 county in which they are serving as such fire rangers all such tracts, books, periodicals and
9 other literature that may, from time to time, be sent out to such rangers by the State and federal
10 forestry agencies touching or dealing with forest preservation, development, and forest
11 management.

12 (b) It shall be the duty of the various rangers herein mentioned under the direction of
13 the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, and the duty of the teachers of the various schools, both public
14 and high schools, to keep posted at some conspicuous place in the various classrooms of the
15 school buildings such appropriate bulletins and posters as may be sent out from the forestry
16 agencies herein named for that purpose and keep the same constantly before their pupils; and
17 said teachers and rangers shall prepare lectures or talks to be made to the pupils of the various
18 schools on the subject of forest fires, their origin and their destructive effect on the plant life
19 and tree life of the forests of the State, the development and scientific management of the
20 forests of the State, and shall be prepared to give practical instruction to their pupils from time
21 to time and as often as they shall find it possible so to do.

22 **"§ 106-873. Authority of Governor to close forests and woodlands to hunting, fishing and
23 trapping.**

24 During periods of protracted drought or when other hazardous fire conditions threaten
25 forest and water resources and appear to require extraordinary precautions, the Governor of the
26 State, upon the joint recommendation of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ and the Executive
27 Director of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, may by official proclamation:

- 28 (1) Close any or all of the woodlands and inland waters of the State to hunting,
29 fishing and trapping for the period of the emergency.
- 30 (2) Forbid for the period of the emergency the building of campfires and the
31 burning of brush, grass or other debris within 500 feet of any woodland in
32 any county, counties, or parts thereof.
- 33 (3) Close for the period of the emergency any or all of the woodlands of the
34 State to such other persons and activities as he deems proper under the
35 circumstances, except to the owners or tenants of such property and their
36 agents and employees, or persons holding written permission from any
37 owner or his recognized agent to enter thereon for any lawful purpose other
38 than hunting, fishing or trapping.

39 **"§ 106-874. Publication of proclamation; annulment thereof.**

40 Such proclamation shall become effective 24 hours after certified time of issue, and shall be
41 published in such newspapers and posted in such places and in such manner as the Governor
42 may direct. It shall be annulled in the same manner by another proclamation by the Governor
43 when he is satisfied, upon joint recommendation of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ and the
44 Executive Director of the North Carolina Wildlife Resources Commission, that the period of
45 the emergency has passed.

46 **"§ 106-875. Violation of proclamation a misdemeanor.**

47 Any person, firm or corporation who enters upon any woodlands or inland waters of the
48 State for the purpose of hunting, fishing or trapping, or who builds a campfire or burns brush,
49 grass or other debris within 500 feet of any woodland, after a proclamation has been issued by
50 the Governor forbidding such activities, or who violates any other provisions of the Governor's
51 proclamation with regard to permissible activities in closed woodlands shall be guilty of a Class
52 1 misdemeanor."

53 **SECTION 13.25.(r)** Article 4A of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
54 (G.S. 113-60.4, 113-60.5, 113-60.6, 113-60.7, 113-60.8, 113-60.9, 113-60.10) is recodified as a
55 new Article 73 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, G.S. 106-880 through G.S. 106-886.

56 **SECTION 13.25.(s)** Article 73 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
57 recodified under subsection (r) of this section, reads as rewritten:

58 "Article 73.

59 "Protection of Forest Against Insect Infestation and Disease.

"§ 106-880. Purpose and intent.

(a) The purpose of this Article is to place within the Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources, Agriculture and Consumer Services~~ the authority and responsibility for investigating insect infestations and disease infections which affect stands of forest trees, the devising of control measures for interested landowners and others, and taking measures to control, suppress, or eradicate outbreaks of forest insect pests and tree diseases.

(b) In this Article, unless the context requires otherwise, the expression "Department" means the Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources; "Secretary" Agriculture and Consumer Services, and "Commissioner" means the Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources; Commissioner of Agriculture.~~

"§ 106-881. Authority of the Department.

The authority and responsibility for carrying out the purpose, intent and provisions of this Article are hereby delegated to the Department. The administration of the provisions of this Article shall be under the general supervision of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner. The provisions of this Article shall not abrogate or change any power or authority as may be vested in the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services under existing statutes.~~

"§ 106-882. Definitions.

As used in this Article, unless the context clearly requires otherwise:

- (1) "Control zone" means an area of potential or actual infestation or infection, boundaries of which are fixed and clearly described in a manner to definitely identify the zone.
- (2) "Forestland" means land on which forest trees occur.
- (3) "Forest trees" means only those trees which are a part and constitute a stand of potential immature or mature commercial timber trees, provided that the term "forest trees" shall be deemed to include shade trees of any species around houses, along highways, and within cities and towns, if the same constitute insect and disease menaces to nearby timber trees or timber stands.
- (4) "Infection" means attack by any disease affecting forest trees which is declared by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ to be dangerously injurious thereto.
- (5) "Infestation" means attack by means of any insect, which is by the ~~Secretary Commissioner~~ declared to be dangerously injurious to forest trees.

"§ 106-883. Action against insects and diseases.

Whenever the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, or his agent, determines that there exists an infestation of forest insect pests or an infection of forest tree diseases, injurious or potentially injurious to the timber or forest trees within the State of North Carolina, and that said infestation or infection is of such a character as to be a menace to the timber or forest growth of the State, the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall declare the existence of a zone of infestation or infection and shall declare and fix boundaries so as to definitely describe and identify said zone of infestation or infection, and the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ or his agent shall give notice in writing by mail or otherwise to each forest landowner within the designated control zone advising him of the nature of the infestation or infection, the recommended control measures, and offer him technical advice on methods of carrying out controls.

"§ 106-884. Authority of ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ and his agents to go upon private land within control zones.

The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ or his agents shall have the power to go upon the land within any zone of infestation or infection and take measures to control, suppress or eradicate the insect, infestation or disease infection. If any person refuses to allow the ~~Secretary Commissioner~~ or his agents to go upon his land, or if any person refuses to adopt adequate means to control or eradicate the insect, infestation or disease infection, the ~~Secretary Commissioner~~ may apply to the superior court of the county in which the land is located for an injunction or other appropriate remedy to restrain the landowner from interfering with the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ or his agents in entering the control zone and adopting measures to control, suppress or eradicate the insect infestation or disease infection, provided the cost of court or control thereof shall not be a liability against the forest landowner nor constitute a lien upon the real property of such infested area.

"§ 106-885. Cooperative agreements.

1 In order to more effectively carry out the purposes of this Article, the Department is hereby
2 authorized to enter into cooperative agreement with the federal government and other public
3 and private agencies, and with the owners of forestland.

4 **"§ 106-886. Annulment of control zone.**

5 Whenever the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ determines that the forest insect or disease control
6 work within a designated control zone is no longer necessary or feasible, then the ~~Secretary~~
7 ~~Commissioner~~ shall declare the zone of infestation or infection no longer pertinent to the
8 purposes of this Article and such zone will then no longer be recognized."

9 **SECTION 13.25.(t)** Article 4B of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
10 (G.S. 113-60.11, 113-60.12, 113-60.13, 113-60.14, and 113-60.15) is recodified as a new
11 Article 74 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, G.S. 106-890 through G.S. 106-894.

12 **SECTION 13.25.(u)** G.S. 106-893, as recodified in subsection (t) of this section,
13 reads as rewritten:

14 **"§ 106-893. Compact Administrator; North Carolina members of advisory committee.**

15 The ~~Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources~~~~Commissioner of Agriculture~~ is
16 hereby designated as Compact Administrator for this State and shall consult with like officials
17 of the other member states and shall implement cooperation between such states in forest fire
18 prevention and control.

19 At some time before the adjournment of each regular session of the General Assembly, the
20 Governor shall choose one person from the membership of the House of Representatives, and
21 shall choose one person from the membership of the Senate, who shall serve on the advisory
22 committee of the Southeastern Interstate Forest Fire Protection Compact as provided for in
23 Article III of said Compact. At the time of the selection of the House and Senate members of
24 such advisory committee, the Governor shall choose one alternate member from the House of
25 Representatives and one from the Senate who shall serve on such advisory committee in case of
26 the death, absence or disability of the regular members so chosen."

27 **SECTION 13.25.(v)** G.S. 106-894, as recodified in subsection (t) of this section,
28 reads as rewritten:

29 **"§ 106-894. Agreements with noncompact states.**

30 The Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~~~Agriculture and Consumer Services~~
31 is hereby authorized to enter into written agreements with the State forest fire control agency of
32 any other state or any province of Canada which is party to a regional forest fire protection
33 compact. The provisions of any written agreement entered into pursuant to this Article shall be
34 substantially in the form of the authority heretofore granted under the provisions of this Article,
35 Southeastern Interstate Forest Fire Protection Compact."

36 **SECTION 13.25.(w)** Article 4C of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
37 (G.S. 113-60.21, 113-60.22, 113-60.23, 113-60.24, 113-60.25, 113-60.26, 113-60.27,
38 113-60.28, 113-60.29, 113-60.30, and 113-60.31) is recodified as a new Article 75 of Chapter
39 106 of the General Statutes, G.S. 106-900 through G.S. 106-910.

40 **SECTION 13.25.(x)** Article 75 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
41 recodified by subsection (w) of this section, reads as rewritten:

42 "Article 75.

43 "Regulation of Open Fires.

44 **"§ 106-900. Purpose and findings.**

45 The purpose of this Article is to regulate certain open burning in order to protect the public
46 from the hazards of forest fires and air pollution and to adapt such regulation to the needs and
47 circumstances of the different areas of North Carolina. The General Assembly finds that open
48 burning in proximity to woodlands must be regulated in all counties to protect against forest
49 fires and air pollution. The General Assembly further finds that in certain counties a high
50 percentage of the land area contains organic soils or forest types which may pose greater
51 problems of forest fire and air pollution controls, and that in counties in which a great amount
52 of land-clearing operations is taking place on these organic soils or these forest types,
53 additional control of open burning is required. The counties subject to the need for additional
54 control are classified as high hazard counties for purpose of this Article.

55 **"§ 106-901. Definitions.**

56 As used in this Article:

- 57 (1) "Department" means the Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
58 ~~Resources~~~~Agriculture and Consumer Services~~.

- 1 (2) "Forest ranger" means the county forest ranger or deputy forest ranger
2 designated under ~~G.S. 113-52~~G.S. 106-861.
3 (3) "Person" means any individual, firm, partnership, corporation, association,
4 public or private institution, political subdivision, or government agency.
5 (4) "Woodland" means woodland as defined in ~~G.S. 113-57~~G.S. 106-869.

6 **"§ 106-902. High hazard counties; permits required; standards.**

7 (a) The provisions of this section apply only to the counties of Beaufort, Bladen,
8 Brunswick, Camden, Carteret, Chowan, Craven, Currituck, Dare, Duplin, Gates, Hyde, Jones,
9 Onslow, Pamlico, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Tyrrell, and Washington which are classified as
10 high hazard counties in accordance with ~~G.S. 113-60.21~~G.S. 106-900.

11 (b) It is unlawful for any person to willfully start or cause to be started any fire in any
12 woodland under the protection of the Department or within 500 feet of any such woodland
13 without first having obtained a permit from the Department. Permits for starting fires may be
14 obtained from forest rangers or other agents authorized by the county forest ranger to issue
15 such permits in the county in which the fire is to be started. Such permits shall be issued by the
16 ranger or other agent unless permits for the area in question have been prohibited or cancelled
17 in accordance with ~~G.S. 113-60.25 or 113-60.27~~G.S. 106-904 or G.S. 106-906.

18 (c) It is unlawful for any person to willfully burn any debris, stumps, brush or other
19 flammable materials resulting from ground clearing activities and involving more than five
20 contiguous acres, regardless of the proximity of the burning to woodland and on which such
21 materials are placed in piles or windrows without first having obtained a special permit from
22 the Department. Areas less than five acres in size will require a regular permit in accordance
23 with ~~G.S. 113-60.23(b)~~G.S. 106-902(b).

- 24 (1) Prevailing winds at the time of ignition must be away from any city, town,
25 development, major highway, or other populated area, the ambient air of
26 which may be significantly affected by smoke, fly ash, or other air
27 contaminants from the burning.
28 (2) The location of the burning must be at least 1,000 feet from any dwelling or
29 structure located in a predominately residential area other than a dwelling or
30 structure located on the property on which the burning is conducted unless
31 permission is granted by the occupants.
32 (3) The amount of dirt or organic soil on or in the material to be burned must be
33 minimized and the material arranged in a way suitable to facilitate rapid
34 burning.
35 (4) Burning may not be initiated when it is determined by a forest ranger, based
36 on information supplied by a competent authority that stagnant air conditions
37 or inversions exist or that such conditions may occur during the duration of
38 the burn.
39 (5) Heavy oils, asphaltic material, or items containing natural or synthetic
40 rubber may not be used to ignite the material to be burned or to promote the
41 burning of such material.
42 (6) Initial burning may be commenced only between the hours of 9:00 A.M. and
43 3:00 P.M. and no combustible material may be added to the fire between
44 3:00 P.M. on one day and 9:00 A.M. on the following day, except that when
45 favorable meteorological conditions exist, any forest ranger authorized to
46 issue the permit may authorize in writing a deviation from the restrictions.

47 **"§ 106-903. Open burning in non-high hazard counties; permits required; standards.**

48 (a) The provisions of this section apply only to the counties not designated as high
49 hazard counties in ~~G.S. 113-60.23(a)~~G.S. 106-902(a).

50 (b) It shall be unlawful for any person to start or cause to be started any fire or ignite
51 any material in any woodland under the protection of the Department or within 500 feet of any
52 such woodland during the hours starting at midnight and ending at 4:00 P.M. without first
53 obtaining a permit from the Department. Permits may be obtained from forest rangers or other
54 agents authorized by the forest ranger to issue such permits in the county in which the fire is to
55 be started. Such permits shall be issued by the ranger or other agent unless permits for the area
56 in question have been prohibited or cancelled under ~~G.S. 113-60.25 or 113-60.27~~G.S. 106-904
57 or G.S. 106-906.

58 **"§ 106-904. Open burning prohibited statewide.**

1 During periods of hazardous forest fire conditions or during air pollution episodes declared
2 pursuant to Article 21B of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, the ~~secretary~~ Commissioner is
3 authorized to prohibit all open burning regardless of whether a permit is required under
4 ~~G.S. 113-60.23 or 113-60.24~~ G.S. 106-902 or G.S. 106-903. The ~~secretary~~ Commissioner shall
5 issue a press release containing relevant details of the prohibition to news media serving the
6 area affected.

7 **"§ 106-905. Permit conditions.**

8 Permits issued under this Article shall be issued in the name of the person undertaking the
9 burning and shall specify the specific area in which the burning is to occur, the type and
10 amount of material to be burned, the duration of the permit, and such other factors as are
11 necessary to identify the burning which is allowed under the permit.

12 **"§ 106-906. Permit suspension and cancellation.**

13 Upon a determination that hazardous forest fire conditions exist the ~~secretary~~
14 Commissioner is authorized to cancel any permit issued under this Article and suspend the
15 issuance of any new permits. Upon a determination by the Environmental Management
16 Commission or its agent that open burning permitted under this Article is causing significant
17 contravention of ambient air quality standards or that an air pollution episode exists pursuant to
18 Article 21B of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, the ~~secretary~~ Commissioner shall cancel
19 any permits issued under authority of this Article and shall suspend the issuance of any new
20 permits.

21 **"§ 106-907. Control of existing fires.**

22 (a) If a fire is set without a permit required by ~~G.S. 113-60.23, 113-60.24 or~~
23 ~~113-60.25~~ G.S. 106-902, 106-903, or 106-904, and is set in an area in which permits are
24 prohibited or cancelled at the time the fire is set, the person responsible for setting the fire or
25 causing the fire to be set shall immediately extinguish the fire or take such other action as
26 directed by any forest ranger authorized to issue permits under
27 ~~G.S. 113-60.23(e)~~ G.S. 106-902(c). In the event that the person responsible does not
28 immediately undertake efforts to extinguish the fire or take such other action as directed by the
29 forest ranger, the Department may enter the property and take reasonable steps to extinguish or
30 control the fire and the person responsible for setting the fire shall reimburse the Department
31 for the expenses incurred by the Department. A showing that a fire is associated with
32 land-clearing activities is prima facie evidence that the person undertaking the land clearing is
33 responsible for setting the fire or causing the fire to be set.

34 (b) If a fire requiring a permit under ~~G.S. 113-60.23(e)~~ G.S. 106-902(c) is set without a
35 permit and a forest ranger authorized to issue such permits determines that a permit would not
36 have been issued for the fire at the time it was set, the person responsible for setting the fire or
37 causing the fire to be set shall immediately take such action as the forest ranger directs to
38 extinguish or control the fire. In the event the person responsible does not immediately
39 undertake efforts to extinguish the fire or take such other action as directed by the forest ranger,
40 the Department may enter the property and take reasonable steps to extinguish or control the
41 fire and the person responsible for setting the fire shall reimburse the Department for the
42 expenses incurred by the Department. A showing that a fire is associated with land-clearing
43 activities is prima facie evidence that the person undertaking the land clearing is responsible
44 for setting the fire or causing the fire to be set.

45 (c) If a fire is set in accordance with a permit but the burning is taking place contrary to
46 the conditions of the permit, any forest ranger with authority to issue permits in the area in
47 question may order the permittee in writing to undertake the steps necessary to comply with the
48 conditions of his permit. If the permittee is not making a reasonable effort to comply with the
49 order, the forest ranger may enter the property and take reasonable steps to extinguish or
50 control the fire and the permittee shall reimburse the Department for the expenses incurred by
51 the Department.

52 **"§ 106-908. Penalties.**

53 Any person violating the provisions of this Article or of any permit issued under the
54 authority of this Article shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor. The penalties imposed by this
55 section shall be separate and apart and not in lieu of any civil or criminal penalties which may
56 be imposed by G.S. 143-215.114A or G.S. 143-215.114B. The penalties imposed are also in
57 addition to any liability the violator incurs as a result of actions taken by the Department under
58 ~~G.S. 113-60.28~~ G.S. 106-907.

59 **"§ 106-909. Effect on other laws.**

1 This Article shall not be construed as affecting or abridging the lawful authority of local
2 governments to pass ordinances relating to open burning within their boundaries. Nothing in
3 this Article shall relieve any person from compliance with the provisions of Article 21B of
4 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes and regulations adopted thereunder. In the event that
5 permits are required for open burning associated with land clearing under the authority of
6 Article 21B of Chapter 143 of the General Statutes, the authority to issue such permits shall be
7 delegated to forest rangers who are authorized to issue permits under
8 ~~G.S. 113-60.23(e)~~-G.S. 106-902(c).

9 **"§ 106-910. Exempt fires; no permit fees.**

10 (a) This Article shall not apply to any fires started, or caused to be started, within 100
11 feet of an occupied dwelling house if such fire shall be confined (i) within an enclosure from
12 which burning material may not escape or (ii) within a protected area upon which a watch is
13 being maintained and which is provided with adequate fire protection equipment.

14 (b) No charge shall be made for the granting of any permit required by this Article."

15 **SECTION 13.25.(y)** Article 4D of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
16 (G.S. 113-60.32 and G.S. 113-60.33) is recodified as a new Article 76 of Chapter 106 of the
17 General Statutes, G.S. 106-911 and G.S. 106-912.

18 **SECTION 13.25.(z)** Article 76 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
19 recodified by subsection (y) of this section, reads as rewritten:

20 "Article 76.

21 "Fire Fighters on Standby Duty.

22 **"§ 106-911. Definitions.**

23 As used in this Article:

24 (1) "Fire fighter" means an employee of the Division of Forest Resources of the
25 Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~Agriculture and
26 Consumer Services who engages in fire suppression duties.

27 (2) "Fire suppression duties" means involvement in on-site fire suppression,
28 participation in Project Fire Team while it is mobilized, Operations Room
29 duty during on-going fires or when required by high readiness plans, mop-up
30 activities to secure fire sites, scouting and detecting forest fires, performance
31 of standby duty, and any other activity that directly contributes to the
32 detection, response to, and control of fires.

33 **"§ 106-912. Standby duty.**

34 (a) Standby duty is time during which a fire fighter is required to remain within 25
35 miles of his duty station and be available to return to the duty station on call. The Department
36 of Agriculture and Consumer Services shall provide each fire fighter on standby duty with an
37 electronic paging device that makes the wearer accessible to his duty station.

38 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, for at least two out of 14 consecutive
39 days that a fire fighter is on duty, the Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
40 ~~Resources~~Agriculture and Consumer Services shall permit the fire fighter to be more than 25
41 miles from his duty station so long as the fire fighter gives the Department of ~~Environment and~~
42 ~~Natural Resources~~Agriculture and Consumer Services a telephone number where he can be
43 reached; each month, the days the fire fighter is permitted to be more than 25 miles from his
44 duty station shall include one full weekend. On the days the fire fighter is permitted to be more
45 than 25 miles from his duty station, the Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~
46 Agriculture and Consumer Services may call him only when there is a bona fide emergency."

47 **SECTION 13.25.(aa)** Article 4E of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
48 (G.S. 113-60.40, 113-60.41, 113-60.42, 113-60.43, 113-60.44, and 113-60.45) is recodified as
49 a new Article 77 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, G.S. 106-920 through G.S. 106-925.

50 **SECTION 13.25.(bb)** Article 77 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
51 recodified by subsection (aa) of this section, reads as rewritten:

52 "Article 77.

53 "North Carolina Prescribed Burning Act.

54 **"§ 106-920. Legislative findings.**

55 The General Assembly finds that prescribed burning of forestlands is a management tool
56 that is beneficial to North Carolina's public safety, forest and wildlife resources, environment,
57 and economy. The General Assembly finds that the following are benefits that result from
58 prescribed burning of forestlands:

- 1 (1) Prescribed burning reduces the naturally occurring buildup of vegetative
2 fuels on forestlands, thereby reducing the risk and severity of wildfires and
3 lessening the loss of life and property.
- 4 (2) The State's ever-increasing population is resulting in urban development
5 directly adjacent to fire-prone forestlands, referred to as a woodland-urban
6 interface area. The use of prescribed burning in these woodland-urban
7 interface areas substantially reduces the risk of wildfires that cause damage.
- 8 (3) Many of North Carolina's natural ecosystems require periodic fire for their
9 survival. Prescribed burning is essential to the perpetuation, restoration, and
10 management of many plant and animal communities. Prescribed burning
11 benefits game, nongame, and endangered wildlife species by increasing the
12 growth and yield of plants that provide forage and an area for escape and
13 brooding and that satisfy other habitat needs.
- 14 (4) Forestlands are economic, biological, and aesthetic resources of statewide
15 significance. In addition to reducing the frequency and severity of
16 wildfires, prescribed burning of forestlands helps to prepare sites for
17 replanting and natural seeding, to control insects and diseases, and to
18 increase productivity.
- 19 (5) Prescribed burning enhances the resources on public use lands, such as State
20 and national forests, wildlife refuges, nature preserves, and game lands.
21 Prescribed burning enhances private lands that are managed for wildlife
22 refuges, nature preserves, and game lands. Prescribed burning enhances
23 private lands that are managed for wildlife, recreation, and other purposes.

24 As North Carolina's population grows, pressures resulting from liability issues and smoke
25 complaints discourage or limit prescribed burning so that these numerous benefits to
26 forestlands often are not attainable. By recognizing the benefits of prescribed burning and by
27 adopting requirements governing prescribed burning, the General Assembly helps to educate
28 the public, avoid misunderstandings, and reduce complaints about this valuable management
29 tool.

30 **"§ 106-921. Definitions.**

31 As used in this Article:

- 32 (1) "Certified prescribed burner" means an individual who has successfully
33 completed a certification program approved by the Division of Forest
34 Resources of the Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
35 ~~Resources~~ Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- 36 (2) "Prescribed burning" means the planned and controlled application of fire to
37 naturally occurring vegetative fuels under safe weather and safe
38 environmental and other conditions, while following appropriate
39 precautionary measures that will confine the fire to a predetermined area and
40 accomplish the intended management objectives.
- 41 (3) "Prescription" means a written plan prepared by a certified prescribed burner
42 for starting, controlling, and extinguishing a prescribed burning.

43 **"106-922. Immunity from liability.**

44 (a) Any prescribed burning conducted in compliance with ~~G.S. 113-60.43~~ G.S. 106-923
45 is in the public interest and does not constitute a public or private nuisance.

46 (b) A landowner or the landowner's agent who conducts a prescribed burning in
47 compliance with ~~G.S. 113-60.43~~ G.S. 106-923 shall not be liable in any civil action for any
48 damage or injury caused by or resulting from smoke.

49 (c) Notwithstanding subsections (a) and (b), this section does not apply when a
50 nuisance or damage results from a negligently or improperly conducted prescribed burning.

51 **"§ 106-923. Prescribed burning.**

52 (a) Prior to conducting a prescribed burning, the landowner shall obtain a prescription
53 for the prescribed burning prepared by a certified prescribed burner and filed with the Division
54 of Forest Resources, Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~ Agriculture and
55 Consumer Services. A copy of the prescription shall be provided to the landowner. A copy of
56 this prescription shall be in the possession of the responsible burner on site throughout the
57 duration of the prescribed burning. The prescription shall include:

- 58 (1) The landowner's name and address.
- 59 (2) A description of the area to be burned.

- 1 (3) A map of the area to be burned.
- 2 (4) An estimate in tons of the fuel located on the area.
- 3 (5) The objectives of the prescribed burning.
- 4 (6) A list of the acceptable weather conditions and parameters for the prescribed
- 5 burning sufficient to minimize the likelihood of smoke damage and fire
- 6 escaping onto adjacent areas.
- 7 (7) The name of the certified prescribed burner responsible for conducting the
- 8 prescribed burning.
- 9 (8) A summary of the methods that are adequate for the particular circumstances
- 10 involved to be used to start, control, and extinguish the prescribed burning.
- 11 (9) Provision for reasonable notice of the prescribed burning to be provided to
- 12 nearby homes and businesses to avoid effects on health and property.

13 (b) The prescribed burning shall be conducted by a certified prescribed burner in
 14 accordance with a prescription that satisfies subsection (a) of this section. The certified
 15 prescribed burner shall be present on the site and shall be in charge of the burning throughout
 16 the period of the burning. A landowner may conduct a prescribed burning without being a
 17 certified prescribed burner if the landowner is burning a tract of forestland of 50 acres or less
 18 owned by that landowner and is following all conditions established in a prescription prepared
 19 by a certified prescribed burner.

20 (c) Prior to conducting a prescribed burning, the landowner or the landowner's agent
 21 shall obtain an open-burning permit under Article 4C of this Chapter from the Division of
 22 Forest Resources, Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~ Agriculture and
 23 Consumer Services. This open-burning permit must remain in effect throughout the period of
 24 the prescribed burning. The prescribed burning shall be conducted in compliance with all the
 25 following:

- 26 (1) The terms and conditions of the open-burning permit under ~~Article~~
 27 Article 75 of this Chapter.
- 28 (2) The State's air pollution control statutes under Article 21 and Article 21B of
 29 Chapter 143 of the General Statutes and any rules adopted pursuant to these
 30 statutes.
- 31 (3) Any applicable local ordinances relating to open burning.
- 32 (4) The voluntary smoke management guidelines adopted by the Division of
 33 Forest Resources, Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
 34 ~~Resources~~ Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- 35 (5) Any rules adopted by the Division of Forest Resources, Department of
 36 ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~ Agriculture and Consumer Services, to
 37 implement this Article.

38 "§ 106-924. Adoption of rules.

39 The Division of Forest Resources, Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
 40 ~~Resources~~ Agriculture and Consumer Services, may adopt rules that govern prescribed burning
 41 under this Article.

42 "§ 106-925. Exemption.

43 This Article does not apply when the ~~Secretary of Environment and Natural~~
 44 ~~Resources~~ Commissioner of Agriculture has cancelled burning permits pursuant to
 45 ~~G.S. 113-60.27~~ G.S. 106-906 or prohibited all open burning pursuant to
 46 ~~G.S. 113-60.25~~ G.S. 106-904."

47 **SECTION 13.25.(cc)** Article 5 of Chapter 113 of the General Statutes
 48 (G.S. 113-61, 113-62, 113-63, 113-64, 113-65, 113-66, 113-67, 113-68, 113-69, 113-70,
 49 113-71, 113-72, 113-73, 113-74, 113-75, 113-76, and 113-77) is recodified as a new Article 78
 50 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, G.S. 106-930 through G.S. 106-946.

51 **SECTION 13.25.(dd)** Article 78 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
 52 recodified by subsection (cc) of this section, reads as rewritten:

53 "Article 78.

54 "Corporations for Protection and Development of Forests.

55 "§ 106-930. Private limited dividend corporations may be formed.

56 (a) In this Article, unless the context requires otherwise, "Department" means the
 57 Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~; and "~~Secretary~~" Agriculture and Consumer
 58 Services, and "~~Commissioner~~" means the ~~Secretary of Environment and Natural~~
 59 ~~Resources~~ Commissioner of Agriculture.

1 (b) Three or more persons, who associate themselves by an agreement in writing for the
2 purpose, may become a private limited dividend corporation to finance and carry out projects
3 for the protection and development of forests and for such other related purposes as the
4 Secretary shall approve, subject to all the duties, restrictions and liabilities, and possessing all
5 the rights, powers, and privileges, of corporations organized under the general corporation laws
6 of the State of North Carolina, except where such provisions are in conflict with this Article.

7 **"§ 106-931. Manner of organizing.**

8 A corporation formed under this Article shall be organized and incorporated in the manner
9 provided for organization of corporations under the general corporation laws of the State of
10 North Carolina, except where such provisions are in conflict with this Article. The certificate of
11 organization of any such corporation shall contain a statement that it is organized under the
12 provisions of this Article and that it consents to be and shall be at all times subject to the rules
13 and supervision of the Secretary, and shall set forth as or among its purposes the protection and
14 development of forests and the purchase, acquisition, sale, conveyance and other dealing in the
15 same and the products therefrom, subject to the rules from time to time imposed by the
16 Secretary.

17 **"§ 106-932. Directors.**

18 There shall not be less than three directors, one of whom shall always be a person
19 designated by the Secretary, which one need not be a stockholder.

20 **"§ 106-933. Duties of supervision by ~~Secretary of Environment and Natural~~
21 ~~Resources~~ Commissioner.**

22 Corporations formed under this Article shall be regulated by the ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner in
23 the manner provided in this Article. Traveling and other expenses incurred by him in the
24 discharge of the duties imposed upon him by this Article shall be charged to, and paid by, the
25 particular corporation or corporations on account of which such expenses are incurred. His
26 general expenses incurred in the discharge of such duties which cannot be fairly charged to any
27 particular corporation or corporations shall be charged to, and paid by, all the corporations then
28 organized and existing under this Article pro rata according to their respective stock
29 capitalizations. The ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner shall:

- 30 (1) Adopt rules to implement this Article and to protect and develop forests
31 subject to its jurisdiction.
- 32 (2) Order all corporations organized under this Article to do such acts as may be
33 necessary to comply with the provisions of law and the rules adopted by the
34 ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner, or to refrain from doing any acts in violation
35 thereof.
- 36 (3) Keep informed as to the general condition of all such corporations, their
37 capitalization and the manner in which their property is permitted, operated
38 or managed with respect to their compliance with all provisions of law and
39 orders of the ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner.
- 40 (4) Require every such corporation to file with the ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner
41 annual reports and, if the ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner shall consider it
42 advisable, other periodic and special reports, setting forth such information
43 as to its affairs as the ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner may require.

44 **"§ 106-934. Powers of ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner.**

45 The ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner may:

- 46 (1) Examine at any time all books, contracts, records, documents and papers of
47 any such corporation.
- 48 (2) In his discretion prescribe uniform methods and forms of keeping accounts,
49 records and books to be observed by such corporation, and prescribe by
50 order accounts in which particular outlays and receipts are to be entered,
51 charged or credited. The ~~Secretary~~ Commissioner shall not, however, have
52 authority to require any revaluation of the real property or other fixed assets
53 of such corporations, but he shall allow proper charges for the depletion of
54 timber due to cutting or destruction.
- 55 (3) Enforce the provisions of this Article, a rule implementing this Article, or an
56 order issued under this Article by filing a petition for a writ of mandamus or
57 application for an injunction in the superior court of the county in which the
58 respondent corporation has its principal place of business. The final
59 judgment in any such proceeding shall either dismiss the proceeding or

1 direct that a writ of mandamus or an injunction, or both, issue as prayed for
2 in the petition or in such modified or other form as the court may determine
3 will afford appropriate relief.

4 **"§ 106-935. Provision for appeal by corporations to Governor.**

5 If any corporation organized under this Article is dissatisfied with or aggrieved at any rule
6 or order imposed upon it by the ~~Secretary, Commissioner,~~ or any valuation or appraisal of any
7 of its property made by the ~~Secretary, Commissioner,~~ or any failure of or refusal by the
8 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ to approve of or consent to any action which it can take only with
9 such approval or consent, it may appeal to the Governor by filing with him a claim of appeal
10 upon which the decision of the Governor shall be final. Such determination, if other than a
11 dismissal of the appeal, shall be set forth by the Governor in a written mandate to the
12 ~~Secretary, Commissioner,~~ who shall abide thereby and take such actions as the same may direct.

13 **"§ 106-936. Limitations as to dividends.**

14 The shares of stock of corporations organized under this Article shall have a par value and,
15 except as provided in ~~G.S. 113-69~~G.S. 106-938 in respect to distributions in kind upon
16 dissolution, no dividend shall be paid thereon at a rate in excess of six per centum (6%) per
17 annum on stock having a preference as to dividends, or eight per centum (8%) per annum on
18 stock not having a preference as to dividends, except that any such dividends may be
19 cumulative without interest.

20 **"§ 106-937. Issuance of securities restricted.**

21 No such corporation shall issue stock, bonds or other securities except for money,
22 timberlands, or interests therein, located in the State of North Carolina or other property,
23 actually received, or services rendered, for its use and its lawful purposes. Timberlands, or
24 interests therein, and other property or services so accepted therefor, shall be upon a valuation
25 approved by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner.~~

26 **"§ 106-938. Limitation on bounties to stockholders.**

27 Stockholders shall at no time receive or accept from any such corporation in repayment of
28 their investment in its stock any sums in excess of the par value of the stock together with
29 cumulative dividends at the rate set forth in ~~G.S. 113-67~~G.S. 106-936 except that nothing in
30 this section contained shall be construed to prohibit the distribution of the assets of such
31 corporation in kind to its stockholders upon dissolution thereof.

32 **"§ 106-939. Earnings above dividend requirements payable to State.**

33 Any earnings of such corporation in excess of the amounts necessary to pay dividends to
34 stockholders at the rate set forth in ~~G.S. 113-67~~G.S. 106-936 shall be paid over to the State of
35 North Carolina prior to the dissolution of such corporation. Net income or net losses
36 (determined in such manner as the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall consider properly to show
37 such income or losses) from the sale of the capital assets of such corporation, whether such sale
38 be upon dissolution or otherwise, shall be considered in determining the earnings of such
39 corporation for the purposes of this section. In determining such earnings unrealized
40 appreciation or depreciation of real estate or other fixed assets shall not be considered.

41 **"§ 106-940. Dissolution of corporation.**

42 Any such corporation may be dissolved at any time in the manner provided by and under
43 the provisions of the general corporation laws of the State of North Carolina, except that the
44 court shall dismiss any petition for dissolution of any such corporation filed within 20 years of
45 the date of its organization unless the same is accompanied by a certificate of the ~~Secretary~~
46 ~~Commissioner~~ consenting to such dissolution.

47 **"§ 106-941. Cutting and sale of timber.**

48 Any such corporation may cut and sell the timber on its land or permit the cutting thereof,
49 but all such cuttings shall be in accordance with the rules, restrictions and limitations imposed
50 by the ~~Secretary, Commissioner,~~ who shall impose such rules, restrictions and limitations with
51 respect thereto as may reasonably conform to the accepted custom and usage of good forestry
52 and forest economy, taking into consideration the situation, nature and condition of the tract so
53 cut or to be cut, and the financial needs of such corporation from time to time.

54 **"§ 106-942. Corporation may not sell or convey without consent of
55 ~~Secretary, Commissioner,~~ or pay higher interest rate than 6%.**

56 No such corporation ~~shall~~ shall do any of the following:

- 57 (1) Sell, assign or convey any real property owned by it or any right, title or
58 interest therein, except upon notice to the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ of the
59 terms of such sale, transfer or assignment, and unless the ~~Secretary~~

1 Commissioner shall consent thereto, and if the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall
2 require it, unless the purchaser thereof shall agree that such real estate shall
3 remain subject to the rules and supervision of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~
4 for such period as the latter may ~~require~~;require.

5 (2) Pay interest returns on its mortgage indebtedness at a higher rate than six per
6 centum (6%) per annum without the consent of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~.

7 (3) Mortgage any real property without first having obtained the consent of the
8 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~.

9 **"§ 106-943. Power to borrow money limited.**

10 Any such corporation formed under this Article may, subject to the approval of the
11 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, borrow funds and secure their payment thereof by note or notes and
12 mortgage or by the issue of bonds under a trust indenture. The notes or bonds so issued and
13 secured and the mortgage or trust indenture relating thereto may contain such clauses and
14 provisions as shall be approved by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, including the right to enter into
15 possession in case of default; but the operations of the mortgagee or receiver entering in such
16 event or of the purchaser of the property upon foreclosure shall be subject to the rules of the
17 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ for such period as the mortgage or trust indenture may specify.

18 **"§ 106-944. ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ to approve development of forests.**

19 No project for the protection and development of forests proposed by any such corporation
20 shall be undertaken without the approval of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, and such approval
21 shall not be given unless:

22 (1) The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall have received a statement duly executed
23 and acknowledged on behalf of the corporation proposing such project, in
24 such adequate detail as the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall require of the
25 activities to be included in the project, such statement to set forth the
26 proposals as to

- 27 a. Fire prevention and protection,
- 28 b. Protection against insects and tree diseases,
- 29 c. Protection against damage by livestock and game,
- 30 d. Means, methods and rate of, and restrictions upon, cutting and other
31 utilization of the forests, and
- 32 e. Planting and spacing of trees.

33 (2) There shall be submitted to the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ a financial plan
34 satisfactory to him setting forth in detail the amount of money needed to
35 carry out the entire project, and how such sums are to be allocated, with
36 adequate assurances to the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ as to where such funds
37 are to be secured.

38 (3) The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall be satisfied that the project gives
39 reasonable assurance of the operation of the forests involved on a
40 sustained-yield basis except insofar as the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall
41 consider the same impracticable.

42 (4) The corporation proposing such project shall agree that the project shall at
43 all times be subject to the supervision and inspection of the
44 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~, and that it will at all times comply with such rules
45 concerning the project as the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall from time to
46 time impose.

47 **"§ 106-945. Application of corporate income.**

48 The gross annual income of any such corporation, whether received from sales of timber,
49 timber operations, stumpage permits or other sources, shall be applied as follows: first, to the
50 payment of all fixed charges, and all operating and maintenance charges and expenses
51 including taxes, assessments, insurance, amortization charges in amounts approved by the
52 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ to amortize mortgage or other indebtedness and reserves essential to
53 operation; second, to surplus, and/or to the payment of dividends not exceeding the maximum
54 fixed by this Article; third, the balance, if any, in reduction of debts.

55 **"§ 106-946. Reorganization of corporations.**

56 Reorganization of corporations organized under this Article shall be subject to the
57 supervision of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ and no such reorganization shall be had without the
58 authorization of the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~."

"Forest Development Act.

"§ 106-955. Title.

This Article shall be known as the "Forest Development Act."

"§ 106-956. Statement of purpose.

(a) The General Assembly finds that:

- (1) It is in the public interest of the State to encourage the development of the State's forest resources and the protection and improvement of the forest environment.
- (2) Unfavorable environmental impacts, particularly the rapid loss of forest land to urban development, are occurring as a result of population growth. It is in the State's interest that corrective action be developed now to offset forest land losses in the future.
- (3) Regeneration of potentially productive forest land is a high-priority problem requiring prompt attention and action. Private forest land will become more important to meet the needs of the State's population.
- (4) Growing demands on forests and related land resources cannot be met by intensive management of public and industrial forest lands alone.

(b) The purpose of this Article is to direct the ~~Secretary-Commissioner of Agriculture~~ to implement a forest development program to:

- (1) Provide financial assistance to eligible landowners to increase the productivity of the privately owned forests of the State through the application of forest renewal practices and other practices that improve tree growth and overall forest health.
- (2) Insure that forest operations in the State are conducted in a manner designed to protect the soil, air, and water resources, including but not limited to streams, lakes and estuaries through actions of landowners on lands for which assistance is sought under provisions in this Article.
- (3) Implement a program of voluntary landowner participation through the use of a forest development fund to meet the above goals.

(c) It is the intent of the General Assembly that in implementing the program under this Article, the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ will cause it to be coordinated with other related programs in such a manner as to encourage the utilization of private agencies, firms and individuals furnishing services and materials needed in the application of practices included in the forest development program.

"§ 106-957. Definitions.

As used in this Article:

- (1) "Approved forest management plan" means the forest management plan submitted by the eligible landowner and approved by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~. Such plan shall include forest management practices to insure both maximum forest productivity and environmental protection of the lands to be treated under the management plan.
- (2) "Approved practices" mean those silvicultural practices approved by the Secretary for the purpose of commercially growing timber through the establishment of forest stands, of insuring the proper regeneration of forest stands to commercial production levels following the harvest of mature timber, or of insuring maximum growth potential of forest stands to commercial production levels. Such practices shall include those required to accomplish site preparation, natural and artificial forestation, noncommercial removal of residual stands for silvicultural purposes, cultivation of established young growth of desirable trees for silvicultural purposes, and improvement of immature forest stands for silvicultural purposes. In each case, approved practices will be determined by the needs of the individual forest stand. These practices shall include existing practices and such practices as are developed in the future to insure both maximum forest productivity and environmental protection.
- (2a) "Commissioner" means the Commissioner of Agriculture.
- (3) "Department" means the Department of ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~. Agriculture and Consumer Services.
- (3a) "Eligible land" means land owned by an eligible landowner.

- 1 (4) "Eligible landowner" means a private individual, group, association or
2 corporation owning land suitable for forestry purposes. Where forest land is
3 owned jointly by more than one individual, group, association or
4 corporation, as tenants in common, tenants by the entirety, or otherwise, the
5 joint owners shall be considered, for the purpose of this Article, as one
6 eligible landowner and entitled to receive cost-sharing payments as provided
7 herein only once during each fiscal year.
- 8 (5) Recodified as § 113A-178(3a).
- 9 (6) "Forest development assessment" means an assessment on primary forest
10 products from timber severed in North Carolina for the funding of the
11 provisions of this Article, as authorized by the General Assembly.
- 12 (7) "Forest development cost-sharing payment" means financial assistance to
13 partially cover the costs of implementing approved practices in such
14 amounts as the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall determine, subject to the
15 limitations of this Article.
- 16 (8) "Forest development fund" means the Forest Development Fund created by
17 ~~G.S. 113A-183-G.S. 106-963~~.
- 18 (8a) "Maintain" means to retain the reforested area as forestland for a 10-year
19 period and to comply with the provisions in the approved forest management
20 plan.
- 21 (9) ~~"Secretary" means the Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources.~~

22 **"§ 106-958. Powers and duties.**

- 23 (a) The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall have the powers and duties to administer the
24 provisions of this Article.
- 25 (b) The Department shall serve as the disbursing agency for funds to be expended from
26 and deposited to the credit of the Forest Development Fund.
- 27 (c) Subject to the limitations set forth in ~~G.S. 113A-183(d), G.S. 106-963(d)~~, the
28 ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ is authorized to employ administrative, clerical and field personnel to
29 support the program created by this Article and to compensate such employees from the Forest
30 Development Fund for services rendered in direct support of the program.
- 31 (d) The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ is authorized to purchase equipment for the
32 implementation of this program from the Forest Development Fund subject to the limitations of
33 ~~G.S. 113A-183(e), G.S. 106-963(e)~~. All equipment purchased with these funds will be assigned
34 to and used only for the forest development program, except for emergency use in forest fire
35 suppression and other activities relating to the protection of life or property. The Forest
36 Development Fund will be reimbursed from other program funds for equipment costs incurred
37 during such emergency use.

38 **"§ 106-959. Administration of cost sharing.**

39 The ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall have authority to administer the cost sharing provisions
40 of this Article, including but not limited to the following:

- 41 (1) Prescribe the manner and requirements of making application for cost
42 sharing funds.
- 43 (2) Identify those approved forestry practices as defined in
44 ~~G.S. 113A-178(2), G.S. 106-957(2)~~ which shall be approved for cost sharing
45 under the provisions of this Article.
- 46 (3) Review periodically the cost of forest development practices and establish
47 allowable ranges for cost sharing purposes for approved practices under
48 varying conditions throughout the State.
- 49 (4) Determine, prior to approving forest development cost sharing payments to
50 any landowner, that all proposed practices are appropriate and are
51 comparable in cost to the prevailing cost of those practices in the general
52 area in which the land is located. Should the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~
53 determine that the submitted cost of any practice is excessive, he shall
54 approve forest development cost sharing payments based upon an allowable
55 cost established under ~~G.S. 113A-180(3), G.S. 106-959(3)~~.
- 56 (5) Determine, prior to approving forest development cost sharing payments,
57 that an approved forest management plan as defined in
58 ~~G.S. 113A-178(1), G.S. 106-957(1)~~ for the eligible land has been filed with

1 the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ and that the landowner has indicated in writing
2 his intent to comply with the terms of such management plan.

3 (6) Determine, prior to approving forest development cost sharing payments,
4 that the approved practices for which payment is requested have been
5 completed in a satisfactory manner, conform to the approved forest
6 management plan submitted under ~~G.S. 113A-180(5)~~, G.S. 106-959(5), and
7 otherwise meet the requirements of this Article.

8 (7) Disburse from the Forest Development Fund to eligible landowners cost
9 sharing payments for satisfactory completion of practices provided for by
10 this Article and the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall, insofar as is practicable,
11 disburse the funds from the State's appropriation on a matching basis with
12 the funds generated by the Primary Forest Product Assessment.

13 **"§ 106-960. Cost-share agreements.**

14 (a) In order to receive forest development cost-share payments, an eligible landowner
15 shall enter into a written agreement with the Department describing the eligible land, setting
16 forth the approved practices implemented for the area and covered by the approved forest
17 management plan, and agreeing to maintain those practices for a 10-year period.

18 (b) In the absence of Vis major or Act of God or other factors beyond the landowner's
19 control, a landowner who fails to maintain the practice or practices for a 10-year period in
20 accordance with the agreement set forth in subsection (a) of this section shall repay to the Fund
21 all cost-sharing funds received for that area.

22 (c) If the landowner voluntarily relinquishes control or title to the land on which the
23 approved practices have been established, the landowner shall:

- 24 (1) Obtain a written statement, or a form approved by the Department, from the
25 new owner or transferee in which the new owner or transferee agrees to
26 maintain the approved practices for the remainder of the 10-year period; or
27 (2) Repay to the Fund all cost-sharing funds received for implementing the
28 approved practices on the land.

29 If a written statement is obtained from the new owner or transferee, the original landowner will
30 no longer be responsible for maintaining the approved practices or repaying the cost-sharing
31 funds. The responsibility for maintaining those practices for the remainder of the 10 years shall
32 devolve to the new owner or transferee.

33 **"§ 106-961. Limitation of payments.**

34 (a) An eligible landowner may receive forest development cost sharing payments for
35 satisfactory completion of approved practices as determined by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~,
36 except that the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ shall approve no assistance in an amount exceeding the
37 lesser of (i) a sum equal to sixty percent (60%) of the landowner's actual per acre cost incurred
38 in implementing the approved practice or (ii) a sum equal to sixty percent (60%) of the
39 prevailing per acre cost as determined by the ~~Secretary-Commissioner~~ under
40 ~~G.S. 113A-180(3)~~ G.S. 106-959(3) for implementing that approved practice.

41 (b) The maximum amount of forest development cost sharing funds allowed to any
42 landowner in one fiscal year will be the amount required to complete all approved practices on
43 100 acres of land at the prevailing cost sharing rate established under
44 ~~G.S. 113A-181(a)~~ G.S. 106-961(a).

45 (c) Eligible landowners may not use State cost sharing funds if funds from any federal
46 cost sharing program are used on the same acreage for forestry practices during the same fiscal
47 year.

48 **"§ 106-962. Participation by government political subdivisions.**

49 No governmental agency, federal, State or local, will be eligible for forest development
50 payments under the provision of this Article.

51 **"§ 106-963. Forest Development Fund.**

52 (a) The Forest Development Fund is created in the Department of ~~Environment and~~
53 ~~Natural Resources~~ as a special fund. Revenue in the Fund does not revert at the end of a fiscal
54 year, and interest and other investment income earned by the Fund accrues to it. The Fund is
55 created to provide revenue to implement this Article. The Fund consists of the following
56 revenue:

- 57 (1) Assessments on primary forest products collected under ~~Article 12 of~~
58 ~~Chapter 113A~~ Article 81 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes.
59 (2) General Fund appropriations.

1 (3) Gifts and grants made to the Fund.

2 (d) In any fiscal year, no more than five percent (5%) of the available funds generated
3 by the Primary Forest Product Processor Assessment Act may be used for program support
4 under the provisions of ~~G.S. 113A-179(e)~~. G.S. 106-958(c).

5 (e) Funds used for the purchase of equipment under the provisions of ~~G.S. 113A-179(d)~~
6 G.S. 106-958(d) shall be limited to appropriations from the General Fund to the Forest
7 Development Fund designated specifically for equipment purchase."

8 **SECTION 13.25.(ii)** Article 12 of Chapter 113A of the General Statutes
9 (G.S. 113A-189, 113A-190, 113A-191, 113A-192, 113A-193, 113A-194, 113A-195, and
10 113A-196) is recodified as a new Article 81 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes,
11 G.S. 106-965 through G.S. 106-972.

12 **SECTION 13.25.(jj)** Article 81 of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes, as
13 recodified by subsection (ii) of this section, reads as rewritten:

14 "Article 81.

15 "Primary Forest Product Assessment Act.

16 **"§ 106-965. Short title.**

17 This Article shall be known as the Primary Forest Product Assessment Act.

18 **"§ 106-966. Statement of purpose.**

19 (a) The purpose of this Article is to create an assessment on primary forest products
20 processed from North Carolina timber to provide a source of funds to finance the forestry
21 operations provided for in the Forest Development Act of 1977.

22 (b) All assessments levied under the provisions of this Article shall be used only for the
23 purposes specified in ~~G.S. 113A-193(e)~~ G.S. 106-969(c) and in the Forest Development
24 ~~Act Act, Article 11 of this Chapter.~~

25 **"§ 106-967. Definitions.**

26 The following words, terms and phrases hereinafter used for the purpose of this Article are
27 defined as follows:

28 (1) "Primary forest product" shall include those products of the tree after it is
29 severed from the stump and cut to its first roundwood product for further
30 conversion. These products include but are not limited to whole trees for
31 chipping, whole tree logs, sawlogs, pulpwood, veneer bolts, and posts, poles
32 and piling.

33 (2) "Processor" shall mean the individual, group, association, or corporation that
34 procures primary forest products at their initial point of concentration for
35 conversion to secondary products or for shipment to others for such
36 conversion.

37 (3) "Forest Development Fund" shall mean the special fund established by ~~the~~
38 ~~Forest Development Act of 1977.~~ G.S. 106-963.

39 (4) For the purpose of this Article, the following are not considered "primary
40 forest products":

41 a. Christmas trees and associated greens;

42 b. Material harvested from an individual's own land and used on said
43 land for the construction of fences, buildings or other personal use
44 developments;

45 c. Fuel wood harvested for personal use or use in individual homes.

46 **"§ 106-968. Operation of assessment system.**

47 (a) The General Assembly hereby levies an assessment on all primary forest products
48 harvested from lands within the State of North Carolina.

49 (b) This assessment shall be at the rates as established in
50 ~~G.S. 113A-194(b)~~ G.S. 106-970(b) and the proceeds of such assessment shall be deposited in
51 the Forest Development Fund.

52 **"§ 106-969. Duties.**

53 (a) The Secretary, Department of Revenue, shall:

54 (1) Develop the necessary administrative procedures to collect the assessment;

55 (2) Collect the assessment from the primary forest product processors;

56 (3) Deposit funds collected from the assessment in the Forest Development
57 Fund;

58 (4) Audit the records of processors to determine compliance with the provisions
59 of this Article.

1 (b) The ~~Secretary of Environment and Natural Resources~~ Commissioner of Agriculture
2 shall:

- 3 (1) Provide to the Secretary, Department of Revenue, lists of processors subject
4 to the assessment;
- 5 (2) Advise the Secretary, Department of Revenue, of the appropriate methods to
6 convert measurements of primary forest products by other systems to those
7 authorized in this Article;
- 8 (3) Establish in November prior to those sessions in which the General
9 Assembly considers the State budget, the estimated total assessment that will
10 be collectible in the next budget period and so inform the General Assembly;
- 11 (4) Within 30 days of certification of the State budget, notify the Secretary,
12 Department of Revenue, of the need to collect the assessment for those years
13 covered by the approved budget.
- 14 (5) By January 15 of each odd-numbered year, report to the General Assembly
15 on the number of acres reforested, type of owners assisted, geographic
16 distribution of funds, the amount of funds encumbered and other matters.
17 The report shall include the information by forestry district and statewide
18 and shall be for the two fiscal years prior to the date of the report.

19 (c) The Secretary of Revenue shall be reimbursed for those actual expenditures incurred
20 as a cost of collecting the assessment for the Forest Development Fund. This amount shall be
21 transferred from the Forest Development Fund in equal increments at the end of each quarter of
22 the fiscal year to the Department of Revenue. This amount shall not exceed five percent (5%)
23 of the total assessments collected on primary forest products during the preceding fiscal year.

24 **"§ 106-970. Assessment rates.**

25 (a) The assessment rates shall be based on the following standards:

- 26 (1) For primary forest products customarily measured in board feet, the
27 "International 1/4 Inch Log Rule" or equivalent will be used;
- 28 (2) For primary forest products customarily measured in cords, the standard
29 cord of 128 cubic feet or equivalent will be used;
- 30 (3) For any other type of forest product separated from the soil, the ~~Secretary of~~
31 ~~Environment and Natural Resources~~ Commissioner of Agriculture shall
32 determine a fair unit assessment rate, based on the cubic foot volume of one
33 thousand foot board measure, International 1/4 Inch Log Rule or one
34 standard cord, 128 cubic feet.

35 (b) The assessment levied on primary forest products shall be at the following rates:

- 36 (1) Fifty cents (50¢) per thousand board feet for softwood sawtimber, veneer
37 logs and bolts, and all other softwood products normally measured in board
38 feet;
- 39 (2) Forty cents (40¢) per thousand board feet for hardwood and bald cypress
40 sawtimber, veneer, and all other hardwood and bald cypress products
41 normally measured in board feet;
- 42 (3) Twenty cents (20¢) per cord for softwood pulpwood and other softwood
43 products normally measured in cords;
- 44 (4) Twelve cents (12¢) per cord for hardwood pulpwood and other hardwood
45 and bald cypress products normally measured in cords;
- 46 (5) All material harvested within North Carolina for shipment outside the State
47 for primary processing will be assessed at a percentage of the invoice value.
48 This percentage will be established to yield rates equal to those if the
49 material were processed within the State.

50 **"§ 106-971. Collection of assessment.**

51 (a) The assessment shall be levied against the processor of the primary forest product.

52 (b) The assessment shall be submitted on a quarterly basis of the State's fiscal year due
53 and payable the last day of the month following the end of each quarter.

54 (c) The assessment shall be remitted to the Secretary, Department of Revenue, by check
55 or money order, with such production reports as may be required by said Secretary.

56 (d) The processor shall maintain for a period of three fiscal years and make available to
57 the Secretary, Department of Revenue, such production records necessary to verify proper
58 reporting and payment of revenue due the Forest Development Fund.

1 (e) The production reports of the various processors shall be used only for assessment
2 purposes. Production information will not be made a part of the public record on an individual
3 processor basis.

4 (f) Any official or employee of the State who discloses information obtained from a
5 production report, except as may be necessary for administration and collection of the
6 assessment, or in the performance of official duties, or in administration or judicial proceedings
7 related to the levy or collection of the assessment, shall be guilty of a Class 3 misdemeanor
8 punishable only by a fine not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50.00).

9 **"§ 106-972. Enforcement of collection.**

10 The Secretary of Revenue shall enforce collection of the primary forest product assessment
11 in accordance with the remedies and procedures contained in Article 9 of Chapter 105 of the
12 General Statutes."

13 **SECTION 13.25.(kk)** G.S. 1-339.17(c1) reads as rewritten:

14 "(c1) When the public sale is a sale of timber by sealed bid, the notice shall also be given
15 in writing, not less than 21 days before the date on which bids are opened, to a reasonable
16 number of prospective timber buyers, which in all cases shall include the timber buyers listed in
17 the office of the Division of Forest Resources of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer
18 Services for the county or counties in which the timber to be sold is located."

19 **SECTION 13.25.(ll)** G.S. 20-81.12(b35) reads as rewritten:

20 "(b35) First in Forestry. – The Division must receive 300 or more applications for the First
21 in Forestry plate before the plate may be developed. The Division shall transfer quarterly
22 one-half of the money in the Collegiate and Cultural Attraction Plate Account derived from the
23 sale of the First in Forestry plates to the Division of Forest Resources of the Department of
24 Agriculture and Consumer Services for a State forests and forestry education program and shall
25 transfer quarterly one-half of the money in the Collegiate and Cultural Attraction Plate Account
26 derived from the sale of the First in Forestry plates to the Forest Education and Conservation
27 Foundation for their programs."

28 **SECTION 13.25.(mm)** G.S. 97-2(2) reads as rewritten:

29 "(2) Employee. – The term "employee" means every person engaged in an
30 employment under any appointment or contract of hire or apprenticeship,
31 express or implied, oral or written, including aliens, and also minors,
32 whether lawfully or unlawfully employed, but excluding persons whose
33 employment is both casual and not in the course of the trade, business,
34 profession, or occupation of his employer, and as relating to those so
35 employed by the State, the term "employee" shall include all officers and
36 employees of the State, including such as are elected by the people, or by the
37 General Assembly, or appointed by the Governor to serve on a per diem,
38 part-time or fee basis, either with or without the confirmation of the Senate;
39 as relating to municipal corporations and political subdivisions of the State,
40 the term "employee" shall include all officers and employees thereof,
41 including such as are elected by the people. The term "employee" shall
42 include members of the North Carolina National Guard while on State active
43 duty under orders of the Governor and members of the North Carolina State
44 Defense Militia while on State active duty under orders of the Governor. The
45 term "employee" shall include deputy sheriffs and all persons acting in the
46 capacity of deputy sheriffs, whether appointed by the sheriff or by the
47 governing body of the county and whether serving on a fee basis or on a
48 salary basis, or whether deputy sheriffs serving upon a full-time basis or a
49 part-time basis, and including deputy sheriffs appointed to serve in an
50 emergency, but as to those so appointed, only during the continuation of the
51 emergency. The sheriff shall furnish to the board of county commissioners a
52 complete list of all deputy sheriffs named or appointed by him immediately
53 after their appointment and notify the board of commissioners of any
54 changes made therein promptly after such changes are made. Any reference
55 to an employee who has been injured shall, when the employee is dead,
56 include also his legal representative, dependents, and other persons to whom
57 compensation may be payable: Provided, further, that any employee, as
58 herein defined, of a municipality, county, or of the State of North Carolina,
59 while engaged in the discharge of his official duty outside the jurisdictional

1 or territorial limits of the municipality, county, or the State of North Carolina
2 and while acting pursuant to authorization or instruction from any superior
3 officer, shall have the same rights under this Article as if such duty or
4 activity were performed within the territorial boundary limits of his
5 employer.

6 Every executive officer elected or appointed and empowered in
7 accordance with the charter and bylaws of a corporation shall be considered
8 as an employee of such corporation under this Article.

9 Any such executive officer of a corporation may, notwithstanding any
10 other provision of this Article, be exempt from the coverage of the
11 corporation's insurance contract by such corporation's specifically excluding
12 such executive officer in such contract of insurance, and the exclusion to
13 remove such executive officer from the coverage shall continue for the
14 period such contract of insurance is in effect, and during such period such
15 executive officers thus exempted from the coverage of the insurance contract
16 shall not be employees of such corporation under this Article.

17 All county agricultural extension service employees who do not receive
18 official federal appointments as employees of the United States Department
19 of Agriculture and who are field faculty members with professional rank as
20 designated in the memorandum of understanding between the North
21 Carolina Agricultural Extension Service, North Carolina State University, A
22 & T State University, and the boards of county commissioners shall be
23 deemed to be employees of the State of North Carolina. All other county
24 agricultural extension service employees paid from State or county funds
25 shall be deemed to be employees of the county board of commissioners in
26 the county in which the employee is employed for purposes of workers'
27 compensation.

28 The term "employee" shall also include members of the Civil Air Patrol
29 currently certified pursuant to G.S. 143B-491(a) when performing duties in
30 the course and scope of a State-approved mission pursuant to Article 11 of
31 Chapter 143B of the General Statutes.

32 "Employee" shall not include any person performing voluntary service as
33 a ski patrolman who receives no compensation for such services other than
34 meals or lodging or the use of ski tow or ski lift facilities or any combination
35 thereof.

36 Any sole proprietor or partner of a business or any member of a limited
37 liability company may elect to be included as an employee under the
38 workers' compensation coverage of such business if he is actively engaged in
39 the operation of the business and if the insurer is notified of his election to
40 be so included. Any such sole proprietor or partner or member of a limited
41 liability company shall, upon such election, be entitled to employee benefits
42 and be subject to employee responsibilities prescribed in this Article.

43 "Employee" shall include an authorized pickup firefighter of the Division
44 of Forest Resources of the Department of ~~Environment and Natural~~
45 ~~Resources~~ Agriculture and Consumer Services when that individual is
46 engaged in emergency fire suppression activities for the Division of Forest
47 Resources. As used in this section, "authorized pickup firefighter" means an
48 individual who has completed required fire suppression training as a
49 wildland firefighter and who is available as needed by the Division of Forest
50 Resources for emergency fire suppression activities, including immediate
51 dispatch to wildfires and standby for initial attack on fires during periods of
52 high fire danger.

53 It shall be a rebuttable presumption that the term "employee" shall not
54 include any person performing services in the sale of newspapers or
55 magazines to ultimate consumers under an arrangement whereby the
56 newspapers or magazines are to be sold by that person at a fixed price and
57 the person's compensation is based on the retention of the excess of the fixed
58 price over the amount at which the newspapers or magazines are charged to
59 the person."

50 **NORTH CAROLINA WINERIES & TOURISM/OPERATING COMMITTEES**

51 **SECTION 14.3A.(a)** There is established an operating committee for the Vinifera
 52 Group and an operating committee for the Muscadines Group. The purpose of the operating
 53 committees is to promote North Carolina wineries and tourism related to the wineries. Each
 54 operating committee shall consist of five members, who shall be appointed by the Secretary of
 55 Commerce to serve two-year terms, which shall be staggered. The members appointed shall be
 56 chosen from among individuals who have education or experience in the wine industry or in the
 57 field of tourism. No member of an operating committee may serve for more than two
 58 consecutive terms. Initial terms shall commence September 1, 2011.

1 **SECTION 14.3A.(b)** Each operating committee shall meet at least twice each
2 calendar year to discuss ways in which to promote and advertise North Carolina wineries and
3 ways in which to improve, use, and distribute State maps showing winery locations. The
4 Vinifera Group shall meet at the NC Shelton Badgett Viticulture Center at Surry Community
5 College, and the Muscadines Group shall meet at Duplin Community College.
6 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, committee members shall receive no salary, per
7 diem, subsistence, travel reimbursement, or other stipend or reimbursement as a result of
8 serving on their respective committees.

9 **SECTION 14.3A.(c)** Each operating committee shall elect from the membership of
10 the committee a chair and vice-chair. Vacancies resulting from the resignation of a member or
11 otherwise shall be filled in the same manner in which the original appointment was made, and
12 the term shall be for the balance of the unexpired term. A majority of the members of each
13 committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. The affirmative vote of a
14 majority of the members present at meetings of each committee shall be necessary for action to
15 be taken by the committee.

16 **EMPLOYMENT SECURITY COMMISSION FUNDS**

17 **SECTION 14.4.(a)** Funds from the Employment Security Commission Reserve

28 Commission offices.

32 which directs the Commission to employ the Common Follow-Up

35 **SECTION 14.4.(c)** There is appropriated from the Employment Security
36 Commission Reserve Fund to the Employment Security Commission of North Carolina an
37 amount not to exceed one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to fund
38 State initiatives not currently funded through federal grants.

39 **SECTION 14.4.(d)** There is appropriated from the Worker Training Trust Fund to
40 the Employment Security Commission of North Carolina the sum of one million dollars
41 (\$1,000,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to fund 'Opportunity NC,' which provides
42 work-based training opportunities to recipients of unemployment insurance benefits.
43 Opportunity NC must meet all of the following factors:

- 44 (1) The training, even though it includes actual operation of the facilities of the
45 employer, is similar to what would be given in a vocational school or
46 academic educational instruction.
- 47 (2) The training is for the benefit of the trainee.

19 **SECTION 14.6.(a)** The statutory authority, powers, duties, functions, records,
20 personnel, property, and unexpended balances of appropriations, allocations, or other funds of
21 the North Carolina State Ports Authority are transferred to the Department of Transportation
22 with all of the elements of a Type I transfer as defined by G.S. 143A-6. The North Carolina
23 State Ports Authority shall use the State's budgeting, accounting, and human resources systems
24 and shall comply with laws and policies related to submitting budget requests to the Office of
25 State Budget and Management.

 53 **STUDY COSTS OF SERVICES PROVIDED BY DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE TO**
 54 **AGENCIES IN THE DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE**

55 **SECTION 14.7.(a)** In consultation with the Fiscal Research Division, the
 56 Department of Commerce and the ABC Commission, State Banking Commission, Credit
 57 Union Division, Cemetery Commission, Utilities Commission, Utilities Commission Public
 58 Staff, and the Rural Electrification Authority shall study the following: (i) the types of services
 59 provided by the Department of Commerce to each of the agencies during each fiscal year; and

(ii) formulas or methods to be used to determine the costs of the services, including the advantages and disadvantages of each formula or method. The Department of Commerce and each of the agencies shall prepare a joint recommendation as to which formula or method to determine the costs of the services should be used. In addition, the Department of Commerce and each of the agencies shall develop a memorandum of understanding that details the services to be provided by the Department of Commerce during each fiscal year.

SECTION 14.7.(b) By May 1, 2012, the Department of Commerce shall report the results of the study, including formula or method recommendations, required under subsection (a) of this section, to the Senate Appropriations Committee on Natural and Economic Resources, the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Natural and Economic Resources, and the Fiscal Research Division. By May 1, 2012, the Department of Commerce shall also submit a copy of each memorandum of understanding required under subsection (a) of this section to the Fiscal Research Division.

INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION FEES/COMPUTER SYSTEM REPLACEMENT

SECTION 14.8. The North Carolina Industrial Commission may retain the additional revenue generated as a result of an increase in the fee charged to parties for the filing of compromised settlements. These funds shall be used for the purpose of replacing existing computer hardware and software used for the operations of the Commission. These funds may also be used to prepare any assessment of hardware and software needs prior to purchase and to develop and administer the needed databases and new Electronic Case Management System, including the establishment of two time-limited positions for application development and support and mainframe migration. The Commission may not retain any fees under this section unless they are in excess of the former two-hundred-dollar (\$200.00) fee charged by the Commission for filing a compromised settlement.

STATE-AID REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

SECTION 14.10.(a) The North Carolina Association of Community Development Corporations, North Carolina Institute of Minority Economic Development, Inc., FFA Foundation, Ag in the Classroom, Land Loss Prevention Project, North Carolina Minority Support Center, North Carolina Community Development Initiative, Inc., Councils of Government, e-NC Authority, High Point Market Authority, and Partnership for the Sounds, Inc., shall do the following:

- (1) By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as requested, report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Fiscal Research Division on prior State fiscal year program activities, objectives, and accomplishments and prior State fiscal year itemized expenditures and fund sources.
- (2) Provide to the Fiscal Research Division a copy of the organization's annual audited financial statement within 30 days of issuance of the statement.

SECTION 14.10.(b) Remaining allotments after September 1 shall not be released to any nonprofit organization that does not satisfy the reporting requirements provided in subsection (a) of this section.

SECTION 14.10.(c) No more than one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000) in State funds shall be used for the annual salary of any one employee of an entity named in subsection (a) of this section.

GRASSROOTS SCIENCE PROGRAM

SECTION 14.11.(a) The Grassroots Science Program within the Department of Environment and Natural Resources is transferred to the Department of Commerce.

SECTION 14.11.(b) Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Commerce for State Aid, the sum of two million eight hundred ninety-nine thousand eight hundred eighty-five dollars (\$2,899,885) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of two million eight hundred ninety-nine thousand eight hundred eighty-five dollars (\$2,899,885) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year is allocated as grants-in-aid for each fiscal year as follows:

SECTION 14.11.(c) No later than March 1, 2012, the Department of Commerce shall report to the Fiscal Research Division all of the following information for each museum that receives funds under this section:

- (1) The actual operating budget for the 2010-2011 fiscal year.
- (2) The proposed operating budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.
- (3) The total attendance at the museum during the 2011 calendar year.

SECTION 14.11.(d) No later than March 1, 2013, the Department of Commerce shall report to the Fiscal Research Division all of the following information for each museum that receives funds under this section:

- (1) The actual operating budget for the 2011-2012 fiscal year.
- (2) The proposed operating budget for the 2012-2013 fiscal year.
- (3) The total attendance at the museum during the 2012 calendar year.

SECTION 14.11.(e) As a condition for qualifying to receive funding under this section, all of the following documentation shall, no later than November 1 of each year of the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, be submitted for each museum under this section to the Department of Commerce for fiscal years ending between July 1, 2009, and June 30, 2010, and only those costs that are properly documented under this subsection are allowed by the Department in calculating the distribution of funds under this section:

- (1) Each museum under this section shall submit its IRS (Internal Revenue Service) Form 990 to show its annual operating expenses, its annual report, and a reconciliation that explains any differences between expenses as shown on the IRS Form 990 and the annual report.

2 Form 990 to show its reported expenses for the museum, its annual report,
3 and a reconciliation that explains any differences between expenses as

6 which case, it shall submit either an IRS Form 990 or an annual report.

10 includes documentation of the name, address, title, and telephone number of

29 **WAKE FOREST INSTITUTE FOR REGENERATIVE MEDICINE/ PROFIT** 30 **SHARING WITH STATE**

31 **SECTION 14.12.(a)** Prior to receiving any General Fund disbursements for the
32 2011-2013 biennium, the Wake Forest Institute for Regenerative Medicine (hereinafter
33 "Institute") must enter into a memorandum of understanding with the Office of the Attorney
34 General in which the Institute commits to do all of the following:

- 35 (1) Work with the Office of the Attorney General to craft a legal agreement that
36 specifies the manner in which any profits from investments made with State
37 funds shall be shared with the State. Included in the agreement shall be
38 language which provides that (i) the Institute will give the State an equitable
39 share of any revenues received from patents, royalties, licensing agreements,
40 or other ancillary revenues which might be generated and (ii) the Institute
41 shall return to the State all of the funds provided by the State to the Institute
42 within a reasonable period of time. For purposes of this section, the terms
43 "equitable share" and "reasonable period of time" shall be as determined by
44 the Office of the Attorney General and the Institute.
- 45 (2) Negotiate the terms of the legal agreement in good faith.
- 46 (3) Submit the proposed legal agreement to the Joint Legislative Commission on
47 Governmental Operations for review by January 15, 2012.
- 48 (4) Execute the legal agreement no later than 30 days after it is presented to the
49 Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations.

50 **SECTION 14.12.(b)** If the Institute fails to execute the legal agreement as
51 provided in subdivision (a)(4) of this section, all disbursements to the Institute shall be
52 suspended until the legal agreement has been executed.

53 **SECTION 14.12.(c)** The Office of the Attorney General shall consult with the
54 Fiscal Research Division in crafting the memorandum of understanding and the legal
55 agreement described in subsection (a) of this section.

56 **SECTION 14.12.(d)** The Institute shall submit a copy of the memorandum of
57 understanding described in subsection (a) of this section to the Fiscal Research Division and the
58 Department of Commerce prior to receiving any General Fund disbursements for the

1 2011-2013 biennium and shall submit a copy of the proposed legal agreement described in
2 subsection (a) of this section to the Fiscal Research Division by January 15, 2012.

3 **SECTION 14.12.(e)** The Institute shall comply with the following reporting
4 requirements:

5 (1) By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as requested, report to the
6 Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Fiscal
7 Research Division on prior State fiscal year program activities, objectives,
8 and accomplishments and prior State fiscal year itemized expenditures and
9 fund sources.

10 (2) Provide to the Fiscal Research Division a copy of the Institute's annual
11 audited financial statement within 30 days of issuance of the statement.

12 **SECTION 14.12.(f)** Remaining allotments after September 1 shall not be released
13 to the Institute if it does not satisfy the reporting requirements provided in subsection (e) of this
14 section.

15 **SECTION 14.12.(g)** No more than one hundred twenty thousand dollars
16 (\$120,000) in State funds shall be used for the annual salary of any one employee of the
17 Institute.

18 19 **COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENT FUNDS**

20 **SECTION 14.12A.(a)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
21 Commerce, the sum of three hundred forty-three thousand one hundred eighty-seven dollars
22 (\$343,187) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year and the sum of two hundred forty-three thousand one
23 hundred eighty-seven dollars (\$243,187) for the 2012-2013 fiscal year shall be used only as
24 provided by this section. Each regional council of government or lead regional organization is
25 allocated up to twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) for the 2011-2012 and the 2012-2013
26 fiscal years.

27 **SECTION 14.12A.(b)** A regional council of government may use funds allocated
28 to it by this section only to assist local governments in grant applications, economic
29 development, community development, support of local industrial development activities, and
30 other activities as deemed appropriate by the member governments.

31 **SECTION 14.12A.(c)** Funds allocated by this section shall be paid by electronic
32 transfer in two equal installments each fiscal year. Upon receipt of the report required by
33 subsection (e) of this section, the first installment shall be paid no later than September 15 of
34 each year.

35 **SECTION 14.12A.(d)** Funds allocated by this section shall not be used for
36 payment of dues or assessments by the member governments and shall not supplant funds
37 appropriated by the member governments.

38 **SECTION 14.12A.(e)** By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as
39 requested, each council of government or lead regional organization shall report to the Joint
40 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Fiscal Research Division of the
41 General Assembly on prior State fiscal year program activities, objectives, and
42 accomplishments and prior State fiscal year itemized expenditures and fund sources. Each
43 council of government or lead regional organization shall provide to the Fiscal Research
44 Division of the General Assembly a copy of the organization's annual audited financial
45 statement within 30 days of issuance of the statement.

46 47 **REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMISSIONS ALLOCATIONS**

48 **SECTION 14.13.(a)** Funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
49 Commerce for regional economic development commissions shall be allocated to the following
50 commissions in accordance with subsection (b) of this section: Western North Carolina
51 Regional Economic Development Commission, Research Triangle Regional Partnership,
52 Southeastern North Carolina Regional Economic Development Commission, Piedmont Triad
53 Partnership, Northeastern North Carolina Regional Economic Development Commission,
54 North Carolina's Eastern Region Economic Development Partnership, and Carolinas
55 Partnership, Inc.

56 **SECTION 14.13.(b)** Funds appropriated pursuant to subsection (a) of this section
57 shall be allocated to each regional economic development commission as follows:

58 (1) First, the Department shall establish each commission's allocation by
59 determining the sum of allocations to each county that is a member of that

commission. Each county's allocation shall be determined by dividing the county's development factor by the sum of the development factors for eligible counties and multiplying the resulting percentage by the amount of the appropriation. As used in this subdivision, the term "development factor" means a county's development factor as calculated under G.S. 143B-437.08; and

(2) Next, the Department shall subtract from funds allocated to the North Carolina's Eastern Region Economic Development Partnership the sum of one hundred seventy-four thousand eight hundred ninety dollars (\$174,890) in the 2011-2012 fiscal year, which sum represents (i) the total interest earnings in the prior fiscal year on the estimated balance of the seven million five hundred thousand dollars (\$7,500,000) appropriated to the Global TransPark Development Zone in Section 6 of Chapter 561 of the 1993 Session Laws and (ii) the total interest earnings in the prior fiscal year on loans made from the seven million five hundred thousand dollars (\$7,500,000) appropriated to the Global TransPark Development Zone in Section 6 of Chapter 561 of the 1993 Session Laws; and

(3) Next, the Department shall redistribute the sum of one hundred seventy-four thousand eight hundred ninety dollars (\$174,890) in the 2011-2012 fiscal year to the seven regional economic development commissions named in subsection (a) of this section. Each commission's share of this redistribution shall be determined according to the development factor formula set out in subdivision (1) of this subsection. This redistribution shall be in addition to each commission's allocation determined under subdivision (1) of this subsection.

SECTION 14.13.(c) No more than one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000) in State funds shall be used for the annual salary of any one employee of a regional economic development commission.

SECTION 14.13.(d) The General Assembly finds that successful economic development requires the collaboration of the State, regions of the State, counties, and municipalities. Therefore, the regional economic development commissions are encouraged to seek supplemental funding from their county and municipal partners to continue and enhance their efforts to attract and retain business in the State.

31 **SECTION 14.17.(a)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the North Carolina
32 Rural Economic Development Center, Inc. (Rural Center), the sum of sixteen million five
33 hundred five thousand seven hundred fifty-eight dollars (\$16,505,758) for each year in the
34 2011-2013 biennium shall be allocated as follows:

- 36 (1) To continue the North Carolina Infrastructure Program. The purpose of the
37 Program is to provide grants to local governments to construct critical water
38 and wastewater facilities and to provide other infrastructure needs, including

11 **SECTION 14.18.(a)** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the North Carolina
12 Rural Economic Development Center, Inc. (Rural Center), the sum of two hundred
13 eighty-seven thousand two hundred eighty dollars (\$287,280) for each year in the 2011-2013
14 biennium shall be equally distributed among the certified Opportunities Industrialization
15 Centers (OI Centers).

16 **SECTION 14.18.(b)** By September 1 of each year, and more frequently as
17 requested, the Rural Center shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
18 Operations and the Fiscal Research Division on OI Centers receiving funds pursuant to
19 subsection (a) of this section. The report shall include data for each OI Center on all itemized
20 expenditures and all fund sources for the prior State fiscal year. The report shall also contain a
21 written narrative on prior fiscal year program activities, objectives, and accomplishments that
22 were funded with funds appropriated in subsection (a) of this section.

23 **SECTION 14.18.(c)** The Rural Center shall ensure that each OI Center complies
24 with the audit and reporting requirements prescribed by G.S. 143C-6-23 and Section 09 North
25 Carolina Administrative Code 03M .0101.

26 **SECTION 14.18.(d)** No funds appropriated under this act shall be released to an
27 OI Center listed in subsection (a) of this section if the OI Center has any overdue tax debts, as
28 that term is defined in G.S. 105-243.1, at the federal or State level.
29

30 **PART XV. JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT**

31 **GRANT FUNDS**

32 **SECTION 15.1.** Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-9, the Administrative Office of the
33 Courts may use up to the sum of one million five hundred thousand dollars (\$1,500,000) from
34 funds available to the Department to provide the State match needed in order to receive grant
35 funds. Prior to using funds for this purpose, the Department shall report to the Chairs of the
36 House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public
37 Safety and to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the grants to
38 be matched using these funds.
39
40

41 **TRANSFER OF EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLY FUNDS**

42 **SECTION 15.2.** Funds appropriated to the Judicial Department in the 2011-2013
43 fiscal biennium for equipment and supplies shall be certified in a reserve account. The
44 Administrative Office of the Courts may transfer these funds to the appropriate programs and
45 between programs as the equipment priorities and supply consumptions occur during the
46 operating year. These funds shall not be expended for any other purpose.

48 **REIMBURSEMENT FOR USE OF PERSONAL VEHICLES**

49 **SECTION 15.3.** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 138-6(a)(1), the Judicial
50 Department, during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, may elect to establish a per-mile
51 reimbursement rate for transportation by privately owned vehicles at a rate less than the
52 business standard mileage rate set by the Internal Revenue Service.

54 **COLLECTION OF WORTHLESS CHECK FUNDS**

55 **SECTION 15.4.** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 7A-308(c), the Judicial
56 Department may use any balance remaining in the Collection of Worthless Checks Fund on
57 June 30, 2011, for the purchase or repair of office or information technology equipment during
58 the 2011-2012 fiscal year. Prior to using any funds under this section, the Judicial Department
59 shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations and the Chairs of

1 the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public
2 Safety on the equipment to be purchased or repaired and the reasons for the purchases.

4 **DISPUTE RESOLUTION FEES**

5 **SECTION 15.5.** G.S. 7A-38.2(d) reads as rewritten:

6 "(d) An administrative fee, not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00), may be charged
7 by the Administrative Office of the Courts to applicants for certification and annual renewal of
8 certification for mediators and mediation training programs operating under this Article. The
9 fees collected may be used by the Director of the Administrative Office of the Courts to
10 establish and maintain the operations of the Commission and its staff. Notwithstanding the
11 provisions of G.S. 143C-1-2(b), certification and renewal fees collected by the Dispute
12 Resolution Commission are nonreverting and are only to be used at the direction of the
13 Commission."

15 **WORKLOAD FORMULA FOR SUPERIOR COURT JUDGES/MINUTES** 16 **MAINTAINED BY THE CLERK OF SUPERIOR COURT TO RECORD** 17 **CONVENING AND ADJOURNMENT OR RECESS OF COURT**

18 **SECTION 15.6.(a)** The Administrative Office of the Courts shall use funds
19 available to contract with the National Center for State Courts to develop a workload formula
20 for superior court judges. The results of this formula shall be submitted to the House of
21 Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety by
22 December 1, 2011.

23 **SECTION 15.6.(b)** G.S. 7A-109 is amended by adding a new section to read:

24 "(a1) The minutes maintained by the clerk pursuant to this subsection shall record the date
25 and time of each convening of court, as well as the date and time of each recess or adjournment
26 of court with no further business before the court."

27 **SECTION 15.6.(c)** The Administrative Office of the Courts shall provide on a
28 monthly basis the records of the dates and times of convening, recess, and adjournment of court
29 collected by each clerk of superior court pursuant to G.S. 7A-109, as enacted by subsection (b)
30 of this section, to the National Center for State Courts, the Fiscal Research Division, and the
31 Study Committee on Consolidation of Judicial and Prosecutorial Districts created in Section
32 15.11 of this act.

34 **STUDY FEASIBILITY OF OFFICE OF PROSECUTORIAL SERVICES**

35 **SECTION 15.7.(a)** The School of Government at the University of North Carolina
36 at Chapel Hill shall study the feasibility and cost of creating an Office of Prosecutorial Services
37 within the judicial branch. The study shall compare North Carolina's judicial branch structure
38 to that of other states in terms of organizational placement of prosecutorial and defense services
39 within the context of the unified court system and shall also determine the necessary resources
40 and costs required to make an Office of Prosecutorial Services viable as an independent agency
41 under the judicial branch. The School of Government shall submit the report by April 1, 2012,
42 to the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and
43 Public Safety.

44 **SECTION 15.7.(b)** The Conference of District Attorneys may use funds available
45 during the 2011-2012 fiscal year to contract for fiscal management and analysis services to
46 analyze the differences between budgeted and actual position and associated costs in
47 prosecutors' offices.

49 **ENSURE MINIMUM NUMBER OF CLERK OF COURT STAFF**

50 **SECTION 15.8.** G.S. 7A-102(a) reads as rewritten:

51 "(a) The numbers and salaries of assistant clerks, deputy clerks, and other employees in
52 the office of each clerk of superior court shall be determined by the Administrative Officer of
53 the Courts after consultation with the clerk concerned. However, no office of clerk of superior
54 court shall have fewer than five total staff positions in addition to the elected clerk of superior
55 court. All personnel in the clerk's office are employees of the State. The clerk appoints the
56 assistants, deputies, and other employees in the clerk's office to serve at his or her pleasure.
57 Assistant and deputy clerks shall take the oath of office prescribed for clerks of superior court,
58 conformed to the office of assistant or deputy clerk, as the case may be. Except as provided by
59 subsection (c2) of this section, the job classifications and related salaries of each employee

1 within the office of each superior court clerk shall be subject to the approval of the
2 Administrative Officer of the Courts after consultation with each clerk concerned and shall be
3 subject to the availability of funds appropriated for that purpose by the General Assembly."
4

5 **STUDY INFRACTIONS AND WAIVABLE OFFENSES**

6 **SECTION 15.9.** The Revenue Laws Study Committee shall study the penalties and
7 fines for infractions and waivable offenses and determine whether the current amounts are at a
8 level appropriate for the associated offenses. The Committee shall report its findings, together
9 with any recommended legislation, to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly
10 upon its convening.
11

12 **WAIVER OF CRIMINAL COURT COSTS ONLY WHEN JUDGE MAKES FINDING** 13 **OF JUST CAUSE TO GRANT WAIVER**

14 **SECTION 15.10.(a)** G.S. 7A-304(a) reads as rewritten:

15 "(a) In every criminal case in the superior or district court, wherein the defendant is
16 convicted, or enters a plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or when costs are assessed against the
17 prosecuting witness, the following costs shall be assessed and collected, ~~except that when the~~
18 ~~judgment imposes an active prison sentence, costs shall be assessed and collected only when~~
19 ~~the judgment specifically so provides, and that no~~ collected. No costs may be assessed when a
20 case is dismissed. Costs under this section may not be waived unless the judge makes a written
21 finding of just cause to grant such a waiver.
22

22"

23 **SECTION 15.10.(b)** The Administrative Office of the Courts shall make the
24 necessary modifications to its information systems to maintain records of all cases in which the
25 judge makes a finding of just cause to grant a waiver of criminal court costs under
26 G.S. 7A-304(a) and shall report on those waivers to the Joint Legislative Commission on
27 Governmental Operations by October 1 of each year.
28

29 **STUDY CONSOLIDATION OF JUDICIAL AND PROSECUTORIAL DISTRICTS**

30 **SECTION 15.11.(a)** Creation. – There is created the Study Committee on
31 Consolidation of Judicial and Prosecutorial Districts. The Committee shall consist of 10
32 members to be appointed as follows:

- 33 (1) Four members of the House of Representatives appointed by the Speaker of
34 the House of Representatives.
- 35 (2) Four members of the Senate appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the
36 Senate.
- 37 (3) Two members who are knowledgeable about the operations of district
38 attorneys' offices, one appointed by the Speaker of the House of
39 Representatives and one appointed by the President Pro Tempore of the
40 Senate.

41 The Speaker of the House of Representatives shall designate one representative as
42 cochair, and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate shall designate one senator as cochair.
43 Vacancies on the Committee shall be filled by the same appointing authority making the initial
44 appointment.

45 The Committee, while in the discharge of its official duties, may exercise all powers
46 provided for under G.S. 120-19 and G.S. 120-19.1 through G.S. 120-19.4. The Committee may
47 meet at any time upon the joint call of the cochairs. The Committee may meet in the Legislative
48 Building or the Legislative Office Building.

49 The Legislative Services Commission, through the Legislative Services Officer,
50 shall assign professional staff to assist the Committee in its work. The House of
51 Representatives and the Senate's Directors of Legislative Assistants shall assign clerical staff to
52 the Committee, and the expenses relating to the clerical employees shall be borne by the
53 Committee. Members of the Committee shall receive subsistence and travel expenses at the
54 rates set forth in G.S. 120-3.1, 138-5, or 138-6, as appropriate.

55 **SECTION 15.11.(b)** Duties. – The Committee shall study the number and structure
56 of judicial and prosecutorial districts in the State and shall make recommendations to reduce
57 those districts by consolidation to increase efficiency and improve the quality of justice. Those
58 recommendations shall, to the extent deemed feasible by the Committee, provide for judicial
59 and prosecutorial district plans that are identical.

1 **SECTION 15.11.(c)** Report. – The Committee may make a final report, including
 2 any proposed legislation, to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly upon its
 3 convening. The Committee shall terminate upon filing its final report or upon the convening of
 4 the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011 General Assembly, whichever is earlier.
 5

6 **STATEWIDE ADMINISTRATIVE COURT SESSIONS**

7 **SECTION 15.11A.** The Administrative Office of the Courts shall develop
 8 protocols to offer regular Administrative Court sessions in each district court district in the
 9 State for the purpose of hearing Chapter 20 infractions. Each district shall offer Administrative
 10 Court regularly by October 1, 2011. The Administrative Office of the Courts shall report to the
 11 Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the scheduling and deployment
 12 of resources by February 1, 2012.
 13

14 **OFFICE OF INDIGENT DEFENSE SERVICES EXPANSION FUNDS/EXPANSION OF**
 15 **PUBLIC DEFENDER OFFICES/STATEWIDE PUBLIC DEFENDER OFFICES**

16 **SECTION 15.16.(a)** The Judicial Department, Office of Indigent Defense
 17 Services, may use up to the sum of two million one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$2,150,000)
 18 in appropriated funds during the 2011-2012 fiscal year for the expansion of existing offices
 19 currently providing legal services to the indigent population under the oversight of the Office of
 20 Indigent Defense Services, for the creation of new public defender offices within existing
 21 public defender programs, or for the establishment of regional public defender programs.
 22 Notwithstanding the defender districts established by G.S. 7A-498.7, the Office of Indigent
 23 Defense Services may use a portion of these funds to create positions within existing public
 24 defender programs to handle cases in adjacent counties or districts. These funds may be used to
 25 create up to 50 new attorney positions and 25 new support staff positions during the 2011-2012
 26 fiscal year and for the salaries, benefits, equipment, and related expenses for these positions in
 27 both years of the biennium. Positions creation will be staggered across the two years of the
 28 biennium. Prior to using funds for this purpose, the Office of Indigent Defense Services shall
 29 report to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and the Senate Appropriations
 30 Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety on the proposed expansion.
 31

31 **SECTION 15.16.(b)** G.S. 7A-498.7(b) reads as rewritten:

32 "(b) For each new term, and to fill any vacancy, public defenders shall be appointed
 33 from a list of not less than two and not more than three names nominated by written ballot of
 34 the attorneys resident in the defender district who are licensed to practice law in North
 35 Carolina. The balloting shall be conducted pursuant to rules adopted by the Commission on

The Office of Indigent Defense Services shall establish positions necessary to staff public defender offices using funds available in the Indigent Persons' Attorney Fee Fund."

SECTION 15.16.(d) Subsection (c) of this section becomes effective July 1, 2012. The remainder of this section becomes effective July 1, 2011.

OFFICE OF INDIGENT DEFENSE SERVICES REPORT

SECTION 15.17. The Office of Indigent Defense Services shall report to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees and the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety by March 1 of each year on:

- (1) The volume and cost of cases handled in each district by assigned counsel or public defenders;
- (2) Actions taken by the Office to improve the cost-effectiveness and quality of indigent defense, including the capital case program;
- (3) Plans for changes in rules, standards, or regulations in the upcoming year; and
- (4) Any recommended changes in law or funding procedures that would assist the Office in improving the management of funds expended for indigent defense services, including any recommendations concerning the feasibility and desirability of establishing regional public defender offices.

AUDIT OF FARMWORKER LEGAL AID PROGRAM

SECTION 15.18. The State Auditor shall conduct a financial audit of the Farmworker Legal Aid program of Legal Aid of North Carolina. The audit shall include assessments of compliance with all State and federal mandates regarding use of funds under the Access to Civil Justice Act and shall assess whether State and federal funds are commingled in the administration and operation of this legal aid program. The State Auditor shall publish this audit not later than October 1, 2011.

PART XVI. DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE

USE OF SEIZED AND FORFEITED PROPERTY TRANSFERRED TO STATE LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT

SECTION 16.1.(a) Assets transferred to the Departments of Justice, Correction, and Crime Control and Public Safety during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium pursuant to applicable federal law shall be credited to the budgets of the respective departments and shall result in an increase of law enforcement resources for those departments. The Departments of Justice, Correction, and Crime Control and Public Safety shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations upon receipt of the assets and, before using the assets, shall report on the intended use of the assets and the departmental priorities on which the assets may be expended.

SECTION 16.1.(b) The General Assembly finds that the use of assets transferred pursuant to federal law for new personnel positions, new projects, acquisition of real property, repair of buildings where the repair includes structural change, and construction of or additions to buildings may result in additional expenses for the State in future fiscal periods. Therefore, the Department of Justice, the Department of Correction, and the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety are prohibited from using these assets for such purposes without the prior approval of the General Assembly.

SECTION 16.1.(c) Nothing in this section prohibits North Carolina law enforcement agencies from receiving funds from the United States Department of Justice, the United States Department of the Treasury, and the United States Department of Health and Human Services.

PURCHASE OF TIME MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE

SECTION 16.2. The Department of Justice shall use funds available to purchase, or purchase licenses for, time management software to be used to ensure adequate record

1 keeping and management of Department attorneys' time. The software shall be of a quality and
2 type generally used by attorneys in the private sector.
3

4 **PRIVATE PROTECTIVE SERVICES AND ALARM SYSTEMS LICENSING BOARDS** 5 **PAY FOR USE OF STATE FACILITIES AND SERVICES**

6 **SECTION 16.3.(a)** G.S. 74C-4 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

7 "(h) The Board shall pay the appropriate State agency for the use of physical facilities
8 and services provided to it by the State."

9 **SECTION 16.3.(b)** G.S. 74D-4 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

10 "(h) The Board shall pay the appropriate State agency for the use of physical facilities
11 and services provided to it by the State."
12

13 **CERTAIN LITIGATION EXPENSES TO BE PAID BY CLIENTS**

14 **SECTION 16.4.** G.S. 114-8.2 reads as rewritten:

15 **"§ 114-8.2. Charges for legal services.**

16 The Department of Justice shall charge State boards and commissions that are totally
17 supported by receipts from fees or surcharges for legal services rendered by the Department to
18 the board or commission. Client State departments, agencies, boards, and commissions shall
19 reimburse the Department of Justice for reasonable court fees, attorney travel and subsistence
20 costs, and other costs directly related to litigation in which the Department of Justice is
21 representing the department, agency, or board.
22

23 **HIRING OF SWORN STAFF POSITIONS FOR THE STATE BUREAU OF** 24 **INVESTIGATION**

25 **SECTION 16.5.** The Department of Justice may hire sworn personnel to fill vacant
26 positions in the State Bureau of Investigation only in the following circumstances: (i) the
27 position's regular responsibilities involve warrant executions, property searches, criminal
28 investigations, or arrest activities that are consistent in frequency with the responsibilities of
29 other sworn agents; (ii) the position is a promotion for a sworn agent who was employed at the
30 State Bureau of Investigation prior to July 1, 2007; (iii) the position is a forensic drug chemist
31 position which requires "responding to clandestine methamphetamine laboratories" as a
32 primary duty; (iv) the position is a forensic impressions analyst position which requires
33 "responding to clandestine methamphetamine laboratories" as a primary duty; or (v) the
34 position primarily involves supervising sworn personnel.
35

36 **PART XVII. DEPARTMENT OF JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY** 37 **PREVENTION**

38 **STATE FUNDS MAY BE USED AS FEDERAL MATCHING FUNDS**

39 **SECTION 17.1.** Funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Juvenile
40 Justice and Delinquency Prevention for the 2011-2012 fiscal year may be used as matching
41 funds for the Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grants. If North Carolina receives
42 Juvenile Accountability Incentive Block Grants or a notice of funds to be awarded, the Office
43 of State Budget and Management and the Governor's Crime Commission shall consult with the
44 Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention regarding the criteria for awarding
45 federal funds. The Office of State Budget and Management, the Governor's Crime
46 Commission, and the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention shall report
47 to the Appropriations Committees of the Senate and House of Representatives and the Joint
48 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to allocation of the federal funds.
49 The report shall identify the amount of funds to be received for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the
50 amount of funds anticipated for the 2012-2013 fiscal year, and the allocation of funds by
51 program and purpose.
52
53

54 **ANNUAL EVALUATION OF COMMUNITY PROGRAMS**

55 **SECTION 17.2.** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
56 shall conduct an evaluation of the wilderness camp programs and of multipurpose group
57 homes.

58 In conducting the evaluation of each of these programs, the Department shall
59 consider whether participation in each program results in a reduction of court involvement

1 among juveniles. The Department also shall identify whether the programs are achieving the
2 goals and objectives of the Juvenile Justice Reform Act, S.L. 1998-202. The Department shall
3 report the results of the evaluation to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and
4 Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee, the chairs of the Senate and House of Representatives
5 Appropriations Committees and the chairs of the Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety
6 of the Senate and House of Representatives Appropriations Committees by March 1 of each
7 year.

8
9 **ALLOCATE REALIZED SAVINGS OF WILDERNESS CAMPS TO FUND CERTAIN**
10 **LEVEL 2 INTERMEDIATE DISPOSITIONAL ALTERNATIVES FOR JUVENILES**

11 **SECTION 17.3.(a)** If any funds appropriated by this act to the Department of
12 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium for wilderness
13 camps are not required for or expended for wilderness camps, then those funds shall be
14 allocated to the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council grants fund to be used for the Level 2
15 intermediate dispositional alternatives for juveniles listed in G.S. 7B-2506(13) through (23).

16 **SECTION 17.3.(b)** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency
17 Prevention shall submit an electronic report by October 1, 2011, on all expenditures made from
18 the miscellaneous contract line in Fund Code 1310 to the House of Representatives and Senate
19 Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety and the Fiscal Research Division
20 of the General Assembly. The report shall include all of the following: an itemized list of the
21 contracts that have been executed, the amount of each contract, the date the contract was
22 executed, the purpose of the contract, the number of juveniles that will be served and the
23 manner in which they will be served, the amount of money transferred to the Juvenile Crime
24 Prevention Council fund, and an itemized list of grants allocated from the funds transferred to
25 the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council fund.

26
27 **JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION COUNCIL FUNDS**

28 **SECTION 17.4.(a)** On or before October 1 of each year, the Department of
29 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention shall submit to the Joint Legislative Commission
30 on Governmental Operations and the Appropriations Committees of the Senate and House of
31 Representatives a list of the recipients of the grants awarded, or preapproved for award, from
32 funds appropriated to the Department for local Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC)
33 grants, including the following:

- 34 (1) The amount of the grant awarded.
- 35 (2) The membership of the local committee or council administering the award
36 funds on the local level.
- 37 (3) The type of program funded.
- 38 (4) A short description of the local services, programs, or projects that will
39 receive funds.
- 40 (5) Identification of any programs that received grant funds at one time but for
41 which funding has been eliminated by the Department.
- 42 (6) The number of at-risk, diverted, and adjudicated juveniles served by each
43 county.
- 44 (7) The Department's actions to ensure that county JCPCs prioritize funding for
45 dispositions of intermediate and community-level sanctions for
46 court-adjudicated juveniles under minimum standards adopted by the
47 Department.
- 48 (8) The total cost for each funded program, including the cost per juvenile and
49 the essential elements of the program.

50 An electronic copy of the list and other information regarding the projects shall also
51 be sent to the Fiscal Research Division of the General Assembly.

52 **SECTION 17.4.(b)** Of the funds appropriated by this act for the 2011-2012 fiscal
53 year to the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for Juvenile Crime
54 Prevention Council grants, the sum of one hundred twenty-one thousand six hundred dollars
55 (\$121,600) shall be transferred to Project Challenge North Carolina, Inc., to be used for the
56 continued support of Project Challenge programs throughout the State.

57
58 **FUNDING FOR JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION**
59 **EDUCATION PROGRAMMING**

1 **SECTION 17.5.** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
2 shall work with the Department of Public Instruction to identify all education fund sources that
3 can be used to cover education programming costs of the Department of Juvenile Justice and
4 Delinquency Prevention.

5 The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention shall report by
6 March 1, 2012, to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations
7 Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety and to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime
8 Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee regarding its findings and
9 recommendations.

10
11 **DJJDP AND DOC JOINT EFFORT TO MAKE IN-HOME MONITORING**
12 **AVAILABLE AS ALTERNATIVE TO DETENTION FOR JUVENILES**

13 **SECTION 17.6.** It is the intent of the General Assembly to reduce the State's
14 reliance on detention facilities and youth development centers in the Department of Juvenile
15 Justice and Delinquency Prevention as correctional options for juveniles by increasing the use
16 of community-based alternatives whenever possible. Therefore, the Department of Juvenile
17 Justice and Delinquency Prevention and the Department of Correction shall work together to
18 increase the use of in-home monitoring as an alternative to detention for juveniles. The
19 Department of Correction and the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
20 shall assess the monitoring needs for both the adult and juvenile systems, identify the contracts
21 that the Department of Correction currently has for monitoring services, and determine which
22 contracts, if any, may be negotiated or renegotiated to cover monitoring services for both the
23 adult and juvenile systems. The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
24 and the Department of Correction may also identify other options to increase the use of
25 in-home monitoring as an alternative to detention for juveniles that may work well and be
26 cost-effective.

27 The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and the
28 Department of Correction shall report to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate
29 Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety, the Joint Legislative Corrections,
30 Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division
31 regarding their findings and recommendations by September 1, 2011.

32
33 **TREATMENT STAFFING MODEL AT YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CENTERS**

34 **SECTION 17.7.** The Department shall implement the staffing treatment model
35 presented to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight
36 Committee as part of the Department's November 14, 2006, report regarding the joint use with
37 the Department of Correction of the Swannanoa Youth Development Center campus.

38 The staffing levels of the new youth development centers shall be capped at 66 staff
39 for a 32-bed facility and 198 staff for the 96-bed facility for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.
40 Staffing ratios shall be no more than 2.1 staff per every juvenile committed at every other
41 existing youth development center.

42
43 **YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CENTER ANNUAL REPORT**

44 **SECTION 17.8.** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
45 shall report by October 1 of each year to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate
46 Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety, the Joint Legislative Corrections,
47 Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee, and the Fiscal Research Division on
48 the Youth Development Center (YDC) population, staffing, and capacity in the preceding fiscal
49 year. Specifically, the report shall include all of the following:

- 50 (1) The on-campus population of each YDC, including the county the juveniles
51 are from.
- 52 (2) The housing capacity of each YDC.
- 53 (3) A breakdown of staffing for each YDC, including number, type of position,
54 position title, and position description.
- 55 (4) The per-bed and average daily population cost for each facility.
- 56 (5) The operating cost for each facility, including personnel and non-personnel
57 items.
- 58 (6) A brief summary of the treatment model, education, services, and plans for
59 reintegration into the community offered at each facility.

- 1 (7) The average length of stay in the YDCs.
2 (8) The number of incidents of assaults/attacks on staff at each facility.
3

4 **DJJDP FACILITY MONTHLY COMMITMENT REPORT**

5 **SECTION 17.9.** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
6 shall report electronically on the first day of each month to the Fiscal Research Division
7 regarding each juvenile correctional facility and the average daily population for the previous
8 month. The report shall include (i) the average daily population for each detention center and
9 (ii) the monthly summary of the Committed Youth Report.

10 11 **USE OF INMATE LABOR FOR REPAIR AND RENOVATION OF YOUTH** 12 **DEVELOPMENT CENTERS**

13 **SECTION 17.10.** The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention
14 and the Department of Correction in consultation with the Governor's Crime Commission shall
15 establish policies regarding the appropriate use of inmate construction crews provided by the
16 Department of Correction for repair and renovation projects located on property owned or
17 controlled by the Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. The policies
18 shall be developed and ready for implementation by September 1, 2011.
19

20 **ALLOCATE FUNDS FOR REPAIRS AND RENOVATIONS TO STONEWALL** 21 **JACKSON AND C.A. DILLON YOUTH DEVELOPMENT CENTERS**

22 **SECTION 17.11.** Of the funds appropriated by this act to the Department of
23 Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the sum of two
24 million three hundred thirty thousand nine hundred dollars (\$2,330,900) shall be allocated to
25 the Stonewall Jackson Youth Development Center, and the sum of one million five hundred
26 thirty-one thousand dollars (\$1,531,000) shall be allocated to the C.A. Dillon Youth
27 Development Center to be used for repairs and renovations that (i) will increase operational
28 capacity at those facilities and (ii) satisfy the requirements of G.S. 143C-4-3(b). This allocation
29 is separate from and in addition to any allocation of funds that might be made pursuant to
30 Section 30.5 of this act.
31

32 **PART XVIII. DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION**

33 **FEDERAL GRANT REPORTING**

34 **SECTION 18.1.** The Department of Correction, the Department of Justice, the
35 Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, the Judicial Department, and the Department
36 of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention shall report by May 1 of each year to the Joint
37 Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Chairs of the House of
38 Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees, and the Chairs of the House of
39 Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety on
40 federal grant funds received or preapproved for receipt by those departments. The report shall
41 include information on the amount of grant funds received or preapproved for receipt by each
42 department, the use of the funds, the State match expended to receive the funds, and the period
43 to be covered by each grant. If the department intends to continue the program beyond the end
44 of the grant period, the department shall report on the proposed method for continuing the
45 funding of the program at the end of the grant period. Each department shall also report on any
46 information it may have indicating that the State will be requested to provide future funding for
47 a program presently supported by a local grant.
48
49

50 **FEDERAL GRANT MATCHING FUNDS**

51 **SECTION 18.2.** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143C-6-9, the Department
52 of Correction may use up to the sum of one million two hundred thousand dollars (\$1,200,000)
53 during the 2011-2012 fiscal year and up to the sum of one million two hundred thousand
54 dollars (\$1,200,000) during the 2012-2013 fiscal year from funds available to the Department
55 to provide the State match needed in order to receive federal grant funds. Prior to using funds
56 for this purpose, the Department shall report to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and
57 Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety and the Joint Legislative
58 Commission on Governmental Operations on the grants to be matched using these funds.
59

USE OF CLOSED PRISON FACILITIES

SECTION 18.3. In conjunction with the closing of prison facilities, including small expensive prison units recommended for consolidation by the Government Performance Audit Committee, the Department of Correction shall consult with the county or municipality in which the unit is located, with the elected State and local officials, and with State and federal agencies about the possibility of converting that unit to other use. The Department may also consult with any private for-profit or nonprofit firm about the possibility of converting the unit to other use. In developing a proposal for future use of each unit, the Department shall give priority to converting the unit to other criminal justice use. Consistent with existing law and the future needs of the Department of Correction, the State may provide for the transfer or the lease of any of these units to counties, municipalities, State agencies, federal agencies, or private firms wishing to convert them to other use. The Department of Correction may also consider converting some of the units recommended for closing from one security custody level to another, where that conversion would be cost-effective. A prison unit under lease to a county pursuant to the provisions of this section for use as a jail is exempt for the period of the lease from any of the minimum standards adopted by the Secretary of Health and Human Services pursuant to G.S. 153A-221 for the housing of adult prisoners that would subject the unit to greater standards than those required of a unit of the State prison system.

LIMIT USE OF OPERATIONAL FUNDS

SECTION 18.4. Funds appropriated in this act to the Department of Correction for operational costs for additional facilities shall be used for personnel and operating expenses set forth in the budget approved by the General Assembly in this act. These funds shall not be expended for any other purpose, except as provided for in this act, and shall not be expended for additional prison personnel positions until the new facilities are within 120 days of projected completion, except that the Department may establish critical positions prior to 120 days of completion representing no more than twenty percent (20%) of the total estimated number of positions.

REIMBURSE COUNTIES FOR HOUSING AND EXTRAORDINARY MEDICAL COSTS FOR INMATES, PAROLEES, AND POST-RELEASE SUPERVISEES AWAITING TRANSFER TO STATE PRISON SYSTEM

SECTION 18.5. Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-6-9, the Department of Correction may use funds available to the Department for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium to pay the sum of forty dollars (\$40.00) per day as reimbursement to counties for the cost of housing convicted inmates, parolees, and post-release supervisees awaiting transfer to the State prison system, as provided in G.S. 148-29. The Department shall report quarterly to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight Committee, the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees, and the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety on the expenditure of funds to reimburse counties for prisoners awaiting transfer and on its progress in reducing the jail backlog.

CENTER FOR COMMUNITY TRANSITIONS/CONTRACT AND REPORT

SECTION 18.6. The Department of Correction may continue to contract with The Center for Community Transitions, Inc., a nonprofit corporation, for the purchase of prison beds for minimum security female inmates during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium. The Center for Community Transitions, Inc., shall report by February 1 of each year to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the annual cost per inmate and the average daily inmate population compared to bed capacity using the same methodology as that used by the Department of Correction.

PAROLE ELIGIBILITY REPORT/MUTUAL AGREEMENT PAROLE PROGRAM/MEDICAL RELEASE PROGRAM

SECTION 18.7.(a) The Post-Release Supervision and Parole Commission shall, with the assistance of the North Carolina Sentencing and Policy Advisory Commission and the Department of Correction, analyze the amount of time each inmate who is eligible for parole on or before July 1, 2012, has served compared to the time served by offenders under Structured

1 Sentencing for comparable crimes. The Commission shall determine if the person has served
2 more time in custody than the person would have served if sentenced to the maximum sentence
3 under the provisions of Article 81B of Chapter 15A of the General Statutes. The "maximum
4 sentence," for the purposes of this section, shall be calculated as set forth in subsection (b) of
5 this section.

6 **SECTION 18.7.(b)** For the purposes of this section, the following rules apply for
7 the calculation of the maximum sentence:

- 8 (1) The offense upon which the person was convicted shall be classified as the
9 same felony class as the offense would have been classified if committed
10 after the effective date of Article 81B of Chapter 15A of the General
11 Statutes.
- 12 (2) The minimum sentence shall be the maximum number of months in the
13 presumptive range of minimum durations in Prior Record Level VI of
14 G.S. 15A-1340.17(c) for the felony class determined under subdivision (1)
15 of this subsection. The maximum sentence shall be calculated using
16 G.S. 15A-1340.17(d), (e), or (e1).
- 17 (3) If a person is serving sentences for two or more offenses that are concurrent
18 in any respect, then the offense with the greater classification shall be used
19 to determine a single maximum sentence for the concurrent offenses. The
20 fact that the person has been convicted of multiple offenses may be
21 considered by the Commission in making its determinations under
22 subsection (a) of this section.

23 **SECTION 18.7.(c)** The Post-Release Supervision and Parole Commission shall
24 report to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight
25 Committee and to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations
26 Committees, and the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations
27 Subcommittees on Justice and Public Safety by April 1, 2012. The report shall include the
28 following: the class of the offense for which each parole-eligible inmate was convicted and
29 whether an inmate had multiple criminal convictions. The Commission shall reinstate the
30 parole review process for each offender who has served more time than that person would have
31 under Structured Sentencing as provided by subsections (a) and (b) of this section.

32 The Commission shall also report on the number of parole-eligible inmates
33 reconsidered in compliance with this section and the number who were actually paroled.

34 **SECTION 18.7.(d)** The Department of Correction and the Post-Release
35 Supervision and Parole Commission shall report by March 1 of each year to the Chairs of the
36 House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public
37 Safety and to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight
38 Committee on the number of inmates enrolled in the mutual agreement parole program, the
39 number completing the program and being paroled, and the number who enrolled but were
40 terminated from the program. The information should be based on the previous calendar year.

41 **SECTION 18.7.(e)** The Department of Correction and the Post-Release
42 Supervision and Parole Commission shall report by March 1 of each year to the Chairs of the
43 House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public
44 Safety and to the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight
45 Committee on the number of inmates proposed for release, considered for release, and granted
46 release under Chapter 84B of Chapter 15A of the General Statutes, providing for the medical
47 release of inmates who are either permanently and totally disabled, terminally ill, or geriatric.

48 **CRIMINAL JUSTICE PARTNERSHIP**

49 **SECTION 18.8.(a)** Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a county may use
50 funds appropriated pursuant to the Criminal Justice Partnership Act, Article 6A of Chapter
51 143B of the General Statutes, to provide more than one community-based corrections program.

52 **SECTION 18.8.(b)** Effective July 1, 2011, the Department of Correction shall
53 recalculate the county allocation funding formula mandated under G.S. 143B-273.15 using
54 updated data.

55 **SECTION 18.8.(c)** Notwithstanding the provisions of G.S. 143B-273.15
56 specifying that grants to participating counties are for the full fiscal year and that unobligated
57 funds are returned to the State-County Criminal Justice Partnership Account at the end of the
58 grant period, the Department of Correction may reallocate unspent or unclaimed funds
59

1 distributed to counties participating in the State-County Criminal Justice Partnership Program
2 in an effort to maintain the level of services realized in previous fiscal years.

3 **SECTION 18.8.(d)** The Department of Correction may not deny funds to a county
4 to support both a residential program and a day reporting center if the Department of
5 Correction determines that the county has a demonstrated need and a fully developed plan for
6 each type of sanction.

7 **SECTION 18.8.(e)** The Department of Correction shall report by March 1 of each
8 year to the Chairs of the House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Committees, the
9 House of Representatives and Senate Appropriations Subcommittees on Justice and Public
10 Safety, and the Joint Legislative Corrections, Crime Control, and Juvenile Justice Oversight
11 Committee on the status of the State-County Criminal Justice Partnership Program. The report
12 shall include the following information:

- 13 (1) The amount of funds carried over from the prior fiscal year;
- 14 (2) The dollar amount and purpose of grants awarded to counties as
15 discretionary grants for the current fiscal year;
- 16 (3) Any counties the Department anticipates will submit requests for new
17 implementation grants;
- 18 (4) An update on efforts to ensure that all counties make use of the electronic
19 reporting system, including the number of counties submitting offender
20 participation data via the system;
- 21 (5) An analysis of offender participation data received, including data on each
22 program's utilization and capacity;
- 23 (6) An analysis of comparable programs prepared by the Division of Research
24 and Planning, Department of Correction, including a comparison of
25 programs in each program type on selected outcome measures developed by
26 the Division of Community Corrections in consultation with the Fiscal
27 Research Division and the Division of Research and Planning, and a
28 summary of the reports prepared by county Criminal Justice Partnerships
29 Advisory Boards;
- 30 (7) A review of whether each sentenced offender program is meeting established
31 program goals developed by the Division of Community Corrections in
32 consultation with the Division of Research and Planning and the State
33 Criminal Justice Partnership Advisory Board;
- 34 (8) The number of community offenders and intermediate offenders served by
35 each county program;
- 36 (9) The amount of Criminal Justice Partnership funds spent on community
37 offenders and intermediate offenders; and
- 38 (10) A short description of the services and programs provided by each
39 partnership, including who the service providers are and the amount of funds
40 each service provider receives.

41 **SWANNANOA CORRECTIONAL CENTER FOR WOMEN**

42 **SECTION 18.9.** The Department of Correction shall relocate the fence at
43 Swannanoa Correctional Center for Women so that the school building is located on the side of
44 the campus housing the Department of Correction facilities, and the Department shall retain the
45 sight and sound barrier between the adults and juveniles at the center.
46
47

48 **INMATE MEDICAL COST CONTAINMENT**

49 **SECTION 18.10.(a)** The Department of Correction shall reimburse those providers
50 and facilities providing approved inmate medical services outside the correctional facility the
51 lesser amount of either a rate of seventy percent (70%) of the provider's then-current prevailing
52 charge or two times the then-current Medicaid rate for any given service. The DOC shall have
53 the right to audit any given provider to determine actual prevailing charge to ensure compliance
54 with this provision.

55 This section does not apply to vendors providing services that are not billed on a
56 fee-for-service basis, such as temporary staffing. Nothing in this section shall preclude the
57 Department from contracting with a provider for services at rates that provide greater
58 documentable cost avoidance for the State than do the rates contained in this section or at rates
59 that are less favorable to the State but that will ensure the continued access to care.

SECTION 18.10.(b) The Department of Correction shall make every effort to contain inmate medical costs by making use of its own hospital and health care facilities to provide health care services to inmates. To the extent that the Department of Correction must utilize other facilities and services to provide health care services to inmates, the Department shall make reasonable efforts to make use of hospitals or other providers with which it has a contract or, if none is reasonably available, hospitals with available capacity or other health care facilities in a region to accomplish that goal. The Department shall make reasonable efforts to equitably distribute inmates among all hospitals or other appropriate health care facilities. With respect to any single hospital, the Department of Correction shall continue to make its best effort to seek admission of the number of inmates representing no more than nine percent (9%) of all inmates requiring hospitalization or hospital services on an annual basis beginning in the 2011-2012 fiscal year, unless the failure to do so would jeopardize the health of an inmate or unless a higher level is agreed to by contract. The Department shall also give preference to those hospitals or other health care facilities in the same county or an adjoining county to the correctional facility where an inmate requiring hospitalization is incarcerated. The Department will continue these efforts until it has reached a number which represents no more than five percent (5%) of all inmates requiring hospitalization or hospital services on an annual basis at any single hospital by July 1, 2013, unless the failure to do so would jeopardize the health of an inmate or unless a higher level is agreed to by contract.

SECTION 18.10.(c) G.S. 131E-77 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:
 "(a1) As a condition of licensure, hospitals licensed under this Article shall accept inmates in the custody of the Department of Correction."

SECTION 18.10.(d) The Department of Correction shall report to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations no later than November 1, 2011, and quarterly thereafter on:

- (1) The volume of services provided by community medical providers that can be scheduled in advance and, of that volume, the percentage of those services that are provided by contracted providers; and
- (2) The volume of services provided by community medical providers that cannot be scheduled in advance and, of that volume, the percentage of those services that are provided by contracted providers.

TRANSFER SENTENCING SERVICES PROGRAM

SECTION 18.11.(a) All functions, powers, duties, and obligations vested in the Office of Indigent Defense Services to administer the Sentencing Services Program are transferred to and vested in the Department of Correction by a Type I transfer, as defined in G.S. 143A-6.

SECTION 18.11.(b) Article 61 of Chapter 7A of the General Statutes, G.S. 7A-770 through G.S. 7A-777, is recodified as Article 15 of Chapter 148 of the General Statutes, G.S. 148-140 through G.S. 148-147.

SECTION 18.11.(c) Article 61 of Chapter 7A of the General Statutes, as recodified as Article 15 of Chapter 148 of the General Statutes by subsection (b) of this section, reads as rewritten:

"Article 15.

"Sentencing Services Program.

"§ 148-140. Purpose.

This Article shall be known and may be cited as the "Sentencing Services Act." The purpose of this Article is to establish a statewide sentencing services program that will provide the judicial system with information that will assist that system in imposing sentences that make the most effective use of available resources. In furtherance of this purpose, this Article provides for the following:

- (1) Establishment of local programs that can provide judges and other court officials with information about local correctional programs that are appropriate for offenders who require a comprehensive sentencing plan that combines punishment, control, and rehabilitation services.
- (2) Increased opportunities for certain felons to make restitution to victims of crime through financial reimbursement or community service.
- (3) Local involvement in the development of sentencing services to assure that they are specifically designed to meet local needs.

- (4) Effective use of available community corrections programs by advising judges and other court officials of the offenders most suited for a particular program.

"§ 148-141. Definitions.

As used in this Article:

"§ 148-142. Allocation of funds.

(a) ~~The Director~~ Secretary may award grants in accordance with the policies established by this Article and in accordance with any laws made for that purpose, including appropriations acts and provisions in appropriations acts, and adopt regulations for the implementation, operation, and monitoring of sentencing services programs. Sentencing services programs that are grantees shall use the funds exclusively to develop a sentencing services program that provides sentencing information to judges and other court officials. Grants shall be awarded by the ~~Director~~ Secretary to agencies whose comprehensive program plans promise best to meet the goals set forth herein. The ~~Director~~ Secretary shall consider the plan required by ~~G.S. 7A-774~~ G.S. 148-144 in making funding decisions. If a senior resident superior court judge has not formally endorsed the plan, the ~~Director~~ Secretary shall consider that fact in making grant decisions, but the ~~Director~~ Secretary may, if appropriate, award grants to a program in which the judge has not endorsed the plan as submitted.

(b) ~~The Director~~ Secretary may establish local sentencing services programs and appoint those staff as the ~~Director~~ Secretary deems necessary. These personnel may serve as full-time or part-time State employees or may be hired on a contractual basis when determined appropriate by the ~~director~~ Secretary. Contracts entered under the authority of this subsection shall be exempt from the competitive bidding procedures under Chapter 143 of the General Statutes. ~~The Office of Indigent Defense Services~~ Department of Correction shall adopt rules necessary and appropriate for the administration of the program. Funds appropriated by the General Assembly for the establishment and maintenance of sentencing services programs under this Article shall be administered by the ~~Office of Indigent Defense Services~~ Department of Correction.

"§ 148-143. Responsibilities of a sentencing services program.

A sentencing services program shall be responsible for:

- (1) Identifying offenders who:
- a. Are charged with or have been offered a plea by the State for a felony offense for which the class of offense and prior record level

- 1 authorize the court to impose an active punishment, but do not
 2 require that it do so;
- 3 b. Have a high risk of committing future crimes without appropriate
 4 sanctions and interventions; and
- 5 c. Would benefit from the preparation of an intensive and
 6 comprehensive sentencing plan of the type prepared by sentencing
 7 services programs.
- 8 (2) Preparing detailed sentencing services plans requested pursuant to
 9 ~~G.S. 7A-773.1~~ G.S. 148-143.1 for presentation to the sentencing judge.
- 10 (3) Contracting or arranging with public or private agencies for services
 11 described in the sentencing plan.
- 12 (4) Repealed by Session Laws 1999-306, s. 1.

13 **"§ 148-143.1. Who may request plans; disposition of plans; contents of plans.**

14 (a) A judge presiding over a case in which the offender meets the criteria set forth in
 15 ~~G.S. 7A-773(1)~~ G.S. 148-143(1) may request, at any time prior to the imposition of sentence,
 16 that the sentencing services program provide a sentencing plan. The court may also request, at
 17 any time prior to the imposition of sentence, that the program provide a sentencing plan in
 18 misdemeanor cases in which the class of offense is Class A1 or Class 1 and the prior conviction
 19 level is Level III, if the court determines that the preparation of such a plan is in the interest of
 20 justice. In addition, in cases in which the offender meets the criteria set forth in ~~G.S. 7A-773,~~
 21 G.S. 148-143, the defendant or a prosecutor, at any time before the court has accepted a guilty
 22 plea or received a guilty verdict, may request that the program provide a plan. However, prior
 23 to an adjudication of guilt, a defendant may decline to participate in the preparation of a plan

 25 presented to the court by the sentencing services program prior to an adjudication of guilt. A
 26 defendant's decision not to participate shall be made in writing and filed with the court. The

 28 G.S. 148-144 shall define what constitutes a reasonable time within the meaning of this
 29 subsection.

30 (b) Any sentencing plan prepared by a sentencing services program shall be presented
 31 to the court, the defendant, and the State in an appropriate manner.

32 (c) Sentencing plans prepared by sentencing services programs may include
 33 recommendations for use of any treatment or correctional resources available, unless the
 34 sentencing court instructs otherwise. Sentencing plans that identify an offender's needs for
 35 education, treatment, control, or other services shall, to the extent feasible, also identify
 36 resources to meet those needs. Plans may report that no intermediate punishment is appropriate
 37 under the circumstances of the case.

38 (d) To the extent allowed by law, the sentencing services program shall develop
 39 procedures to ensure that the program staff may work with offenders before a plea is entered.
 40 To that end, information obtained in the course of preparing a sentencing plan may not be used
 41 by the State for any purpose at trial and is subject to the provisions of G.S. 15A-1333.

42 **"§ 148-144. Requirements for a comprehensive sentencing services program plan.**

43 Agencies applying for grants shall prepare a comprehensive sentencing services program
 44 plan for the development, implementation, operation, and improvement of a sentencing services
 45 program for the superior court district, as prescribed by the ~~Director~~ Secretary. The plan shall
 46 be updated annually and shall be submitted to the senior resident superior court judge for the
 47 superior court district for the judge's advice and written endorsement. The plan shall then be
 48 forwarded to the ~~Director~~ Secretary for approval. The plan shall include:

- 49 (1) Goals and objectives of the sentencing services program.
- 50 (2) Specification of the kinds or categories of offenders for whom the programs
 51 will provide sentencing information to the courts.
- 52 (3) Proposed procedures for the identification of appropriate offenders to
 53 comply with the plan and the criteria in ~~G.S. 7A-773(1)~~ G.S. 148-143(1).
- 54 (4) Procedures for preparing and presenting plans to the court.
- 55 (4a) Strategies for ensuring that judges and court officials who are possible
 56 referral sources use the program's services in appropriate cases.
- 57 (5) Procedures for obtaining services from existing public or private agencies,
 58 and a detailed budget for staff, contracted services, and all other costs.
- 59 (6) to (8). Repealed by Session Laws 1999-306, s. 1.

"§ 148-145. Sentencing services board.

(a) Each sentencing services program shall establish a sentencing services board to provide direction and assistance to the sentencing services program in the implementation and evaluation of the plan. Sentencing services boards may be organized as nonprofit corporations under Chapter 55A of the General Statutes. The sentencing services board shall consist of not less than 12 members, and shall include, insofar as possible, judges, district attorneys, attorneys, social workers, law-enforcement officers, probation officers, and other interested persons. The sentencing services board shall meet on a regular basis, and its duties include, but are not limited to, the following:

- (1) Preparation and submission of the sentencing services program plan to the senior resident superior court judge and the ~~Director~~ Secretary annually, as provided in G.S. 7A-772(a);
- (1a) Development of an annual budget for the program;
- (2) Hiring, firing, and evaluation of program personnel;
- (3) Selection of board members;
- (4) Arranging for an annual financial audit.
- (5) Development of procedures for contracting for services.

(b) If the board serves as an advisory board to a sentencing services program located in a local or State agency, the board's duties do not include budgeting and personnel decisions.

"§ 148-146. Limitation on use of funds.

Funds provided for use under the provisions of this Article shall not be used for the operating costs, construction, or any other costs associated with local jail confinement, or for any purpose other than the operation of a sentencing services program that complies with this Article.

"§ 148-147. Evaluation.

The ~~Director~~ Secretary shall evaluate each sentencing services program on an annual basis to determine the degree to which the program effectively meets the needs of the courts in its judicial district by providing them with sentencing information. In conducting the evaluation, the ~~Director~~ Secretary shall consider the goals and objectives established in the program's plan, as well as the extent to which the program is able to ensure that the offenders served by the plan meet the criteria established in ~~G.S. 7A-773(1)~~. G.S. 148-143(1)."

SECTION 18.11.(d) G.S. 7A-498.2(a) reads as rewritten:

"(a) The Office of Indigent Defense Services, which is administered by the Director of Indigent Defense Services and includes the Commission on Indigent Defense ~~Services and the Sentencing Services Program established in Article 61 of this Chapter~~, Services, is created within the Judicial Department. As used in this Article, "Office" means the Office of Indigent Defense Services, "Director" means the Director of Indigent Defense Services, and "Commission" means the Commission on Indigent Defense Services."

SECTION 18.11.(e) G.S. 7A-498.6(b)(8a) is repealed.

SECTION 18.11.(f) G.S. 15A-1333 reads as rewritten:

"§ 15A-1333. Availability of presentence report.

(a) Presentence Reports and Sentencing Services Information Not Public Records. – A written presentence report, the record of an oral presentence report, and information obtained in the preparation of a sentencing plan by a sentencing services program under ~~Article 61 of Chapter 7A~~ Article 15 of Chapter 148 of the General Statutes are not public records and may not be made available to any person except as provided in this section.

(b) Access to Reports. – The defendant, his counsel, the prosecutor, or the court may have access at any reasonable time to a written presentence report or to any record of an oral presentence report. Access to a sentencing plan and information obtained in the preparation of a sentencing plan shall be in accordance with the comprehensive sentencing services program plan developed pursuant to ~~G.S. 7A-774~~. G.S. 148-144.

(c) Expunging Reports. – On motion of the defendant, the court in its discretion may order a written presentence report, the record of an oral presentence report, or a sentencing plan expunged from the court record."

SECTION 18.11.(g) G.S. 15A-1340.14(f) reads as rewritten:

"(f) Proof of Prior Convictions. – A prior conviction shall be proved by any of the following methods:

- (1) Stipulation of the parties.
- (2) An original or copy of the court record of the prior conviction.

(3) A copy of records maintained by the Division of Criminal Information, the Division of Motor Vehicles, or of the Administrative Office of the Courts.

(4) Any other method found by the court to be reliable.

The State bears the burden of proving, by a preponderance of the evidence, that a prior conviction exists and that the offender before the court is the same person as the offender named in the prior conviction. The original or a copy of the court records or a copy of the records maintained by the Division of Criminal Information, the Division of Motor Vehicles, or of the Administrative Office of the Courts, bearing the same name as that by which the offender is charged, is prima facie evidence that the offender named is the same person as the offender before the court, and that the facts set out in the record are true. For purposes of this subsection, "a copy" includes a paper writing containing a reproduction of a record maintained electronically on a computer or other data processing equipment, and a document produced by a facsimile machine. The prosecutor shall make all feasible efforts to obtain and present to the court the offender's full record. Evidence presented by either party at trial may be utilized to prove prior convictions. Suppression of prior convictions is pursuant to G.S. 15A-980. If a motion is made pursuant to that section during the sentencing stage of the criminal action, the court may grant a continuance of the sentencing hearing. If asked by the defendant in compliance with G.S. 15A-903, the prosecutor shall furnish the defendant's prior criminal record to the defendant within a reasonable time sufficient to allow the defendant to determine if the record available to the prosecutor is accurate. Upon request of a sentencing services program established pursuant to ~~Article 61 of Chapter 7A of the General Statutes~~, Article 15 of Chapter 148 of the General Statutes, the district attorney shall provide any information the district attorney has about the criminal record of a person for whom the program has been requested to provide a sentencing plan pursuant to ~~G.S. 7A-773.1~~. G.S. 148-143.1."

PART XIX. DEPARTMENT OF CRIME CONTROL AND PUBLIC SAFETY

CREATION OF DEPARTMENT

SECTION 19.1.(a) The Department of Public Safety is established as a new executive department. All functions, powers, duties, and obligations vested in the following departments and agencies are transferred to, vested in, and consolidated within the Department of Public Safety by a Type I transfer, as defined in G.S. 143A-6:

(1) The Department of Correction.

(2) The Department of Crime Control and Public Safety.

(3) The Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

SECTION 19.1.(b) Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is amended by adding a new Article to read:

"Article 5A.

"Department of Public Safety.

"Part 1. General Provisions.

"§ 143B-259. Organization.

(a) There is established the Department of Public Safety. The head of the Department of Public Safety is the Secretary of Public Safety, who shall be known as the Secretary. The Department shall consist of five divisions as follows:

(1) The Division of Adult Correction, which shall consist of the former Department of Correction. The head of the Division of Adult Correction shall be a deputy secretary, who shall be responsible for prisons, community corrections, and correction enterprises.

(2) The Division of Juvenile Justice, which shall consist of the former Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. The head of the Division of Juvenile Justice shall be a deputy secretary, who shall be responsible for youth detention centers, court services, community programs, and youth development centers.

- 1 (3) The Division of Law Enforcement, which shall consist of the following
 2 former divisions of the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety: the
 3 State Highway Patrol, the Alcohol Law Enforcement Division, the Butner
 4 Public Safety Division, and the State Capitol Police Division. The head of
 5 the Division of Law Enforcement shall be a deputy secretary.
- 6 (4) The Division of Emergency Services, which shall consist of the following
 7 former divisions of the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety: the
 8 Division of Emergency Management and the National Guard. The head of
 9 the Division of Emergency Services shall be a deputy secretary.
- 10 (5) The Division of Administration, the head of which shall be a deputy
 11 secretary responsible for all administrative functions, including fiscal,
 12 auditing, information technology, purchasing, human resources, engineering,
 13 and facility management functions for the Department. Within the Division,
 14 there is established a Grants Management Section, which shall consist of the
 15 Governor's Crime Commission, the Criminal Justice Partnership Program,
 16 and the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council Fund. Other sections within the
 17 Division of Administration shall be:
- 18 a. The Fiscal and Budget Section.
 19 b. The Victims' Services Section.
 20 c. The Audit Section.
 21 d. The Engineering and Facility Management Section.
 22 e. The Purchasing Section.
 23 f. The General Counsel Section.
 24 g. The Human Resources Section.
 25 h. The Research and Policy Section.
 26 i. The Information Technology Section.
 27 j. The Training Section.

28 (b) The powers and duties of the deputy secretaries and the respective divisions shall be
 29 subject to the direction and control of the Secretary of Public Safety.

30 **§ 143B-259.1. Powers and duties of the Department of Public Safety.**

31 It shall be the duty of the Department of Public Safety to do all of the following:

- 32 (1) Provide assigned law enforcement and emergency services to protect the
 33 public against crime and against natural and man-made disasters.
- 34 (2) To plan and direct a coordinated effort by the law enforcement agencies of
 35 State government and to ensure maximum cooperation between State and
 36 local law enforcement agencies in the fight against crime.
- 37 (3) To prepare annually a State plan for the State's criminal justice system.
- 38 (4) To serve as the State's chief coordinating agency to control crime, to ensure
 39 the safety of the public, and to ensure an effective and efficient State
 40 criminal justice system.
- 41 (5) To have charge of investigations of criminal matters particularly set forth in
 42 this Article and of such other crimes and areas of concern in the criminal
 43 justice system as the Governor may direct.
- 44 (6) To regularly patrol the highways of the State and enforce all laws and
 45 regulations respecting travel and the use of vehicles upon the highways of
 46 the State and all laws for the protection of the highways of the State.
- 47 (7) To provide National Guard troops trained by the State to federal standards.
- 48 (8) To ensure the preparation, coordination, and currency of military and civil
 49 preparedness plans and the effective conduct of emergency operations by all
 50 participating agencies to sustain life and prevent, minimize, or remedy injury
 51 to persons and damage to property resulting from disasters caused by enemy
 52 attack or other hostile actions or from disasters due to natural or man-made
 53 causes.
- 54 (9) To develop a plan for a coordinated and integrated electronic
 55 communications system for State government and cooperating local
 56 agencies, including coordination and integration of existing electronic
 57 communications systems.
- 58 (10) To carry out the relevant provisions of Part 2 of this Article, Chapter 148 of
 59 the General Statutes, Chapter 15 of the General Statutes, Chapter 15A of the

1 General Statutes, and other provisions of the General Statutes governing the
2 provision of necessary custody, supervision, and treatment to control and
3 rehabilitate criminal offenders and thereby reduce the rate and cost of crime
4 and delinquency.

- 5 (11) To carry out the relevant provisions of Part 3 of this Article, Chapter 7B of
6 the General Statutes, and other provisions of the General Statutes governing
7 juvenile justice and the prevention of delinquent acts by juveniles.

8 **"§ 143B-259.2. Powers and duties of the Secretary of Public Safety.**

9 The Secretary of Public Safety shall have the powers and duties as are conferred on the
10 Secretary by this Article, delegated to the Secretary by the Governor, and conferred on the
11 Secretary by the Constitution and laws of this State. These powers and duties include the
12 following:

- 13 (1) Provision of assistance to other agencies. – The Secretary, through
14 appropriate subunits of the department, shall, at the request of the Governor,
15 provide assistance to State and local law enforcement agencies, district
16 attorneys, and judges, when called upon by them and so directed.
- 17 (2) Coordination of government subunits emergencies. – In the event that the
18 Governor, in the exercise of the Governor's constitutional and statutory
19 responsibilities, shall deem it necessary to utilize the services of more than
20 one subunit of State government to provide protection to the people from
21 natural or man-made disasters or emergencies, including, but not limited to,
22 wars, insurrections, riots, civil disturbances, or accidents, the Secretary,
23 under the direction of the Governor, shall serve as the chief coordinating
24 officer for the State between the respective subunits so utilized.
- 25 (3) Allocation of state resources during emergencies. – Whenever the Secretary
26 exercises the authority provided in subdivision (2) of this section, the
27 Secretary shall be authorized to utilize and allocate all available State
28 resources as are reasonably necessary to cope with the emergency or
29 disaster, including directing of personnel and functions of State agencies or
30 units thereof for the purpose of performing or facilitating the initial response
31 to the disaster or emergency. Following the initial response, the Secretary, in
32 consultation with the heads of the State agencies which have or appear to
33 have the responsibility for dealing with the emergency or disaster, shall
34 designate one or more lead agencies to be responsible for subsequent phases
35 of the response to the emergency or disaster. Pending an opportunity to
36 consult with the heads of such agencies, the Secretary may make interim
37 lead agencies designations.
- 38 (4) Reporting of emergencies to the Secretary. – Every department of State
39 government is required to report to the Secretary, by the fastest means
40 practicable, all natural or man-made disasters or emergencies, including, but
41 not limited to, wars, insurrections, riots, civil disturbances, or accidents
42 which appear likely to require the utilization of the services of more than one
43 subunit of State government.
- 44 (5) Rule making. – The Secretary is authorized to adopt rules and procedures for
45 the implementation of this section.
- 46 (6) Powers of Governor and Council of State not superseded. – Nothing
47 contained in this section shall be construed to supersede or modify those
48 powers granted to the Governor or the Council of State to declare and react
49 to a state of disaster as provided in Chapter 166A of the General Statutes, the
50 Constitution, or elsewhere.
- 51 (7) Reporting required prior to grant awards. – Prior to any notification of
52 proposed grant awards to State agencies for use in pursuing the objectives of
53 the Governor's Crime Commission pursuant to sub-subdivisions a. through f.
54 of subdivision (8) of this section, the Secretary shall report to the Senate and
55 House Appropriations Committees for review of the proposed grant awards.
- 56 (8) Other powers and duties. – The Secretary shall have the following additional
57 powers and duties:

- 1 a. Accepting gifts, bequests, devises, grants, matching funds, and other
 2 considerations from private or governmental sources for use in
 3 promoting the work of the Governor's Crime Commission.
 4 b. Making grants for use in pursuing the objectives of the Governor's
 5 Crime Commission.
 6 c. Adopting rules as may be required by the federal government for
 7 federal grants-in-aid for criminal justice purposes and to implement
 8 and carry out the regulatory and enforcement duties assigned to the
 9 Department of Public Safety as provided by the various commercial
 10 vehicle, oversize/overweight, motor carrier safety, motor fuel, and
 11 mobile and manufactured home statutes.
 12 d. Ascertaining the State's duties concerning grants to the State by the
 13 Law Enforcement Assistance Administration of the United States
 14 Department of Justice, and developing and administering a plan to
 15 ensure that the State fulfills its duties.
 16 e. Administering the Assistance Program for Victims of Rape and Sex
 17 Offenses.
 18 f. Appointing, with the Governor's approval, a special police officer to
 19 serve as Chief of the State Capitol Police Section of the Division of
 20 Law Enforcement.
 21 g. Appointing an employee of the Division of Administration to be the
 22 central point of contact for any federal surplus property or purchasing
 23 programs."

4 improvement projects that are subject to the Department of Administration's review authority

6 Office of State Budget and Management to ensure optimal management and administration of
7 funds needed for new construction and repairs and renovations projects.

8 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, upon a request of the administration of
9 a State agency, and after consultation with the Office of State Construction, the Director of the
10 Budget may, when it is in the best interest of the State to do so, allocate funds from the reserve
11 to the requesting agency to be used for any of the purposes for which contingency funds may
12 permissibly be used. Under no circumstances, may funds disbursed from the statewide capital
13 reserve be used for a capital improvement project not previously authorized by the General
14 Assembly.

15 **SECTION 20.4.(b)** Each fiscal year of the biennium, the Director of the Budget
16 may reallocate a portion of the funds deposited in the reserve not to exceed eight hundred
17 seventy-five thousand dollars (\$875,000) in any fiscal year to the State Construction Office in

44 **SECTION 20.6.(a)** The campaign finance functions of the State Board of Elections
45 and the lobbying registration and enforcement functions of the Secretary of State are
46 transferred to the State Ethics Commission, and the transfers shall have all the elements of a
47 Type I transfer under G.S. 143A-6.

48 **SECTION 20.6.(b)** Any pending proceedings of the State Board of Elections
49 concerning campaign finance law violations are transferred to the State Ethics Commission.
50 Any pending proceedings of the Secretary of State concerning lobbying law violations are

(c) Emergency Reserve. – The Department of Cultural Resources may establish out of existing unobligated funds, including lapsed salaries and unobligated special funds, an emergency reserve fund. Any use of the emergency reserve will require reimbursement from museum receipts.

(d) Audit. – The Fund shall be subject to the oversight of the State Auditor pursuant to Article 5A of Chapter 147 of the General Statutes. The Fund shall reimburse the State Auditor for the cost of any audit."

ROANOKE ISLAND COMMISSION FUNDING/HISTORICAL ROANOKE ISLAND FUND

SECTION 21.2.(a) The Roanoke Island Commission shall receive State funds through the 2011-2012 fiscal year. Beginning with the 2012-2013 fiscal year, the Roanoke Island Commission shall be self-supporting.

- 42 (1) Seven million dollars (\$7,000,000) shall be allocated in each fiscal year for
43 small construction projects recommended by the State Highway
44 Administrator in consultation with the Chief Operating Officer and approved
45 by the Secretary of the Department of Transportation. These funds shall be
46 allocated equally in each fiscal year of the biennium among the 14 Highway
47 Divisions for small construction projects.
- 48 (2) Five million one hundred sixty-nine thousand twenty dollars (\$5,169,020)
49 shall be allocated statewide in each fiscal year for rural or small urban
50 highway improvements and related transportation enhancements to public
51 roads and public facilities, industrial access roads, and spot safety projects,
52 including pedestrian walkways that enhance highway safety. Projects funded
53 pursuant to this subdivision shall be approved by the Secretary of
54 Transportation.

55 None of these funds used for rural secondary road construction are subject to the
56 county allocation formulas in G.S. 136-44.5(b) and (c).

57 These funds are not subject to G.S. 136-44.7.

58 The Department of Transportation shall report to the members of the General
59 Assembly on projects funded pursuant to this section in each member's district prior to

1 construction. The Department shall make a quarterly comprehensive report on the use of these
2 funds to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee and the Fiscal Research
3 Division.

4 5 **ADJUST SECONDARY ROAD CONSTRUCTION AND SECONDARY ROAD** 6 **MAINTENANCE**

7 **SECTION 28.7.(a)** Notwithstanding G.S. 136-44.2A, secondary road construction
8 and secondary road maintenance funds from the Highway Fund shall not increase over the
9 amounts allocated in the fiscal year 2011-2012 and fiscal year 2012-2013 base budgets.

10 **SECTION 28.7.(b)** Notwithstanding G.S. 136-182, secondary road construction
11 and secondary road maintenance funds from the Highway Trust Fund shall not increase over
12 the amounts allocated in the fiscal year 2011-2012 and fiscal year 2012-2013 base budgets.

13 14 **SYSTEM PRESERVATION FUNDS PREFERENCE FOR DEFICIENT BRIDGES**

15 **SECTION 28.8.** The funds allocated to the system preservation program (Budget
16 Code 84240-7839) for fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013 shall be used for bridge
17 improvements on structurally deficient bridges.

18 19 **INCREASE DOT PRIVATIZATION**

20 **SECTION 28.9.** The Department of Transportation shall seek to increase the use of
21 contracts to further privatize design and engineering work where practical and economical. In
22 doing so, the Department of Transportation shall do the following:

- 23 (1) Identify State-funded professional service contracts of two hundred fifty
24 thousand dollars (\$250,000) or less that are likely to attract increased
25 participation by Small Professional Services Firms and then direct the
26 solicitation of applicable contracts to those firms.
- 27 (2) Expand the use of multiple contract awards for maintenance and repair
28 projects.
- 29 (3) Increase the outsourcing of preliminary engineering projects to fifty percent
30 (50%) of the total funds in the annual work plan.

31 32 **STATE STREET-AID TO MUNICIPALITIES (POWELL BILL) ADJUSTMENTS**

33 **SECTION 28.10.(a)** G.S. 136-41.1(a) reads as rewritten:

34 "(a) There is annually appropriated out of the State Highway Fund a sum equal to the net
35 amount after refunds that was produced during the fiscal year by a one and three-fourths cents
36 (1 3/4¢) tax on each gallon of motor fuel taxed under Article 36C of Chapter 105 of the General
37 Statutes and on the equivalent amount of alternative fuel taxed under Article 36D of that
38 Chapter. ~~The One-half of the~~ amount appropriated shall be allocated in cash on or before
39 October 1 of each year to the cities and towns of the State in accordance with this section. The
40 second one-half of the amount appropriated shall be allocated in cash on or before January 1 of
41 each year to the cities and towns of the State in accordance with this section. In addition, as
42 provided in G.S. 136-176(b)(3), revenue is allocated and appropriated from the Highway Trust
43 Fund to the cities and towns of this State to be used for the same purposes and distributed in the
44 same manner as the revenue appropriated to them under this section from the Highway Fund.
45 Like the appropriation from the Highway Fund, the appropriation from the Highway Trust
46 Fund shall be based on revenue collected during the fiscal year preceding the date the
47 distribution is made.

48"

49 **SECTION 28.10.(b)** Article 2 of Chapter 136 of the General Statutes is amended
50 by adding a new section to read:

51 **"§ 136-41.2B. Eligibility for funds; municipalities with no road miles ineligible.**

52 No municipality shall be eligible to receive funds under G.S. 136-41.1 unless the
53 municipality maintains public streets that (i) are within its jurisdiction and (ii) do not form a
54 part of the State highway system."

55 **SECTION 28.10.(c)** Unexpended and unencumbered funds previously allocated to
56 municipalities made ineligible to receive funds by subsection (b) of this section shall be
57 reallocated to eligible municipalities in accordance with G.S. 136-41.1.

58 59 **STATE AID TO RAILROADS TRANSPARENCY**

1 **SECTION 28.12.** G.S. 136-44.20(d) is repealed.
2

3 **STATE AID TO SHORT-LINE RAILROADS**

4 **SECTION 28.13.** Article 2D of Chapter 136 is amended by adding a new section
5 to read as follows:

6 "**§ 136-44.39. Department to provide State and federal financial assistance to short-line**
7 **railroads.**

8 The Department of Transportation is authorized to provide assistance to short-line railroads
9 to continue and enhance rail service in the State so as to assist in economic development and
10 access to ports and military installations. Assistance under this section may involve both the
11 Rail Industrial Access Program and the Short Line Infrastructure Access Program, as well as
12 other innovative programs. Grants under this section shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the
13 nonfederal share and must be matched by equal or greater funding from the applicant."
14

15 **STUDY RAIL CONNECTION BETWEEN WILMINGTON AND FAYETTEVILLE**

16 **SECTION 28.14.** The Department of Transportation, Rail Division, shall study the
17 feasibility and cost of constructing a rail connection between Wilmington and Fayetteville. The
18 Department of Transportation, Rail Division, shall report to the Joint Legislative Transportation
19 Oversight Committee with its findings no later than March 1, 2012.
20

21 **REPORT, CONSULTATION, AND APPROVAL OF RAIL PROJECTS**

22 **SECTION 28.15.** G.S. 136-44.36 reads as rewritten:

23 "**§ 136-44.36. Department of Transportation designated as agency to administer federal**
24 **and State railroad revitalization programs.**

25 (a) The General Assembly hereby designates the Department of Transportation as the
26 agency of the State of North Carolina responsible for administering all State and federal
27 railroad revitalization programs. The Department of Transportation is authorized to develop,
28 and the Board of Transportation is authorized to adopt, a State railroad plan, and the
29 Department of Transportation is authorized to do all things necessary under applicable State
30 and federal legislation to properly administer State and federal railroad revitalization programs
31 within the State. Such authority shall include, but shall not be limited to, the power to receive
32 federal funds and distribute and expend federal and State funds for rail programs designed to
33 cover the costs of acquiring, by purchase, lease or other manner as the department considers
34 appropriate, a railroad line or other rail property to maintain existing or to provide future rail
35 service; the costs of rehabilitating and improving rail property on railroad lines to the extent
36 necessary to permit safe, adequate and efficient rail service on such lines; and the costs of
37 constructing rail or rail related facilities for the purpose of improving the quality, efficiency and
38 safety of rail service. The Department shall also have the authority to preserve railroad
39 corridors for future railroad use and interim compatible uses and may lease such corridors for
40 interim compatible uses. Such authority shall also include the power to receive and administer
41 federal financial assistance without State financial participation to railroad companies to cover
42 the costs of local rail service continuation payments, of rail line rehabilitation, and of rail line
43 construction as listed above. This Article shall not be construed to grant to the department the
44 power or authority to operate directly any rail line or rail facilities.

45 (b) Notwithstanding subsection (a) of this section, the acceptance of federal funds by
46 the Department of Transportation for rail programs shall be subject to the following:

47 (1) Report. – For any project under this subsection (a) of this section, the
48 Department of Transportation shall report the project details, including the
49 amounts of federal funds and any State matching funds, as well as the
50 expected annual maintenance and operational costs to the State of the project
51 for the next 25 years, to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
52 Operations if the General Assembly is not in session, or to the House
53 Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation and the Senate Committee
54 on Appropriations on Department of Transportation if the General Assembly
55 is in session.

56 (2) Consultation. – If either the amount of State matching funds required by the
57 federal grant or the amount of future annual maintenance and operational
58 costs of the project are reasonably expected to exceed three million dollars
59 (\$3,000,000), then the Department shall not accept the federal funds prior to

1 consultation with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
2 Operations if the General Assembly is not in session, or with the House
3 Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation and the Senate Committee
4 on Appropriations on Department of Transportation if the General Assembly
5 is in session. Failure of the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
6 Operations, the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Transportation, or
7 the Senate Committee on Appropriations on Department of Transportation to
8 hold a meeting with the Department of Transportation within 90 days of a
9 written request for a meeting from the Department of Transportation shall be
10 deemed a waiver of consultation by the committee.

11 (3) Approval. – If either the amount of State matching funds required by the
12 federal grant or the amount of future annual maintenance and operational
13 costs of the project are reasonably expected to exceed five million dollars
14 (\$5,000,000), then the Department's acceptance of funds shall be subject to
15 approval of the project by an act of the General Assembly. If 60 days have
16 passed since consultation or the expiration of the consultation period under
17 subdivision (2) of this subsection, then the inaction of the General
18 Assembly, including the lack of an extra session to address the project, shall
19 be deemed an approval of the project, and the Department may accept the
20 funds without an act of the General Assembly.

21 For purposes of this subsection, the terms "State matching funds" and "annual maintenance and
22 operational costs to the State" shall not include funds that may pass through the Department of
23 Transportation but that originally came from a non-State source."

24 25 **PROHIBIT RAIL DIVISION FROM PROVIDING CONVENIENCE ITEMS FREE OF** 26 **CHARGE ON ALL PASSENGER RAIL SERVICE**

27 **SECTION 28.16.** The Department of Transportation, Rail Division, shall not
28 provide convenience items to passengers free of charge unless the items are donated to the
29 State. These items include bottled or canned drink products, excluding water, newspapers, or
30 other items of convenience. The Department of Transportation may charge a nominal fee for
31 such items through vending machines or through other mechanisms.

32 33 **ELIMINATE AERONAUTICS COUNCIL, BICYCLE COMMITTEE, AND RAIL** 34 **COUNCIL**

35 **SECTION 28.17.(a)** The Aeronautics Council of the Department of Transportation
36 is eliminated. G.S. 143B-356 and G.S. 143B-357 are repealed.

37 **SECTION 28.17.(b)** The North Carolina Bicycle Committee within the
38 Department of Transportation is eliminated. G.S. 136-71.13 is repealed.

39 **SECTION 28.17.(c)** The North Carolina Rail Council of the Department of
40 Transportation is eliminated. Part 9 of Article 8 of Chapter 143B of the General Statutes is
41 repealed.

42 43 **FLEXIBLE USE OF FUNDS TO LEVERAGE FEDERAL FUNDS FOR RURAL** 44 **PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION**

45 **SECTION 28.18.** In order to ensure maximum receipts of funding and to facilitate
46 the use of funds available to the Department, the Department of Transportation, Public
47 Transportation Division, shall have the flexibility to transfer funding from the consolidated
48 capital program of its rural funding programs for vehicles, technology, and facilities to the
49 operating programs, based on the Department's ability to leverage all additional federal funds to
50 meet the capital needs of rural transportation systems. This section applies only to fiscal years
51 2011-2012 and 2012-2013.

52 53 **MAXIMIZE LEVERAGE OF FEDERAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION OPERATING** 54 **AND CAPITAL FUNDS FOR LOCAL PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS**

55 **SECTION 28.19.** The Department of Transportation, Public Transportation
56 Division, shall provide local public transportation systems with maximum flexibility to use
57 State operating funds from the "urban and regional maintenance," "elderly and disabled," "work
58 first and transportation employment," and "urban technology, human service transportation

1 management, and rural general public" grant programs to leverage all eligible federal transit
2 operating assistance funds. This section applies only to fiscal years 2011-2012 and 2012-2013.

4 **STREAMLINE GRANT PROCESS AND CONSOLIDATE GRANTS FOR PUBLIC** 5 **TRANSPORTATION**

6 **SECTION 28.20.(a)** The Department of Transportation, Public Transportation
7 Division, shall work with stakeholders to streamline the grant application process, determine
8 levels for funding distributions, and make recommendations to the General Assembly to
9 maximize the use of these grant funds. The Department of Transportation shall report these
10 findings to the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee no later than March 1,
11 2012.

12 **SECTION 28.20.(b)** The Department of Transportation and the Office of State
13 Budget and Management are directed to combine grant funding to the "elderly and disabled,"
14 "work first and transportation employment," and the human service transportation management
15 and rural general public grant programs within the "urban technology, human service
16 transportation management and rural general public" grant programs. The Highway Fund
17 Budget Code 84210, Fund Code 7831, shall be changed to reflect these consolidations and the
18 separation of the "urban technology, human service transportation management and rural
19 general public" grant program. The grant categories and respective formulas shall remain
20 unchanged. The Department shall determine an appropriate distribution for funds based upon
21 the needs of the local governments.

22 Consolidating the funding sources should enable the Department to increase
23 utilization of all available funds based on documented local needs, reduce program
24 administration at the State and local levels, and increase flexibility for regional systems to
25 apply and expend funds for multicounty transit needs.

26 **SECTION 28.20.(c)** Subsection (b) of this section becomes effective July 1, 2012.

27 **STUDY REGIONAL CONSOLIDATION OF TRANSIT SYSTEMS**

28 **SECTION 28.21.** The Department of Transportation, Public Transportation
29 Division, is directed to study the feasibility and appropriateness of developing regional transit
30 systems with the goals of (i) providing increased mobility between existing transit systems
31 within one county and between counties, (ii) improving planning and coordination to better
32 meet public demand, (iii) maximizing funding, and (iv) developing centralized professional
33 staff that will create operational and administrative efficiencies. This study shall examine both
34 (i) the consolidation of transit service planning and delivery based on regional travel patterns
35 and (ii) the consolidation of single-county transit systems, where applicable. The Department of
36 Transportation, Public Transportation Division, shall report the results of its study to the Joint
37 Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee no later than March 1, 2012.

38 **FLEXIBLE USE OF FUNDS FOR DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLES FOR FISCAL** 39 **YEARS 2011-2012 AND 2012-2013**

40 **SECTION 28.23.** Of the funds appropriated in this act to the Department of
41 Transportation, Division of Motor Vehicles:

- 42 (1) One hundred five thousand dollars (\$105,000) may be used for contractual
43 security services at the Division of Motor Vehicles Registration and
44 International Registration Plan (IRP) office in the City of Charlotte.
- 45 (2) Two hundred twenty-five thousand thirty dollars (\$225,030) may be used for
46 the purpose of staffing the dedicated commercial drivers license skills testing
47 sites located in the City of Lumberton and under construction in Iredell
48 County. The Division is authorized to reclassify five existing, vacant
49 positions for this purpose.

50 **STUDY EXEMPTING THE THREE NEWEST MODEL YEARS FROM EMISSIONS** 51 **INSPECTIONS OF MOTOR VEHICLES**

52 **SECTION 28.24.(a)** The Department of Transportation, Division of Motor
53 Vehicles, shall lead a study to exempt, for the three newest model years, the emissions
54 inspection required for motor vehicles under G.S. 20-183.2(b). As part of this study, the
55 Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Division of Air Quality, in coordination
56 with the Department of Transportation, Division of Motor Vehicles, shall evaluate the potential
57
58
59

1 impacts of exempting these motor vehicles on emissions levels and air quality. In evaluating
2 these potential impacts, the Division of Air Quality shall consider all of the following:

- 3 (1) Whether North Carolina would be in jeopardy of the United States
4 Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) finding that the State failed to
5 implement its State Implementation Plan; if so, what specific alternative
6 programs would result in emissions reductions that would be equivalent to
7 any increased emissions resulting from exempting these motor vehicles from
8 emissions testing; and what approvals, demonstrations, documentation, or
9 other requirements is the State subject to in order to comply with federal law
10 and to assure that the State does not lose eligibility to secure federal
11 transportation funds.
- 12 (2) Whether air quality standards would be violated based on (i) existing air
13 quality standards adopted under Article 21B of Chapter 143 of the General
14 Statutes and (ii) revised air quality standards, including a revised standard
15 for ozone, that are currently being considered for adoption by the United
16 States Environmental Protection Agency.
- 17 (3) Whether the State would be in jeopardy of being found to be out of
18 conformity such that its State and local transportation plans would interfere
19 with the State's ability to attain federal air standards, resulting in loss of
20 future federal transportation funds.
- 21 (4) What new or amended rules would be necessary regarding any
22 recommendation of this study and the time frame for adopting such new or
23 amended rules.
- 24 (5) What fiscal impacts would result for motor vehicle owners, licensed
25 inspection stations, the Department of Transportation, and the Department of
26 Environment and Natural Resources.
- 27 (6) Any other issues pertinent to the study under this section.

28 **SECTION 28.24.(b)** No later than March 1, 2012, the Department of
29 Transportation and Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall submit a joint
30 report of the results of the study under this section, including the findings, recommendations,
31 and any legislative or administrative proposals, to the Joint Legislative Transportation
32 Oversight Committee, the Environmental Review Commission, the Joint Legislative
33 Commission on Governmental Operations, the House and Senate Appropriations
34 Subcommittees on Natural and Economic Resources, the House Appropriations Subcommittee
35 on Transportation, and the Senate Committee on Appropriations on Department of
36 Transportation.

37 38 **DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE TO REPORT ON MOTOR FUELS TAX AUDITOR 39 AND INVESTIGATOR PERFORMANCE**

40 **SECTION 28.25.** The Department of Revenue, Motor Fuels Division and the Tax
41 Enforcement Division, is directed to report on the performance of auditor and investigator
42 collection and enforcement activities as it relates to its administration of the motor fuels,
43 alternative fuels, motor carrier, and inspection tax laws. The report will overview the
44 Department's collection and enforcement activities and include recommendations to improve
45 these efforts. This Department shall develop a methodology to compare performance by
46 employees and include these results in the report. The Department of Revenue shall report to
47 the Joint Legislative Transportation Oversight Committee and to the Joint Legislative
48 Commission on Governmental Operations by March 1, 2012.

49 50 **STUDY REIMBURSEMENT PROCESS FOR DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION 51 LITTER PICKUP**

52 **SECTION 28.26.** The Office of State Budget and Management, in consultation
53 with the Department of Correction and Department of Transportation, shall study
54 performance-based reimbursement as an alternative to the current funding mechanism for
55 inmate litter pickup which consists of a direct appropriation from the Department of
56 Transportation's Highway Fund budget to the Department of Correction. Measures for an
57 alternative funding mechanism may include reimbursements based on total mileage of
58 highways cleaned, per hour reimbursements for non-litter pickup activities, or other factors, as
59 appropriate.

1 The Office of State Budget and Management shall report to the Joint Legislative
2 Transportation Oversight Committee and to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental
3 Operations no later than March 1, 2012. It is intended that the report contain recommendations
4 for reimbursement rates that have been agreed upon by the Department of Correction and the
5 Department of Transportation and that the recommended rate structure will be included in the
6 report. The report shall also include any statutory changes to be considered by the General
7 Assembly in relation to this report.

9 STATE HIGHWAY PATROL POSITIONS

10 **SECTION 28.28.(a)** The Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, State
11 Highway Patrol, shall have management flexibility to achieve a savings of one million three
12 hundred eighty thousand three hundred seventy dollars (\$1,380,370), recurring, in the Patrol's
13 administrative structure. The Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, State Highway
14 Patrol, is authorized to eliminate positions to achieve this budgetary reduction, but is
15 encouraged to find efficiencies and savings elsewhere in the Patrol's administrative structure.

16 **SECTION 28.28.(b)** The Commander of the State Highway Patrol, upon the
17 approval of the Secretary of the Department of Crime Control and Public Safety, is authorized
18 to eliminate a greater number of positions than that specified in the Committee Report on the
19 Continuation, Expansion, and Capital Budget for fiscal year 2011-2012. In implementing the
20 remaining reductions in force required by this act, the Commander shall not eliminate sworn
21 law enforcement officer positions allocated for district-level traffic and commercial motor
22 vehicle enforcement, unless the State Highway Patrol is incapable of otherwise implementing
23 the reductions specified in this act. Reductions in force may include filled positions.

24 **SECTION 28.28.(c)** The Commander of the State Highway Patrol shall report on
25 the number of positions eliminated for fiscal year 2011-2012. The report shall identify the
26 position number and type; assignment area or organizational unit; whether the position was
27 filled or vacant; personnel savings achieved; and any severance paid. The report shall also
28 include alternatives considered to the implemented reductions in force. The Commander shall
29 submit the report to the House of Representatives Appropriations Subcommittee on Justice and
30 Public Safety, the Senate Appropriations Committee on Justice and Public Safety, and the Joint
31 Legislative Crime Control and Public Safety Oversight Committee no later than March 1, 2012.

33 HIGHWAY TRUST FUND MONEY FOR VISITOR CENTERS; SPECIAL 34 REGISTRATION PLATES MONEY FOR VISITOR CENTERS

35 **SECTION 28.30.(a)** G.S. 20-85.1(a1), as amended by Section 31.11 of this act,
36 reads as rewritten:

37 "(a1) One dollar (\$1.00) of the fee imposed for any transaction assessed a fee under
38 subdivision (a)(1), (a)(2), (a)(3), (a)(7), (a)(8), or (a)(9) of this section shall be credited to the
39 North Carolina Highway Fund. The Division shall use the fees derived from transactions with
40 the Division for technology improvements. The Division shall use the fees derived from
41 transactions with commission contract agents for the payment of compensation to commission
42 contract agents. An additional fifty cents (\$.50) of the fee imposed for any transaction assessed
43 a fee under subdivision (a)(1) of this section shall be credited to the Mercury Switch Removal
44 Account in the Department of Environment and Natural Resources. An additional fifty cents
45 (50¢) of the fee imposed for any transaction assessed a fee under subdivision (a)(1) of this
46 section shall be credited as follows:

47 (1) The first four hundred thousand dollars (\$400,000) collected shall be
48 credited to the Reserve for Visitor Centers in the Highway Fund.

49 (2) Any additional funds collected shall be credited to the Mobility Fund."

50 **SECTION 28.30.(b)** G.S. 20-79.7(c)(2) reads as rewritten:

51 "(2) From the funds remaining in the Special Registration Plate Account after the
52 deductions in accordance with subdivision (1) of this subsection, there is
53 annually appropriated from the Special Registration Plate Account the sum
54 of one million two hundred thousand dollars (\$1,200,000) one million three
55 hundred thousand dollars (\$1,300,000) to provide operating assistance for
56 the Visitor Centers:

- 57 a. on U.S. Highway 17 in Camden County, (\$100,000);
- 58 b. on U.S. Highway 17 in Brunswick County, (\$100,000);
- 59 c. on U.S. Highway 441 in Macon County, (\$100,000);

- 1 d. in the Town of Boone, Watauga County, (\$100,000);
2 e. on U.S. Highway 29 in Caswell County, (\$100,000);
3 f. on U.S. Highway 70 in Carteret County, (\$100,000);
4 g. on U.S. Highway 64 in Tyrrell County, (\$100,000);
5 h. at the intersection of U.S. Highway 701 and N.C. 904 in Columbus
6 County, (\$100,000);
7 i. on U.S. Highway 221 in McDowell County, (\$100,000);
8 j. on Staton Road in Transylvania County, (\$100,000);
9 k. in the Town of Fair Bluff, Columbus County, near the intersection of
10 U.S. Highway 76 and N.C. 904, ~~(\$100,000); and (\$100,000);~~
11 l. on U.S. Highway 421 in Wilkes County, ~~(\$100,000); (\$100,000); and~~
12 m. at the intersection of Interstate 73 and Interstate 74 in Randolph
13 County, (\$100,000)."

All other salary increases are prohibited.
- (2) For employees of the judicial branch for local supplementation as authorized under G.S. 7A-300.1.

The cumulative salary adjustment allowed under this subsection for the 2011-2012 fiscal year may exceed ten percent (10%) of annual salary only if the adjustment is approved in advance by the Office of State Budget and Management, the University of North Carolina Board of Governors, the Board of the North Carolina Community College System, the Legislative Services Commission, local board of education, or other authorized body as appropriate.

SECTION 29.8.(b) The automatic salary step increases for assistant and deputy clerks of superior court and magistrates are suspended for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

SECTION 29.8.(c) The salary increase provisions of G.S. 20-187.3 are suspended for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

SECTION 29.8.(d) Notwithstanding G.S. 53-96.1, and except as provided by subdivision (1) of subsection (a) of this section, employees of the Office of the Commissioner

TEACHER SALARY SCHEDULES

SECTION 29.12.(a) The following monthly salary schedules shall apply for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as teachers. The schedules contain 35 steps, with each step corresponding to one year of teaching experience. Public school employees paid according to this salary schedule and receiving NBPTS certification or obtaining a master's degree shall not be prohibited from receiving the appropriate increase in salary. Provided, however, teachers employed during the 2010-2011 school year who did not work the required number of months to acquire an additional year of experience shall not receive a decrease in salary as otherwise would be required by the salary schedule below.

SECTION 29.12.(b) Annual longevity payments for teachers shall be at the rate of one and one-half percent (1.5%) of base salary for 10 to 14 years of State service, two and twenty-five hundredths percent (2.25%) of base salary for 15 to 19 years of State service, three and twenty-five hundredths percent (3.25%) of base salary for 20 to 24 years of State service, and four and one-half percent (4.5%) of base salary for 25 or more years of State service. The longevity payment shall be paid in a lump sum once a year.

SECTION 29.12.(c) Certified public schoolteachers with certification based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as "M" teachers. Certified public schoolteachers with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as "M" teachers.

SECTION 29.12.(d) The first step of the salary schedule for school psychologists shall be equivalent to Step 5, corresponding to five years of experience, on the salary schedule established in this section for certified personnel of the public schools who are classified as "M" teachers. Certified psychologists shall be placed on the salary schedule at an appropriate step based on their years of experience. Certified psychologists shall receive longevity payments based on years of State service in the same manner as teachers.

Certified psychologists with certification based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified psychologists. Certified psychologists with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for certified psychologists.

SECTION 29.12.(e) Speech pathologists who are certified as speech pathologists at the master's degree level and audiologists who are certified as audiologists at the master's degree level and who are employed in the public schools as speech and language specialists and audiologists shall be paid on the school psychologist salary schedule.

Speech pathologists and audiologists with certification based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall receive a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for speech pathologists and audiologists. Speech pathologists and audiologists with certification based on academic preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month in addition to the compensation provided for speech pathologists and audiologists.

SECTION 29.12.(f) Certified school nurses who are employed in the public schools as nurses shall be paid on the "M" salary schedule.

SECTION 29.12.(g) As used in this section, the term "teacher" shall also include instructional support personnel.

SCHOOL-BASED ADMINISTRATOR SALARY SCHEDULE

SECTION 29.13.(a) The following base salary schedule for school-based administrators shall apply only to principals and assistant principals. This base salary schedule shall apply for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, commencing July 1, 2011. Provided, however, school-based administrators (i) employed during the 2010-2011 school year who did not work the required number of months to acquire an additional year of experience and (ii) employed during the 2011-2012 school year in the same classification shall not receive a decrease in salary as otherwise would be required by the salary schedule below.

SECTION 29.13.(b) The appropriate classification for placement of principals and assistant principals on the salary schedule, except for principals in alternative schools and in cooperative innovative high schools, shall be determined in accordance with the following schedule:

The number of teachers supervised includes teachers and assistant principals paid from State funds only; it does not include teachers or assistant principals paid from non-State funds or the principal or teacher assistants.

The beginning classification for principals in alternative schools and in cooperative innovative high school programs shall be the Principal III level. Principals in alternative schools who supervise 33 or more teachers shall be classified according to the number of teachers supervised.

SECTION 29.13.(c) A principal shall be placed on the step on the salary schedule that reflects total number of years of experience as a certificated employee of the public schools and an additional step for every three years of experience as a principal. Provided, however, a principal who acquires an additional step for the 2011-2012 or 2012-2013 fiscal years shall not receive a corresponding increase in salary during the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium. A principal or assistant principal shall also continue to receive any additional State-funded percentage increases earned for the 1997-1998, 1998-1999, and 1999-2000 school years for improvement in student performance or maintaining a safe and orderly school.

SECTION 29.13.(d) Principals and assistant principals with certification based on academic preparation at the six-year degree level shall be paid a salary supplement of one hundred twenty-six dollars (\$126.00) per month and at the doctoral degree level shall be paid a salary supplement of two hundred fifty-three dollars (\$253.00) per month.

SECTION 29.13.(e) Longevity pay for principals and assistant principals shall be as provided for State employees under the State Personnel Act.

SECTION 29.13.(f) If a principal is reassigned to a higher job classification because the principal is transferred to a school within a local school administrative unit with a larger number of State-allotted teachers, the principal shall be placed on the salary schedule as if the principal had served the principal's entire career as a principal at the higher job classification.

If a principal is reassigned to a lower job classification because the principal is transferred to a school within a local school administrative unit with a smaller number of

1 State-allotted teachers, the principal shall be placed on the salary schedule as if the principal
2 had served the principal's entire career as a principal at the lower job classification.

3 This subsection applies to all transfers on or after the effective date of this section,
4 except transfers in school systems that have been created, or will be created, by merging two or
5 more school systems. Transfers in these merged systems are exempt from the provisions of this
6 subsection for one calendar year following the date of the merger.

7 **SECTION 29.13.(g)** Participants in an approved full-time master's in school
8 administration program shall receive up to a 10-month stipend at the beginning salary of an
9 assistant principal during the internship period of the master's program. For the 2006-2007
10 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years, the stipend shall not exceed the difference between the
11 beginning salary of an assistant principal plus the cost of tuition, fees, and books and any
12 fellowship funds received by the intern as a full-time student, including awards of the Principal
13 Fellows Program. The Principal Fellows Program or the school of education where the intern
14 participates in a full-time master's in school administration program shall supply the
15 Department of Public Instruction with certification of eligible full-time interns.

16 **SECTION 29.13.(h)** During the 2011-2012 fiscal year, the placement on the salary
17 schedule of an administrator with a one-year provisional assistant principal's certificate shall be
18 at the entry-level salary for an assistant principal or the appropriate step on the teacher salary

57 directors/coordinators, supervisors, and finance officers with certification based on academic
58 preparation at the doctoral degree level shall receive a salary supplement of two hundred

3 **SECTION 29.14.(e)** The State Board of Education shall not permit local school
4 administrative units to transfer State funds from other funding categories for salaries for public

7 Central Office Allotment shall remain unchanged for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

9 **NONCERTIFIED PERSONNEL SALARIES**

10 **SECTION 29.15.** The annual salary for permanent, full-time and part-time
11 noncertified public school employees whose salaries are supported from the State's General
12 Fund shall be remain unchanged for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.

13 **FURLOUGHS AUTHORIZED/PUBLIC SCHOOLS**

14 **SECTION 29.16.(a)** The General Assembly finds that local boards of education
15 are under economic stress that requires they be granted flexibility in managing expenditures.
16 Further, the General Assembly finds that the provisions of this section will assist local school
17 boards to best serve communities.

18 **SECTION 29.16.(b)** Local boards of education may implement furloughs of
19 State-funded public school employees to offset any LEA budgetary flexibility adjustment.

20 **SECTION 29.16.(c)** The following definitions apply in this section:

- 21 (1) Furlough. – A temporary period of leave from employment without pay that
22 (i) is ordered by a local board of education and (ii) is not in connection with
23 a demotion or other disciplinary action.
24 (2) Public school employee. – Any person employed by a local school
25 administrative unit. The term includes public officers.

26 **SECTION 29.16.(d)** The provisions of Section 29.18 of this act apply to public
27 school employees furloughed pursuant to this section.

28 **SECTION 29.16.(e)** Local school administrative units shall cooperate with the
29 Department of Public Instruction in the implementation of a furlough, if required.

30 **SECTION 29.16.(f)** As soon as practicable, and no more than 30 calendar days
31 from the effective date of this section, the State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the
32 implementation of this section in accordance with G.S. 150B-21.1A, except that
33 notwithstanding G.S. 150B-21.1A(d), those emergency rules may remain in effect until the
34 expiration of this section. These rules shall be applied by local boards of education in
35 designating the times public school employees may be subject to furlough. These rules shall
36 provide, at a minimum, that:

13 **SECTION 29.17.(a)** Findings. – The General Assembly finds that The University
14 of North Carolina requires flexibility in managing personnel-related expenditures and that the
15 provisions of this section will aid in the administration of personnel-related costs.

16 **SECTION 29.17.(b)** The President of The University of North Carolina may
17 implement furloughs of university employees or delegate furlough authority to a chancellor of a
18 constituent institution to offset any UNC management flexibility reduction.

19 **SECTION 29.17.(c)** Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

20 (1) Furlough. – A temporary period of leave from employment without pay that
21 (i) is ordered by the President of The University of North Carolina or a
22 chancellor when delegated and (ii) is not in connection with a demotion or
23 other disciplinary action.

24 (2) University employee. – Any permanent full-time, permanent part-time, or
25 time-limited employee of The University of North Carolina, including
26 employees exempt from the State Personnel Act under G.S. 126-5(c),
27 126-5(c1), 126-5(c7), and 126-5(c8). The term includes public officers.

28 **SECTION 29.17.(d)** The provisions of Section 29.18 of this act apply to university
29 employees furloughed pursuant to this section.

30 **SECTION 29.17.(e)** Cooperation with The University of North Carolina – General
31 Administration. – Constituent institutions shall cooperate with UNC General Administration in
32 the implementation of furloughs, if required.

33 **SECTION 29.17.(f)** As soon as practicable, and no more than 30 calendar days
34 from the effective date of this section, the Board of Governors of The University of North
35 Carolina shall adopt policies for the implementation of this section to remain in effect until the
36 expiration of this section. These policies shall be applied by the President and the constituent
37 institutions in implementing a furlough of university employees. These policies shall provide,
38 at a minimum, that:

39 (1) The President may establish a salary threshold below which university
40 employees shall not be subject to furlough. In no event may any full-time
41 university employee, prorated for any part-time employee, earning an annual
42 salary of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) or less be subject to
43 furlough.

44 (2) The scheduling of any furlough period shall be at the discretion of the
45 President or the chancellor of the constituent institution when delegated.

46 (3) Paid leave shall not be used to offset all or any portion of a furlough.

47 (4) If a holiday falls during the mandatory furlough period, the university
48 employee must be paid for the holiday.

49 (5) All savings realized as a result of a furlough shall be used to offset the
50 Management Flexibility Reduction for The University of North Carolina.

51 **SECTION 29.17.(g)** Upon delegation of furlough authority to a chancellor, the
52 constituent institution shall develop a furlough plan to be approved by the President consistent
53 with the policies adopted by the UNC Board of Governors. Access to approved furlough plans
54 shall be provided to all affected employees.

55 **SECTION 29.17.(h)** Effective Date. – This section is effective when it becomes
56 law and expires June 30, 2013.

FURLOUGHS AUTHORIZED/NORTH CAROLINA COMMUNITY COLLEGE SYSTEM

SECTION 29.17A.(a) Findings. – The General Assembly finds that the North Carolina Community College System requires flexibility in managing personnel-related expenditures and that the provisions of this section will aid in the administration of personnel-related costs.

SECTION 29.17A.(b) The President of the North Carolina Community College System (System President) may implement furloughs of community college employees or delegate furlough authority to a local system president of a system institution to offset any management flexibility reduction.

SECTION 29.17A.(c) Definitions. – The following definitions apply in this section:

- (1) Community college employee. – Any permanent full-time, permanent part-time, or time-limited employee of the North Carolina Community College System. The term includes public officers.
- (2) Furlough. – A temporary period of leave from employment without pay that (i) is ordered by the System President of the North Carolina Community College System or a local system president when delegated and (ii) is not in connection with a demotion or other disciplinary action.

SECTION 29.17A.(d) The provisions of Section 29.18 of this act apply to community college employees furloughed pursuant to this section.

SECTION 29.17A.(e) Cooperation with the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office. – System institutions shall cooperate with the North Carolina Community Colleges System Office in the implementation of furloughs, if required.

SECTION 29.17A.(f) As soon as practicable, and no more than 30 calendar days from the effective date of this section, the State Board of Community Colleges shall adopt policies for the implementation of this section to remain in effect until the expiration of this section. These policies shall be applied by the System President and the system institutions in implementing a furlough of community college employees. These policies shall provide, at a minimum, that:

- (1) The System President may establish a salary threshold below which community college employees shall not be subject to furlough. In no event may any full-time community college employee, prorated for any part-time employee, earning an annual salary of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) or less be subject to furlough.
- (2) The scheduling of any furlough period shall be at the discretion of the System President or the local system president of a system institution when delegated.
- (3) Paid leave shall not be used to offset all or any portion of a furlough.
- (4) If a holiday falls during the mandatory furlough period, the community college employee must be paid for the holiday.
- (5) All savings realized as a result of a furlough shall be used to offset the Management Flexibility Reduction for the North Carolina Community College System.

SECTION 29.17A.(g) Upon delegation of furlough authority to a local system president, the system institution shall develop a furlough plan to be approved by the System President consistent with the policies adopted by the State Board of Community Colleges. Access to approved furlough plans shall be provided to all affected employees.

SECTION 29.17A.(h) Effective Date. – This section is effective when it becomes law and expires June 30, 2013.

BENEFITS PROTECTION FOR FURLOUGHED STATE GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES AND PUBLIC SCHOOL PERSONNEL

SECTION 29.18.(a) The following definitions apply in this section:

- (1) Furlough. – A temporary period of leave from employment without pay that (i) is ordered or authorized by the Governor, the Chief Justice, the Legislative Services Commission, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, the Board of the North Carolina Community College

1 System, or a local school board and (ii) is not in connection with a demotion
2 or any other disciplinary action.

3 (2) Public agency. – A State agency, department, or institution in the executive,
4 legislative, or judicial branch of State government; The University of North
5 Carolina; the North Carolina Community College System; and a local school
6 administrative unit.

7 (3) Public employee. – An employee employed by a public agency.

8 **SECTION 29.18.(b)** Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, if necessary
9 economies in public agency expenditures must be effected by a furlough of public employees,
10 then a public employee on a furlough who is:

11 (1) A member of any of the State-supported retirement plans administered by
12 the Retirement Systems Division of the Department of State Treasurer, or an
13 Optional Retirement Program (ORP) administered under G.S. 135-5.1 or
14 G.S. 135-5.4, shall be considered in active service during any period of
15 furlough and shall be entitled to all of the same benefits to which the
16 employee was entitled on the workday immediately preceding the furlough.
17 The member shall suffer no diminution of retirement average final
18 compensation based on being on furlough, and the retirement average final
19 compensation shall be calculated based on the undiminished compensation.
20 During a furlough period, the employer shall pay both employee and
21 employer contributions to the Retirement Systems Division or ORP on
22 behalf of the furloughed employee as though the employee were in active
23 service.

24 (2) A member of the State Health Plan for Teachers and State Employees shall
25 be considered eligible for coverage under the Plan on the same basis as on
26 the workday immediately preceding the furlough. The public employer shall
27 pay contributions on behalf of the furloughed public employee as though the
28 employee were in active service.

29 **SECTION 29.18.(c)** This section holds harmless employees who are subject to
30 furloughs to accomplish economies required by this act as to their retirement and other benefits
31 that normally accrue as a result of employment. This section does not apply to a furlough
32 within a public agency that is designed:

33 (1) To solely and selectively provide benefits to a public employee or a subset
34 of public employees, or to extend or enhance benefits beyond those that
35 normally accrue to a public employee as a result of employment.

36 (2) To allow the public agency to settle any claim against the public agency or
37 to gain additional economies not specifically required by this act.

38 **SECTION 29.18.(d)** This section shall not be construed as authorizing furloughs.

39 **SECTION 29.18.(e)** Whenever the Governor, the Chief Justice, the Legislative
40 Services Commission, the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, the Board
41 of the North Carolina Community College System, or a local school board authorizes a
42 furlough of public agency employees, the respective authorizing officer or entity shall report to
43 the State Treasurer, the Director of the Retirement Systems Division, and the Executive
44 Administrator of the State Health Plan the following:

45 (1) The specifics of the authorized furlough including the applicable reduction
46 in salary and the date the reduction in salary will occur. Examples of other
47 furlough specifics include one-day furlough per month for the next three
48 months, five furlough days during the remainder of the fiscal year, et cetera.

49 (2) The positions affected, including all full-time, part-time, temporary and
50 contractual positions, all nonessential personnel, all nonteaching positions, et
51 cetera.

52 (3) The individual employees affected, including the applicable reduction in
53 salary and whether the employee is subject to or exempt from the Fair Labor
54 Standards Act.

55 (4) Certification that the furlough is not in connection with a demotion or any
56 other disciplinary action.

57 (5) Certification that the furlough is to accomplish economies specifically
58 required by this act, including the specific budget provision or reduction the
59 furlough is intended to address.

- 1 (6) Certification that the furlough is not related to the settlement of any claim
2 against a public agency.

3 **SECTION 29.18.(f)** This section is effective when it becomes law.
4

5 **MONITOR COMPLIANCE WITH FREEZE ON MOST SALARY INCREASES**

6 **SECTION 29.19.(a)** The Office of State Budget and Management and the Office
7 of State Personnel shall monitor jointly the compliance of the following units of government
8 with the provisions of Section 29.8 of this act and shall submit quarterly reports of their
9 monitoring activities to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of
10 Representatives, and the Fiscal Research Division: (i) State agencies, departments, and
11 institutions, including authorities, boards, and commissions; (ii) the judicial branch; and (iii)
12 The University of North Carolina and its constituent institutions.

13 The quarterly reports required by this section shall include the following
14 information:

- 15 (1) For agencies reporting through the BEACON HR/Payroll system, (i) a
16 breakdown by action type (including promotion, reallocation, career
17 progression, salary adjustment, and any similar actions increasing employee
18 pay) of the number and annual amount of those increases and (ii) a
19 breakdown by action reason (including in-range higher level, acting pay,
20 trainee adjustment, and other similar action reasons) of the number and
21 annual amount of those action types coded as salary adjustment.
- 22 (2) For The University of North Carolina and its constituent institutions, a
23 breakdown of the number and annual amount of those increases categorized
24 by the university as promotions, changes in job duties or responsibilities,
25 Distinguished Professorships, retention pay, career progression, and any
26 similar actions increasing employee pay.
- 27 (3) A summary of actions taken by the Office of State Budget and Management
28 and the Office of State Personnel with respect to unauthorized salary
29 increases.

30 **SECTION 29.19.(b)** The Legislative Services Officer shall report quarterly to the
31 President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House of Representatives on
32 compliance with this act.
33

34 **COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW AND REFORM OF PUBLIC EMPLOYEE**
35 **COMPENSATION PLANS**

36 **SECTION 29.20.(a)** It is the intent of the General Assembly to create and
37 implement a modernized, fair, and fully-functional performance-based compensation system
38 for employees of State agencies, departments, institutions, The University of North Carolina
39 System, the North Carolina Community College System, and local education agencies. To that
40 end, the Legislative Services Commission, jointly through the Fiscal Research and Program
41 Evaluation Divisions, is directed to commission a review and study of the current compensation
42 plans of State agencies, departments, institutions, The University of North Carolina System, the
43 North Carolina Community College System, and local education agencies (government
44 sectors). The Legislative Services Commission may use a Request for Information process or a
45 Request for Proposal process to contract with a qualified consulting firm to perform this review
46 and study. The study shall be completed in two phases and, at minimum, shall include all of the
47 following:

- 48 (1) Phase I. –
49 a. A labor market analysis of pay, fringe benefits, classification, and
50 banding plans of government sector employees to determine whether
51 current employees are compensated appropriately relative to market
52 rates for similar positions as compared to (i) other North Carolina
53 public employees, (ii) similar positions and employees in other
54 states, and (iii) where applicable, employees in private industry.
- 55 b. An analysis of current performance-based compensation plans in use
56 by the North Carolina Banking Commission, the University of North
57 Carolina Health Care System, and the performance-based
58 compensation system proposed by Charlotte/Mecklenburg County
59 Schools. This analysis should include an assessment of the

- 1 effectiveness of these performance-based plans and should include
 2 identification of best practices.
- 3 c. An evaluation of current longevity pay as applicable to most
 4 government sector employees and recommendations as to whether
 5 longevity pay should be continued for new hires.
- 6 d. An evaluation of current laws and policies related to 'career status'
 7 for employees subject to the State Personnel Act and tenure for
 8 public school teachers and university professors. This evaluation
 9 should include recommendations as to whether these laws and
 10 policies should be continued or modified based upon human resource
 11 best practices.
- 12 e. An evaluation of the State Personnel Act including recommendations
 13 as to whether these laws and policies should be continued or
 14 modified based upon human resource best practices.
- 15 f. An analysis of the effect of in-State regional variables on employee
 16 compensation and recommendations as to how those variables should
 17 be addressed in the future.
- 18 g. Recommendations of how to evaluate and compare the value of
 19 employee fringe benefits.
- 20 (2) Phase II. –
- 21 a. Assessment of the validity of performance-based compensation
 22 plans.
- 23 b. Recommendations, timetable, and design of a comprehensive
 24 performance-based compensation plan across all government sectors
 25 for implementation by the General Assembly. Recommendations
 26 must include the design of an effective employee performance
 27 evaluation system, including the identification of effective employee
 28 performance measures and information systems (including estimated
 29 costs) to track and monitor employee performance.
- 30 c. Training recommendations for supervisors and managers regarding
 31 employee productivity and performance evaluation.
- 32 d. Recommendations to assure equity of compensation among public
 33 employees across government sectors.
- 34 e. Feasibility of a consensus forecasting group to make annual
 35 recommendations for compensation policy across all government
 36 sectors. These recommendations should include how to establish and
 37 maintain priorities for General Fund appropriations necessary to fund
 38 the performance-based compensation system while remaining
 39 affordable for the State and its taxpayers.

40 **SECTION 29.20.(b)** By May 1, 2012, an interim report completed jointly by the
 41 Fiscal Research and Program Evaluation Divisions, or at their direction by the consultant hired
 42 to perform the review and study, shall be submitted to the 2012 Regular Session of the 2011
 43 General Assembly. The interim report shall include all Phase I findings. The Fiscal Research
 44 and Program Evaluation Divisions, or consultant, shall report the Phase II findings and any
 45 other final results of its study including recommendations and legislative proposals to the 2013
 46 General Assembly upon its convening.

47 **SECTION 29.20.(c)** All State agencies, departments, institutions, The University
 48 of North Carolina System, the North Carolina Community College System, and local education
 49 agencies shall provide any information, data, or documents within their possession,
 50 ascertainable from their records, or otherwise available to them to the Fiscal Research and
 51 Program Evaluation Divisions and/or the consultant necessary to complete this review and
 52 study.

53 **SECTION 29.20.(d)** The State Personnel Director, the State Budget Director, the
 54 State Controller, and the State Treasurer shall dedicate and identify staff for technical
 55 assistance, as needed, to aid in the reviews required by this section.

57 ESTABLISH SEVERANCE EXPENDITURE RESERVE

58 **SECTION 29.21.(a)** There is established in the Office of State Budget and
 59 Management a General Fund reserve budget code for the purpose of funding severance-related

1 obligations to State employees subject to the State Personnel Act, and employees exempt from
2 the State Personnel Act, who are separated from service due to a reduction-in-force action.
3 Severance-related expenditures from this reserve shall include obligations to fund:

- 4 (1) A State employee's severance salary continuation with an age adjustment
5 factor as authorized by G.S. 126-8.5, including employer related
6 contributions for social security, and
- 7 (2) Noncontributory health premiums for up to 12 months as authorized by
8 G.S. 135-45.2(a)(8) for employees of employing units as defined by
9 G.S. 135-45.1(12).

10 **SECTION 29.21.(b)** The Director of the Budget shall allocate funds appropriated
11 in Section 2.1 of this act to the Severance Expenditure Reserve to public agencies to fund
12 severance-related obligations incurred by the agencies as a result of reduction-in-force actions
13 that cause State-supported public employees to be terminated from public employment. Funds
14 appropriated to the Severance Expenditure Reserve shall be expended in their entirety before
15 funds appropriated to a public agency for State-supported personal services expenditures may
16 be used to fund any severance-related obligations. For the purposes of this subsection, the term
17 "public employee" means an employee of a State agency, department, or institution; The
18 University of North Carolina; the North Carolina Community College System Office; or a local
19 school administrative unit.

21 SALARY-RELATED CONTRIBUTIONS

22 **SECTION 29.22.(a)** Effective for the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, required
23 employer salary-related contributions for employees whose salaries are paid from department,
24 office, institution, or agency receipts shall be paid from the same source as the source of the
25 employees' salary. If an employee's salary is paid in part from the General Fund or Highway
26 Fund and in part from department, office, institution, or agency receipts, required employer
27 salary-related contributions may be paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund only to the
28 extent of the proportionate part paid from the General Fund or Highway Fund in support of the
29 salary of the employee, and the remainder of the employer's requirements shall be paid from the
30 source that supplies the remainder of the employee's salary. The requirements of this section as
31 to source of payment are also applicable to payments on behalf of the employee for
32 hospital-medical benefits, longevity pay, unemployment compensation, accumulated leave,
33 workers' compensation, severance pay, separation allowances, and applicable disability income
34 benefits.

35 Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an employing unit, as defined in
36 G.S. 135-45.1 or in G.S. 135-48.1 as enacted by this act, that hires or has hired as an employee
37 a retiree that is in receipt of monthly retirement benefits from any retirement system supported
38 in whole or in part by contributions of the State shall enroll the retiree in the active group and
39 pay the cost for the hospital-medical benefits if that retiree is employed in a position that would
40 require the employer to pay hospital-medical benefits if the individual had not been retired.

41 **SECTION 29.22.(b)** Effective July 1, 2011, the State's employer contribution rates
42 budgeted for retirement and related benefits as percentage of covered salaries for the 2011-2012
43 fiscal year are: (i) thirteen and sixty-two hundredths percent (13.62%) – Teachers and State
44 Employees; (ii) eighteen and sixty-two hundredths percent (18.62%) – State Law Enforcement
45 Officers; (iii) twelve and thirty-six hundredths percent (12.36%) – University Employees'
46 Optional Retirement System; (iv) twelve and thirty-six hundredths percent (12.36%) –
47 Community College Optional Retirement Program; (v) thirty-one and fifty-four hundredths
48 percent (31.54%) – Consolidated Judicial Retirement System; and (vi) five and zero hundredths
49 percent (5.00%) – Legislative Retirement System. Each of the foregoing contribution rates
50 includes five and zero hundredths percent (5.00%) for hospital and medical benefits. The rate
51 for Teachers and State Employees, State Law Enforcement Officers, Community College
52 Optional Retirement Program, and for the University Employees' Optional Retirement Program
53 includes fifty-two hundredths percent (0.52%) for the Disability Income Plan. The rates for
54 Teachers and State Employees and State Law Enforcement Officers include sixteen hundredths
55 percent (0.16%) for the Death Benefits Plan. The rate for State Law Enforcement Officers
56 includes five percent (5%) for Supplemental Retirement Income.

57 **SECTION 29.22.(c)** Effective July 1, 2012, the State's employer contribution rates
58 budgeted for retirement and related benefits as percentage of covered salaries for the 2012-2013
59 fiscal year are: (i) fifteen percent (15%) – Teachers and State Employees; (ii) twenty percent

(20%) – State Law Enforcement Officers; (iii) twelve and sixty-six hundredths percent (12.66%) – University Employees' Optional Retirement System; (iv) twelve and sixty-six hundredths percent (12.66%) – Community College Optional Retirement Program; (v) thirty-three and fifty-one hundredths percent (33.51%) – Consolidated Judicial Retirement System; and (vi) five and thirty hundredths percent (5.30%) – Legislative Retirement System. Each of the foregoing contribution rates includes five and thirty hundredths percent (5.30%) for hospital and medical benefits. The rate for Teachers and State Employees, State Law Enforcement Officers, Community College Optional Retirement Program, and for the University Employees' Optional Retirement Program includes fifty-two hundredths percent (0.52%) for the Disability Income Plan. The rates for Teachers and State Employees and State Law Enforcement Officers include sixteen hundredths percent (0.16%) for the Death Benefits Plan. The rate for State Law Enforcement Officers includes five percent (5%) for Supplemental Retirement Income.

SECTION 29.22.(d) Effective July 1, 2011, the maximum annual employer contributions, payable monthly, by the State for each covered employee or retiree for the 2011-2012 fiscal year to the State Health Plan for Teachers and State Employees are: (i) Medicare-eligible employees and retirees – three thousand seven hundred seventy-six dollars (\$3,776) and (ii) non-Medicare-eligible employees and retirees – four thousand nine hundred sixty-two dollars (\$4,962).

SECTION 29.22.(e) Effective July 1, 2012, the maximum annual employer contributions, payable monthly, by the State for each covered employee or retiree for the 2012-2013 fiscal year to the State Health Plan for Teachers and State Employees are: (i) Medicare-eligible employees and retirees – three thousand nine hundred eighty-one dollars (\$3,981) and (ii) non-Medicare-eligible employees and retirees – five thousand two hundred thirty-two dollars (\$5,232).

LIMIT STATE ABORTION FUNDING/HEALTH PLAN/INSURANCE

SECTION 29.23. No State funds may be used for the performance of abortions or to support the administration of any governmental health plan or government-offered insurance policy offering abortion, except that this prohibition shall not apply where (i) the life of the mother would be endangered if the unborn child were carried to term or (ii) the pregnancy is the result of a rape or incest. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit medical care provided after a spontaneous miscarriage.

PART XXX. CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS

GENERAL FUND CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS/INTRODUCTION

SECTION 30.1. The appropriations made by the 2011 General Assembly for capital improvements are for constructing, repairing, or renovating State buildings, utilities, and other capital facilities, for acquiring sites for them where necessary, and for acquiring buildings and land for State government purposes.

CAPITAL APPROPRIATIONS/GENERAL FUND

SECTION 30.2. There is appropriated from the General Fund for the 2011-2012 fiscal year the following amounts for capital improvements:

WATER RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

SECTION 30.3.(a) The Department of Environment and Natural Resources shall allocate the funds appropriated in this act for water resources development projects in accordance with the schedule that follows. These funds will provide a State match for an estimated twenty-three million four hundred forty-nine thousand dollars (\$23,449,000) in federal funds.

SECTION 30.3.(b) Where the actual costs are different from the estimated costs under subsection (a) of this section, the Department may adjust the allocations among projects as needed. If any projects funded under subsection (a) of this section are delayed, and the budgeted State funds cannot be used during the 2011-2012 fiscal year, or if the projects funded under subsection (a) of this section are accomplished at a lower cost, the Department may use the resulting fund availability to fund any of the following:

- (1) U.S. Army Corps of Engineers project feasibility studies.
- (2) U.S. Army Corps of Engineers projects whose schedules have advanced and require State-matching funds in fiscal year 2011-2012.
- (3) State-local water resources development projects.

However, fund availability shall not be used to fund the North Carolina International Terminal. Funds subject to this subsection that are not expended or encumbered for the purposes set forth in subdivisions (1) through (3) of this subsection shall revert to the General Fund at the end of the 2012-2013 fiscal year.

SECTION 30.3.(c) The Department shall make semiannual reports on the use of these funds to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations, the Fiscal Research Division, and the Office of State Budget and Management. Each report shall include all of the following:

- (1) All projects listed in this section.
- (2) The estimated cost of each project.
- (3) The date that work on each project began or is expected to begin.
- (4) The date that work on each project was completed or is expected to be completed.
- (5) The actual cost of each project.

The semiannual reports also shall show those projects advanced in schedule, those projects delayed in schedule, and an estimate of the amount of funds expected to revert to the General Fund.

SECTION 30.3.(d) Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, funds appropriated for a water resources development project shall be used to provide no more than fifty percent (50%) of the nonfederal portion of funds for the project. This subsection applies to funds appropriated in this act and to funds appropriated prior to the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium that are unencumbered and proposed for reallocation to provide the nonfederal portion of funds for water resources development projects. The limitation on fund usage contained in this

subsection applies only to projects in which a local government or local governments participate.

SECTION 30.3.(e) G.S. 143-215.73A is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

"(c1) At least 60 days prior to preparing the Water Resources Development Plan, the Department shall provide information to appropriate county or municipal officials about the availability of Water Resources Development Funding and requirements to receive that funding."

SECTION 30.4.(b) From funds deposited with the State Treasurer in a capital improvement account to the credit of the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services pursuant to G.S. 146-30, the sum of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) for the 2011-2012 fiscal year shall be transferred to the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services to be used, notwithstanding G.S. 146-30, by the Department for its plant conservation program under Article 19B of Chapter 106 of the General Statutes for costs incidental to the acquisition of land, such as land appraisals, land surveys, title searches, and environmental studies, and for the management of the plant conservation program preserves owned by the Department.

REPAIRS AND RENOVATIONS RESERVE ALLOCATION

SECTION 30.5.(a) Of the funds in the Reserve for Repairs and Renovations for the 2011-2012 fiscal year, fifty percent (50%) shall be allocated to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina for repairs and renovations pursuant to G.S. 143C-4-3, in accordance with guidelines developed in The University of North Carolina Funding Allocation Model for Reserve for Repairs and Renovations, as approved by the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina, and fifty percent (50%) shall be allocated to the Office of State Budget and Management for repairs and renovations pursuant to G.S. 143C-4-3.

Notwithstanding G.S. 143C-4-3, the Board of Governors may allocate funds for the repair and renovation of facilities not supported from the General Fund if the Board determines that sufficient funds are not available from other sources and that conditions warrant General Fund assistance. Any such finding shall be included in the Board's submission to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations on the proposed allocation of funds.

The Board of Governors and the Office of State Budget and Management shall consult with the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations prior to the allocation or reallocation of these funds.

SECTION 30.5.(b) Of the funds allocated to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina in subsection (a) of this section, a portion shall be used by the Board of Governors for the installation of fire sprinklers in university residence halls. This portion shall be in addition to funds otherwise appropriated in this act for the same purpose. Such funds shall be allocated among The University of North Carolina's constituent institutions by the President of The University of North Carolina, who shall consider the following factors when allocating those funds:

- (1) The safety and well-being of the residents of campus housing programs.
- (2) The current level of housing rents charged to students and how that compares to an institution's public peers and other UNC institutions.
- (3) The level of previous authorizations to constituent institutions for the construction or renovation of residence halls funded from the General Fund, or from bonds or certificates of participation supported by the General Fund, since 1996.
- (4) The financial status of each constituent institution's housing system, including debt capacity, debt coverage ratios, credit rankings, required reserves, the planned use of cash balances for other housing system improvements, and the constituent institution's ability to pay for the installation of fire sprinklers in all residence halls.
- (5) The total cost of each proposed project, including the cost of installing fire sprinklers and the cost of other construction, such as asbestos removal and additional water supply needs.

The Board of Governors shall submit progress reports to the Joint Legislative Commission on Governmental Operations. Reports shall include the status of completed, current, and planned projects. Reports also shall include information on the financial status of each constituent institution's housing system, the constituent institution's ability to pay for fire protection in residence halls, and the timing of installation of fire sprinklers. Reports shall be submitted on January 1 and July 1 until all residence halls have fire sprinklers.

SECTION 30.5.(c) Of the funds allocated to the Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina in subsection (a) of this section, a portion shall be used by the Board of Governors for campus public safety improvements allowable under G.S. 143C-4-3(b).

PROCEDURES FOR DISBURSEMENT OF CAPITAL FUNDS

SECTION 30.6. The appropriations made by the 2011 General Assembly for capital improvements shall be disbursed for the purposes provided by this act. Expenditure of funds shall not be made by any State department, institution, or agency until an allotment has been approved by the Governor as Director of the Budget. The allotment shall be approved only after full compliance with the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the General Statutes. Prior to the award of construction contracts for projects to be financed in whole or in part with self-liquidating appropriations, the Director of the Budget shall approve the elements of the method of financing of those projects, including the source of funds, interest rate, and liquidation period. Provided, however, that if the Director of the Budget approves the method

1 of financing a project, the Director shall report that action to the Joint Legislative Commission
2 on Governmental Operations at its next meeting.

3 Where direct capital improvement appropriations include the purpose of furnishing
4 fixed and movable equipment for any project, those funds for equipment shall not be subject to
5 transfer into construction accounts except as authorized by the Director of the Budget. The
6 expenditure of funds for fixed and movable equipment and furnishings shall be reviewed and
7 approved by the Director of the Budget prior to commitment of funds.

8 Capital improvement projects authorized by the 2011 General Assembly shall be
9 completed, including fixed and movable equipment and furnishings, within the limits of the
10 amounts of the direct or self-liquidating appropriations provided, except as otherwise provided
11 in this act. Capital improvement projects authorized by the 2011 General Assembly for the
12 design phase only shall be designed within the scope of the project as defined by the approved
13 cost estimate filed with the Director of the Budget, including costs associated with site
14 preparation, demolition, and movable and fixed equipment.

15 **UNC NON-GENERAL FUND CAPITAL PROJECTS**

16 **SECTION 30.7.(a)** The purpose of this section is (i) to authorize the planning or
17 construction by certain constituent institutions of The University of North Carolina of the
18 capital improvements projects listed in this section for the respective institutions and (ii) to
19 authorize the financing of these projects with funds available to the institutions from gifts,
20 grants, receipts, self-liquidating indebtedness, Medicare reimbursements for education costs,
21 hospital receipts from patient care, or other funds, or any combination of these funds, but not
22 including funds received for tuition or appropriated from the General Fund of the State.

23 **SECTION 30.7.(b)** The capital improvements projects, and their respective costs,
24 authorized by this section to be constructed and financed as provided in subsection (a) of this
25 section, including by revenue bonds, by special obligation bonds as authorized in subsection (e)

54 experience may include at least one hour of instruction on the techniques of
55 defensive driving.
56 (4) At least one hour of motorcycle safety awareness training.

57 (c) The State Board of Education shall establish and implement a strategic plan for the
58 driver education program. At a minimum, the strategic plan shall consist of goals and
59 performance indicators, including the number of program participants as compared to the

1 number of persons projected to be eligible to participate in the program, the implementation of
2 a standard curriculum for the program, expenditures for the program, and the success rate of
3 program participants in receiving a drivers license as reported by the Division of Motor
4 Vehicles. The strategic plan shall also outline specific roles and duties of an advisory
5 committee consisting of employees of the Division of Motor Vehicles and the Department of
6 Public Instruction and other stakeholders in driver education.

7 (d) The State Board of Education shall adopt a salary range for driver education
8 instructors who are public school employees and who do not hold teacher certificates.

9 Driver education instructors who are public school employees and who hold teacher
10 certificates shall be paid on the teacher salary schedule. A day of employment for driver
11 education instructors who hold teacher certificates shall be the same number of hours required
12 of all regular classroom teachers as established by the local board of education.

13 (e) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules to permit local boards of education
14 to enter contracts with public or private entities to provide a program of driver education at
15 public high schools. All driver education instructors shall meet the requirements established by
16 the State Board of Education; provided, however, driver education instructors shall not be

46 Commissioner for a permit to report the tonnage of commercial fertilizer sold and shall pay to
47 the North Carolina Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services an inspection fee of
48 ~~twenty-five cents (25¢)~~ fifty cents (50¢) per ton. The Commissioner is authorized to require
49 each such distributor to keep such records as may be necessary to indicate accurately the
50 tonnage of commercial fertilizers sold in the State, and as are satisfactory to the Commissioner.
51 Such records shall be available to the Commissioner, or his duly authorized representative, at
52 any and all reasonable hours for the purpose of making such examination as is necessary to
53 verify the tonnage statement and the inspection fees paid. Each registrant shall report monthly
54 the tonnage sold to non-registrants on forms furnished by the Commissioner. Such reports shall
55 be made and inspection fees shall be due and payable monthly on the fifteenth of each month
56 covering the tonnage and kind of commercial fertilizers sold during the past month. If the
57 report is not filed and the inspection fee paid by the last day of the month it is due, the amount
58 due shall bear a penalty of ten percent (10%), which shall be added to the inspection fee due. If

1 the report is not filed and the inspection fee paid within 60 days of the date due, or if the report
2 or tonnage be false, the Commissioner may revoke the permit."

3 **SECTION 31.8.(b)** G.S. 106-65.31(b1) reads as rewritten:

4 "(b1) Registration. – Within 75 days after the hiring of an employee who is either an
5 estimator, salesman, serviceman, or solicitor, the licensee shall apply to the Division for the
6 issuance of an identification card for such employee. The application must be accompanied by
7 a fee of forty dollars (\$40.00) for each card. The card shall be issued in the name of the
8 employee and shall bear the name of the employing licensee, the employer's license number

17 dollars (\$5.00). The licensee shall notify the Division of the termination or change in status of
18 any registered technician. All identification cards expire when a license expires."

21 **TONNAGE FEES**

22 **SECTION 31.9.** G.S. 106-92.8 reads as rewritten:

23 "**§ 106-92.8. Tonnage fees: reporting system.**

24 For the purpose of defraying expenses connected with the registration, inspection and
25 analysis of the materials coming under this Article, each manufacturer or registrant shall pay to
26 the Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services tonnage fees in addition to registration
27 fees as follows: for agricultural liming material, ~~ten cents (10¢)~~ fifty cents (50¢) per ton; for
28 landplaster, ~~ten cents (10¢)~~ fifty cents (50¢) per ton; excepting that these fees shall not apply to
29 materials which are sold to fertilizer manufacturers for the sole purpose for use in the
30 manufacture of fertilizer or to materials when sold in packages of 10 pounds or less.

31 Any manufacturer, importer, jobber, firm, corporation or person who distributes materials
32 coming under this Article in this State shall make application for a permit to report the
33 materials sold and pay the tonnage fees as set forth in this section.

34 The Commissioner of Agriculture shall grant such permits on the following conditions: The
35 applicant's agreement that he will keep such records as may be necessary to indicate accurately
36 the tonnage of liming materials, etc., sold in the State and his agreement for the Commissioner
37 or this authorized representative to examine such records to verify the tonnage statement. The
38 registrant shall report quarterly and pay the applicable tonnage fees quarterly, on or before the
39 tenth day of October, January, April, and July of each year. The report and payment shall cover
40 the tonnage of liming materials, etc., sold during the preceding quarter. The report shall be on
41 forms furnished by the Commissioner. If the report is not filed and the tonnage fees paid by the
42 last day of the month in which it is due, or if the report be false, the amount due shall bear a
43 penalty of ten percent (10%) which shall be added to the tonnage fees due. If the report is not
44 filed and the tonnage fees paid within 60 days of the date due, or if the report or tonnage be
45 false, the Commissioner may revoke the permit and cancel the registration."

46
47 **NER/AGRICULTURE/INCREASE ANTIFREEZE DISTRIBUTION REGISTRATION**
48 **FEE**

49 **SECTION 31.10.** G.S. 106-579.4 reads as rewritten:

50 "**§ 106-579.4. Registrations.**

51 On or before the first day of July of each year, and before any antifreeze may be distributed
52 for the permit year beginning July 1, the manufacturer, packager, or person whose name
53 appears on the label shall make application to the Commissioner on forms provided by the
54 latter for registration for each brand of antifreeze which he desires to distribute. The application
55 shall be accompanied by specimens or facsimiles of labeling for all container sizes to be
56 distributed, when requested by the Commissioner; a license and inspection fee of ~~two hundred~~
57 ~~and fifty dollars (\$250.00)~~ five hundred dollars (\$500.00) for each brand of antifreeze and a
58 properly labeled sample of the antifreeze shall also be submitted at this time. The
59 Commissioner may inspect, test, or analyze the antifreeze and review the labeling. If the

1 antifreeze is not adulterated or misbranded, if it meets the standards established and
2 promulgated by the Board, and if the said antifreeze is not such a type or kind that is in
3 violation of this Article, the Commissioner shall thereafter issue a written license or permit
4 authorizing the sale of such antifreeze in this State for the fiscal year in which the license or
5 inspection fee is paid. If the antifreeze is adulterated or misbranded, if it fails to meet standards
6 promulgated by the Board, or is in violation of this Article or regulations thereunder, the
7 Commissioner shall refuse to register the antifreeze, and he shall return the application to the
8 applicant, stating how the antifreeze or labeling is not in conformity. If the Commissioner shall,
9 at a later date, find that a properly registered antifreeze product has been materially altered or
10 adulterated, or a change has been made in the name, brand or trademark under which the
11 antifreeze is sold, or that it violates the provisions of this Article, or that it violates regulations,
12 definitions or standards duly promulgated by the Board, he shall notify the applicant that the
13 license authorizing sale of the antifreeze is canceled. No antifreeze license shall be canceled
14 unless the registrant shall have been given an opportunity to be heard before the Commissioner
15 or his duly designated agent and to modify his application in order to comply with the
16 requirements of this Article and regulations, definitions, and standards promulgated by the
17 Board. All fees received by the Commissioner shall be placed in the Department of Agriculture

In the event the funds derived from the facilities fees exceed what is needed for these purposes, the county or municipality may use any or all of the excess to retire outstanding indebtedness incurred in the construction of the facilities, or to reimburse the county or municipality for funds expended in constructing or renovating the facilities (without incurring any indebtedness) within a period of two years before or after the date a district court is established in such county, or to supplement the operations of the General Court of Justice in the county.

Persons who are lawfully confined in jail awaiting trial shall be liable to the county or municipality maintaining the jail in the sum of ~~five-ten~~ dollars (~~(\$5.00)~~ (\$10.00)) for each 24 hours' confinement, or fraction thereof, except that a person so confined shall not be liable for this fee if the case or proceeding against him is dismissed, or if acquitted, or if judgment is arrested, or if probable cause is not found, or if the grand jury fails to return a true bill.

1 Persons who are ordered to pay jail fees pursuant to a probationary sentence shall be liable
2 to the county or municipality maintaining the jail at the same per diem rate paid by the
3 Department of Correction to local jails for maintaining a prisoner, as set by the General
4 Assembly in its appropriations acts."

5 **SECTION 31.26.(e)** If House Bill 642 or other substantially similar legislation that
6 requires a misdemeanor with a period of confinement of six months or less to serve the period
7 in a local confinement facility becomes law, then G.S. 153A-225(a) reads as rewritten:

8 "(a) Each unit that operates a local confinement facility shall develop a plan for
9 providing medical care for prisoners in the facility. The plan

- 10 (1) Shall be designed to protect the health and welfare of the prisoners and to
11 avoid the spread of contagious disease;
- 12 (2) Shall provide for medical supervision of prisoners and emergency medical
13 care for prisoners to the extent necessary for their health and welfare;
- 14 (3) Shall provide for the detection, examination and treatment of prisoners who
15 are infected with tuberculosis or venereal diseases.

16 The unit shall develop the plan in consultation with appropriate local officials and
17 organizations, including the sheriff, the county physician, the local or district health director,
18 and the local medical society. The plan must be approved by the local or district health director
19 after consultation with the area mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse
20 authority, if it is adequate to protect the health and welfare of the prisoners. Upon a
21 determination that the plan is adequate to protect the health and welfare of the prisoners, the
22 plan must be adopted by the governing body.

23 As a part of its plan, each unit may establish fees of not more than ~~ten dollars (\$10.00)~~
24 twenty dollars (\$20.00) per incident for the provision of nonemergency medical care to
25 prisoners. In establishing fees pursuant to this section, each unit shall establish a procedure for
26 waiving fees for indigent prisoners."
27

28 **GENGOV/INS/SET INSURANCE REGULATORY CHARGE**

29 **SECTION 31.27.(a)** The percentage rate to be used in calculating the insurance
30 regulatory charge under G.S. 58-6-25 is six percent (6%) for the 2011 calendar year.

31 **SECTION 31.27.(b)** This section is effective when it becomes law.
32

33 **TRANSPORTATION/DIVISION OF MOTOR VEHICLES BULK DATA**

34 **SECTION 31.29.** G.S. 20-43.1 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

35 **"§ 20-43.1. Disclosure of personal information in motor vehicle records.**

36 (a) The Division shall disclose personal information contained in motor vehicle records
37 in accordance with the federal Driver's Privacy Protection Act of 1994, as amended, 18 U.S.C.
38 §§ 2721, et seq.

39 (b) As authorized in 18 U.S.C. § 2721, the Division shall not disclose personal
40 information for the purposes specified in 18 U.S.C. § 2721(b)(11).

41 (c) The Division shall not disclose personal information for the purposes specified in 18
42 U.S.C. § 2721(b)(12) unless the Division receives prior written permission from the person
43 about whom the information is requested.

44 (d) As authorized in 18 U.S.C. § 2721, the Division may disclose personal information
45 to federally designated organ procurement organizations and eye banks operating in this State
46 for the purpose of identifying individuals who have indicated an intent to be an organ donor.
47 Personal information authorized under this subsection is limited to the individual's first, middle,
48 and last name, date of birth, address, sex, county of residence, and drivers license number.
49 Employees of the Division who provide access to or disclosure of information in good-faith
50 compliance with this subsection are not liable in damages for access to or disclosure of the
51 information.

52 (e) As authorized in 18 U.S.C. § 2721, the Division may also provide copies of partial
53 crash report data collected pursuant to G.S. 20-166.1, partial driver license data kept pursuant
54 to G.S. 20-26(a), and partial vehicle registration application data collected pursuant to
55 G.S. 20-52 in bulk form to persons, private companies, or other entities, for uses other than
56 official, upon payment of a fee of three cents (3¢) per individual record. The Division shall not
57 furnish such data except upon execution by the recipient of a written agreement to comply with
58 the Driver's Privacy Protection Act of 1994, as amended, 18 U.S.C. §§ 2721, et seq. The
59 information released to persons, private companies, or other entities, for uses other than

1 official, pursuant to this subsection, shall not be a public record pursuant to Chapter 132 of the
2 General Statutes."
3

4 **TRANSPORTATION/FERRY DIVISION TOLLING ON ALL ROUTES**

5 **SECTION 31.30.(a)** Effective April 1, 2012, G.S. 136-82 reads as rewritten:

6 **"§ 136-82. Department of Transportation to establish and maintain ferries.**

7 The Department of Transportation is vested with authority to provide for the establishment
8 and maintenance of ferries connecting the parts of the State highway system, whenever in its
9 discretion the public good may so require, and to prescribe and collect such tolls therefor as
10 may, in the discretion of the Department of Transportation, be expedient. The Board of
11 Transportation shall establish tolls for all ferry routes, except that the Board of Transportation
12 shall maintain one untolled ferry route to any barrier island not accessible by a state-maintained
13 road.

14 To accomplish the purpose of this section said Department of Transportation is authorized
15 to acquire, own, lease, charter or otherwise control all necessary vessels, boats, terminals or
16 other facilities required for the proper operation of such ferries or to enter into contracts with
17 persons, firms or corporations for the operation thereof and to pay therefor such reasonable
18 sums as may in the opinion of said Department of Transportation represent the fair value of the
19 public service rendered.

20 The Department of Transportation, notwithstanding any other provision of law, may
21 operate, or contract for the operation of, concessions on the ferries and at ferry facilities to
22 provide to passengers on the ferries food, drink, and other refreshments, personal comfort
23 items, and souvenirs publicizing the ferry system."

24 **SECTION 31.30.(b)** The Board of Transportation shall toll all ferry routes no later
25 than the effective date of subsection (a) of this section, but is encouraged to begin tolling on all
26 routes before that date. In establishing tolls for ferry routes under G.S. 136-82, as amended by
27 this section, the Board of Transportation shall consider the needs of commuters and other
28 frequent passengers. In maintaining one untolled ferry route to any barrier island not accessible
29 by a state-maintained road, as required by G.S. 136-82, as amended by this section, the Board
30 of Transportation shall not toll any route to any barrier island not accessible by a state-
31 maintained road that is untolled as of April 1, 2011.
32

33 **EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS PART**

34 **SECTION 31.31.** Unless otherwise provided herein, this Part becomes effective
35 July 1, 2011.
36

37 **PART XXXII. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS**

38 **STATE BUDGET ACT APPLIES**

39 **SECTION 32.1.** The provisions of the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the
40 General Statutes, are reenacted and shall remain in full force and effect and are incorporated in
41 this act by reference.
42

44 **MOST TEXT APPLIES ONLY TO THE 2011-2013 FISCAL BIENNIUM**

45 **SECTION 32.2.** Except for statutory changes or other provisions that clearly
46 indicate an intention to have effects beyond the 2011-2013 fiscal biennium, the textual
47 provisions of this act apply only to funds appropriated for, and activities occurring during, the
48 2011-2013 fiscal biennium.
49

50 **EFFECT OF HEADINGS**

51 **SECTION 32.3.** The headings to the parts and sections of this act are a
52 convenience to the reader and are for reference only. The headings do not expand, limit, or
53 define the text of this act, except for effective dates referring to a part.
54

55 **COMMITTEE REPORT**

56 **SECTION 32.4.(a)** The N.C. House of Representatives Appropriations Committee
57 Report on the Continuation, Expansion, and Capital Budgets dated April 28, 2011, which was
58 distributed in the House of Representatives and used to explain this act, shall indicate action by
59 the General Assembly on this act and shall therefore be used to construe this act, as provided in

1 the State Budget Act, Chapter 143C of the General Statutes, and for these purposes shall be
2 considered a part of this act and as such shall be printed as a part of the Session Laws.

3 **SECTION 32.4.(b)** The budget enacted by the General Assembly is for the
4 maintenance of the various departments, institutions, and other spending agencies of the State
5 for the 2011-2013 biennial budget as provided in G.S. 143C-3-5. This budget includes the
6 appropriations of State funds as defined in G.S. 143C-1-1(d)(25).

7 The Director of the Budget submitted a recommended continuation budget to the
8 General Assembly on February 15, 2011, in the document "The State of North Carolina
9 Governor's Recommended Budget, 2011-2013" and in the Budget Support Document for the
10 various departments, institutions, and other spending agencies of the State. The adjustments to
11 these documents made by the General Assembly are set out in the Committee Report.

12 **SECTION 32.4.(c)** The budget enacted by the General Assembly shall also be
13 interpreted in accordance with G.S. 143C-5-5, the special provisions in this act, and other
14 appropriate legislation.

15 In the event that there is a conflict between the line-item budget certified by the
16 Director of the Budget and the budget enacted by the General Assembly, the budget enacted by
17 the General Assembly shall prevail.

18 **SEVERABILITY CLAUSE**

19 **SECTION 32.5.** If any section or provision of this act is declared unconstitutional
20 or invalid by the courts, it does not affect the validity of this act as a whole or any part other
21 than the part so declared to be unconstitutional or invalid.
22

23 **EFFECTIVE DATE**

24 **SECTION 32.6.** Except as otherwise provided, this act becomes effective July 1,
25 2011.
26
